President Kevin Thompson called the meeting to Order and proceeded with introductions. A quorum was present.

Jay Peterson moved to approve the agenda with the addition of US Solar to the agenda. Seconded. Motion carried.

Jessica Wiley moved to approve last month's minutes. Seconded. Jay Peterson noted that his wife's last name is Ripke. With that modification, the motion was approved.

City of Minneapolis: Councilmember Lisa Goodman's Report Lisa has a new executive assistant, Judy Sharon, with new office hours to accommodate. There will be no Lunch with Lisa in August. The last Lunch with Lisa was a field trip which included 90 people over two days. Next program is September 25th, and the topic is 7th Ward Residents who serve on boards and commissions. Lisa noted that Minneapolis was ranked 4th of 75 behind Boston, San Francisco in terms of solar efficiency.

Kaleb Lindsey is residential community solar coordinator for US Solar, Based and operated and based in Minnesota. The solar project underway in Belle Plain will achieve an estimated 20% savings over Xcel, as these are the last of the ARR rates. The solar garden covers approximately ten acres in Belle Plain, producing about 1 megawatt. Interested parties can learn more at www.ussolar.com.

Treasurer Dennis Fazio provided a 6-month check in report. After a review, Dennis Fazio moved to accept the 6-month budget report. Seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer Dennis Fazio moved to approve the Finance Committee new Procedures. Seconded. Motion carried.

Treasurer Dennis Fazio reviewed the Financial Management Policy including utilizing gift cards as a mechanism of purchase instead of cash or blank checks.

Treasurer Dennis Fazio moved to adopt the Financial Management Policy. Seconded. Motion carried.

Communications and Fundraising Coordinator Lynda Shaheen sent in a report in absentia. Ice Cream social was extremely successful and well attended this year. The report included a review of some additional notes to improve the event for next year.

President Kevin Thompson provided an update on the Event Coordinator Position. Approximately 9 applicants, 3 showed up for an interview. The Event committee plans to extend an offer to one individual.


As part of the Communications Committee, Karen Frederickson received 26 signups for the Visioning Committee.



edar Lake Parkway at the Kenilworth Corridor will be closed for up to five days in early September in order to shift the freight track. Water main work will also be conducted in this area at that same time. The closure date for freight track work is being coordinated with water main work to reduce to duration that the roadway is closed. Pedestrians and bicycles will continue to have access across the Kenilworth corridor when Cedar Lake Parkway is closed to vehicle traffic. The longer-term closure of Cedar Lake Parkway for LRT tunnel work is anticipated later this year.

Saw the usual docks for loading taconite, wheat, limestone, cement, and coal destined for ports on the lower Great Lakes and all over the world. Something new: two big ships unloading wind turbine bases and blades from Europe, being carefully placed onto special large trucks for wind farms all over the midwest. At a glance I could imagine the transition from coal to wind power. No ships were at the coal terminal. Duluth has developed expertise for handling this labor-intensive cargo.
- September 5, 2018 Loud after-dark chorus of singing insects including crickets, grasshoppers, and katydids.
- September 14, 2019 Full moon, the Ojibwe Manominike Giziz or wild rice harvest moon. The first half of September is summery and can be rainy. The second half is fall-like and generally dry. It's important to water trees and shrubs as they prepare for winter.

Home Make Over in Area 3

This past spring, 65 eager volunteers from Krause-Anderson (employees, their family members and friends) gathered on a Saturday in June to restore the exterior of Area 3 neighbor Jerry Mordaunt's home. Jerry, a former landscape designer who has lived in Bryn Mawr for 14 years, qualified under the guidelines of Hearts & Hammers to receive an exterior home makeover.

KA volunteers scraped and painted Jerry's 1923 home. Carpenters patched squirrel holes in the house soffits, replaced a lower section of her garage door that was rotted and installed a new service door to her garage.





The landscape crew weeded and edged Jerry's beautiful gardens, overgrown because of Jerry's inability to maintain them anymore; a task she loved so much to do. Jerry actively participated in the weeding, telling volunteers the name of every plant and weed! Landscapers also rebuilt a brick wall that was falling over and relocated many large rocks.

Kraus-Anderson has been with Hearts & Hammers since its inception in Minnesota. Many KA employees have served on their Board of Directors and as Captain of the KA Home team on program day.

The mission of Hearts & Hammers –Twin Cities is to provide exterior home improvement assistance for senior citizens, disabled adults, and veterans of the United States Armed Forces or their surviving spouse so that they may continue living independently. 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

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Proposed Improvements Contained in the Bassett Creek Watershed Management Commission's 2015 Watershed Management Plan

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Bassett Creek Watershed Management Commission (BCWMC) will hold a public hearing during its regular meeting on

Thursday, September 19, 2019 at 8:30 a.m.

at Golden Valley City Hall, 7800 Golden Valley Rd, Golden Valley, MN Interested persons are invited to attend. The purpose of the hearing is to hear testimony and comments from the public and cities regarding four capital improvements proposed to begin in 2020.

Bryn Mawr Meadows Water Quality Improvement Project:

This project in Minneapolis will collect stormwater runoff from 45.1 acres of residential areas for treatment in new stormwater ponds and water features in Bryn Mawr Meadows Park. Annually, it will remove an estimated 30 lbs. of phosphorus and 10,500 lbs. of sediment before entering Bassett Creek. The project will be built in conjunction with a park reconstruction project. The project has a total estimated cost of \$912,000. Funding is proposed to come from the BCWMC's Capital Improvement Program funds through 2020 and 2021 ad valorem property taxes collected by Hennepin County on property within the Bassett Creek Watershed.

Jevne Park Stormwater Improvement Project:

This project in the City of Medicine Lake will create 0.38 acre-feet of flood storage within an existing wetland in Jevne Park and will reduce phosphorus pollution to Medicine Lake by 4.1 lbs. per year. The project will also improve wetland and upland habitat. This project has a total estimated cost of \$500,000. Funding is proposed to come from the BCWMC's Capital Improvement Program funds through a 2020 ad valorem property tax collected by Hennepin County on property within the Bassett Creek Watershed.

Crane Lake Improvement Project:

This project in Minnetonka will treat runoff from 13.3 acres within an underground treatment and filtration/infiltration system in a new park on Ridgedale Drive. The project will reduce phosphorus and sediment pollution to Crane Lake by approximately 9 lbs. and 3,500 lbs. pounds per year, respectively, and will be built in conjunction with the reconstruction of Ridgedale Drive. Estimated project costs are \$582,800. Partial funding of \$380,000 is proposed to come from the BCWMC's Capital Improvement Program funds through a 2020 ad valorem property tax collected by Hennepin County on property within the Bassett Creek Watershed. The remainder of project costs will be paid by the City of Minnetonka.

Sweeney Lake Water Quality Improvement Project:

This project in Golden Valley will significantly reduce phosphorus, improve water quality, and support a balanced aquatic ecosystem in the lake by performing an alum treatment and managing carp. Estimated project costs are \$550,000. Partial funding of \$220,000 is proposed to come from the BCWMC's Capital Improvement Program funds through 2020 and 2021 ad valorem property taxes collected by Hennepin County on property within the Bassett Creek Watershed. The remainder of project costs will be paid by a Federal Clean Water Act Section 319 grant.



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

Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

The Overstory Richard Powers

Where the Crawdads Sing Delia Owens

This summer we read two novels steeped in the wonders of nature, both written by authors whose knowledge of the natural world created wondrous images of trees, roots, forests, swamps, marshes and rivers, their interconnections, and the creatures who inhabit these places.

Powers and Owens are both environmentalists who write like poets. Powers' legend in The Overstory of a handful of activists trying to save the majestic forests of the northwest draws in the reader with his powerful images of trees growing, connecting and dying.

"The smell of the cuts overwhelms him. Damp spice drawer. Dank wool. Rusty nails. Pickled peppers. Scents that return him to childhood,,,Smells that plunge him down to the bottom of the deepest well and hold him there for hours.

",The snarl of saws and feller bunchers,,,A great truth comes over him. Tress fall with spectacular crashes. But planting is silent and growth is invisible."

Owens, a wildlife scientist and nature writer, has beautiful passages in Where the Crawdads Sing describing the marshes of the North Carolina coast.

"Marsh is not swamp. Marsh is a space of light, where grass grows in water, and water flows into sky. Slow-moving creeks wander, carrying the orb of the sun with them to the sea and long-legged birds lift with unexpected grace- -as though not built to fly—against the roar of a thousand snow geese. "


The Overstory begins with eight short stories, each connected in some way to the life of trees and then eventually, in activism to save the forests. From the young artist who becomes intertwined with the chestnut tree his great great grandfather planted, to the tech wizard who is left disabled after falling from a tree, we become immersed in the life of trees, and challenged to see the power trees have in maintaining the health of the earth.

Where the Crawdads Sing is the story of an abandoned young girl who survives in the marshes of North Carolina because of her love and understanding of nature. There are rich themes to discuss; the woman as outsider, domestic abuse, and social isolation. But at its heart, Crawdads is a murder mystery, destined to be a movie.

Each book had its critics. Some found Overstory to be long and overwritten. Some found the plot of Crawdads contrived, the dialogue annoying. But we all agreed the descriptions of nature in both books were magical.
