Chris Etz moved to approve. Seconded. Motion carried.

Approval of minutes of last month's meeting.

Chris Etz moved to approve as amended. Seconded. Motion carried.

City of Minneapolis Councilmember Lisa Goodman provided a report. City Budget public hearing on December 11 starts at 6:05pm and is open to the public. Later with Lisa is on December 9th from 4:30-6:30 at the City Club Apartments and will include a look at micro-apartments. Attendees are asked to bring an item for donation, a list will be sent out via Lisa's email distribution. Animal Care Control is having a free adoption event on November 22nd.


The City is replacing all water meters in the next 5 years, starting in Kenwood, Lowry Hill, and CIDNA neighborhoods.

Street sweeping will be done over the next week and yard waste collection ends next week on November 22nd.

Lisa had several zoning updates: 1921 Drew Ave had an approved variance to construct a rear deck, 2109 Ewing Ave S will do an ADU above garage, 411 Newton will be putting in a pool, and Pioneer Paper requested an expansion of a nonconforming use but are planning no changes.

Karen Frederickson ask a question about Small neighborhood plans. Lisa stated that SNP were included for consideration in the 2040 plan.

Jennifer Samaha from the US Census bureau spoke. She is a 2020 Census Jobs Recruiter. This Census will be primarily done online. Census forms cannot be placed in a mailbox, so if the household has not participated in the census will receive in-person visits. Information and applications can be found here:

Steve Minn of Lupe Development gave a update on the 2800 Wayzata project. Bryn Mawr project received a \$2M grant from the city for affordable housing. Steve provided a brief walk through of the storm water runoff issue. There are two pond options, one on Theo Wirth parkland and one on Anwatin school property. Applications to the City for conditional use are being presented to the City. Steve had several letters to School Board, Park Board, and Planning Commission crafted and would like official BMNA support.

Steve fielded a number of questions regarding the ponds and the usage including the actual look of the pond, whether it would be or needed to be fenced in, and the depth of the ponds.

Dennis Fazio provided a Treasurer's Report. Provided an overview of current health. We have drawn almost all the funds available via CPP. Next year, funds of almost \$25K will be available.

Dennis made a motion to that: 1. BMNA renew the Fiscal Sponsorship agreement with PASS for 2020 2. BMNA set up a separate Quick-Books subscription at the "Essentials" option level for PASS bookkeeping

3. BMNA continue to subsidize PASS for ongoing accounting and bookkeeping labor and startup labor for the new subscription

4. BMNA subsidize 50% of the Quickbooks subscription fees (at a cost of \$10/mo, \$120/yr) and bill PASS for the remainder
5. The Board review this arrangement in 6 months to evaluate the level of subsidy we want to sustain. After some discussion, motion carried.

Lastly, Dennis Fazio reminded attendees that BMNA has G-suite account which includes document storage. Dennis is using it for storage of his documents and encourages others to store BMNA documents there. He is also looking for someone to take over AV duties starting in December.

Communications and Fundraising

Harvest Dinner is on Wednesday, November 20. Centerpiece donations would be welcome. Next month is the Taste of Anwatin and the Craft Fair. Recommendations for local bands are being accepted.

Arlene Fried request that more outreach to south side residents occur for events.

JoEllyn Jolstad, Bugle Editor reported. The deadline is the 20th. Reminder that there is no Bugle in January so get ads or articles in. The Bugle plans to run an ad for the US Census.

Community Projects update by Jessica Wiley read by Kevin Thompson stated via email that solicitations for 2020 community projects continue until the 31st of December, and that wrap for the utility boxes are in the final stage.

Finance/Membership meeting on Dec 4th and tomorrow is Give to the Max is tomorrow.

Barry Schade reports that SWLRT construction continues.

Vida Ditter retired from the BMNA Board in October, so there is an opening for an Area 6 Rep as well as a representative to Basset Creek/ROC. The Board wishes to express our sincerest thanks to Vida for her years of dedication and commitment to the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood.

Dennis moved that the Board authorize Kevin Thompson to work with Steve Minn to execute the letters of support from BMNA on the 2800 Wayzata project. Seconded. Motion carried.

From the Editor

have worked for Minneapolis Community Education for nine and a half years. This fall I finally signed up for a class.Why? Because it was at Anwatin Middle School! It was so fun to be in those familiar halls where all three of our kids passed some of the most joyful and awkward times of their lives.

Back in the day, when I was working as a Family Liaison at Anwatin, there was a Community Education Coordinator working at the school who had evening programs several days a week. I served on her advisory council and worked with her to find teachers to offer dance classes for my then preschool student. But it never really occurred to me to take any classes targeted at adults. She retired a few years later and a Beacons Program for youth moved in.

For over 50 years, Minneapolis Community Education has been ever-evolving to meet the needs of the people it serves. In the past 10 years they have increased the way they serve K-12 students in collaboration with the Minneapolis Public Schools district of which they are part. Despite the loss of Anwatin as a site, adult enrichment opportunities have also grown.

You may be wondering what class could possibly be so appealing


that I would enroll? Why Pickleball of course – the most popular class in all of Community Education. This fall there were 14 classes at six different schools. There are some with instructors and some (like the one at Anwatin) that are "open gym" for those who already know how to play. Almost all of them filled this fall filled on the first day of registration.

Registration for the Winter 2020 session opens at Midnight, Tuesday, January 2. Most classes will not fill by 1:00 am, but Pickleball might. So I will be logged on early to get my spot for the winter session. If an indoor paddle/racquet sport resembling a cross between tennis and giant ping-pong with a whiffle ball is not your thing, there will be lots of other options for you to nurture your inner lifelong learner.

A lot of fun things will happen between then and now. Dec. 12 is the Craft Fair at Taste of Anwatin (Pickleball cancelled for the evening!) A couple days later it is Saturnalia in Bryn Mawr's downtown business district. Thanksgiving is next week and after an emotional year, we are once again reflecting on the many things for which we are thankful. Wishing the happiest of holidays to you and yours!

Reduced price passes for Lyft Scooters

There is a great equity opportunity for low-income residents to use Lyft Scooters for just \$5 per month. This includes unlimited, free, 30-minute rides in Minneapolis. This program is called The Community Pass. It is available to residents ages 18+ who are currently enrolled in, or qualify for, a state or federal assistance program such as Medicaid, SNAP, or a discounted utility bill. Batteries no longer accepted in Minneapolis recycling

lects batteries from homes. No batteries may go with the recycling. Alkaline batteries (single use AA, AAA, etc.) may be disposed of in the Solid Waste & Recycling black garbage carts. Rechargeable batteries, lithium batteries and items containing batteries such as electronic cigarettes and cellphones are prohibited from all City of Minneapolis garbage and recycling carts. **What to do with batteries**

Hennepin County will accept batteries at its permanent drop-off locations in Bloomington and Brooklyn Park. It will also accept batteries at hazardous waste drop-off events located around Minneapolis in the spring, summer and fall.

Minneapolis passes 5 cent fee ordinance for carryout bags

The Minneapolis City Council has passed an ordinance requiring retail establishments to charge a fee of at least 5 cents for carryout bags. The retail establishments will keep the fees. The requirement will go into effect Jan. 1. **The goals of this requirement are to:** Encourage shoppers to bring their

own bags. Protect resources used to produce paper and plastic bags.

Reduce litter.

- Reduce waste: Minnesotans throw away 87,000 tons of plastic bags every year and recycle less than 5% of them.
- Keep plastic bags from clogging the gears in recycling facilities, which workers spend four-six hours a day removing.

Exemptions include bags used for produce, bulk foods, small items, carryout restaurants, farmers markets, food banks, retail establishments that do not possess a cash register; secondhand bags, bags sold in packages, dry cleaning bags, bags given out with no transaction; bags given at hospitals, car dealerships and car washes; and bags used for litter cleanup.



Guavas Cuban Café 5607 Chicago Ave


Your neighborhood restaurant assessors most recently checked out the Guavas Cuban Café at 5607 Chicago Ave. It was on one of our recent bone cold Friday nights, but the warm Cuban atmosphere immediately charmed us. It's a large, open space with a nice fireplace in the middle. There was counter service, not table services which we were not fond of. The place was not particularly busy so the host paid special attention to us, taking our orders all evening. We are not fond of counter service

The main attraction, however, the food and drink, was great! Mojito's were delish, made with cava wine. The wine pour was generous. There were interesting chips to start, made from yucca and plantains and served with three wonderful dips made with guacamole, black bean hummus and garlic mojo. The mussels were the best ever, with a generous amount of garlic wine sauce. So tasty.

The main courses were equally worthy: Lechon Asado (braised pork shoulder rice bowl) was delicious and enough for three hearty appetites; the Cuban Burger was juicy and flavorful. The seafood special of the day, white fish, shrimp, clams, and mussels with creole sauce over rice was excellent. The sauce was very flavorful, and the shrimp were good-sized, as was the portion. We had the arroz con leche (rice pudding with mango preserves) for dessert. Also very tasty.

The Guavas Cuban Café is a neighborhood, family friendly place. They have a kid's menu and indeed, there were kids present when we were there. There is a park right across the street and Diamond Lake is across the park. We didn't get the full park effect as we were there at night but bet it would be a lovely place on a summer day. There's a nice outdoor patio, too. And the place was quiet. That's a big plus with us. We could carry on an extended conversation, not constantly interrupted by "What? What? what?" Our biggest complaint: the tables were a bit too close together. And to top it all off, the prices were very reasonable. We'll be back!

Elections 2020

National Election One Year Away -Three Times to Vote in 2020

In one year, voters will cast ballots Nov. 3, 2020, for the Minnesota Legislature, U.S. Congress and U.S. president. Besides the general election, Minnesota will have two primaries: the presidential primary March 3 and the state primary Aug. 11.

Key 2020 election dates

March 3 - Presidential primary August 11 - State primary November 3 - General election

Early Voting in the Presidential Primary

Minnesota will hold its presidential primary on Super Tuesday, and because of early voting we'll be among the first voters in the nation to cast ballots. The Early Vote Center opens Jan. 17 for the presidential primary, and it will be at a new location: 980 E. Hennepin Ave. In downtown Minneapolis, Hennepin County will also have early voting at the Government Center, 300 S. Sixth St.

This will be Minnesota's first presidential primary election since 1992. People who vote will need to choose which major party's ballot they want. The parties people choose will not be public information, though it will be available to each major party.

Minneapolis ordinance requires that property owners clear sidewalks after the end of a snowfall within

\$ 24 hours for houses and duplexes

Four daytime hours for apartment and commercial buildings (daytime hours begin at 8 a.m.)

When you shovel snow and clear ice

- Shovel the sidewalks on all sides of your property, the full width of the sidewalk down to the bare pavement.
- Remove all ice from sidewalks. After the sidewalk is clear, sprinkling a little sand can help prevent slipping on frosty sidewalks.
- Pile snow onto your yard and boulevard.
- It's against the law to shovel snow into streets and alleys.
- If you have a corner property, clear curb cuts at corners and crosswalks to the street gutter. You are not required to clear snow ridges or piles left by the plows beyond the gutter. City crews will make an effort to return to do this work as quickly as possible, but with some 20,000 corners to clear across the City, it may take a while. However, your neighbors would appreciate it if you could clear an opening sooner to help shorten the wait and provide a clear passage.

Avoid a ticket

- If the City of Minneapolis gets a complaint or discovers that a sidewalk is not properly cleared, Public Works will inspect the sidewalk and give the property owners a chance to clear it.
- If the sidewalk has not been cleared upon re-inspection, the property owner may be issued a citation with a fine.
- Crews will remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk. Property owners will be billed for this service, and unpaid bills will be added to the owner's property tax.

Remember

- You are as responsible for clearing ice on your sidewalk as clearing snow. Ice can be more dangerous and intimidating than snow.
- The sooner and more completely you shovel, the less likely ice will form.
- Make arrangements for someone to take over while you are on vacation.



It's school request time in the **Minneapolis Public Schools!** ENROLLING FOR THE 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR

very year in mid-November we kick off a new school request season when families begin the process of requesting a school for the following school year. Our online School Request portal opened in November. Request forms and other helpful information will be available at the portal. The deadline is February 7.

WHO NEEDS TO REQUEST A SCHOOL?

Children who will turn 4 by September 1 (High Five - Preschool) Children who will turn 5 by September 1 (Kindergarten) Students, in K-5 schools, moving to 6 grade who want a middle school other than their pathway school.

Any current student wishing to switch schools We welcome new students all year round!

STEP-1: CONSIDER YOUR CHILD'S NEEDS

Consider your child's strengths, challenges and interests. In what kinds of environments do they learn best? Do they have special needs? Do you want your child in school near your home? Do you want out-ofschool childcare available on-site?

STEP-2: CHOICES

Find your school options by entering your home address into the School Request Center SchoolRequest.mpls.k12.mn.us Know that bus transportation and priority admission will be available to your child at these schools. Other school options are available, but may impact transportation and admissions.

STEP-3:VISIT

See the MPS Guidebook to read about your schools, talk with staff at one of our two student placement centers about how schools compare, and, most importantly, visit the schools to see how they make you and your student feel. Tours are available most days and most schools have evening activities open to visitors.

STEP-4: PRIORITIZE

You can request up to two schools. In most cases a family's school request can be honored, especially when received by the February 8, 2019, priority deadline. Your child will have the highest priority for placement at the community school for your Attendance Area.

STEP-5: APPLY


