## **Fruen Mill**

t the May BMNA Meeting, we received an update on illegal activity at Fruen Mill from 4th Precinct Crime Prevention Specialist Torie Stone that we wanted to share with you.

The Police Dept. has received numerous calls regarding trespassers at the Mill buildings. Officers have been responding there a couple times a week. The trespassers are juveniles that are a part of an "urban explorer group" that likes to go on voyages to tour historic, abandoned or vacant buildings.

The police are in communication with the owner/property manager. The Police Department met with the property owner and conducted a security assessment. A lot of the property's security and fencing is half-done, so the two groups talked about improving security methods. The Police had a mobile camera out there; however, due to poor connection, it was removed.

The police have asked the property owners to invest in their own security cameras and lighting, so they can share their video footage with the police, or they can use the cameras to monitor activity and immediately call 911 when there are trespassers. The Police Department is working with our City Attorneys to see if the penalty for trespassing at the Mills can be enhanced to a Gross Misdemeanor. This is in progress.

Lastly, due to the building's structure, Fire Inspections is the department to enforce owner citation and other recommendations. From the last conversation with Fire Inspections, per policy code, they were looking to order the owner to hire a security guard to patrol the buildings. If you see trespassers at the mill, please continue to call 911 to report it.



# Algae Bloom on Cedar Lake

'n the Spring of 2020, beginning with ice out, a red colored algae **▲**bloom occurred on Cedar Lake. By early April, a significant amount of red material was being seen on the north side of Cedar Lake and in Brownie Lake. When staff of the MPRB (Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board) investigated, they found no sign of a spill and no unusual discharge from storm sewers. The red substance appeared to be an algal bloom, and subsequent analysis confirmed that the red substance was algae. Although this same type of algae was present in previous years, there is no record of a bloom as severe as 2020.

A concern was raised by residents that the SWLRT project has had an influence on lake water quality and may be related to the unusual algae bloom. This has been investigated. The most visible construction-related activity that has taken place near Cedar Lake is the temporary pumping of water in the Cedar Lake Channel. Pumping activities have been monitored and water quality has been tested consistently since construction activities began in the Chain of Lakes area since summer of 2019.

Review of the data has confirmed that water pumping activities remain consistent with permit limits requiring compliance with state and local agency standards. Erosion control and infiltration systems are also currently in place and monitored consistently by both the Contractor and SWLRT Project Office staff to ensure that they are functioning properly. As of May 13, 2020, no water quality incidents have been reported by the Civil Construction Contractor in the Chain of Lakes area.

In addition, the flow of water is generally from Cedar to Isles through the channel, where SWLRT construction is taking place.
Because of this, it is not likely that action taken downstream of Cedar Lake, like dewatering from the SWLRT, has caused an algae bloom upstream in Cedar Lake.

The recent algae bloom is consistent with information provided by the MPRB staff which indicates that Cedar Lake has experienced a gradual worsening water over the past ten years. This decline in water quality has been especially noticeable between 2017 and 2019. MPRB staff indicates that there is no obvious reason for this recent decline in water quality in Cedar Lake and the presumed poor quality in spring 2020. However, the past few years have been the wettest period on record. Increasing precipitation has led to years of unprecedented high water levels, which may be negatively impacting the water quality on Cedar Lake due to increased stormwater runoff and erosion. There has been an increased amount of runoff and urban drainage flowing into the watershed and this has an impact on the lakes.

The algae bloom now is also in Nokomis and Isles. Although this year is exceptional, algae are a natural part of lake ecology. As weather and lake conditions change, different types of algae can grow. The species of algae currently blooming grows better in cooler conditions.

Plankton samples MPRB collected last winter show that the algae blooms at these three lakes started under the ice. In a normal year, ice would melt off slowly and the algae would die off before it got a foothold in the lake. This spring, a rapid ice-out and cooler than average temperatures led to conditions that allowed the algae to persist. These blooms will diminish or subside as air and water temperatures rise

The MPRB has indicated that there is no way to tell if an algae bloom is toxic just by looking at it. The Minnesota Department of Health advises the following:

- Don't swim if you can't see your feet in knee-high water (and wash off with fresh water).
- Don't let your dog drink or swim in the water.
- When in doubt, stay out!

#### **Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food**

The Wolf at Twilight: An Elder's Journey into a Land of Ghosts and Shadows

By Kent Nerburn

This very powerful narrative is second in a trilogy written by Kent Nerburn, following his award winning book, Neither Wolf Nor Dog: On Forgotten Roads with an Indian Elder. Nerburn, who is not Native American, says he came to the "unlikely calling of giving voice to the deep and complex spirituality of Native American people a spirituality that has much to teach us all." The reader experiences his anguish and hesitancy in this role as he navigates between native and non-native worlds in this second journey.

In Neither Wolf Nor Dog Nerburn gives readers a glimpse into the world of contemporary Native American life and its spiritual insights and beliefs through his relationship with Dan, a Lakota elder in the western Dakotas. In The Wolf at Twilight, Nerburn finds himself called back to Dan's home. Their ensuing journey is based on the mystery of what happened to Dan's little sister, Yellow Bird, who disappeared some 80 years before in the brutal boarding school system forced on Indian nations. The writing takes you into the heat of the road trip, the heart of a sweat lodge, the white out of a blizzard, the smell of the dust in a small town museum, encounters with spoiled food and broken down trucks. There were spiritual, almost supernatural, experiences that both terrified and inspired Nerburn.

The journey is framed by Dan's life philosophy, the primacy he places on story, on children; his willingness to undertake an arduous journey to honor his sister, and then shift the focus to the newest family baby, Shondrell, so she becomes part of the circle of life he believes in.

Dan tells Nerburn, "you... confuse being useful with being important. The little children are not useful because their hands are not yet strong and their minds have not yet been filled with knowledge of how

the world works. But they are important. They are important because of where they stand in the circle of life. Like the elders, they are weak. But like the elders, they are closest to the Great Mystery. They allow us to see the morning of creation. "Dan shares the wisdom from deep in his heart that children give the elders a reason to live, because elders are entrusted with the shaping of their hearts and setting their feet straight upon the path of life.

To Dan, a guardian of both story and earth, being a guardian means caring for the earth; her soil, water, air, not taking from the earth. "We were an honoring people, a guardian people, not an exploring and discovering people. For us the world was a mystery to be honored, not a puzzle to be solved." Dan implores Nerburn to learn to listen. He asks Kent if he ever wondered why he picked up a certain rock. Maybe the rock was speaking to him, because all things speak. We agreed that we've heard that calling We've had rocks and seashells call to us, even transporting some back to their home places.

We highly recommend this book. It's filled with unforgettable characters, humor, tragedy, and loss, but also the love of community and family, redemption and an understanding of the power of words. Nerburn describes the second book as "novelized non-fiction." Although there were some reservations about Nerburn's professed humbleness, it's beautifully written and thought provoking.

This was the first time in our long history that our book club was unable to meet at one of our homes, share a meal, and discuss the book. We gathered on Zoom. But the conversation was lively and rich and carried on through email after. We will continue to be a self-distanced book club during this pandemic, looking forward to being together when it's safe.

# Minneapolis Public Schools' Comprehensive District Design (CDD)

he MPS School Board approved the Comprehensive District Design at its last full board meeting. The CDD is a large scale, long range, systems redesign that hopes to ensure every student receives an equitable and high quality education. The plan hopes to stabilize staffing, correct uneven enrollment patterns, and prevent future closures of schools due to low enrollment.

The plan will now be implemented over the next 2-3 years. No building changes or reconfigurations will take place until September 2021. What does this mean for the Bryn Mawr neighborhood?

Bryn Mawr Elementary will remain a K5 community school with a slightly larger attendance zone. Anwatin will be our community 6-8 school without the Dual Language Spanish Immersion program. Anwatin students will come from Bryn Mawr, Kenwood, and Nellie Stone Johnson Elementary Schools.

Those same kids would pathway from Anwatin to North High all together.

Sheridan, Emerson, and Green will be K5 Dual Language Spanish Immersion programs with the 6-8 program moved to Andersen which will also house a community school much like Anwatin does now. Other magnets are Hall STEM K-5, Bethune and Marcy Arts K-5, Franklin 6-8 and Sullivan K-8 STEAM, Seward Montessori K-5, and Jefferson Global Studies and Humanities K-8. Bryn Mawr and the entire city would have access to these magnets and busing. Career and Technical Sites will be at North High, Edison High and Roosevelt High. Current high school students will not have to change high schools.




## **Zackary Carlson, Area 5**

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


