City of Minneapolis-

Councilmember Lisa Goodman's Report

No lunch w/ Lisa in March; next meeting on April 28th will be sharing the Tiny Villages project which is up and occupied. Thanked Kevin for suggesting and attending a meeting of neighborhood Presidents with the City safety leadership team about what to expect as the Chauvin trial takes place.

CCP/Safe Officer Report

Bill Magnuson (will report next month). Torie Stone has taken a new position

Bill Magnuson is our new Safe Officer. Lynda was notified of a robbery in the Meadows; a gun was involved. MPD and Park Police worked together, a person was arrested. Bill sent the stats for February— two auto thefts, one burglary, one theft.

2800 Wayzata Blvd Update

Nancy Aleksuk, Swervo Development Introduced David Miller, Urban Works Architecture; Jackie Cherryhomes, Swervo Development; Scott England, DJR Architecture

Update on the senior buildings- Wirth on the Woods. Currently in the construction document phase. Work should start this summer. Century Link building will be a total of six stories with studio and 1 bedroom apartments. Amenities on the top floor including a roof deck. Planning 60 rental townhomes on the eastern portion of the site. Buildings will be grouped in 6, 8, or 10 units. Responded to questions about the three projects. Underground parking for senior living, street level parking for Century Link units and townhomes. Changes to the original plans had to be made. Market is not there for office building space or assisted living at this time. Affordable housing rates will apply to 99 of the senior spaces. Townhouses will be market rate. There will be landscaping between the townhouses and the houses on Upton. There will be bike racks at each site. The goal is to do all the construction at one time. An updated traffic study will be done.

Bryn Mawr Meadows Improvements Update

Tyler Pederson, (design MPRB) and Adam Arvidson (strategic planning MPRB)

This is the first community meeting. The goal is to implement the Master Plan. Budget is a little over \$3 million. Begin construction in spring of 2022; most construction will take place over approximately 6 months. Some things may take a bit longer. Will be collaborating with City and Water Shed District to resolve storm water issues and implement the park project at the same time. Responded to questions. No contact yet with SWLRT. Will be coordinating in future. Strong desire expressed from neighborhood for coordination to take place. Wirth Park is not a part of this project, but questions about it can be sent to Tyler. Dog park is not planned as part of Meadows project; ran out of funds for it in the Bassett Creek Park project. It is still in the Master Plan. The Master Plan is bigger than just the Bassett Creek Park and Meadows project. The \$3 million is enough for the Mead-

ows but not the entire Master Plan. Future of the tennis courts. Tennis courts have a failing surface. The Meadows has been identified as a possible spot for a bike park. Equipment on the tennis court surface right now is temporary; things that you can ride a bike over. BMNA Board and staff expressed support for tennis courts and a desire to think about how inter city tennis will be affected if there are no courts in Bryn Mawr. Reports sent out. Will complete full reconciliation by the end of the month and submit Form 990 with Michael Wilson, who is contracted by the city and free

Gateway Committee Update/ Request - Dennie Juillerat

Matthew Kuha, Irrigation by Design, walked through the proposed irrigation system. Irrigation by Design has been in business since 2010. Located in the neighborhood. Will get the water from the existing hydrant on the east side of Penn. There will be a buried pipe to where the water is needed. There will be a wireless rain sensor which opens and closes the circuit when needed. Described end-of-season maintenance, coordinated with city. Will be winterized by blowing out water with air compressor. Discussed benefit of using a battery v/s solar. Dennie moved that we contract for installation of the system with Irrigation by Design for \$1,510. JD second. Motion carried. Budget discussion for future as to where these dollars will be taken from.

Communications & Fundraising Coordinator Report - Lynda Shaheen

Sent out report. Creating a business page with businesses and links. Working with Jeremy on updating Park Page. McKenzie and Lynda attending Coordinator meetings, mostly about upcoming trial and neighborhood preparation. Meeting suggested Boards should point people to updates so they can get their own information. Sending out a survey on the Garage Sale. We should start thinking about how and when we want to "reopen" and how best to use technologies in the future, like recording cameras. Fundraising going well, up from last year to date. Can give a donation "in honor of" or "in memory of."

Event Coordinator Report -McKenzie Erickson

Officially been in the role for a year. Completed a review of the position and expectations. Clarified the event coordinator responsibilities for 6 major events. If we want to organize other events not on the list, will need leadership for them to occur, or reimburse the event coordinator to plan them. Winter Fest is Saturday. Reviewed what will be happening and help needed. McKenzie, Lynda, and Jaime (from Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church) are planning a healing event for CoVid.

Bugle Report- JoEllyn Joistad

Need Board members to sign up to submit articles. Thanks to Barry, Rod, and Liv for submitting. Mary Duffy is stepping down as delivery person to Area 1. Mary has delivered the Bugle for much longer than JoEllyn's 20 years as editor. Our undying gratitude for all of her service. Motion to acknowledge Mary's service. Jay moved, Kevin second. Approved.

Webmaster Report- Jeremy Staffeld

Working on issue with corruption of the Bugle archive.

The City launched a website that offers information and updates around the upcoming trial of former Minneapolis Police Officer Derek Chauvin, who is charged with murder in the death of George Floyd.

City information and links to partners in the new web section will help residents, businesses and others:

- Find current street closures.
- Sign up for trial updates from MN District Court.
- Report suspicious activity.
- Look up mental health and wellbeing resources for support during traumatic times.

You can also explore ways to prepare and stay informed, learn about security preparations and updates during the trial, follow impacts to traffic and transportation, and find public data on the officers involved.

How to contact the City:

Call 311 for non-emergency City information.

Call 911 for life safety emergencies requiring police, fire or emergency medical services.

Call the MPD Tips Line at 612-692-TIPS (8477) to report suspicious activity not requiring an immediate response.

Businesses and property owners can call 612-673-2499 with questions about advanced preparation before the trial, business operations during the trial and general information about regulations and resources.

The web page will be updated as new information becomes available and as situations change. The BMNA will pass along updates as we receive them via this email list, our Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and NextDoor accounts but for the most up to date 24/7 information please refer to the city website where you can subscribe to updates.

Charter Amendment

Nommunity safety and police brutality have become focal points in Minneapolis and around the country in the past year especially. Several groups have started to envision what a safe community for all looks like where violence prevention is front and center. There are 3 proposals right now to restructure the Minneapolis Police Department. The city charter can be amended two ways: by an ordinance which requires the unanimous vote of the City Council and the Mayor, or by a ballot question. An amendment makes it to the ballot one of three ways: by either a citizen petition with signatures equaling 5% of the votes cast from the last election, by submission from the City Council after a non binding review by the Charter Commission, or by the Charter Commission.

The first proposal, the Public Safety Amendment, would abolish the Minneapolis Police Department as a city department, eliminate the requirement to maintain a minimum number of officers, and greatly reduce the mayor's responsibility and accountability for law enforcement. The new Minneapolis Department of Public Safety would be modeled after the MN Department of Public Safety and would report both to the Mayor and the City Council instead of the current model of reporting only to the Mayor. The Department of Law Enforcement would be one of the departments in the Department of Safety and would employ peace officers. It is a slightly revised version of the proposed amendment from last year that was sent to the Charter Commission who rejected it citing the short timeline leading up to the November 2020 elections. City Council is working on further ordinances to clarify the functions, leadership, and operations of the department. The Charter Commission is reviewing this proposed amendment and will recommend to the City Council that they move forward, reject, or replace with an alternative amendment by August. Their recommendation is not binding. It would be up to the City Council to move forward with putting it on the ballot. The Mayor would also review the proposed amendment and could veto a City Council vote which could then be overruled by a 9 vote decision at City Council.

A second proposal is being brought forth via a people's petition by a coalition group called Yes 4 Minneapolis. This campaign is made up of members such as Reclaim the Block, Black Visions, Minnesota Fed-

eration of Teachers, ACLU, Take Action MN, Pollen, Jewish Community Action, Coalition of Asian American Leaders, Little Earth and others. Their amendment would also replace the Police Department with a Department of Public Safety which would include licensed peace officers. There would not be a minimum number of peace officers required. The Department would report to a Commissioner, nominated by the Mayor and appointed by the City Council. This amendment would be on the ballot in November if it gathers enough in person signatures by May 1. Their website states that their motion was developed through a community input process and that they are working with City Council and the two proposals are not in conflict. Both proposals focus on integrating public health and safety. More information can be found at yes4minneapolis.org

A third proposal would create a new Civilian Police Accountability Commission (CPAC) that takes oversight of the police department away from the Mayor. This effort is being led by the Twin Cities Coalition for Justice 4 Jamar. The CPAC would be made up of 13 elected members elected for 4 year terms and who have experience serving and advocating for those most impacted by police crimes. This amendment would be on the ballot in November if it gathers enough in person signatures by May 1. More information can be found on their website

The Charter Commission is also considering a change of its own, not to the Police Department but to the leadership structure of the city that would restructure the relationship between the Mayor and the City Council. One option would give the Mayor more power and better define the role of City Council. Another would create a position of City Manager as a go between the Mayor and the Council. Another option is to clarify the duties and responsibilities of city government. These changes being discussed do not alter the Police Department.

Stay tuned for more updates and learn more about these important issues on your own. The issue will likely be part of the upcoming City Council election, and you may want to ask the candidates what they think about the options. The League of Women Voters recently hosted a talk on the city charter and the proposed amendments. A recording can be found at



From the Editor

fter spending so much time at home alone, I have sadly become one of those people who yells at the TV. Tonight, I was yelling at the Hill Murray hockey dad talking about how unfair it is that their team had to drop out of the state hockey tournament because of a Covid exposure. Instead of being grateful for having a season at all (when performing arts student had to completely give up theirs) they were mad because they had to follow the rules they agreed to at the start of the season.

But the rules are slowly adapting to new circumstances. I am happy to report that I have both doses of the vaccine on board and am forging ahead with plan a for a robust in-person summer youth program. We are projecting that it will be safe by June to be in small groups outside and we are even planning a musical that hopefully will be performed for a live audience.

The anniversary of the shutdown passed. We look back and recall thinking it would last a week or maybe a month. Many have died, had life altering disruption and/or financial disaster. I've missed live theatre, dining in restaurants and hugs (oh how I have missed hugs.) If I had a kid playing hockey, I would miss that too. But they all seem like petty inconveniences

compared with all the loss that others have endured.

The true reality check came this past week as I watched in horror the testimony of the witnesses to the death of George Floyd at the hands of Derek Chauvin. I am so fortunate to have never seen anything like this and am completely devastated just by watching and listening to the video recordings. I wonder what I would have done had I been at the scene as Mr. Floyd lay dying and crying out for help. Would I have felt anger? Fear at the sight of a police officer being so dispassionate? To hear that an off-duty first responder recognized that immediate medical attention was needed and was dismissed is mind boggling. To hear children and adults express guilt that their efforts could not save his life absolutely breaks my heart.

I cannot believe it. I cannot believe it because it would never happen to me. I have never had reason to fear the police and the sad reality is that black, indigenous and people of color are all to familiar with seeing their people being treated as less than human.

After all we have been through together, I hope that we emerge from this pandemic wiser, more empathetic and more willing to see our common humanity.

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Update: 2800 Wayzata Blvd Development

The property most of us know as the CenturyLink Building at ■ 2800 Wayzata Blvd will become a campus of rental apartments and townhomes. On the west side of the property, Lupe Development will deliver 100 units of affordable one or two bedroom senior apartments in a six-story building (The Theodore) and 100 units of market-rate senior apartments (The Eloise) in another sixstory building. See Photo 1.

Swervo Development updated their development plans at the March 10th BMNA Board Meeting. The CenturyLink building will be rehabbed into a six-story apartment building. Two stories will be added to allow for about 120 rental units, mostly studios and one-bedroom apartments. See Photo 2. The sixth story (slightly visible) will contain amenities shared by the building. While the senior apartments will share underground parking, the CenturyLink apartment building and townhomes will have surface parking.

Swervo will also move forward with plans to build 60 townhomes for rent, mostly on the perimeter of the eastern side of property. See Photo 3. The townhomes will be in groups of 6, 8 and 10 in seven buildings set back from property lines by 20 or 30 feet. Each townhome will be 3 stories, 3 bedrooms and 2.5 baths. All of the units will have a rear door at ground level with a small porch and surface parking in front. An initial design was presented. See Photo 4. Landscaping for the entire property will be designed

to create a high-end feel that will be attractive to renters. Efforts will be made to preserve as many of the existing trees as possible. A natural landscape buffer along the Upton Ave S property lines will be added for privacy. A walking path along the Upton property line will connect to the trail off of Mt. View leading into Wirth Woods.

Both Swervo and Lupe properties will be managed by a property management company. Construction is planned to begin this summer. Efforts will be made to coordinate all construction to minimize disruption to the neighborhood. A new traffic study will be done to reflect the impact of the townhomes.

Neighbors on the 600 block of Upton Ave S most impacted by the development provided written feedback to Swervo Development and the BMNA on March 16. Kevin Thompson, President of the BMNA, and Lisa Goodman, Ward 7 City Council Member, met with the developers on March 18 to discuss the plans and make recommendations. Swervo is improving on the design after neighborhood input. The BMNA looks forward to continued discussion. Everyone is welcome to attend BMNA Board Meetings on the second Wednesday of each month to follow developments. Check the agenda published on Monday or Tuesday before the meeting in the BMNA Coordinator's email newsletter and on NextDoor, Facebook and Twitter.


Racial Covenants in Bryn Mawr

eginning in the early 20th century racially restrictive covenants were recorded by developers and property owners in a home's legal title. They prohibited Black, Indigenous, People of Color and, in some cases, Jewish people from purchasing, renting and/or residing on a property. As a result of these covenants, BIPOC communities were forced to live in segregated areas of Minneapolis that have historically, and currently, had more environmental hazards, less parks and green space, less access to hospitals and health care, fewer grocery stores, and under funded schools. In 1968 Congress passed the Fair Housing Act making these covenants illegal, however they still exist on the deed record. There are approximately 70 properties in the Bryn Mawr neighborhood with racial covenants in the deeds. Although these covenants are no longer enforceable their impact still shapes the composition of the city, making it one of the most segregated in the nation.

Homeownership is one of the greatest ways to accrue and inherit

wealth, however disparities in housing and homeownership serve to further the racial wealth gap and segregation. When equal housing opportunities are denied so are opportunities to create generational wealth. A 2020 study conducted by Redfin, a real estate brokerage, finds that only 25% of Black families in Minneapolis own their home, the lowest among all metro areas in the U.S. www.redfin.com/news/blackhomeownership-rate-across-unitedstates/). This disparity is largely due to Minneapolis's history of racial covenants.

The good news is that there are organizations addressing this form of systemic racism head on: Mapping Prejudice (mappingprejudice.org) has joined up with Just Deeds (minneapolismn.gov/government/ departments/attorney/just-deeds/) to provide homeowners with free assistance in having these covenants discharged. We strongly encourage all Bryn Mawr residents to explore these resources and to take this opportunity to remove any racially restrictive covenants that may exist on your property. We also urge you to share this information with other Minneapolis residents. If you are looking for more ways to get involved with this project, Mapping Prejudice is still in need of volunteers to read through deeds in neighboring counties. You can find more information on their website.

Some may be wondering why is it important to have these covenants discharged if they are no longer enforceable. Not only is it necessary to understand who has directly and indirectly benefited from these historically racist practices, but also how such practices have shaped access to real estate, which largely impacts access to wealth, health and

education. As a majority white neighborhood we have the opportunity to take action by removing these vestiges of our racist history so that future homeowners do not have to take on this burden. If you are seeking ways in which to take direct action in dismantling systemic racism, this is an excellent first step.




