Agenda approval moved, seconded. Motion carried.
Minutes from March moved, seconded. Motion carried.

City of Minneapolis - Councilmember Lisa Goodman

Want to acknowledge that we value the life of Daunte Wright who was killed this past week. Hosting Lunch with Lisa on Wednesday, April 28. Hearing from leaders of Avevo who built the indoor tiny village project for unsheltered neighbors. Received notice of an ADU at 1928 Ewing, building above the garage for a family member. Working with public works to place the solar powered speed limit sign in Bryn Mawr that the neighborhood purchased years ago. We will provide a list of locations in the neighborhood and public works will put the speed sign up and move it every two weeks. Street sweeping in the coming weeks; signs will be posted. Important for keeping debris out of our storm system which dumps into the Mississippi River. City is collecting leaves and bundled brush. Should be put out on garbage day but not in the garbage can. In an effort to reduce homicides and shootings, working with Learning Lab. Part of City safety initiatives. City awarded \$1 million dollar to 7 community organizations who provide de-escalation and violence prevention activities, ready for activities that may take place during and at the end of the Chauvin trial.

CPP Safe Officer-MPD William Magnuson

Has been with Minneapolis for 4 years; new to Bryn Mawr. Part 1 crimes report. March/April to date: 1 robbery, 5 thefts, and an auto theft. Bryn Mawr is one of the safer neighborhoods in Minneapolis.

2800 Wayzata Blvd Update-Steve Minn/David Miller.

Have been officially awarded grants needed for affordable housing. Clos-

ing in the 3rd quarter. Agreements in progress with School Board and Park Board. Described changes to the 9-acre site from the presentation in March for townhouse orientation, parking, and color palettes Answered questions from Board and community members about home ownership, parking, design, accessibility, and environmental impacts. Looking for feedback on color palate and design before meeting with the planning commission in early May.

Treasurer Report- JD Dietrich
Written report submitted.

Communications & Fundraising Report - Lynda Shaheen

Written report submitted. Fielding inquiries about garage sale. Online survey had 137 responses; reschedule dates prioritized. Exploring ways to allow access to Board meetings once we return to F2F meetings. Donations up from last year.

Event Report – McKenzie Erickson

Emailed Winter Fest report. Park Board sponsoring trash pickup in April. Discussed best time for rescheduled garage sale. General consensus of the Board is to hold off until fall.

Bugle - JoEllyn Jolstad

General consensus from Events committee is to set Garage Sale in fall—proposing weekend of September 11 or 18, to be determined.

Finance/Membership – Jessica Wiley

990 ready for submission in May. Kevin and Jessica will complete the CPP draw by May board meeting. Proposing a budget adjustment. Add a line item for Gateway Project-6410 - with a \$3000 budget. Will bring back for a vote in May.

Gardens – Dennie Juillerat

Waiting for spring to return. Have over 27 volunteers to help with the 30+ community gardens. Big salute to Kathy Ripke for her work. Salute to Cathy Skalicky for Upton Garden spring cleanup. Email Dennie if you want to join the garden crew. Gateway Project – Karen Frederickson/Dennis Juillerat/JD Dietrich. Continue to work with City of Minneapolis. We have a cooperative agreement with the City for procurement for shrubs, compost, mulch, and other products. Goal to get a date for planting by end of May/early June.

Hosting annual meeting virtually on June 9th. Brian is confirming who will be running for Vice President, Treasurer, and reps from Areas 1, 3, 5 and 7. JD will be stepping down as treasurer. Two neighbors, Deb Anderson and Roberta Jordan, have stepped up to run as co-treasurers. Lynda will reach out to elected officials.

Racial Justice – Kate Knuth/McKenzie Erickson/Jessica Wiley

Article in April Bugle on city charter amendments proposed for public safety. TOPA will not be addressed by the City Council in the near future. Vandalization of a Little Library was disquieting. Working on equity conversations; planning for anti-racism work with the Board. Will propose equity work as part of our development of a Board operation manual. Will include a discussion on creating an Indigenous land acknowledgement statement.

Safety/Traffic – Chris Etz

Rod has stepped up to co-chair the committee. List of sites will be provided to public works for the speed sign. Will define the purpose of the committee.

Schools – Lynda Shaheen

Colleen reported. Expecting an increase of 125 students at Bryn Mawr Elementary. May 6 event to welcome new families. Need help with plant sale pickup, which will take place during the family welcome.

Parks – Chris Etz/Barry Schade

Met with park rep about master plans for Cedar/Isles. Meeting with Loppet leadership about trails. Encouraging community engagement process for input on Bryn Mawr Meadows. Clarified that the Master Plan is complete, but dollars dictate what can actually be done. The Master Plan is an overall concept; identifying the specifics of what will be funded. The plan calls for the tennis courts to be removed and replaced with other amenities. Discussed potential for a dog park, which was included in Master Plan but dropped because of funding.

Community Violence Prevention

The City of Minneapolis has awarded about \$1 million to seven community organizations to provide positive outreach and support services during and after the trials of the former officers involved in the killing of George Floyd.

These community organizations will provide positive outreach and community engagement; support two-way communication between communities and the City; de-escalate, mediate and resolve conflicts if needed; and share information about existing City and community supports and help community members access them. Contracts will run through Dec. 31.

The seven organizations are:

- A Mother’s Love.
- Center for Multicultural Mediation.
- Native American Community Development Institute (NACDI).
- Corcoran Neighborhood Organization and T.O.U.C.H. Outreach.
- Change Equals Opportunity (C.E.O.).

The organizations will work in specific areas of the city covering north, south and downtown.

From the Editor

I went downtown today. The city still looks like a war zone. There is still plywood on windows and fences and concrete barriers around government buildings. It is eerily quiet, our once thriving arts district is abandoned and there is a post-apocalyptic haze over the city.

Despite the fact that (in my opinion) the Chauvin verdict came out on the right side of history, these past two weeks have not been Minneapolis's finest hours. Chauvin was found guilty on all counts. Is that justice or is it accountability? Can there be justice in a system that is still so unjust for so many?

There should be celebration that we all have a greater awareness of the everyday horrors that black, brown, indigenous and Asian people experience. It is only in knowing more about these issues that we can see the value in changing the systems that continue to oppress marginalized communities. It is very encouraging to see the new political candidates emerging with eyes on dismantling generations of wealthy white men dominating the narrative and shaping government to benefit their own comfort and wealth.

It also seems possible that Minnesota is turning the corner on the Covid pandemic. There are more vaccine doses available than the current demand and it looks like we will soon start vaccinating youth younger than 16 making it more realistic to go back to a more normal version of school next year.

My school is back in-person (hybrid, for now anyway) and plans for in-person summer programs are in full swing. I am even planning to do a musical with a live performance and an audience and this feels like a huge step. It will be hard to get used to leaving the house everyday again but going into school can only improve my socialization and conversational skills.

I had both doses of the vaccine three weeks ago and everyone else in my family has at least one shot. I have hugged several friends and family (also fully vaccinated) for the first time in over a year.

Getting the vaccine was a no-brainer for me. I read the research, understand the science and have trust in the system. But I know that is not true for everyone.

Time will tell how vaccine averse and anti-vaccers will affect the path of the virus, but I feel good that I am part of a solution that hopefully will save lives in days, weeks and years to come.


Bugle Notes

I'm deeply grieved to have to report that my husband of 35 years, Ronald Schmidt, died suddenly and unexpectedly Thursday morning April 1. Ronald A Schmidt
Age 75, of Minneapolis passed away at home on April 1, 2021. Ron was born 7/22/1945 in Winona, Minnesota to Carroll and Bette (Rost) Schmidt. He was a graduate of Winona High School (1963) and Winona State University (1974). He served in the US Army in Vietnam and Germany 1966-1969. Site Plan and Design Changes to 2800 Wayzata Boulevard South

Changes to the 2800 Wayzata Blvd S development project were presented at the BMNA monthly meeting on April 14 by Steve Minn (Lupe Development). Ned Abdul (Swervo Development) also attended.

The site plan and design have changed. Nine buildings will be constructed to accommodate around sixty 3-story, 3-bedroom townhomes for rent. Five of the buildings will be oriented to the Upton Ave S properties so only the backs of the buildings are exposed to the properties. There will be no back doors or backyards. Balconies will be generally off of the kitchens over the garages. Each townhome will have a tuck-under single or double garage entered from the back of the building, eliminating about 100 surface parking spaces. Entrance to the townhomes will be through shared landscaped courtyards (in green - see Photo 1). The water management system will direct water underground to the northwest retention pond and prevent water from flooding into the backyards

and basements of the Upton neighbors. Most of the remaining surface parking is dedicated to the 6-story apartment building and guest parking for the townhomes. The homes on Upton will be about 60 feet from the townhomes (14' "paper alley" City right-of-way + 20' buffer for the trail and landscaping + 25' setback to the buildings). This is very generous compared to most back or side yards in Minneapolis.

Comments from BMNA Board Members favored an exterior re-design that uses cement fabricated lap-siding instead of flat board panels that was shown earlier or stucco which tends to look more industrial or commercial (see Photo 2). The re-design, coupled with brick, will fit in with the exterior design and color palette of the senior buildings and the CenturyLink conversion (see Photos 3 & 4 - blue in Photo 4 represents the sky).

Construction is likely to begin September 1, 2021. The developers are welcoming feedback on the exterior materials and color choices. They can be seen, along with additional details of the project, at 2800wayzata.com/townhome-design Your feedback, and any additional comments you wish to make, will help determine the final design of the townhomes.

Bryn Mawr to Rejuvenate its Neighborhood Vision

The Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA) wants to characterize the kind of community we are and to lay out a path to the kind of community we aspire to become. We are doing this for the benefit of those considering joining our community and those who have already moved into the Bryn Mawr neighborhood. We also want to present an operating manual for members of the community who might join the BMNA Board or who might become more active community members by joining one of the many committees working to build a strong Bryn Mawr community. This visioning statement will also define how the Bryn Mawr community serves the broader intentions and operations of the City of Minneapolis. We see this as a dynamic document and will continue to update it as conditions and community needs change.

Members of the BMNA Board are sometimes asked – “What is your purpose? How are you organized? What are your responsibilities? What exactly does the Board do? How can I be involved?” In 2019, a small group of neighbors got together to work on an updated vision for Bryn Mawr. This is an on-going effort and is taking longer to complete than expected, due to the pandemic.

BMNA Organization

Bryn Mawr is one of 81 official Minneapolis neighborhoods and is a part of the larger Bde Maka Ska-Isles Community. Our neighborhood is represented to the city by the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA), which does its best to represent the views of the neighborhood. The BMNA was formed in 1974 and incorporated in 1976 through the work of the original Bryn Mawr School parent group. One of its earliest challenges was to represent Bryn Mawr throughout the construction of I-394, which bisected the neighborhood.

Per our by-laws the purpose of the BMNA is to – Strengthen our

community; Improve the quality of life in our community; Foster good relationships in our community; and Open channels for information and communication in our community.

The BMNA Board is made up of officers, directors and independent contractors. Other than paid contractors (communications and fundraising coordinator, bookkeeper, events coordinator, Bugle editor and BMNA.org webmaster), all positions are filled by election for two-year terms. The officers are President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary. Besides these four positions, the Area Representatives represent the seven, numbered Areas that make up Bryn Mawr. Each of the seven Areas may have up to three Area Representatives. The duties of the Area Representatives include assisting in the annual membership drive, attending meetings, doing their best to represent neighbors and vote on items before the Board. At the Annual Meeting in 2021 (this year in June, but normally in May), the Vice-President, Treasurer and Area Representatives of Areas 1,3,5, and 7 are up for election.

The Board has also identified a number of Committees to forward its work. Our by-laws identify three standing committees – Officers Committee, Elections Committee and Finance Committee. We have also identified several on-going Ad Hoc Committees – Communications, Community Projects, Neighborhood Gardens, Schools, Parks, Safety and Traffic, and our newest committee, Racial Justice. You can contact the chairs of any of these committees by looking at www.BMNA.org/Board – for the Chair’s contact information.



The BMNA Board also supports several activities to bring neighbors together, especially when there is not a pandemic raging. The BMNA Board supports 10 regularly scheduled events through the year, including the May BMNA Garage Sale, Ice Cream Social, Sip and Stroll, bi-annual Garden Tour, Harvest Dinner, Saturnalia, and others. Check the Bugle for the schedule.

BMNA Committees

Many of the BMNA committees grew out of the NRP (Neighborhood Revitalization Program), a city-wide program begun in the 1990’s, and the Bryn Mawr Comprehensive Plan that was created to structure the

neighborhood’s approach to use the NRP funds. The committees had direct links to the action items identified in the NRP Plan and were responsible for the execution of these action items. Some of these committees have faded. For example, in the 90’s, safety was a big topic due to a crime ring operating in the neighborhood but interests in the committee faded when the ring was broken up. Neighborhood Gardens became a more active group and is still encouraging neighbors to volunteer in the many garden sites around Bryn Mawr.

All Bryn Mawr residents are encouraged to follow their interest level and play an active role in the neighborhood. While Bryn Mawr is routinely defined by its physical boundaries, it is more appropriately characterized by the people who

live here. Bryn Mawr is a community of people, and anyone who lives here, whether owners or renters, is a significant part of that community. Everyone is needed to play some role in making Bryn Mawr the kind of community we aspire to become.

There are many opportunities. For example, you could - run for one of the elected offices, become a member of a committee, participate in a community event, read the Bugle delivered to your door monthly, volunteer to help weed or plant one of the gardens. There are many ways you can become closer to the Bryn Mawr neighborhood and make it an even greater community.


