Kevin Thompson called the meeting to order at 6:35. After introductions, the first item was the approval of the agenda. With no changes, the agenda was approved.

With no changes, the Minutes for May Annual Meeting was approved.

Next Councilmember Lisa Goodman's Reported. Policy aide Ruth Weakly is retiring. Cards are welcome. Lunch with Lisa is a field trip to different development projects. No Lunch With Lisa in July or August. Hennepin county is having a hazardous waste pickup. Reminder to continue to recycle. Hennepin County has local and regional distribution for recycling processing so is unaffected by international changes.

Steve Minn provided an update on 2800 Wayzata Blvd. Meeting with planning commission provided good feedback, characterized as "supportive and positive" by Steve. They made several suggestions. Steve presented an approximate schedule, which relayed building interior demolition through June, 2019, planning and leasing through April 2020, construction beginning May 2020 and completed January 2021, with full occupancy by December 2021.

There are issues with storm water run-off, and Aaron Diedrich presented several potential solutions, including underground storage, new holding ponds, or expanding the volume of existing holding ponds.

Kevin Thompson re-stated that a NCEC Elector and Alternate is needed. Dennis Fazio has volunteered to be an Elector. With no objections, the Board approved Dennis.

Communications and Fundraising Coordinator Report presented by Lynda Shaheen. Lynda and Jeremy are working towards live streaming the Board Meetings. Lynda is recommending a transition from Constant

Contact to MailChimp for email communications. The Board made no objections. Lynda is also looking into creating an online "store" so neighborhood specific items can be purchased through the website. Lynda request transferring \$300 in unused fundraising monies towards the purchase of Bryn Mawr T-Shirts which will be for sale. There will be a neighborhood social gathering and potluck at Chestnut park.

JoEllyn Jolstad provided a Bugle Report in absentia. Kevin Thompson summarized some of the issues with printing and delivery due to this change. There was a slight increase in cost as well. This is the Graduate issue, so salutations and congratulations should go in this month. Sue will write the next article. Jay Peterson reminded Board Members that part of their responsibilities include contributing articles.

Webmaster Jeremy Staffeld provided a Webmaster Report in absentia. Jay Peterson summarized. Significant

Jessica Wiley presented an update on Community Projects. Bryn Mawr Monarch haven was successful. Attendees received a \$40 voucher for pollinator friendly garden plants. The utility box wrap is in progress. Doggie waste station materials are in, and will be going up shortly.

Brian Treece presented on Events. With Patty's resignation, several members are pulling together to tackle all of the tasks to make the Ice Cream Social a success.

Jessica Wiley gave an update on the Finance Committee. Several discussions have been had on potential modifications to the policies and procedures. A balance must be found between protecting the Board while making sure the procedures are not overly onerous for staff, contractors, and Board Members.

recommend any procedural and/or policy changes needed to clarify and streamline those procedures. Seconded. After discussion. Motion carried.

Still no Garden Committee Chair, but Dennie got some volunteers together and tackled the downtown containers.

Karen Frederickson provided an update on the Gateway Art. Karen met David Bauer, Todd Carrol, Michelle Hewitt from MnDOT and Paul Miller with the City. There will be some expansion of sidewalk on the Mountview block. Their recommendation was to submit designs for next year's funding. Karen and JD will be meeting with Michele next month.

Lynda Shaheen provided an update on Schools. There are pending proposals on major changes to programs and pathways. Limited changes to Bryn Mawr but there were proposed changes to Anwatin including moving the Spanish Immersion out and keeping Anwatin as a community middle school. The vote was pushed to December to allow more time to consider and gather feedback.

Vida Ditter provided an update on ROC/Basset Creek Valley. A vacant lot near the Wellington construction, former Leaf Building, will be made into townhouses.


Kevin Thompson spoke briefly on a proposed change Reserve Lot 40. There is a proposal to add a Bump Track in that park.


With nothing further, the meeting was adjourned.



NRP Changes

he Neighborhood Revitalization Program (NRP) Policy Board has proposed a change to the neighborhood plan modification approval process. A Neighborhood Plan identifies investments that residents believe will generate the greatest community engagement outcomes and neighborhood improvements and meets the most critical needs in their neighborhood. For a number of very appropriate reasons, some of the strategies initially defined in the Plan may no longer have the same level of importance or warrant the approved investment when implementation is occurring. Other uses of the funds approved for the neighborhood may better meet its identified needs. The BMNA receives some of its funding through the NRP. NRP processes require actions to be taken in order to modify funding strategies, reallocate funds within approved strategies or the creation of a new strategy. Currently, the NCR Department Director has sole discretion to approve or deny these requests. The proposed policy change does the following:

- Plan modifications over \$100,000 will require the approval of the NRP Policy Board
- Plan modifications \$100,000 and under will be administratively approved by the NCR Department Director
- Authorizes programmatic documents to reflect these changes

This policy change requires a 45day public comment period, which opens on June 10 and closes on July 25, 2019. After the public comment period, the NCR Department will forward this change, and any comments, to the City Council. The proposed changes are posted at www.minneapolismn.gov/ncr/board s/nrp for review.

Works Progress Administration (WPA) Wall Located at the Cedar Lake (Kenilworth) Channel: Early-July

Salvage work is scheduled to begin in early-July. This work includes manual and mechanical excavation in sections. This work may take up to 4 months depending on the condition of the wall and preservation protocols. The channel will remain open for recreational use but will be narrowed to approximately 25 feet during this work. A full closure of the channel is expected later this summer; a 14-day advanced notification will be provided prior to a full closure

The Cedar Lake Trail in Minneapolis from Linden Yards located west of Van White Blvd to east of Royalston Avenue is anticipated to close mid-July, in conjunction with the closure of Glenwood Avenue and will be closed for approximately two years. 


- July 2, 1987 Big storm with 60 mph winds and damage in St. Paul. Thunderstorms are common on July afternoons, with a hot sun rapidly warming the humid air over the great plains. When to take cover indoors from lightning? Since sound travels much more slowly than light, thunder arrives about 5 seconds after the flash for a lightning strike one mile away. The less time between the lightning and thunder, the closer the strike. If you can't get indoors or into a car, don't be on the water, don't be the tallest object in an open field, don't stand under tall trees, and avoid metal (fences, land telephone lines, etc.)
- July 15, 2013 Great horned owl hooting at 9 am near the path leading into the wooded area where Hawthorne dead-ends. More commonly these nocturnal predators are heard at dusk, winter and summer.
- July 16, 2019 Full moon, the Ojibwe Abitanibi Giziz or midsummer moon.
- July 31, 1978 High 105 °, warmest I've ever recorded here. With daily watering, my tomatoes, peppers and cukes are producing a bounty .

A Blacksmith's Story

y neighbor, Carla Hall Willette, is a "Blacksmith." Yes, living right here in Bryn Mawr. This term is not used for only a horseshoe farrier but also includes these areas of metal work: art, sculpting, building and education.

She grew up in the Appalachian culture of North Carolina within a self-sufficient family. The women around her were all hand crafters, surely an influence on her early interest in the use of tools to create pieces of art.

Carla enrolled in Earlham College, a very small Indiana Quaker liberal arts college but studied blacksmithing at Penland Craft School focusing on metal studies and sculpture. Subsequently, she worked in the Bay Area of California for seventeen years at a non-profit organization teaching youth Industrial Arts classes which included glass blowing, woodworking, foundry and welding. She also ran a business while there custom designing and fabricating ornamental as well as functional metal pieces for clients.

These included metal interior and exterior railings, garden pieces, gates, lighting fixtures and furniture.


Because Minnesota has a strong metal arts community, Carla moved here two years ago with her spouse Rene Willette to re-establish her custom metal business and teach. As an educator she offers a weekend basic blacksmithing class for adults through the Grand Marais North House Folk School. In Minneapolis she is involved at the Chicago Avenue Fire Arts Center which offers basic blacksmithing for youth and adults as one of many types of class offerings.

When Carla is not doing metal work she can be found doing gardening, tending to her hens in their deluxe coop, building patio furniture, entertaining friends or cuddling their five month old daughter Franny. She never sits still!


Grover Warner, Area 6


