

Kevin Thomson called the meeting to Order. A quorum was present.

First order of business was approval of today's agenda. With no changes, the agenda was approved. Next was approval of minutes of last month's meeting. With no changes, the minutes were approved.

City of Minneapolis: Councilmember Lisa Goodman's Report

Two more Lunch with Lisa events. The next occurs Sept 26, always the last Wednesday of the month, at University of St Thomas, focused on how the average citizen can assist with naturally occurring affordable housing.

Affordable housing is defined as 60% of metro wide median or less. Naturally occurring is non-subsidized affordable houses.

The October meeting may be a round table of developers, discussing changes in the Minneapolis market, development opportunities, etc.

After receiving an inquiry, Lisa discussed the development occurring at the IMS Parking lot. This will be another parking lot.


Lisa presented a heat map of the changes in Ending Market Value (EMV) across Minneapolis. Bryn Mawr showed an average of 8.4%. Other areas showed variations between 4% and 16.4%

Election judges are still needed. Early voting starts on September 21st.

Lisa mentioned a charter amendment coming through the process regarding small restaurants inability to sell liquor. La Mesa is one of those who fall into this category. A "Yes" vote on the charter amendment on the ballot will allow these restaurants to apply to sell liquor.

Neighborhood Board Diversity Survey— Jack Whitehurst, Neighborhood Specialist, NCR

Jack Whitehurst from the City of Minneapolis discussed Welcoming



Week, focused on welcoming and celebrating newer immigrants and refugees. NRP and CPP funds are still available, and Bryn Mawr has not yet submitted an application for its funding.

Jack also provided a survey on neighborhood boards and community involvement, to be completed by individual at the meeting. This survey is meant to gauge involvement from Neighborhoods Associations.

We received an Impound Lot Redesign Update from Bob Friddle, City of Mpls. This included a discussion of what the changes will be and some visual elements to understand what it will look like.

Kevin Thompson gave a report on developments on 2800 Wayzata Blvd.

Kevin read verbatim and update from Steve Minn of Lupe Development. The transcript of that is included here.

JoEllyn Jolstad gave an update on the Bugle.

The last Bugle was going to be 8 pages but was expanded to the usual 12 pages, due to new content that was submitted late. Please remember to send all submissions by the 20th of the month. Next month's edition will include an article from Joanne Michalec

Jay Peterson provided a report in lieu of Jeremy Staffeld for the Webmaster Report.

There is a survey out on how the website can be more effective. Takes just a few minutes and is open to anyone.

Kevin Thompson gave an update on the Neighborhood Coordinator Positions.

The Executive Committee has asked Lynda Shaheen to be the Neighborhood Communications and Funding Coordinator.

The Executive Committee would like to offer Kristen Hanousek the Event Planner position.

Vida Ditter moved to increase the budget to \$6,000 per year for each position. Seconded. Jay Peterson requested to review the contracts prior to the signature. Patty Wycoff has stated a willingness to assist in transition and will assist through the end of the month. Motion carried.

Jessica Wiley gave some updates.

Community Projects Committee will begin to solicit ideas for next year's projects this fall and expects to present the selections to the Board in January. The Mosaic is complete and looks fantastic. The painting of the railing on the bridge over the railroad tracks is being planned.

The next BMNA Event is the Sip and Stroll on October 11th.

Finance Committee has met twice, focusing on the long-term funding for BMNA. Contingency planning for what would happen if CPP funding ends. There are sufficient funds in reserve to carry through 3 to 5 years.

JD gave a brief update on the Gateway Art temporary committee.

Through communication with MnDot there is funding available to assist with neighborhood beautification.

Vida Ditter gave an update on the ROC/Basset Creek Valley.

ROC meets Tuesday, Ned Abdul and EXL permit for a School in the EXL building. Supposed to be retail, with living, and living wage jobs. 17th at 4:00 in the council room, City Hall.

Kevin Thompson moved that BMNA oppose the conditional use permit for the Charter School in the EXL location as it does not conform to the expectations and considerations listed in the Basset Creek Valley Master Plan as adopted by City of Minneapolis. Seconded. Motion carried.

Vida continued with her update. Heritage park now has a new paid director. Heritage Park now speaks for the section that includes IMS, called Heritage Sumner Glenwood. Dave Calling, who has worked closely with ROC is moving away. His assistance has been appreciated.

Nothing further, meeting was adjourned at 8:11.

Jay Peterson moved to pay Patty at a rate of \$20 for her time during the transition. Seconded. Motion carried.

Lynda Shaheen gave an update for the Schools Committee.

There is a fund raiser at Utepils on The School Committee is meeting tomorrow at Bryn Mawr Elementary.


There are two volunteer opportunities are starting up.

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

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Harmilton. What more is there to say about September 2018? Yes, I was one of the lucky few who was able to buy specially-priced advance tickets to the Tony Award winning Broadway touring production that came to Minneapolis this past month.

Even the most arts-clueless among us, have certainly at least heard of this show. The playwright Lin Manuel Miranda is a genius. He received a MacArthur Fellowship (popularly known as a genius grant) after his first Broadway show, *In the Heights* won the Tony Award for Best Musical in 2008.

In case you really don't know, this show is about the United States founding fathers; specifically the man who invented our treasury department. It is an interesting time in the history of our country to be looking back at its genesis. As far as I can tell, there are very few artistic liberties taken with the known historical facts of that time.

Miranda performed "The Hamilton Mixtape" at the White House Evening of Poetry, Music, and the Spoken Word in May 2009. Inspired by a biography he had read, that song was the starting point. It tells more historic details than you ever imagined could be packed into a four-minute performance.

In the education world, we know that the arts transform the lives of youth. Even STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) has become STEAM, with the addition of Arts. When I was growing up, art was symphony orchestras and classical ballet. Young people today still consume lots of art, but it is taking on new forms. Even though I work with young people for a living, I do not appreciate most of the up and coming musical artist. If I'm watching a performance on late night television, I will turn it off when an artist is repeatedly bleeped.


Hamilton is an incredibly successful melding of an old story with a modern musical sensibility. I am reminded of the value of new perspectives and the importance of telling stories in ways today's youth can enjoy and understand.

So, do I think everyone should rush out and get tickets to see this show? Absolutely. I am a self-confessed theater junky and it profoundly changed me. Do I also know that that is not realistic? Of course. But it warms my heart that Hennepin Theatre Trust and Project SUCCESS are making sure that 2000 Minneapolis Public Schools students and future leaders are "In the Room Where it Happens".

long's story starts in a refugee camp in Thailand where his family took refuge from Communist soldiers who wanted to kill them for helping the Americans. He came to the U.S. with his family when he was three years old. As with other refugees, he was a recipient of public assistance growing up. He worked hard and put himself through college at UCLA and law school at the University of Minnesota. He became an attorney, helping people navigate the different systems. He worked for Minneapolis as a civil rights investigator. He then served on the Minneapolis City

Council, chairing the Public Safety Committee where he secured funding for body cameras. Blong knows the possibilities and limitations of government. And he believes government should work for everyone.

I met Blong and his wife Mai Neng through the PTA at our children's school, Bryn Mawr Elementary. I am impressed by the depth of his personal and professional experience, his thoughtfulness, and his commitment to the community. He is not afraid to stand up for what he believes in, even when it is difficult. I strongly support Blong for Hennepin County Commissioner and I encourage you to do the same.

BMNA Yearly COMMUNITY PROJECT

The BMNA Community Projects Committee is looking for a few good ideas to improve Bryn Mawr. You could have the perfect suggestion.

Timeline:

Ideas will be solicited from now until December 31, 2018. The committee will meet in January 2019 to identify workable projects and make a recommendation to the board at their February 2019 board meeting.

The process:

Request for proposals October - December 2018.

Submit proposals to jessicasusanwiley@gmail.com by December 31, 2018.

Those who have submitted an idea will be asked to complete a brief form about specifics of the project.

Describe the project Who will lead the project? What will it involve? How much funding is needed?

The committee evaluates suggestions using the criteria listed below.

Is there leadership (an identified neighbor) to get the project done?

Is it possible (politically, physically)?

Does it meet the budget (\$0 - \$5000)? Is it sustainable long term? Does it have neighborhood wide impact?

The BMNA Community Project program has been in place for the last 12 years. Each year we ask neighbors to suggest projects that improve livability and safety in Bryn Mawr. Projects from past years include:

Downtown mosaic: Installation of an original Stacia Goodman mosaic in downtown Bryn Mawr

Minneapolis Nature Pre-School: Support for Minneapolis Nature Pre-School and Nature Play Adventure Camp for 4-7 year olds

Traffic speed indication sign

Bee hotel: placed in J.D. Rivers Children's Garden **Bench:** Construction of a bench at Brownie Lake **Buckthorn removal:** in Chestnut Park/Fruen Mill area over the last six years

Construction of a Little Library on Penn Avenue **2011 Pedal to Pedal garden bike ride;** which culminated in a renewal of our alternate year garden tour program

Downtown banner project: Part of a joint City of Minneapolis/BMNA NRP project

Ash Borer identification project: Our team identified more than 800 ash trees in Bryn Mawr and presented neighbors with a variety of options Energy Challenge: Over 80 neighbors joined the challenge and received statistics about their energy use. From this project we leveraged our relationship with SEE to receive two cash awards that benefited BMNA initiatives

Redesigning the Upton garden in Area 4. Our first community project; we completed a remake of the Upton garden and thanks to Cathy Skalicky, created a plan for ongoing maintenance. Drive by to enjoy the beauty

There are also a few projects still underway the placement of doggie waste stations throughout the neighborhood and painting the metal bridge railings on Cedar Lk Rd over the BNSF RR just east of Morgan Ave.

The Community Project Committee includes BMNA board members Steve Harvey, Area 7; Jay Peterson, Area 6; Joanne Michalec, Area 4; Jessica Wiley, Area 3; and Susan Verrett, Area 2. The committee also considers suggestions from past years. We just can't let go of a good idea!

Submissions from BMNA Board Members

n Bryn Mawr, depending the area you live in, the storm drains flow directly to Basset Creek or Brownie/Cedar Lakes which both flow to the Mississippi River. It seems like dumping is a problem of the past because people used to empty their oil right onto the street, letting it flow to the storm drains. Now that we are more informed we might still miss the fact that the slight oil or gas leak where we park flows to the storm drains each time it rains. Some neighbors rake leaves into the street which is against the law in Minneapolis. Those leaves send extra organic material into the system that breaks down and disrupts water quality. We picked up lots of trash including MANY cigarette butts which are pollutants. Even lawn fertilizers find their way into the storm water on major downpours. All things to consider.

So spray painting "Do Not Dump, Drains to Creek" will hopefully cause folks to stop and think.

The other way neighbors could be good stewards of the environment is by taking time to clean out the storm grates on the street by their homes. This is something that should be done after each major storm so that the water is free to run and clear the street. If each of us took care of it when we noticed, just like picking up garbage we would be helping our waterways and the people downstream.



Area Four Bryn Mawr neighbors took the initiative to start this effort. Marjorie Fedyszn organized this neighborhood event. Cathy Skalicky passed out material. Elliot and Olivia Etz completed 20 stenciled drains in Bryn Mawr. Let's try to keep this initiative moving forward. It does indeed take a village to make this happen.



to all of you who have so positively responded to this idea of a senior news column. 1 received many calls and inquiries and have learned many new stories in the last month about our neighborhood history ! Stories that have made me even more confident that Bryn Mawr is truly a great place to live.

One story was recalled by Lillian Lindsted (a longtime Area 3 resident). With great affection she told the story of her Bryn Mawr neighbors in the 60's & '70's. It seems that the neighbor to the north had a son who took a liking to the niece of the neighbor to the south.

Romance and marriage followed. That was followed by three small children. Nothing out of the ordinary it seemed. But those days were anything but ordinary for the nation, and Bryn Mawr saw a number of its' finest called to service in Vietnam. Lillian's neighbor's son was among those called. As time passed, his father (who was by then a widower) received word of his son's capture. Only though the kindness of Bryn Mawr neighbors (who for the next four years provided assistance with daily tasks, meals, and companionship) was the older man's hope kept alive. Then another word came—after four years of captivity his son was alive, well and soon to be released!

The joy of the reunion was captured by a *Star Tribune* photographer who won an award for his photo depicting the two men reunited.

But the story didn't end there. Later, when he was able, the son returned to Bryn Mawr to go door-to-door to thank the neighbors who had so generously given attention to their neighbor in need—his father.


A great story...an even greater feeling knowing that stories like this happen all the time here in the place we call home—Bryn Mawr!





Anti-Racism Bryn Mawr

n Wednesday, September 5, a group of Bryn Mawr neighbors met at the Hero/Uptown Heating & Cooling community meeting space to talk about race and racism. The meeting was in response to a thread in the online Nextdoor Bryn Mawr platform that described

two disturbing, menacing incidents of racism that had happened to one of our black neighbors - in a nutshell, where his family members were told by a pair of white men to get out, with racist profanity. On Nextdoor, the overwhelming response was, "That's not the neighborhood we want to be!" Yet, knowing that racism is a systemic disease upheld by structures larger than any one of us, we knew that we needed to come together around this problem.

So, an intergenerational group of 14 Bryn Mawr neighbors showed up for the conversation, facilitated by racial equity educator Rie Gilsdorf and organized by Kristin Markert. Since everyone in the room was white we used the time as an "affinity" experience - that is, a space where people of the same racial group can share their understandings, misunderstandings, fumbles, fears and frustrations without embarrassment. Just as important, they can swap promising ideas, and successes. An idea we discussed was that white people need a place to process with one another so that we don't exhaust our friends and colleagues of color by asking them to help us with our own processing, in addition to the processing they need for their own lived experiences. In fact, people of any race can benefit from the support and accountability of affinity experiences.





We used our time to define some common terms like Race, Racism, Implicit Bias and Micro-aggression, in order to have a common vocabulary. We don't need to add semantic problems to the list of things that can go wrong when discussing race! Much of the evening was then used to practice listening with an open mind and heart - something that is needed both when listening to people of different races and to people of the same race in our own families and communities whose racist words or actions we want to challenge.

The group decided to meet monthly to continue to study the phenomenon of race and racism in this country, state and neighborhood. Our next meeting will take a look at our blind spots by looking at how we're perceived by those outside our neighborhood as well as by people both within and outside the racial dominant who live, have grown up, or operate businesses in Bryn Mawr. We'll also look at where we feel "stuck" individually and as a community and will provide some exercises to gain insight into how to get "un-stuck." All Bryn Mawr neighbors are welcome, and Rie will be prepared to facilitate for a racially mixed group or a continued white affinity group.

ast Hennepin is in the midst • of a rebuild blow out; there →are high rises going up all over the place. The strip from Main Street to 5th is still recognizable; Nye's polka bar survived and the building housing Bardo is there.

The name Bardo-maybe Bridget Bardot? Ouch! She's too obscure and it's the wrong spelling. Actually Bardo is a Buddhist term for the waiting room between death and rebirth.

The restaurant was formally Bobino's and then Rachels. Bardo opened in August 2017. It's a great old art deco dining room, with the double sided bar in the center serving both the lounge in front by the windows and the cozy dining area, small, full and lively but not too loud to carry on a conversation. Our booth was comfortable

We were told the menu is designed for sharing. It included pricing for single portions and larger for sharing, so we shared all the plates. We were a group of five and ordered three large entrees and four sides and we ate every bite. The rainbow trout with grilled lovage (look that up) was wonderful. We also had lamb ribs which were tender and delicious but with only four ribs in the large portion, they were a challenge to share. We enjoyed the clams, mushrooms, and a very goaty cheese tortellini pasta with peas and chorizo. The mashed Yukon gold potatoes with chevre and chives and the heirloom tomatoes with farmer's cheese were especially good. Everything was rich and tasty.

The wine came from a separate mini bar with a sommelier who came over to our table to let us know she could answer any questions we had about the wines. There is also a full bar with fun beer and cocktail choices.

We save our pennies for these outings, and it's a good thing we do. It's pricey. The service was good and friendly. There were many staff attending to us and our sharing plates and cutlery were refreshed as new courses arrived at the table. But thinking about the space between death and rebirth, our souls would have been quite famished on that journey with the meager portions!

The happy hour looks yummy and affordable. We'll be back!


