## 2018 Annual Meeting Potluck Dinner & Board Elections

he BMNA annual meeting and potluck dinner took place on Wednesday, May 9th, 2018, with over 75 people in attendance. In addition to great food and conversation, neighbors were welcomed with comments from City Council Rep Lisa Goodman and School Board Member Rebecca Gagnon. BMNA President Kevin Thompson gave an overview of accomplishments this year and Treasurer Dennis Fazio reviewed our finances.

Thanks to all those who took the time to join their neighbors for a great meal and the opportunity to share their thoughts with the BMNA board. An extra thank you to neighbor Hugh Morris, for his time and expertise preparing our main dish and our generous, local businesses for donating door prizes.

# **Mosaic for Downtown Bryn Mawr**

Tn February, the BMNA Board approved a proposal for a downtown Bryn Mawr as one of the 2018 Community Projects. The artist, Cedar-Isles-Dean neighbor Stacia Goodman, has a number of mosaic pieces installed around the Twin Cities. Stacia's vibrant mosaic art commissions appear in hospitals, airports, commercial buildings, retail, and education sites. You can visit her website to see examples of her work. http://www.staciagoodmanmosaics.com/ According to Stacia, her mosaics transform blank spaces into portals for meaningful connections. They convey beauty, provide pause, and act as wayfinding solutions.

After receiving permission to hang art on the Market building from owner Doug Anderson, Stacia evaluated the wall and determined that "one large image would give us the most wow" on the brick space that faces Penn. She solicited input from Board members and others involved with the BMNA about what the design should say about our neighborhood. Some of the comments she received included having the work reflect the natural beauty of the neighborhood; capture the parks, gardens and the water that surrounds us. There is also a desire for residents and visitors to have a photo opportunity using the art in some interactive way and a suggestion that mirror tiles be used to add sparkle. A suggestion was to make the wall as playful and potentially interactive as possible.

Stacia created two designs which were on display at the BMNA annual meeting on May 9. Neighbors attending the meet-

Wednesday, May 9, 2018 6:00– 8:30 PM Bryn Mawr Elementary (Cafeteria) Kevin Thompson kicked off the meeting at 7:01. He welcomed the attendees and introduced the BMNA board.

Lisa Goodman, elected official and Bryn Mawr resident, spoke briefly. She thanked Patty Wycoff for helping her find the house that allowed her to return to Bryn Mawr. She thanked the board for all the work and support and cooperation with the City, on behalf of the City. She's glad

Rebecca Gagnon for the School board was another elected representative in attendance. She gave kudos to Bryn Mawr and Anwatin Schools and thanked them for the education her kids have received. She is up for re-election on the next cycle.

Kevin gave a state of the neighborhood and introduced Dennis Fazio to review BMNA's financials. Dennis provided copies of the balance sheets as well as reminded people that the financials can be found on the website. The BMNA is in good shape and expect to receive a good allocation from the City's NRP fund. There was a question on why BMNA showed a loss for the year, and Dennis stated we'd be recouping some of the posted loss through the forthcoming NRP distribution.

Patty Wycoff spoke on membership. She thanked Cuppa Java for hosting a membership drive and donating a portion of the profit received that day to BMAN. BMNA moved to a more digitally focused membership drive using email and Next Door.

Kevin spoke more about the purpose BMNA serves and represents Bryn Mawr for the city. Our purpose is to keep people informed and represents their interests. As part of that mission, for almost 20 years BMNA and Harrison have partnered to assist in cleaning up, advising, and providing recommendations on the Basset Creek valley.

We want to remind you that BMNA is a 501c3 group and your donations are tax deductible. We do our best to represent the entire population of Bryn Mawr. We have a diverse collection of events, including the Festival of Garage Sales, Annual Dinner, the Garden, Outdoor Living, and Urban Farms Tour, Ice Cream scoop off, Sip and Stroll in the fall, Harvest Festival, and Satunalia. This keeps our Neighborhood Coordinator very busy.

We have several community projects, reviews and awards every year. This year one of them is the mosaic, which attendees could vote on. Others include pet waste stations (coming) and speed signs. We also created a Community Safety committee.

We maintain the Bugle, which we believe is the last single neighborhood paper in the City, designed to communication information to residents and serve as document of the Committee.

Garden Committee maintains nearly 40 gardens, relying on funding from group, and volunteers from the neighborhood to maintain them.

BMNA has been active in interactions with the City on major issues including SWLRT, Basset Creek construction projects, park renovations, just to name a few.

We are always hopeful that residents will volunteer to be part of the board, or attend meetings to voice their opinion. We have several developments coming online in the next few years, including Leaf Brothers and the CenturyLink building. There is renovation planned for the office and then buildings to be added. Design review will occur on the 22nd of May. The architect of the project lives in Bryn Mawr. The target building was also sold to Opus, and planned continue use.

Brian Treece then introduced the slate of candidates up for election. The candidates were introduced from the ballet.



ruly, who has a more thankless job than a middle school teacher? I remember middle school (Jr. High for me) and we were not always easy to be around during those years. "I work with amazing people and amazing students, and I know you say everyone says it, but I really am the lucky one every single day, to work with these people, and with these kids and in this community."


I know for a fact how much Hayley Forrest loves middle schoolers.

"They drive you nuts, but you know what? They are so real, they are so honest and so loving and so forgiving. And that's something I think we all need."

"Sometimes you don't know if you're making a difference. A kid will get angry at you, or you'll get frustrated with them, and you don't know if they understand the meaning behind you pushing them. And that's my goal, is that they understand that it comes out of a place of love. Everything I do, and the reason I'm here, comes from that place...But I make them think, I hope. That's my goal: to make them think and to respect their individuality -and to meet them where they are and to bring them a little bit higher each and every day."

In addition to her award, Anwatin received \$900 from Royal Credit Union for classroom supplies. I honestly cannot think of anyone more deserving at the end of another school year. Congratulations Ms. Forrest and all those lucky souls that learn and work with her every day at Anwatin.







# When does the ice go out?



Spring does come, eventually.

But, some springs are earlier than others. One measure of when spring arrives is the day the ice leaves Cedar Lake.

Edwin Hartwick moved into his new house on the west shore of Cedar Lake in 1955. The next year he noted the date the ice left the lake. Once started, he continued. Each year he noted the date. He worked nearby and for a while he kept the records in his office. The result is a single 3" by 5" card, with careful pencil notations for each of the 40 years.

The earliest day of ice-out during that time is March 19, the latest is April 26. The average day is April 9.

Ed Hartwick's data show that the average day for the first part of the 40 years is April 10, for the last ten years, April 7. This shift to an earlier date is not evidence for global warming. It is probably due to the build up of the urban heat island. The metropolitan area tends to be warmer than outlying areas because of a build up of air pollution traps heat in the atmosphere.

Determining the ice-out day requires setting some standards. One recent year, a strong wind from the south built up a windrow of ice that gradually moved north across the lake. In one afternoon the lake became completely ice free. On other years, the passing is more gradual. The best criteria may be the Freshwater Foundation's Dick Gray's approach to say that the ice is out when you can take a boat from any place on the shore to any other place on the shore. This definition may leave an occasional floe about, but it will define the ice-out date precisely.

One certain thing is that the day the ice leaves is also the day of the first canoe or kayak on the lake. It is often the day of the first Common Loon on Cedar Lake. The loons seem to be traveling around quite a bit in April, and find the open lakes quickly. For many of the residents of Minneapolis, it means that spring is finally here and we can enjoy the lakes again.

(Massage, yoga, meditation, workshops) One can meet up with a friend or client over a cup of coffee/tea, schedule space for a conference or group meeting, attend a speaker's event or just get some inspiration in a "quiet space" for a personal project. There are many "membership levels". Space limits a more complete explanation of these, so here is a brief description. Pricing for these levels are on the web site.

The basic membership is called "Community Space" with access during open hours of all Modernwell offerings, wellness extras and fixed

use of conference and consultations rooms. "Desk" member perks include a locked file cabinet and more generous fixed use of conference and consultations rooms. "Private Office" and "Shared Office" are higher member levels with even more amenities. Two other choices are "Community Space Flex" member, to access this space 4 times per month and get 2 hours each of conference room and consult room rental plus discounts on creative classes and workshops or "Community Drop-In" member for access to classes, workshops and a day pass. The building is open Mon-Thurs. 7 am to 7 pm, closing Fri. 6 pm. Weekend hours may be viewed on the web site. The second Fri. of the month is "Free Friday" for women to tour and try out the space and possibly become members. Pre-registration for this is required via the web site Modernwell.co The next "Free Friday" is June 8.

The public is welcome to come into the reception area to view the space and look at artisan jewelry, handmade journals and occasional cards for purchase.



June 9, 2004


Mudslides close Highway 169 in Mankato after 9 1/2 inches of rain in 12 hours.



pening in 1985, Figlio's had a great thing going; for 25 years they dominated the corner at Hennepin and Lake. Since they closed, it's been a revolving door of restaurants. 3001 Hennepin has a reputation of being jinxed. But Fig + Farro is giving it a shot; vegan and vegetarian might be the ticket.

The revamped space is warm and inviting; with a great play space for kids. We sat in a round booth where we could see and hear each other, a huge plus for us. We had a charming but somewhat inexperienced and distracted waiter. But it was a Friday night, we were not in a hurry, and we enjoyed our experience.

We ordered the Feast of Nations for \$125, billed as a "special experience serving 4 - 5 people designed by our chefs to take your palate on a trip around the globe." What better way to experience all the chef had to offer.

We started with the hummus, ajvar, and pesto plate served with warm sumac pita. Then

goat cheese croquette, panko breaded chevre, roasted curried cauliflower, and Brussels sprouts with maple glaze and spicy nuts. Navy beans paired with nutty rice and avocado topped off the side servings. There are a number of gluten free choices, which our group always appreciates.

The jackfruit nachos with vegan cheese sauce and house-pickled red onion on blue tortilla chips was a surprise. The jackfruit was dark and shredded—could be mistaken for shredded pork!

A favorite was the Shakshuka stew, with simmered tomato, red pepper, organic cage-free egg and feta. Not as well liked were the cheesy shells with cashew cream sauce.

The food kept coming, but how many vegetables can one person eat? We actually turned down a second serving of jackfruit. Being dessert lovers, we ordered chocolate mousse and a coconut dish. They both need a bit of tweaking, but this certainly should be a first choice for those looking for a vegan and gluten free meal.


