

Brian Treece, Vice President, called the April Board Meeting to order at 6:38.

First order was approval of today's agenda. With no changes, Jessica Wiley moved to approve the agenda. Seconded. Motion carried.

Next was the approval of minutes of last month's meeting. With no changes, Barry Schade moved to approve the minutes with no changes. Seconded. Motion carried.

Commissioner Jono Cowgill provided an update on the Minneapolis Park Board. The Park Board Masterplan was approved. Planning continues on North Service Area, including Bryn Mawr Meadows and Triangle gardens. All of these parks are being considered and included in long term multi-year planning. The Park Board is working to expand the Teen Teamworks program to accommodate the more than 200 individuals who hire/apply. Additionally, as a steward of the environment, the Board is trying to push towards a ban of single use plastics.

Commissioner Jono fielded a number of questions, including inquiries as to Fruen Mill trail funding, which has no funding for at least the next 5 years, and questions on the CP right-of-way, which is still in negotiations.

There is a memorandum of understanding between Park Board, Golden Valley within Theodore Wirth Park to build a dog park nearby. Funding for the project is currently in consideration.

Lisa Goodman provided a report in absentia, read by Brian Treece Lunch with Lisa is Wednesday April 24th with Minneapolis transportation action plan and Mission Zero at St Thomas.

Leaf and bundled brush collection starts this week April 8th. Street sweeping is scheduled to begin Tuesday April 16th. Watch for the signs and don't get towed.

Dennis Fazio, Treasurer, provided the Treasurer's Report. BMNA has slightly more money than last year. BMNA gained \$4,027 in proceeds from the Winter Music Festival. Jay Peterson moved to adopt the Treasurer's Report as produced. Seconded. Motion carried.

Communications and Fundraising Coordinator Report: Lynda Shaheen sent a report in absentia. It was suggested to have a sign in sheet for the Annual Board Meeting.

Event Coordinator Patty Wycoff sent in the report in absentia.

JoEllyn Jolstad reminded everyone that the deadline for the Bugle submissions is the 20th. Jay Peterson is writing this month's article. Annual dinner notice will be included.

Karen Frederickson presented on the Visioning subcommittee under Communications.

Community Projects Monarch workshop (13th and 27th) is this Saturday at the Bryn Mawr school. Subsidized plants for attendees will be available. Working with the city on artist designed wrap for utility box.

Garage Sale prep is well underway, as is planning for the Annual Board Meeting.

Elections are coming! No new nominations have been received. Please make any nominations to Brian Treece.

Chris Etz reported for Safety & Traffic that speed sign is back up.

Schools – BMNA usually makes a \$100 donation to





Speaking of unplanned setbacks, what an ordeal it has been trying to



Street Sweeping

tarting April 16 for approximately four weeks, sweeping crews will take care of more than 1,000 miles of city streets in addition to sweeping alleys. To make sure the crews can do the most complete job possible, temporary "No Parking" signs will be posted at least 24 hours in advance to make sure streets are clear of parked vehicles. Drivers need to follow street sweeping parking rules or they may have their cars ticketed and towed to the Minneapolis Impound Lot. To find out which week your street is scheduled to be swept, go to

www.minneapolismn.gov/publicworks/streetsweeping and click on "street sweeping schedule lookup." Then the weekend before your week, you can revisit the website to find out which day of the week the street is scheduled to be swept.

Your Vision for the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood

hat is it that makes Bryn Mawr a good community for you? Is it a community where you enjoy living? Does the community reflect your values? What is more important to you – location or atmosphere? Is it a place where you like to raise your kids or walk your dog? Do you have a personal connection with other people who live here? What makes you feel connected to Bryn Mawr and are you able to call it your own? The BMNA (Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association) will be addressing these questions in the next few weeks.

Bryn Mawr Board members are very aware of how special the neighborhood is. While the physical location and layout is important, what most people value is the community atmosphere in which we live. We value stopping by the familiar Market for a carton of milk and a Powerball number, we like pausing to chat with neighbors as they work in their garden, we look forward to a game night in a living room. Maybe for you it's a glass of wine and a walk at the Sip and Stroll, a hamburger at your annual National Night Out gathering or a summer gathering in a backyard for music and a beer.

A newly formed working group of the BMNA has started a process to identify a vision for Bryn Mawr that looks out over the next twenty years. This activity serves to name a vision, mission and strategies to guide the BMNA as we work to create and maintain the kind of community we choose to live in. The vision, mission and strategies will be crafted in the next year and be presented to the City as a formal vision for the neighborhood. It is meant to identify what is important to the people of the neighborhood and

take a position with the City as a response to the changes coming.

This workgroup activity is an attempt to continue those efforts the BMNA has taken for its 43 years of existence. The BMNA has past successes, including writing bylaws that lay out the organization's purpose and what we strive for to preparing formal documents to create the kind of environment we want to live in. Over twenty years ago, in 1995, the BMNA form created a comprehensive plan for the neighborhood that supported our strategies to use the newly initiated Neighborhood Revitalization Plan (NRP). The NRP was a city-funded project to allocate taxpayer funds directly to neighborhoods to be used to further the health and development of Minneapolis neighborhoods. Bryn Mawr used its funding to support housing improvements, development of the "downtown" area, traffic safety improvements and park development among other projects. This Bryn Mawr group included over 35 people and four organizations that came together to create the plan document. The Comprehensive Plan is available on the BMNA website.

In 2003, another group of neighbors and support staff came together to create a Land Use Plan to articulate a common neighborhood response to development changes in the neighborhood. The Land Use Committee met for many years to review zoning variances and city plans that affected Bryn Mawr.

Our intention is to build on our past planning efforts. While being attentive to the physical aspects of Bryn Mawr as a neighborhood, this process will also create a vision of the kind of community we intend to live in. The BMNA Board will introduce this process at this year's (2019) Annual Meeting on May 8. We intend to complete this process in one year and present a completed document at the 2020 Annual Meeting. If approved, it will be presented to the City and as a guide for Bryn Mawr community develop ment in the future.

The documents that have already been created will be used as guidelines; we will update and expand from there. This includes referencing the



six Topic Areas, which are based on those in the original Comprehensive Plan:

- Richness of Community
- Neighborhood Focus and Activity in its Retail Setting
- Neighborhood within a Park
- Neighbors Active and Safe in the Neighborhood
- Neighborhood with Access to Life-long Learning
- Neighborhood that's Easy to get Into and Around

For this activity to be successful we invite the kind of participation that went into writing the initial Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Plan. We will use our e-mail list, website, Facebook page, Next Door, individual interviews and community meetings as some of the avenues to gather ideas and priorities.

You can start your participation by attending the Annual Meeting on May 8th at Bryn Mawr Elementary at 6:00, by contacting Karen.Frederickson@bmna.org or by completing the survey on our neighborhood web site at bmna.org.

Milkweed for Monarchs

Saving Monarchs One Milkweed Plant at a Time

rowing up, I remember my mom's milkweed garden as a summer resort for scores of monarchs. It was a spectacular sight. I also remember my 10-year-old brother swinging his tennis racket at the monarchs as they perched in the milkweed and how sadly the next year, they didn't return.

Looking back, I see both events impacting my view of monarchs; they are beautiful yet fragile creatures.

This past Spring, my wife took my daughter Greta and I out by the pond in our backyard. There she began to search for milkweed plants. When she found one, she would carefully turn the leaves over to see if she could find these tiny white specks, and I had no idea that they were monarch eggs. We carefully collected multiple milkweed plants and placed them in a small insect/butterfly habitat to watch them grow. Over the next few weeks, we would check on the eggs daily. From the eggs would hatch a small caterpillar, depending on the amount of milkweed available to eat

Nationally, the monarch populations have fallen off a cliff – the loss of food, warmer climate and pesticides are the cause of this according to the US Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS). What is happening to these magnificent creatures in their yearly 3000-mile migration to Mexico? What can be done to keep the monarchs returning to Minnesota in big numbers?

The state of Minnesota is doing its part by promoting pollinator-friendly yards. The Legislature is now considering subsidies for homeowners who convert lawns to clover and wild flowers.

Homeowners can also step up as neighborhood gardens have become critical habitat for the monarch. This spring as you plan your garden think about planting milkweed. Milkweed is not only a wonderful wildflower, it is also the sole host plant for monarchs. Growing milkweed plants in your garden not only affords color and fragrance, it also is a small step to help save monarch butterflies. Hey...It can mean more hummingbirds, too.

(Mad about my brother's actions? To this day my brother, who is now an adult, regrets batting away those monarchs and holds a deep appreciation for the environment and its stewardship.)




