Lisa Goodman provided a report from City Council.Lunch with Lisa on the 25th will be a panel on taking part in Boards and Commissions. October 21st starts sweet sweeping. 1921 Drew Ave S is applying for a variance. 311 system will now be open M-F 7:00-7:00. CenturyLink project is working through stormwater management. Currently in the funding process. There will be a 6month closure of Cedar Lake Parkway to build a tunnel.

There was discussion around speed limits. Cities will now be able to set own speed limits and a study on streets including Bryn Mawr are currently included in a traffic study.

Former resident/Bryn Mawr Market employee, Dave Logsdon spoke briefly on events in the neighborhood. The spare change bucket, as well as other endeavors, has generated \$20K for different non-profits. He presented a check of over \$1500 for donations for BMNA. He suggested a ceremony to commemorate the 7th anniversary of the Accent Signage shooting. Jay Peterson moved to support the event. Seconded. Motion carried.

Dennis Fazio presented on funds remaining from NRP in Home

Improvement, consisting mostly of residual payback of loans. Dennis moved to move the funds to Improve Neighborhood Environment. Seconded. Motion carried.

Lynda Shaheen gave a Neighborhood Coordinator report. Stickers and T-shirts are still selling. A relator is giving stickers and T-shirts to clients. Members night is coming up on the 17th. Lynda has been having discussions with Rowena on crime in the neighborhood.

Molly Erdman, the new Event Coordinator, spoke on the Member Night at Utepils and the upcoming Sip and Stroll. November 20th has been set aside for the Harvest Dinner.

Jessica Wiley provided an update on community projects. Doggie waste stations are up. Volunteers needed to make sure they remain full of bags.

Brian Treece reported that Event Committee has met and started discussions around upcoming and future events.

Jessica Wiley stated that the Finance Committee will be returning with more information on the differences between contractors and employees with respect to the Board, and also findings in the financial review on having a combined Treasurer/Accountant role.

Schools Committee met and started working on Taste of Anwatin, to be held Thursday, December 12th.


Vida Ditter provided information from ROC for Bassett Creek Valley. Specifically, Gerard and Humbolt, south of Glenwood. There is a proposal to build a 4 story, 94 market rate units, studio, 1-bedroom, and a few 2-bedroom units. There has been negative reaction from renters who will be impacted.


Barry Schade stated that with Light Rail construction having begun, access to trails have been impacted.




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From the Editor

wo weeks ago, I did a quick day trip to the cabin to squeeze in one more day of summer. It was 80 degrees and perfect for sitting in the sun and reading a book. I didn't take the pontoon out, but I did swim and float on a raft in the already-chilly water. We had pulled in our window air conditioners at home when the heatwave hit. So, a retreat to the water was just what I needed on the day before the always-crazy opening of after school registration at work. With all the drama in and around our house these past (eight!) months, I've come to truly appreciate any chance to escape the mess and responsibility if even for such a short time.

Now the autumnal equinox has passed and temperatures are back to a more seasonal 65. Overnight lows in the 40s are expected in the coming week. And here we sit, still without a furnace due to the big radiator that was disconnected so repairs could be made on the porch. We did have a chilly run of nights a few weeks ago but this seems serious.

Apparently qualified boiler mechanics are a rarity – perhaps a dying breed. I don't know what it takes to become certified in this work but for anyone who likes working with their hands and wants to make a good, steady income with flexible hours, this is one trade that is truly in demand. With all the old homes in Minneapolis being restored instead of demolished, it seems likely that need will continue to outpace supply.

I have always been more about reuse, repair and restore than replace. Partially because I never really had the funds for a big remodel but also because I appreciate things with a little history and enjoy the challenge of fixing or repurposing something.

So it really troubles me to see dumpsters popping up all over the city. My mind goes to HGTV and homeowners tearing out walls and perfectly lovely flooring to "upgrade" their spaces. I guess it is better than what is happening in my brother's suburban neighborhood where people are intentionally allowing older properties to degrade so they are condemned and can be torn down and replaced with McMansions.

But of course, our own project necessitated several dumpsters so I am no one to talk. Much like the article in today's paper about the myth of plastics recycling, you put it in the container and magically, it goes away. Right? Oh well. "Makin' Bryn Mawr a Monarch Haven"

Community Project Wraps-up on a High Note

uring two Saturday mornings in April, about 40 people attended wonderfully informative presentations about Monarchs and Monarch-friendly gardens provided by Stephanie Rathsack of the Monarch Joint Venture.

Bryn Mawr participants were given the opportunity to be reimbursed up to \$40for their purchase of Monarch garden plants, by the BMNA. The Monarch gardens that were created as an outcome of this community project brought joy and interest to the gardeners and to our neighborhood at large, and most of all, the new gardens provided more habitat in Bryn Mawr for Monarchs!

Here are a few of the comments and photos participants in the project provided when asked about their experience this summer:

Emily, Area 3:

"The monarch garden project is a lovely initiative. I really enjoyed learning more about monarchs, picking out plants, and getting my pollinator garden started!"

Elaine, Area 5:

"After attending the workshop we were glad to learn that our garden was pretty well set up for Monarchs, but did buy some plants to supple-

ment. Although this wasn't an intended part of the program, we also decided to raise monarchs by collecting eggs and small caterpillars from milkweed in our yard and behind the school, then feed them and keep them safe from predators in containers in our backyard. We've had a couple dozen go through their full metamorphosis and have several chrysalises and caterpillars still going."


"Thanks for making this program happen, we've had a lot of fun with our butterflies this year."

Wendy, Area 6:

"...half of my front yard is common milkweed and purple bergamot, and I see 4 or 6 bees out there when I pass down the steps."

"...your efforts have wrought changes. Have you noticed how many Bryn Mawrites (even those with smooth green lawns) have been leaving the one or two milkweed plants poking up in their lawns to flourish, even if surrounded by perfect lawn? You are getting your message across: we will save milkweed in Bryn Mawr!"



- 2011 Pedal to Pedal garden bike ride; which culminated in a renewal of our alternate year garden tour program
- Downtown banner project: Part of a joint City of
- Minneapolis/BMNA NRP project Ash Borer identification project:
- Our team identified more than 800 ash trees in Bryn Mawr and presented neighbors with a variety of options
- Energy Challenge. Over 80 neighbors joined the challenge and received statistics about their energy use. From this project we leveraged our relationship with SEE to receive two cash awards that benefited BMNA initiatives
- Redesigning the Upton garden in Area 4. Our first community
- Is there leadership (an identified neighbor) to get the project done?
- Is it possible (politically, physicallv)?
- Does it meet the budget (\$0 -\$5000)?
- Is it sustainable long term?
- Does it have neighborhood wide impact?

The BMNA Community Project program has been in place for the last 13 years. Each year we ask neighbors to suggest projects that improve livability and safety in Bryn Mawr. Projects from past years include:

Four Doggy Waste Stations installed throughout the neighborhood

project; we completed a remake of the Upton garden and thanks to Cathy Skalicky, created a plan for ongoing maintenance. Drive by to enjoy the beauty

There are also a few projects still underway—wrapping a utility box and painting the metal bridge railings on Cedar Lk Rd over the BNSF RR just east of Morgan Ave. The Community Project Committee includes BMNA board members Steve Harvey, Area 7; Jay Peterson, Area 6; Joanne Michalec, Area 4; Jessica Wiley, Area 3; Susan Verrett, Area 2. and Neighborhood Coordinator, Lynda Shaheen. The committee also considers suggestions from past years. We just can't let go of a good idea!



- October 9, 2012 Bald eagle fishing in Lake Calhoun. Many of these magnificent raptors have adjusted to urban life, nesting in tall dead trees as they do in rural areas. As city lakes freeze, eagles will move south and spend the winter where they can find open water, for example along Lake Pepin.
- October 12, 2002 Dedication of the Bassett's Creek bike trail through the Bryn Mawr and Harrison neighborhoods. When Three Rivers Parks completed an extension of the 63 mile Luce Line State Trail to Wirth Park, our local trail was renamed "Luce Line" to indicate continuity. A connection to the Bassett's Creek Valley LRT station will soon be under construction.
- October 12, 2009 2 1/2 inches of snow.
- October 13, 2019 Full moon, the Ojibwe Banakwe Giziz or falling leaves moon.
- October 15, 2014 First sighting of the constellation Orion, "The Hunter", a sign of fall. As winter approaches, this familiar rectangle of bright stars will appear higher and earlier in the southern sky.

HUMMINGBIRDS OF THE AMERICAS- Carrol Henderson

After nearly 45 years with the Minnesota DNR, Carrol Henderson retired in October of 2018 and has been busy ever since! He and his wife, Ethelle, led a birding trip to Colombia last March and are already planning birding trips to Guatemala in January of 2020 and to Colombia next March.

This program will be based on the information and photos he has taken over the past 30-plus years of birding travels from Arizona to Patagonia. He has encountered over 170 species of hummingbirds and photographed over 110 of those species. His presentation will cover life histories, ecological adaptations, flight, and migration, as well as historical myths and folklore associated with Apache, Aztec, and Inca cultures. He has always been amazed at the stunning iridescence of hummingbirds, their unique adaptations for flight that are different from all other birds, their adaptations for survival from sea level to over 17,000 feet in the Andes, and their ability to live in habitats ranging from deserts to rainforests.



Domestic Abuse Project (DAP): Working to End Family Violence

id you know that kids who witness domestic abuse are found to be at least 6 months behind developmentally? This includes being behind socially, emotionally, physically, and/ or cognitively. Not meeting developmental milestones is exactly why kids like Jackson, who attended DAP's Youth Program, are behind in school, have trouble building friendships, feel they are to blame for the fighting in their homes and are confused about their feelings. But after Jackson completed the Youth Group, he learned that he could make friends, say how he was feeling, and most importantly, that the fighting in his family was not his fault and that he was not alone.

We are fortunate in Minneapolis to have DAP in our city, housed on Broadway and Central. DAP is celebrating 40 years of supporting families on October 24, 2019, at the Parallel Cafe.

At DAP, they work with families to end the cycle of abuse. They seek to permanently break the intergenerational cycle of family violence by leading societal change and by providing men, women and children with essential tools needed to eliminate violence in their lives.

DAP Advocacy supports victims as they navigate the legal system, and connects them to resources a victim often needs in their moments of crisis.

DAP Therapy is for men, women and children who are at a place in their lives when they can make real changes in their behaviors. In 1979, DAP was the first organization in MN to offer a therapy program for men who use abuse in their intimate relationships. Since then, DAP has worked to not only heal but to prevent – as their work with children is truly preventative. Without intervention, children who witness domestic violence are 64% more likely to grow up to be abusers or victims.

DAP has a budget of roughly \$1.9 million dollars, which funds programs and services such as:

The Men's Program – using trauma informed therapy to teach men about the cycle of domestic violence and how to stop their use of abuse.

The Women and Children's program – supporting women and children birth to 18 on their journey of healing from the traumatic effects of abuse.

Providing crisis intervention services for families who are trying to escape the abuse present in their lives and/or navigate the criminal justice system as an abuse victim.




Bryn Mawr Student Named National Merit Semi Finalist


