Help Improve Minneapolis Parks

The goal of Earth Day Cleanup is to provide a volunteer experience and environmental education to Minneapolis residents and park users. This annual event involves cleaning Minneapolis parks, neighborhoods, watersheds and water bodies including the Chain of Lakes, Lake Nokomis, Lake Hiawatha, Powderhorn Lake, Diamond Lake, Shingle Creek, Minnehaha Creek, Bassett's Creek and the Mississippi River. Since the inception of the Earth Day cleanup we have removed more than 140,000 pounds of garbage from Minneapolis parks.

Learn About Our Environment and Community

In addition to cleanup efforts, environmental education is a key part of our Earth Day efforts. Onsite programs offer volunteers the opportunity to learn about various issues affecting our environment and community today. The programs are designed for individuals of all ages.

Earth Day Cleanup is a collaborative effort between the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) and City of Minneapolis Solid Waste and Recycling.

Individuals and Small Groups

It's easy to get involved in Earth Day Cleanup 2016. No pre-registration is required! Arrive at any site between 9:30 am and noon, bring a pair of gloves to pick up trash, and check in at the registration table. A site coordinator will provide you with gloves (if you did not bring any) and bags, and instruct you where to go and where to leave trash. Every site has a coordinator available to assist volunteers and to answer any questions you may have. This event is free and open to all ages. No registration required.

President Kevin Thompson called the meeting to order.

Motion to approve agenda. Seconded. Motion passed.

Motion to approve minutes of last month's meeting. Seconded. Motion passed.

Councilmember Lisa Goodman gave a report from the city. Lunch with Lisa is March 28th in room 202 Opus Hall, St Thomas' Minneapolis campus. The guest was going to be Mike Kennedy, Director of Transportation, but he is now unavailable so Robin Hutcheson, Director of Public Works will be speaking.

Lisa took a vote on the topic for the next Lunch with Lisa, either 911, or Animal Control. Other associations will vote and Lisa will select the topic from the results.

Inspector Biard updated the community on the results of the individual found in Bryn Mawr Meadows. No Foul Play is suspected. It

appears she was homeless and perhaps fell asleep or passed out and froze to death.

There are reports of drug dealing occurring again on Penn Ave, just off the overpass. A camera has been set up overlooking the area. Neighbors can call if they witness suspicious activity, to report license plate numbers, or if the dealing moves to a different part of the neighborhood. Patrols have been increased in the neighborhood.

Linda Shaheen and Lisa Goodman worked with Ned Abdul, new owner of the Century Link building, to use any left-over furniture from the now vacant CenturyLink building for Anwatin and Bryn Mawr Schools. Ned happily gave permission to remove what furniture they needed. The Board would like to thank Linda, Lisa, and Ned for making this happen.

Nancy Aleksuk from Swervo Development spoke briefly on the CenturyLink building project. Swervo is a local developer and has a history of renovating old building to new uses. The Downtown Armory and Uptown Theatre are good examples. The space may be updated to include outdoor patios and perhaps a rooftop deck. The building will continue as an office complex. They are seeking a large anchor tenant and they plan to use the space as their corporate headquarters. They will manage the property as well.

Aaron Diederich and Steve Minn of Lupe Development spoke in conjunction with Swervo. Lupe is committed to Affordable Housing and is looking to develop two new developments on the former CenturyLink property. On the east side, they are considering a market rate senior building, planned as 3 stories, for 55+ seniors, since there is no senior housing close by. The building may be configured as an equity coopera-

Second project will be on the west side and would likely consist of between 100-150 affordable family units. These will be rentals, managed by Lupe Development. This project would probably be about 4 stories, built on pylons with parking under the building. Aiming at the 50% or 60% of the metro median income families.

Lupe Development will work closely with the neighborhood to find common ground with what the neighborhood wants and needs. The noted concerns about extra traffic will be addressed, though traditionally senior populations do not have multiple cars. Initially a committee consisting of Kevin Thompson, Christopher Etz, and Vida Ditter will work on Lupe Development on how to proceed.

Chris Etz made a motion for the Board to enter into an agreement with Hennepin County Library to Digitize the Bugle archives and make them available on the library's website. Seconded. Motion passed.

Garden hose applications for 3 connections during the summer has been approved.

JoEllyn Jolstad noted the date for the Bugle Articles for the month of April. Kevin Thompson will write the Board article for April.

The Board reviewed the CPP report for 2017. A few minor changes were made. The report was approved.

Barry Schade was not present at the meeting, but submitted a written report on progress on SWLRT, included in the minutes:

A Supplemental Environment Assessment on changes to the project has been published, and a Town Hall Meeting will be held on Thursday, March 22, 5:00 - 7:30 PM at Dunwoody College of Technology. I intend to make a short statement at that meeting acknowledging that the BMNA requested such an environmental review of the Crash Wall, and the document substantially addresses the issues we raised in our request.

In addition, I intend to point out that the Bassett Creek Valley Working Group has completed its work and issued its Report and Recommendations. The Working Group provided guidance on the aesthetic treatment of the Crash Wall and had positive results.

The environmental review process related to the Supplemental Environmental Assessment should be completed in May, in time for opening of bids on the whole project. Construction should begin this Fall once Staff reports bids are awarded. that momentum for federal funding continues in Congress, in spite of what the Administration is saying.

After the Town Hall meeting next week, I intend to start paying more attention to the phasing of construction adjacent to Bryn Mawr. Access to trails is going to be a mess and I want to be sure that the neighborhood is aware of the evolving status. This will be going in for some time once ground is bro





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From the Editor

The Bugle publishes the BMNA Board's meeting minutes so that their work on behalf of all of us is known to the broader community. Volunteers are the Heart of Bryn Mawr

¬ pring is coming to Bryn Mawr and with it comes the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association's (BMNA) Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting is Bryn Mawr's official business meeting wherein board members are elected for a two-year term. The board consists of officers and area representatives. Elections for board members are staggered so that in each year about half of the board is up for election. This year, the positions of President and Secretary are up, as well as even numbered area representatives. Bryn Mawr is divided into seven areas, so the even numbered areas 2, 4 and 6 are up this year. Each area can elect up to 3 representatives to serve on the board.

The BMNA is incorporated as a 501c3 non-profit organization. It is the recognized entity representing the interests of the geographical portion of Minneapolis designated as the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood. The BMNA's stated purpose is:

"...to strengthen our community, improve our quality of life, foster good personal relationships and to open channels of information and communication in our community."

The BMNA strives to accomplish this mission by maintaining lines of communication with elected representatives and being actively involved in issues that affect the neighborhood. One well known issue over the past decade or more has been the Southwest Light Rail line, for example. The BMNA has been actively involved in SWLRT from the start with representatives on multiple advisory committees. One of the BMNA's most recent actions was to request a supplemental environmental assessment for the barrier wall that is to be constructed in the corridor between Bryn Mawr and the Cedar Lake Trail area. That

request was submitted to the Met Council and the review was done. Bryn Mawr representatives have also been working on landscape and screening options to reduce the wall's impact from a visual point of view

Another example of a long-term project that the BMNA has been working on is the redevelopment of the Basset Creek Valley between Bryn Mawr and downtown. The area has been largely industrial for many years and suffered a great deal of environmental contamination. Slowly, working together with the city, the Harrison neighborhood, and other stakeholders, the underutilized land is attracting interest and is evolving into new uses. The SWLRT is playing a part in the increased desirability of the area for development since Bryn Mawr will have two stations within its boundaries, the station at Penn and 394, and the station at Van White Blvd (the Basset's Creek Station).

In the coming few years, development will almost certainly come to other parts of the neighborhood as well since some large parcels are either for sale, or in one case, recently sold.





Where Big Mama gets her greens, and saves some green!!! HaHaHa-Ha." If you haven't seen the commercials, you'll find them with lots of Thumbs Up on YouTube. They. Are. Awesome.

Fancy Ray declares So Low to have "the best meat department in Minnesota: chicken wings, cat fish nuggets, neckbones, smoked turkey tails, ribs, chops, everything!" In another commercial, there's a reference to pigs' feet. When my wife and I were dreaming up the menu for Christmas dinner for 15 people this year, it came down to pigs feet or pork loin. The loin won out by a toenail, and my boys and I headed to So Low on a quiet Friday

The secret of her success

Milda's Cafe is a little bit of heaven for breakfast lovers in Minneapolis, and it has won accolades for years.

Opened in 1965 by Milda Hokkanen, the cafe recently celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary.

"We started with twelve tables and forty-eight chairs," Hokkanen recalled recently, adding that business was good from the start for the restaurant.

Still, the early years were not without hardships. First, there was a fire, which kept the restaurant closed for months. But the restaurant sprang back from that calamity, reopening on an April Fool's Day (the same day as the restaurant's original opening).

And there was the dilemma of the original furniture, which wasn't hardy enough for the customers.

"With those heavy guys, the tables and chairs didn't last," says Hokkanen, who recalls having to buy new furniture after just two years.

Milda's also had the enviable problem of being more popular than the owner had figured. Right from the start, the cafe was crowded with customers.

"I was frightened," says Hokkanen. "When the place was full, I wondered if the food would last."

In its early years, Milda's was open for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Later, dinner was eliminated, and the cafe began closing in mid-afternoon.

Breakfast aficionados flock to Milda's for many things.

One favorite is the cinammon rolls baked right on the spot. "We introduced those during the first year."

Omelettes, too, are a big attraction, including Denver and ham and cheese.

The lunch crowd at Milda's has its favorites, too. Among them, bread pudding and hot meat loaf—again made right in the cafe's kitchen. On Tuesdays there's a longstanding special: vegetable soup and egg salad sandwiches.

Milda's is also known for its pasties—a little meat pie. On the inside is ground beef, potatoes, carrots, and onions. On the outside is Milda's homemade pie crust.

Over the years, Milda's has been singled out for acclaim by a variety of newspapers and magazines around the Twin Cities. One columnist for a Minneapolis daily

newspaper even wrote his column from a table in the restaurant. His "Views from Milda's" ran for twelve weeks.

To Milda, the secret of the restaurant's success is that "everybody is treated equally—whether they are president of the United States." Another facet is a clean restaurant, she says, adding that "cleanliness seems to be tops" among customers.

In recent years, Milda's has slowed down a bit. She's turned over the reins of the restaurant to her son-in-law, Tom Eisenschenk.

"If it hadn't been for Tom, we couldn't have carried on," she says. We would have closed long ago."

Eisenschenk says the success of Milda's is the result of many things, among them quality of food and consistency from one visit to the next.

"You're never surprised when you order something."




Youth at the Capitol Tuesday, March 27

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Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

Killers of the Flower Moon: :The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI By David Grann

olly Burkhardt knew the members of her family were being murdered, but authorities appeared unable to discover who was behind the poisonings, brutal shootings, and arson. It started with the mysterious death of Molly's 27 year old sister, from what doctors claimed was "wasting disease." Two vears later, another sister was found shot in the head in her car, and shortly after that her mother died of the vague "wasting disease." By the time a third sister was killed in a house fire, Molly had no doubts that someone was targeting her family.

This riveting true story of the murders of members of the Osage Nation chronicles the history of the U.S government's broken promises to American Indians, the Oklahoma oil boom of the early 1900's, and the early years of the FBI, woven together in a conspiracy to take control of the oil the Osage Indians owned. Given how long this travesty went on, and the number of agencies and people involved, we were taken aback that we had never heard of this historical event. It speaks to the absence of narrative for marginalized peoples in the United States.

After many broken agreements, the Osage Nation was forced to sell their lands in Kansas in the 1870's, and bought a parcel of land in Oklahoma that was hilly and unsuited for farming. They were one of few American Indian nations to buy their own reservation. In a shrewd move, it was stipulated in the purchase agreement that the land's "oil, gas, coal, or other minerals" would also be owned by the tribe. When oil was discovered, the Osage

leased their land to prospectors, including the Getty, Skelly, Sinclair, and Phillips families. Grann writes, "In 1923 alone the tribe took in more than \$30 million, the equivalent today of more than \$400 million. The Osage were considered the wealthiest people per capita in the world."

The wealth concentrated in the Osage Nation was a great source of envy and frustration for white settlers and town leaders. Molly's family was not the only one to be systematically murdered. Between 1920 and 1924 over a dozen killings occurred, including an oilman who was advocating for the tribe in Washington and an investigator sent to find out what was happening. A Washington Post headline read "Conspiracy Believed to Kill Rich Indians." It became known as the Osage Reign of Terror.

With local and state authorities unable or unwilling to find the killers, the fledgling FBI stepped in. Grann's meticulous research documents the case FBI agent Tom White was able to pull together to expose those behind the murders of possibly hundreds of people. His work illuminates how the FBI grew into the organization it is today.

This book is dense; filled with dates, and quotes and references. There are numerous facts and characters to keep track of, with Grann linking direct quotes from resource materials. For some, it was difficult to power through. But it's a compelling crime story that needs to be exposed, revealing the disturbing attempts to destroy a proud nation, told with urgency and compassion.

Moms at La Mesa

The Moms were excited to visit the new neighborhood restaurant "La Mesa" on a recent Friday night. Though we loved "Sparks" and were sad to see it go, we were overjoyed to see that its space was so quickly filled. An excellent complement to our neighborhood in every way. We got there as quickly as our schedules would allow. We were not disappointed.

Because it was a Friday night, it was full but with minimal waiting times. There was usually at least one table available in the 'new' section in which we were sitting. The space is a lovely and well designed as before, of course, though a bit dark for my taste, but then I'm a bright lights gal. The noise level was very acceptable especially given how full the dining room was.

The beer and wine selections were good and not too expensive and there were some exotic imported sodas and soft drinks from South America. We'll try them next time or perhaps when we visit with kids. This visit we opted for adult beverages.

We ordered the chicken wings —4 whole wings to an order, not just drumettes. They were excellent, prepared in a chili sauce (gluten free), but with a Minnesota spice level (not too hot). They were a bit messy and we wished we'd had

some of those little packet hand wipes. We also ordered the Queso Fundito which we loved best of all! It is a spiced cheese sauce served with grilled crostini for dipping. Yummy! Kind of an Andean fondue

Next we ordered the Chorizo pizza on a gluten free crust, mahi mahi tacos and the Chuzos - marinated chicken skewers with Andean corn and red onion-tomato salad. The gluten free pizza crust was excellent. The gluten intolerant among us said it was the best she'd ever had. She even had to double check it was gluten free, it looked and tasted so different than she'd had in the past. The pizza topping could have used a bit more sausage. One in our party thought the pizza was too bland. The rest thought it was fine. The tacos were good, the grilled mahi mahi excellent but the tortillas themselves were crumbly, so not a finger food. The chicken skewers were very tasty as was the salad. We did not care for the Andean corn.

Then, yum of yums, we ordered dessert! We shared a piece of Tres Leches cake that was moist but not too sweet, just as it's supposed to be, and a martini glass full of chocolate mousse that was excellent.

Kudos to the chefs and the servers and welcome, La Mesa, to the neighborhood.



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
