Kevin Thompson, President, called the meeting to order at 6:34pm.

First order of business was the approval of the agenda. With no changes, Vida Ditter moved to approve the agenda as presented. Motion was seconded. Passed

Next was the Approval of minutes of last month's meeting. With a minor correction noted, Jessica Wiley moved to approve with the correction. Motion was seconded. Passed

Lisa Goodman gave a Councilmember Report. The next Lunch with Lisa will be held on October 25th at Opus Hall 202 from 12:00-1:00 and features chair of Superbowl committee Maureen Bosch to talk about the Superbowl and the many events that the public can get involved in.

Street Sweeping is coming! Go to http://www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/pu blicworks/streetsweeping/index.htm for specific information. Reminder to our neighbors, please do not sweep your leaves into the street. It is a violation of city ordinance.

The Minneapolis Municipal Election happens Nov 7th. Absentee voting is occurring now. Last day to pre-register to vote is October 17th. Voting for our neighborhood occurs at the school. There will be a seminar on rank choice voting hosted by Lowry Hill Neighborhood.

We have had several instances recently of break-ins in the neighborhood. Bryn Mawr is in the 4th Precinct and it is one of the safest in Minneapolis; however, crime does happen. Lisa introduced the Inspector Biard who in charge of crime reduction for Minneapolis. Inspector Biard gave a recap of the break-ins and burglaries in the neighborhood.

Aaron Biard grew up in Minneapolis including living in Bryn Mawr for a short time. He still has friends and family in the neighborhood. Minneapolis watches the crime patterns closely to identify trends and patterns.

There were nine reported burglaries in Bryn Mawr in the last three months. They have identified a pattern of convenient entry. Two burglaries involved garages that were

Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church left open, several burglaries involved a house had an unlocked back door. Three were entered through the rear, and two have suspect information. Most occurrences are happening during the day. At each of these occurrences, the MPLS crime lab is called and forensic evidence including fingerprints have been collected.

MPD suggests you be vigilant, know your neighbors, and lock your doors. Most occurrences can be prevented just by locking your doors.

Rowena Holmes, CPS, spoke on and distributed information on the important role of Block Leaders. Block Leaders can get involved in helping prevent crime as well as providing neighbors with an individual to turn to with concerns to be addressed by the City. To help prevent crimes of convenience, Rowena suggests having a neighbor pick up your package, deliver it to your place of business, or ask the shipping company to hold the package. Good common sense can help prevent crime. Interested parties can contact Rowena directly at 612.673.2833 to learn more about becoming a Block Leader.

Anna Collins spoke up about a concerning incident occurring in Bryn Mawr. There was a discussion about verbal harassment from kids in the neighborhood who appear to be leaving Anwatin. The City and the Police take this behavior seriously and will consider the matter.

George Warzinik introduced himself as 4th Precinct Patrol. He expressed that calls from Bryn Mawr are taken very seriously and encourages residents to continue to call if there is suspicious activity.

Alyson Quinn thanked the BMNA for their support of the summer nature pre-school. Quinn is President of Minneapolis Nature Preschool. She completed a summer camp program and is planning a full preschool for Fall 2018. Naturebased means approximately 50% of the time will be outdoors. Camp will be held January for ages 4-6. Interested parties can reach out at

Barry Schade spoke in support of a petition to encourage the Met Council to perform an EAW (Environmental Assessment Worksheet) of the proposed wall. The process for approval of this wall was done out of step with the standard approval process. He believes it is important for Bryn Mawr to relay that our officials should follow the standard process for important changes such as this.

Barry Schade moved to have BMNA petition the Met Council to perform an EAW. Seconded. Motion carried. The full petition will be available on BMNA.org for review.

Patty Wycoff gave the Neighborhood Coordinator Report via email. Everything is ready for the Sip and Stroll. Interest has been high and we expect a good turnout. Membership collected another \$900 in membership dues. The next event is the Harvest Dinner on November 16th. Volunteers needed to help cook turkeys. More information can be found at bmna.org/events.

JoEllyn Jolstad gave the Bugle Report via email. Joanne Michalec has volunteered to write next month's article. December is still available. Contact JoEllyn if you'd like to volunteer to write an article.




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


Area 6

Ron, who had lived in Bryn Mawr for more than 30 years, died June 30 at age 82, at the Minnesota Veterans Home. He is survived by his wife, Annetta Bray-Wagner, four children, eight grandchildren, and eight greatgrandchildren.

Ron grew up in Tracy, Minnesota and served in the U.S. Air Force in Japan, where he was a flight controller and was active in sports. He later was a police officer in Los Angeles and served as chief of police in Oakdale, MN.

He was a runner, competing in marathons, and later took up bicy-



cling. He held a record for 3,000 meter bicycle races in his age category and was a time trial winner on Route 66 in New Mexico.

Annetta continues her active life in Bryn Mawr, where she has many friends.

Parks History

The Beginning

In 1856, with a population of 1,555, the Town of Minneapolis was incorporated. In 1857, one year before New York City had its first park, Edward Murphy donated three and one-third acres of land to the town for that purpose.

Minneapolis and the Village of St. Anthony merged in 1872 to form one city with a population of 21,014. Both municipalities had been active in trying to develop public parks where people could gather to listen to music, celebrate holidays, or simply escape for a while.

By the 1880s a movement was sweeping the U.S. which advocated public parks in densely populated areas as a necessity to people's well being. In 1882 the city council began to provide funds for the purchase of land and a year later an election and a legislative act established the Minneapolis system of parks and a board of park commissioners. The population was then more than 96,000.

Charles M. Loring

Charles Loring, along with a group of other wealthy Minneapolis residents, led the fight for a system of public parks in Minneapolis.

Loring had lived in Minneapolis for 20 years when he was appointed the first president of the newly formed park commission. He became known as "the father of the Minneapolis parks system."

Cedar Lake

During the 1870s Cedar Lake was the regional hot spot for boating and fishing parties. An octagonshaped hotel called the Oak Grove House was on the southwest side, while Stetson's Cedar Lake Park resort graced the eastern shore.

By 1908, when the park board began buying up the land around the lake, all of the red cedars (for which the lake was named) had died or had been cut down. One of the park boards first projects for Cedar Lake was to restore the trees.

At the end of 1911, the first of a series of dredging contracts was let. Coarse gravel made the work slow and difficult. In 1914, work was begun on a canal that could connect Brownie and Cedar. In 1917, navigation between the four lakes became a reality--Brownie, Cedar, Isles, and Calhoun were now linked.

The dredging and digging had taken six years. The dredging had cost \$46,417.48, and the canal to Brownie had cost \$6,452.55.

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This was originally printed in December of 1992.



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Superintendent Presents Proposed 2018 MPRB Budget

Public comment opportunities scheduled Nov. 1, 15, 29 and Dec. 6

MPRB Superintendent Jayne Miller presented her recommended 2018 budget at tonight's Board meeting and that there are opportunities to review and comment on it.

The Superintendent's Recommended 2018 Budget for the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) focuses on maintenance, rehabilitation and capital investments for neighborhood parks through continued implementation of the 20 Year Neighborhood Park Plan (NPP20), continued sound fiscal management, providing responsive service delivery to meet the changing demographics and needs of the community, addressing the \$15 minimum wage initiative and continues the use of racial equity tools throughout the budget process.

The Superintendent's Recommended 2018 Budget totals \$80.7 million for the general operating fund, \$3.1 million for the special revenue fund, \$11.2 million for the enterprise operating fund and \$2098 for capital project funding.

"The 2018 recommended budget continues much of the important work begun in 2017, including supporting the NPP20 and continuing to integrate criteria metrics and the use of the racial equity lens for budget allocations and decisions," explains Superintendent Jayne Miller. "It also allows continued focus on sustainable funding, supporting ongoing operations, addressing threats to the urban tree canopy, continued refinement and implementation of operating efficiencies and targeted service delivery improvements, and organizational initiative and asset investment alignments to meet changing demographic needs across the city."






