First order of business was approval of today's agenda. With no changes, the agenda was approved.

Next was approval of minutes of last month's meeting. After the noted to add Arlene Fried to the previous month's guest list, the minutes were approved as amended.

City of Minneapolis:

Councilmember Lisa Goodman's Report The last Lunch with Lisa is on the 31st of October. The City's sustainability director Kim Havey talking about the City's sustainability plan.

Street sweeping begins on the 22nd of October. The full schedule is available on the City's website.


There was a zoning variance request for 2004 Cedar Lake Rd for a new garage. Additionally, 2012 Cedar Lake Rd

was approved for construction a single-family home.

The comp plan public hearing is the 14th of November at City Hall. Many of the proposed zoning changes to Bryn Mawr were rolled back. The exceptions are all residential properties would be rezoned from R1 to Interior 2. This means two lots can be combined and 9 units can be built. Also, lots greater than 40' could have 4-plexes or more on them. Basset Creek Valley master plan had an outlier.

Steve Minn of Lupe Development

spoke next about some updates to the Century Link development plan. There will no longer be a 2.5-3 story



parking ramp behind the existing office building. Instead, the new buildings will be weighted to the west side of the lot to allow for a surface parking lot for the office building. There will also be a parking platform underneath the new buildings.

The new buildings will be 70 ft in height, which is at the tree line. It also means there will be no buildings next to the homes on Upton Ave.

Additionally, what had been proposed as a family affordable housing development will now be a senior affordable housing development with 100 units. This means that the 150-unit family affordable housing development will no longer be built. The 100-unit senior market rate housing development remains part of the plan.

Third quarter Treasurer's report

was presented with expense vs budget and balance sheet. Dennis Fazio moved to adopt some minor changes to adjust language and correct oversights in the Fiscal Management Policy including some simplifications in handling cash to insure integrity. Seconded. There was some discussion on the requirements to provide receipts in a timely manner from those using the corporate credit card. Motion passed.

Staff updates Neighborhood Coordinator

Lynda Shaheen was welcomed as the new BMNA Communications and Fundraising Coordinator; she officially started on October 1st. She is working at bringing Twitter and Facebook back to life and has created an Instagram account for BMNA as well. She will be posting the BMNA monthly meeting agenda to Facebook as well as creating a monthly event for the monthly meeting. At all future events there will be a *#* that people can use to post pictures.

Bugle Report

JoEllyn stated this month's board submission is from Jessica Wiley and Kevin is sending an article regarding the new coordinator. There is a tight turn-around this month. chair, stated the growing season has ended. There have been primarily eight people involved this season who we would like to acknowledge and thank:

Reports from Affiliated Groups Karen Frederickson - 2040 plan.

The former prudential building was re-zoned to 6 stories. Buildings on the south side of 394, such as ModernWell, were zoned down to 6 stories. The Jaffee property and empty lot and others are still at 15 stories. The Planning Commission is meeting Monday Oct 29th, City Council Wednesday Nov 14th. City Council votes the 1st week of December, then to Met Council for final approval.

Vida Ditter reported on ROC.

Swervo has contracted to allow a charter high school on Glenwood and conditional use permits have been approved despite notable opposition from ROC, Harrison, and Bryn Mawr that it does not fit within the stated Basset's Creek Valley Master Plan for Glenwood Avenue.

With nothing further, meeting was adjourned at 8:00.

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aybe you've heard, there's a mid-term election in a couple weeks. If you watch any television at all, you have been bombarded with campaign advertisements. Most are incredibly negative and many are for races in which I have no say in the outcome.

I can understand how angry people have become about the state of our government but I am absolutely gobsmacked by the public expressions of those frustrations. I grew up in a time when people listened to other opinions and being civil, honest and fair were essential traits for a successful political career.

Now there is such extreme polarization. There is even one ad out there that literally says, "[S/he] is one of <u>them</u>, not one of <u>us</u>." REALLY? Them and us? These words are devisive and in my opinion not designed to rally votes for candidates but to foster fear, hatred and intolerance.

As a person who has always valued the experience and privilege of voting, I have never known what it's like to feel as though I'm not being heard. I have voted for candidates who did not prevail, and while it is not fun to see your candidate defeated, it just makes me want to keep learning and voting. I worry that the current election tone will make previously engaged voters drop out of the process because they feel powerless to be heard above the din of hostility.

Voting should be a joyous community experience. I always feel this at my polling place inside Bryn Mawr Elementary School where we typically see one of the highest voter turnouts. I enjoy standing in line with my neighbors and having my ballot handed to me by a familiar face. And once again this year, the Bryn Mawr PTA will be at the entrance of the school to welcome voters. This is the ultimate in building community. You can chat with parents of current and former community schools students. You can wash that ugly bitter taste of out of your mouth with a hot cup of coffee and a yummy treat that has been donated by a local business.



The CP committee discusses which proposals fit the criteria set, one of the most important being a leader who is willing to see the project through. It was inspirational to receive the proposals from the Nature Play Adventure Camp and Nature Play Pre-School. Alyson Quinn spear headed the creation of these programs; she articulated a mission, a work plan and a financial plan, and was the lead on seeing these programs come to life. Everyone from the CP committee to the Board to the BMNA School Committee was excited to see these projects take place.

The Community Project Committee includes BMNA board members Steve Harvey, Area 7; Jay Peterson, Area 6; Joanne Michalec, Area 4; Jessica Wiley, Area 3; and Susan Verrett, Area 2. The committee also considers suggestions from past years. We just can't let go of a good idea!

The result of the reassessment was that the single Coordinator position was split into two roles, a Neighborhood Communications and Fundraising Coordinator and an Events Coordinator.

The new Neighborhood Communications and Fundraising Coordinator is Lynda Shaheen. Lynda will concentrate on keeping neighbors informed of happenings in the neighborhood via email, social media, the website (bmna.org), the Bugle, and any other avenue that is workable and effective. She will also concentrate on increasing membership in and funding of the association.

History Center Program to Celebrate Burma-Shave

Maintenance in the second seco

Activities featured for the Minnesota Historical Society's History HiJinx program include Guests in the Galleries-reminiscences from Grace and Clinton Odell, wife and son of Allan Odell, creator of the famous Burma-Shave Signs; a showing of the video "The Signs and Rhymes of Burma-Shave" featuring historic and contemporary scenes of the Burma-Shave headquarters and the Bryn Mawr neighborhood; and a chance for participants to rhyme their way back in time by creating their own Burma-Shave signs.

In the 1920s, Allan Odell, then a young college graduate, and son of the founder of the Burma-Shave Company came up with the idea of the sequential signs to promote their product. The first signs appeared in southeastern Minnesota and through the 1920s, 1930s and 1940s, the signs sprouted across the United States. At the peak, there were 7,000 sets of signs in 45 states.


Initially, Allan Odell composed many of the jingles, but the company later ran contests which drew 50,000 entries a year, paying up to \$1,000 for entries which became signs.

Until shortly after the Burma-Shave Company was purchased in the 1960s, the Burma-Shave Company had its longtime headquarters at 2318 Chestnut Avenue in Bryn Mawr, currently the home of several businesses including Asplund Coffee and Accent Signage. At this location, the Burma-Shave Company manufactured its shaving cream products as well as its famous signs.

Bryn Mawr residents are encouraged to bring their own memories of the Burma-Shave Company in Bryn Mawr, or if they are unable to attend the program at the History Center, drop off your recollections of the Burma-Shave Company to the Bugle Box (c/o Dave Kelliher) at the Bryn Mawr Market.

Domestic Abuse Project (DAP): Working to End Family Violence

S adly, we are confronted regularly with stories of domestic violence. In 2017, at least 24 Minnesotans were killed by a current or former intimate partner, according to the Minnesota Council for Battered Women. MCBW reports that while 65,000 adult Minnesotans reached out for support services for domestic abuse, that's less than half of those experiencing violence in their homes.

We are especially fortunate in Minneapolis to have DAP (Domestic Abuse Project) in our city. Housed on Franklin and LaSalle, DAP has been supporting families for nearly 40 years.

At DAP, they work with families to end the cycle of abuse. They seek to permanently break the intergenerational cycle of family violence by leading societal change and by providing men, women and children with essential tools needed to eliminate violence in their lives.

DAP Advocacy supports victims as they navigate the legal system, and connects them to resources a victim often needs in their moments of crisis.

DAP Therapy is for men, women and children who are at a place in their lives when they can make real



changes in their behaviors. In 1979, DAP was the first organization in MN to offer a therapy program for men who use abuse in their intimate relationships. Since then, DAP has worked to not only heal but to prevent – as their work with children is truly preventative. Without intervention, children who witness domestic violence are 64% more likely to grow up to be abusers or victims.

Working with the criminal justice system, public policy makers, and other community agencies, DAP strives to open the conversation around domestic abuse in order to lead societal change.

DAP has a budget of roughly \$1.9 million dollars, which funds programs and services such as:

The Men's Program – using trauma informed therapy to teach men about the cycle of domestic violence and how to stop their use of abuse.

The Women and Children's program – supporting women and children birth to 18 on their journey of healing from the traumatic effects of abuse.

Providing crisis intervention services for families who are trying to escape the abuse present in their lives and/or navigate the criminal justice system as an abuse victim.




