### **Councilmember Lisa Goodman**

Wirth on the Woods/71 submissions to choose from. Great gift certificates. Fencing going up at the site. All the little buildings are down. Trying to get Lunch w Lisa going in September online. Dayton's tour going on in late September or October. Two variance requests for small yard setbacks. Charter commission met tonight. Two public hearings on limiting the number of police officers; July 15 and 21. Public hearing on 2020 budget adjustment; reductions needed. Have reduced already by 61% through hiring freeze, eliminating onetime expenses. 20 is Plenty yard signs available at local fire station (#16) to advertise the new speed limit. Vote by mail right now. Fill out the application you got from the Center for Voter Information. They will mail you your ballot for the primary and general election. Lot of information in the newsletter that comes out of Lisa's office. Love the idea of the roving ice cream

### Safety – Torie Stone

Gave a quick overview of crime statistics. Bryn Mawr has been quiet with 2-3 weeks of no activity. Part one crime report. Three burglaries. Two garage burglaries. Stolen bikeopened the door and tried to get into the garage. 4XX Cedar Lake Rd -damaged the door and stole \$100. No suspect. Do have video. Successful meeting with owners and business contacts at Century Link. Parking lot is still a problem Owners will be fencing around the property. Sheds are down. Barriers are down.

### **Treasurer Report – JD Dietrich**

Report sent out. Have filed our annual filings. Taxes should be done this week. We anticipate that the city will be making cuts. We will be judicious about spending.

### **Communications & Fundraising** Report-Lynda Shaheen

Online donations still coming in. Mail in has dwindled down. Membership night in September could bring in some dollars. Things are quieting down with Covid and the protests over George Floyd's death. Getting more followers in Instagram from the pet contest. Yoga brought in new people also. Meeting with other neighborhoods online. Discussed our use of FB and whether they are contributing to hate speech. Talked about how social media reaches new demographics and supports our work.

### **Events Report - McKenzie Erickson**

Presented the spreadsheet of events and activities. Activities at a distance are being balanced with remote and in person events. Pet contest ended; announcing winner soon. 15+ participants, increased Instagram followers. 70 participated in naming Woods on Wirth contest. Yoga was a pilot with 20 people. Turning it into a series. 80% new faces, got their emails. Held from 10-11 in the Meadows every other Saturday. Ice Cream stroll on July 16. Maps downtown, 8 bands performing. Swag at the church. Cooler of ice cream t reats. Take pictures. Conscious of planning activities to encourage civil engagement and making the neighborhood more inclusive.


### Schools - Lynda Shaheen



## **Neighborhood Contest Yields New Name** for Senior Campus: Wirth on the Woods

hanks to the creativity of the Bryn Mawr community, Lupe Development Partners has selected a new name for its senior housing campus at 2800 Wayzata Boulevard: Wirth on the Woods. The developer behind the new affordable and market-rate senior living launched a contest earlier this summer to give Bryn Mawr residents a chance to leave their mark on the neighborhood. They received more than 65 creative submissions – many inspired by the people, nature and history of our city and neighborhood.

The entire campus – which includes a commercial building and potential future uses - will be known as Wirth on the Woods. The senior living communities will be named The Theodore (a ffordable) and The Eloise (marketrate), in an homage to the beautiful setting of Theodore Wirth Park and the Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden.

Wirth on the Woods is a collaboration between Lupe Development and Swervo Development Corporation to deliver 99 units of affordable senior housing in a six-story building (The

Theodore) and 100 units of market-rate senior housing (The Eloise) in another six-story building. These properties will share amenities, including an outdoor courtyard, garden and greenhouse. The campus also includes a renovated commercial building.

Several of the other names submitted inspired Lupe Development to also name community rooms and amenities according to various plants and flowers found in the garden. A selection committee including Minneapolis Council Member Lisa Goodman and representatives from the development team reviewed and selected the winning theme.

Congratulations to Liana Linnerooth, Tami Galvin and Emma Butzer for inspiring the new name and helping to give the development a greater sense of community. Each winner will receive gift cards to two Bryn Mawr area businesses – \$75 to Cuppa Java and \$175 to La Mesa.

Construction on the project is slated to begin in 2021. Visit lupedevelopment.com and 2800wayzata.com for updates.

## **Bryn Mawr Launches Racial Justice Work**

√here has been widespread reaction to the murder of George Floyd. The Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA) acted by creating an initiative to address issues of racial justice highlighted by George Floyd's death. The newly-formed Racial Justice Committee embraces the following vision:

### **Racial Justice Committee Statement**

The death of George Floyd has shaken the Bryn Mawr community. We grieve with our city and the world.

We condemn the murders of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Elijah McClain and so many others. We unequivocally state that Black lives matter. We commit ourselves to actions that will change the systems that have hurt Black, Indigenous, and People Of Color (BIPOC) in our country and in our neighborhood.

We will not allow the realities of racism to remain alive and active in ourselves and our community. We will be critical of actions we take in Bryn Mawr and consciously promote racial equity.

We are aware that we are historically and currently, a predominantly white community inhabiting Dakota land. While Bryn Mawr has many members, both white and BIPOC, committed to dismantling racism, we now see how much more we need to do.

Although we feel grief and frustration at this moment, it is nothing compared to the trauma of the communities whose loved ones have been killed and terrorized

through police brutality and who have been most harmed by the systemic racism that pervades our cities, schools, justice systems and health care institutions.

We will listen to BIPOC communities. We will talk with one another. Your ideas and involvement are welcome as we walk these days together. We ask you to join us.

### **Six initiatives the Racial Justice Committee has Begun:**

### Diversification of the BMNA Board and **Committee Membership**

The BMNA values diversity in Board and committee membership and will encourage broader participation. If you have an interest in being on the BMNA Board or being on any committee, you are encouraged to contact any current Board member listed on the back page of the Bugle. Feel free to ask or recommend your neighbors.

### **Racial Equity Lens**

The BMNA will develop and adopt a process which guides the evaluation, development, and implementation of policies, initiatives, programs, and budgets to address the impacts on racial equity when making decisions affecting the neighborhood. This will ensure that we consciously work to achieve practices of equitable development, transportation, environmental justice, education and a ffordability in our community.

### **Community Education**

The Committee will place antiracism books for all ages in Little Free Libraries throughout the neighborhood. Neighbors who have physical books on this topic are encouraged to circulate them through the Little Free Libraries as well.

The Committee also encourages Bryn Mawr neighbors to read along with the One Book One Minnesota selection, A Good Time for the Truth, edited by Minnesota author Sun Yung Shin. It is available free online for the next month. Follow the links at St. Paul Public Library, sppl.org/onebook/.

The Committee will offer subsidized antiracism classes for Bryn Mawr residents. Stay tuned for more details!

#### Support for BIPOC Owned Business

The Committee will promote awareness and patronization of BIPOC owned businesses through free advertising in a special supplement to the Bugle for those in Bryn Mawr and surrounding neighborhoods including Harrison, Sumner-Holmes, Willard-Hay, Jordan, Near North and Hawthome.

The Committee will also solicit advertisements for Near North businesses for inclusion in The Bugle on a regular basis.

### **Bryn Mawr Schools**

The Racial Justice Committee will work in concert with the BMNA Schools Committee to support our neighborhood schools with the goal of having fully supported integrated schools.

### Volunteering and Donating

The Committee will place new emphasis on curating volunteer and donation opportunities on the BMNA website for those in our community looking to directly support BIPOC led organizations working to dismantle systemic racism and oppression.

The epidemic of racism is not new, but white supremacy is entrenched in all aspects of our culture and society. Transforming into an antiracist culture will demand deep and sustained effort by individuals throughout our neighborhood along with our city, state and country. The Racial Justice Committee invites your participation.






the lease and said, salon names-GO! She said, spruce about three words in and I got really excited and knew that was it! A quick search on the department of commerce website and, yay! That was it!" Beth has always wanted to open her own place and the stay at home order this spring gave her the chance. Beth reflected, "During the shutdown of my industry for covid-19, I started to question the best way for me to return to work safely and feel comfortable inviting clients into a salon again...I couldn't imagine feeling ok around so many people for quite some time. In turn, I didn't feel that I could/ should invite clients into an environment that I couldn't be absolutely sure was as safe as I thought possible. It was a unique time that nothing else was going on and I could focus all of my energy and time in building out the space. An amazing human, Joe Moos, who was furloughed from his work in construction offered his invaluable help, guidance and sup-

port right away...I couldn't have done it without him. He showed up every day ( pro bono) and when I was having a moment of anxiety of not being ready in time ( I had already started booking clients for June 1, when the Governor said we wouldn't likely be able to resume business), Joe would calmly explain that we were right on schedule, and we were.

I guess the amazing thing, as always, is the people that show up to help, Laura W. painted and painted and painted and painted till we could paint no more and Brian C. helped me so much— I'm not good at asking for help— they just gave it when I needed it most! I've been incredibly humbled by this process, the kindness and generosity of friends and new neighbors (in downtown Bryn Mawr) is wonderfully overwhelming."

She previously worked for 22 years at Thomas Charles Salon. She likes working on her own and has been able to greatly reduce the risk

to clients by having only one person in the space at a time. She says, "I look forward to the time it will feel safe to have other people in the salon with me, until then I am happy to work one on one with my clients in a space that I can do all I can to control the environment for our health and well-being." Beth is originally from Pennsylvania and came to Minneapolis to study at the Aveda Institute almost 32 years ago. 

August 21, 2017

Almost total (80%) solar eclipse over 3 hours around noon in Minneapolis. Mostly cloudy here but a drive to Hastings produced a clear sky and good viewing. Took the grandkids, who were impressed (their dog wasn't). Made a pinhole "camera" with a pencil-sized aperture from a piece of cardboard, an easy and safe way to watch. Nest up: a 75% eclipse in April, 2024.

ave you noticed the beautifully manicured hillside where the BRYN MAWR hedge used to be? Thanks to the work of the Red Knights Motorcycle Club Bryn Mawr's south gateway is a very attractive entrance to our community.

BMNA is working with MnDOT and the City of Minneapolis to recreate the living topiary hedge which previously existed on the west side of Penn Avenue and 394. In preparation for the project we wanted to keep the hillside mowed where the hedge will be replanted.

They have continued to mow all summer at no cost to Bryn Mawr—volunteering their time,


