Kevin Thompson called the meeting to order at 6:30pm.

The agenda was modified to remove John Munger, Director of Loppet Foundation and add Torrie Stone, Minneapolis Police 4th Precinct. Motion to approve the agenda as modified. Seconded. Motion carried.

James Dietrich, Secretary, moved to approve February Minutes. Seconded. Motion carried.

Torry Stone addressed the Association on the crime in the neighborhood. She presented a Crime Summary which showed incidents in 2019 to be higher than 2017 and 2018. Unattended car theft topped the list, as well as thefts to AirBnB locations.

City of Minneapolis: Councilmember Lisa Goodman’s Report. Lisa started with giving kudos on the Winterfest event. Lunch with Lisa is still planned for the 24th of March. Robert Liligren, a member of the White Earth band of Ojibwe, runs Native American Community Development Institute. Lisa is looking for individuals to serve on the Advisory Committee on Aging and the Advisory Committee on People with Disabilities.

Minneapolis has opened an Incident Command Center. In the event that emergency supplies are needed, the City of Minneapolis has emergency supplies on-hand.

Speed limits on some Minneapolis residential streets will be reduced to 20 or 25 miles per hour. Please check for new posted speed limits. Penn Ave and Cedar Lake Parkway are not affected. The City is updating Draft Transportation Action Plan, working to make it easier to use public transportation, bike or walk.

Kevin Thompson announced that James Dietrich has resigned as Secretary and that Jessica Wiley has resigned as Interim Treasurer. The Board wishes to express sincere thanks to both individuals for their service to the community.

Kevin Thompson moved to appoint James Dietrich as Treasurer. Seconded. Motion carried.

Kevin Thompson moved to appoint Jessica Wiley as Secretary. Seconded. Motion carried.

Kevin Thompson updated the group on Neighborhoods 2020. Recommendations have been made to set rules and conditions for funding. Base amounts would be reduced, and that money would be transitioned to a project-based expenditure. Kevin Thompson moved to create a sub committee to review and respond to the proposal. Seconded. Motion carried.

McKenzie Erickson and Lynda Shaheen reported that Winterfest was a success, selling over 100 tickets, and. A big thank you to all volunteers. The expense budget was set at \$1500, but actuals were under \$1000 and the estimate for revenue and donations is over \$8000 producing a net gain of \$7000 or more for the neighborhood.

Webmaster Jeremy Staffeld has taken over email administration. He is also documenting the website and what has been done, in case there is a need in the future to transition to another individual. He is using Facebook Live to stream the BMNA Board Meeting and will continue to work on allowing others to attend the board meeting remotely.

Brian Treece has received 3 applications from the neighborhood for the vacant Event Coordinator position.

Gardens Dennie Juillerat is working on the Garden Committee.

New Treasurer James Dietrich provided a report on the Gateway Project. The current data shows that the community supported a hedge, but that maintenance requirements for the hedge and “gateway” area need to be addressed. We have broken the project into a multi-year build, with year one objectives of rebuilding the topiary hedge, addressing water and mowing maintenance issues, and perhaps cleaning up the lilacs and volunteer trees in the space. Though \$25,000 had previously been approved for what we are now referring to as the Gateway Project, our objective is the reduce the expenditure required,

We will be applying for the MnDOT Landscape Program to receive up to

\$10,000 is reimbursement of plant and mulch spend. Additional funds may be available on an annual basis. We are working with MnDOT to identify plants and design the space. We are working with the City of Minneapolis and SWLRT to coordinate the design of the space with the new LRT Bryn Mawr Station.

Elections for Area Representatives for 2, 4, and 6, Secretary and President will occur this year. Interested parties please contact Vice President Brian Treece.

Lynda Shaheen reported on Schools. Minneapolis will vote on school boundary changes. ECCO, Kenwood, and Bryn Mawr would feed into Anwatin Middle and then to North High.

First Service Residential has moved into the 1015 Glenwood building, as well as a few other tenants.

Construction on Bryn Mawr Station is being staged.

Kevin Thompson spoke briefly on the Covid virus and the Board’s response. We will be updating the website with any information we and we may cancel the April Board meeting or host it remotely. For now, the Board Meeting has been moved to April 15th out of respect for Passover.

With nothing further, Kevin Thompson moved to adjourn. Seconded. Motion carried and the meeting was adjourned.

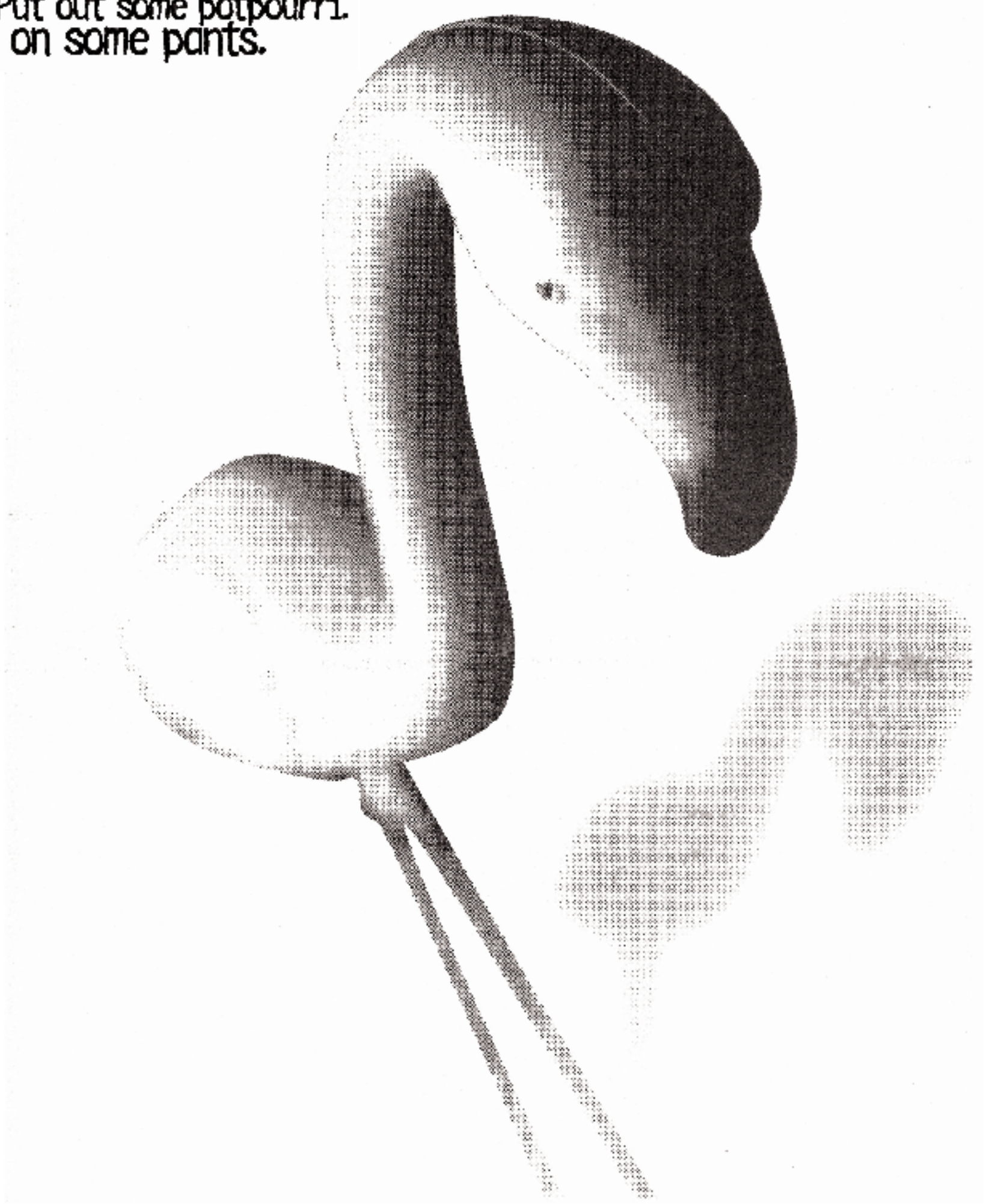

COVID-19

Our world and lives have been turned upside down, and it happened so quickly. I hope everyone reading this is doing okay and not going stir-crazy. The corona virus is upending our entire way of life, and no one knows how fast we'll recover from the changes or even if life will go on as before. Some things may change permanently coming out of this.

The COVID-19 virus, as it has been named, appears to have originated in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China around December, 2019. It has since spread to other countries rapidly, including the U.S., and of course Minnesota.

Common symptoms include fever, cough, shortness of breath and difficulty breathing. The virus seems to be more of a lower respiratory syndrome with less involvement of the upper respiratory system (sinuses) than a common cold, but symptoms can vary from person to person. Severe symptoms can develop, mostly affecting persons with pre-existing conditions like heart and lung disease, kidney disease, diabetes, or weakened immune systems. Age is also a factor with people over 60 more at risk of serious illness overall than younger people.

The virus spreads through the air from coughing and sneezing and also from close personal contact, thus the advice on social distancing/not touching others to reduce spread. Social distancing is being defined as trying to maintain a distance of 6 feet between people as much as possible, especially out in public.

Prevention measures include:

- Washing your hands often
- Avoiding touching your eyes, nose or mouth
- Sneezing or coughing into a tissue or the crook of your elbow
- Cleaning and disinfecting surfaces and objects
- Drinking plenty of fluids

- Aiming for eight hours of sleep each night
- Eating a well-balanced diet

Most people with common human coronavirus illness will recover on their own. Although there are no specific treatments for illnesses caused by human coronaviruses, you can take the following actions to help relieve symptoms if you are mildly sick:

- Take pain and fever medications. Ask your pharmacist how they may interact with any medications you currently take. Caution: The CDC and American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommend not giving aspirin to children.
- Use a room humidifier or take a hot shower to help ease a sore throat and cough.
- Stay home and rest.

If you are concerned about your symptoms, please call your local health care provider. Some insurances offer a "Nurse Line" or similar service. That may be a good place to start. Contact information is often on the back of your insurance card.

Your Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association representatives wish you well during this trying time. If you need help while sheltering at home, reach out to neighbors, or shoot an email to coordinator@bmna.org and we'll try to help or steer you to someone who can. I've also noticed postings on NextDoor from neighbors offering to run errands like picking up prescriptions or running to the grocery store for elderly or disabled persons, so you could check those posts out too.

Some of our neighborhood events will need to be postponed, including the Festival of Sales normally held the first full weekend of May. The Annual Dinner in May will likely be postponed as well. Watch the calendar on bmna.org, the Bugle and the neighborhood email list as well as NextDoor and Facebook for updates.

A Letter From Lisa Goodman
HAVE CONFIDENCE, THE CITY IS RESILIENT

I want to begin this sharing of information by first letting everyone know that you are in my thoughts and prayers and that I continue to work for each of you and the city as a whole. I have been humbled by the generosity I have seen so far and the dedication of everyone to work together as we maneuver our way through this challenging time.

As you might imagine, things are changing daily, sometime hourly. My hope is to share resources where you can access information. The City of Minneapolis web page www.minneapolismn.gov is the place to find the most up to date information on city specific topics and it also contains links to the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) and the Center for Disease Control (CDC) site along with FAQ pages and links to community support.

The City's first responsibility is to maintain the critical services we provide to our residents and visitors. Please know the city continues to operate. There are no changes to the solid waste, recycling and organics collection operation. Our current tap water operation will continue to function, providing safe drinking water to people in Minneapolis and the City's suburban customers. There is no need to buy bottled water for drinking. Safe, clean tap water will continue to be supplied.

The City has stringent hygiene measures in place at its water treatment plants. In addition, there is almost no human contact in the process of treating water for drinking. Existing water treatment and disinfection processes are effective in removing and inactivating viruses from water supplies. We are in contact with key government agencies to monitor and understand the health impact of COVID-19 as it develops and are well-connected internationally to stay updated on the latest information and evidence.

On the topic of Utilities, City Utility Operations is discouraging indi-

viduals from physically visiting the Utility billing counter and recommend you pay your bill through the mail or other electronic payment options. They are also able to process credit card payments over the phone. 612-673-1114.

Xcel Energy announced they will suspend service disconnections and the company would work with customers who face difficulty paying their electricity bill. Their customer service line is 1-800-895-4999.

CenterPoint Energy also announced it will suspend service disconnections and will work with customers who need payments assistance, extensions or other help. Their customer service line is 1-800-245-2377.

As for the rest of Public Works, emergency repair services will continue. This includes issues such as sewer repairs and blocked roadways. If needed, staff can shift work between operations and from preventative maintenance to more urgent responses.

The City of Minneapolis operates many service counters and to be in alignment with recommendations from the Minnesota Department of Health, we are suspending in-person counter service and shifting to drop-off service for plans, permits, licenses, homestead and other special program applications. All communication between customers and City staff will shift to phone and email. Minneapolis Animal Care and Control has adjusted operations to require appointments rather than walk-up counter service. Their phone number is 612-673-6222.

Please remember that 311 is a great resource to report problems or to get questions answered. Know that me and my staff will continue to work on your behalf and we are here if you need anything! Take care of yourself and each other!

Census

The Census is officially available online! Minneapolis residents should have received an invite in their mailboxes to complete the census in it's online version by going to my2020census.gov. You can also request a paper form or complete it over the phone. The official Census Day arrives on April 1, 2020, as residents are invited to complete the census form online, by mail, or over the phone.

-April 8th-April 16th: A reminder letter and paper questionnaire are sent to all households that have not responded.

-April 20th-April 27th: A final reminder postcard is sent to all households who have not responded, this is the final postcard distributed before the Census Bureau follows up in-person.

-Later in the month of April, extending through August 2020, Census takers go door-to-door to collect information from residents who did not complete a census form using any of these methods.

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) approved the Cedar-Isles Master Plan Community Advisory Committee (CAC) roster at its March 18, 2020 meeting, in-person events are postponed, and virtual meetings are planned.

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) closed all recreation centers and program buildings from March 17 to April 5 in response to COVID-19. Due the closure of all Southwest Minneapolis recreation centers, the Southwest Service Area Master Plan public comment period has been extended to at least April 25.

BMNA Gateway Committee

The Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA) is making plans to replicate the iconic green living hedge which was located at the south entrance to Bryn Mawr at the 394/Penn Avenue Right of Way.

As many residents remember, for 18 years the south entrance to Bryn Mawr featured a topiary hedge which spelled out BRYN MAWR on the sloped hillside of Penn Ave— a unique and beautiful welcome sign to our neighborhood. Planning, planting and maintenance of the hedge was supported by a small group of committed garden volunteers who designed, trimmed and watered it. The group originally received funding through the same Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) program, the Community Landscape Partnership Program which also funded median planters on the north and south sides of the 394 Bridge.

The hedge was removed in 2016 as the plant material was aging, the water source was inconvenient, and volunteers were spread thin as the Garden Committee supports 32 gar-

dens in the Bryn Mawr community. In 2018 a separate Gateway Committee was created to conduct further research for the project and focus solely on options for the hillside.

The Gateway Committee has been in consultation with representatives from the City of Minneapolis, MnDOT, and the Southwest Light Rail Transit (SWLRT). Coordination with SWLRT is key as the Bryn Mawr light rail station plan includes widening the existing Penn sidewalk from Mt. View to the new station to improve commuter access.

Key considerations in determining the hillside design include identifying low maintenance plant materials which would be less labor intensive and watering solutions requiring less maintenance. The MnDOT program has landscape architects to assign with design. Project objectives identified to date include:

Reintroduce a live topiary hedge using new water retaining soils.

Reduce the water maintenance required to maintain the health of the hedge through the use of natural methods such as retention ponds, water collection containers, or other.

Establish a pollinator-friendly, flowering native plant garden.

These plant materials would mirror existing gardens in the neighborhood and complement the SWLRT Bryn Mawr station landscape design which is slated to be prairie.

The Gateway Committee is planning for a potential three to four year process with the work being done in phases and completed by the time the new light rail station opens in 2023. Proposed first year activities include removal of nuisance trees, addition of new water retaining soils, the creation of an efficient and effective watering system, and planting of the topiary shrubs. Out year enhancements might include hardscape materials which are not covered by the MnDOT program but could be funded with community or corporate support.

The MnDOT Community Landscape Partnership Program is a reimbursement program—not a grant program. It reimburses the cost of approved landscape materials such as trees, shrubs, wildflowers and grasses, mulch, etc. Program applicants forward fund material costs and are reimbursed by MnDOT.

As the Committee furthers develops the project design and application we will need volunteer assistance and will keep you posted on needs. Sweat equity, tools, enthusiasm always welcome!

SWLRT Update

Sheet piling for the Kenilworth tunnel continues. One of the press-in-pilers will continue working south from 28th Street. The second press-in-piler is moving north from 28th Street on the freight rail side. It will stop short of Cedar Lake Parkway and return south, working towards Lake Street. Sheet piling installation is expected to last through summer of 2020.

Tunnel excavation is anticipated to begin spring 2020, we will provide notice in this update and through the efforts of our outreach coordinators before this work begins. For more information about tunnel construction, see the tunnel FAQ information under the construction tab of our webpage: swlrlt.org. A short video of the press-in-piler construction technique is also available.

In preparation for future tunnel work, a Metropolitan Council Environmental Services sanitary sewer force main needs to be temporarily relocated, with crews working around 28th Street. After this work is complete, Dean Court will become a two-way roadway and will remain in this configuration for six to eight weeks. We anticipate the road-

way reconfiguration will be implemented early April. We will provide updates as work progresses.

Cedar Lake (Kenilworth) Channel

Temporary sheeting is being removed from the channel area as abutment and retaining wall work has been completed. This activity also generates vibration. Then focus will switch to continued concrete work, bridge spans and utility work.

21st Street

No additional work is anticipated in this area in March. Construction equipment continues to move through the corridor.

Bryn Mawr Station Area

Crews continue earthwork in the Bryn Mawr Station area in Minneapolis to construct a surcharge. This work will remain for five months to consolidate the underlying soil to provide a suitable foundation for the station. In late March/early-April earth work will also begin for the new trail.

I-394/Cedar Lake Trail

Pier protection work continues the I-394 bridge.

Glenwood Avenue

Glenwood Avenue between Lyndale Avenue North and 11th Street North is closed until mid 2021. The road-

mid 2021. The roadway is closed to vehicle, pedestrian, and bicycle traffic as the bridge has been removed. Local access to businesses continues to be maintained. Crews have made significant progress on utility work and retaining walls in the area. Work on the west abutment for the new roadway bridge continues.

Royalston Avenue

Work on the LRT bridge piers on the east side of Royalston Avenue is ongoing and will continue through the spring. Expect pile driving activities in this area. The southbound travel lane on Royalston Avenue from 5th Street to Holden Street closed on March 16. This closure will last until summer 2021. Business access is available via the northbound lane.

Support Is Available to Build Your Refuge for Pollinators

Bryn Mawr residents can now receive assistance if they want to create a pollinator-friendly yard. In addition to up to \$350 in State aid, homeowners have access to technical assistance, including gardeners who live in our own neighborhood.

Bees, butterflies and other pollinators rely on the plants growing in our yards. With the loss of habitat and because of the impact from agriculture, pollinators need a refuge in the environment we create around our homes. In the big picture, we also rely on pollinators to support the plants we enjoy and the food we eat.

As you look around the neighborhood, every yard you see is an actual or potential oasis for pollinators. Each yard can become part of a web of support for pollinators. It can be as simple as allowing clover to bloom within a lawn or planting a small cluster of native perennial plants.

Because of the importance of individual action, the state set up a \$900,00 program to support pollinators, particularly the endangered rusty patched bumblebee. This endangered bumblebee, the state bee, is still present in the metro area, and our part of the state is targeted for the \$350 in aid available to individual homeowners.

As a cost-shared program, it provides homeowners up to \$350 to plant native and pesticide-free plants in their yards. The funds will be in the form of a reimbursement and will cover up to 75% of a project's cost. Information on this Lawns to Legumes program can be found at bluethumb.org

Blue Thumb is also a good resource for workshops and plant information for anyone interested in making their yards pollinator friendly. Bryn Mawr is especially a good neighborhood to provide refuge for bees, butterflies and other pollinators. Our yards are adjacent to numerous areas that provide natural habitat for pollinators. Also, the neighborhood is replete with yards that serve as good examples of what works. Bryn Mawr has many neighbors, some of them Hennepin County Master Gardeners, who are happy to “talk plants” and offer assistance.

For residents wanting to make their yards pollinator-friendly, this is a good time to plan and take advantage of programs, such as those offered through Blue Thumb. Think about converting some of your lawn to legumes. Consult with neighbors and plan to convert part of your yard or boulevard into a rain-garden.

Check where the sun shines in your yard so you can select proper plants, then plant a few native perennials. You have multiple sources of support if you want to make your yard a better refuge for pollinators.

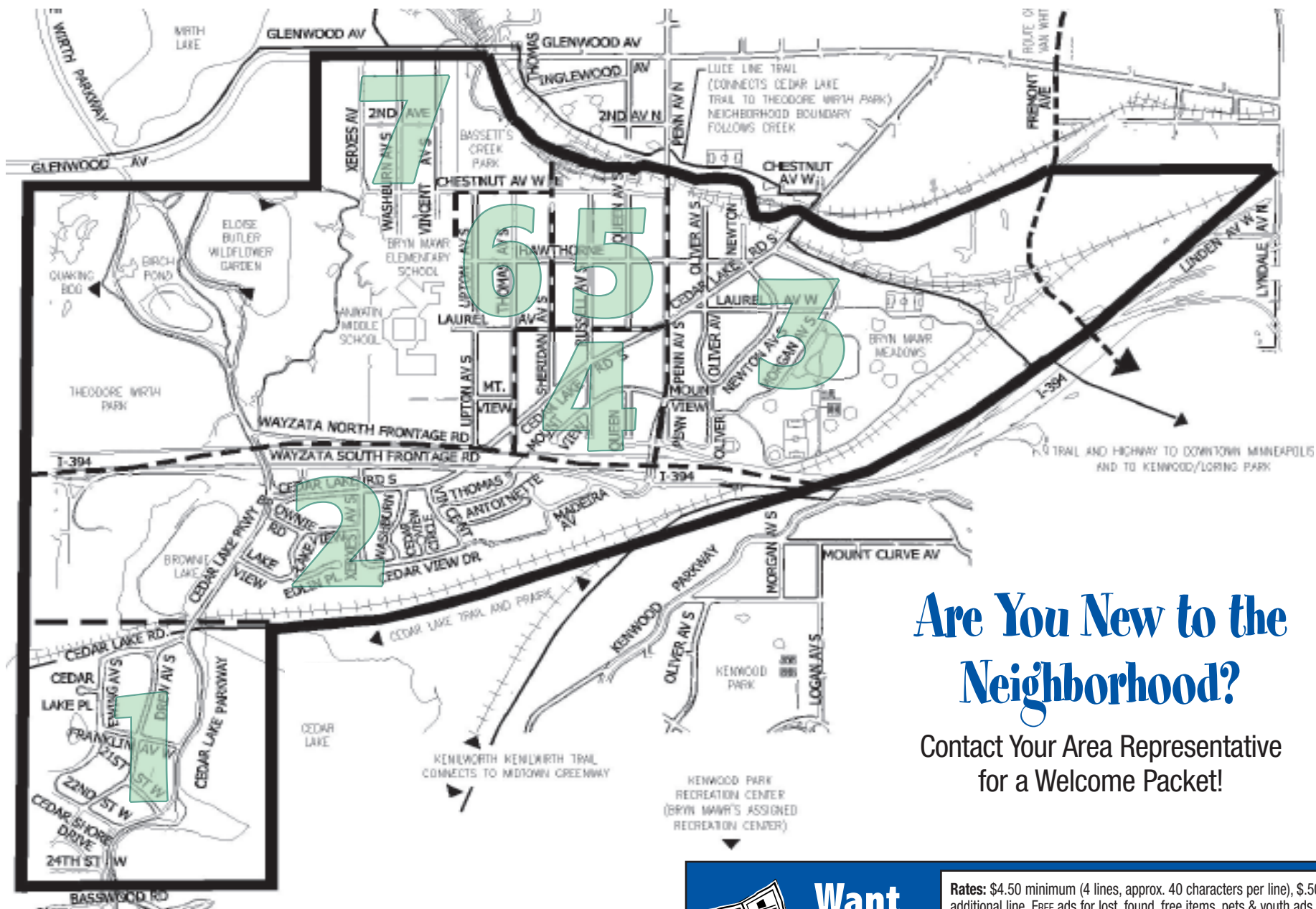
