Call to Order at 6:35 PM.

Agenda approval moved, seconded. Motion carried.

Minutes from the annual meeting on June 9, 2021, moved, seconded. Motion carried.

City of Minneapolis -Councilmember Lisa Goodman

Lunch with Lisa has resumed in-person. July 28 will be a tour of the City Service Center which houses 30 pieces of public art. No meeting in August. Noted that rezoning of the La Mesa building to bring the parking lot and building into the same zoning was approved, along with an alley

renovation on So Cedar Lake Rd and Lakeview. Described the spending plan for the American Rescue dollars, about \$102 million. Have 3 years to spend the money. The buckets include: \$28 million for affordable housing, \$37 million for economic development including small business support, \$13.7 million for public safety, prevention, intervention and overtime expenses, guaranteed income pilot, and paying back city enterprise fund for revenue not collected during the pandemic like liquor license fees, renewals, late fees. City will go back to in-person meetings right after Labor Day. Making some changes to alternatives for police response that will take pressure off MPD. Reporting theft and property damage will go to 311. Asked about the former Bolin building signage request for a larger sign. Waiting to hear planning commission recommendation.

Crime Prevention Specialist No report.

Treasurer Report– Deb Anderson/Roberta Jordan No report.

Communications and Fundraising Report - Lynda Shaheen

Thanks to Allison Fruen for organizing Yoga in the Meadows. Thanks to Steve Harvey for moving BMNA equipment, supplies, and files from JD's storage space. Looking at a space in Cuppa Java where we can consolidate. Neighbor Basil Considine, Really Spicy Opera, has applied for a city grant from the engagement fund for outdoor performances next summer. Looking for a camera for continued streaming when we go back to inperson meetings. Fundraising doing well. Membership donations are up to about \$14,000, corporate giving up from \$90 to \$650, and our new memorial fund is at \$557. New Tshirts for Ice Cream Stroll. Will attend a city meeting about requirements for city funding.

Event Report – McKenzie Erickson

Ice Cream Stroll will be similar to last year, but four locations, five bands. Starting work for Garage Sale on September 11. Lining up food trucks, port-a-potties, registration materials. Member Night planned for September 23.

Bugle - JoEllyn Jolstad

The deadline for articles/ads is the 20th, as usual. Last edition got out late due to technical issues and holiday. Jessica will compile bios for August Bugle to introduce new board members.

Webmaster – Jeremy Staffeld

Submitted a report in the chat. Gave us a lesson on how to correctly pronounce Bryn Mawr, which he learned from a contact in Wales who wanted to know why we are called Bryn Mawr. Working on safety for phishing and hacking.

Committee Reports (as needed)

Finance/Membership – Jessica Wiley Transition to new treasurers is in process. Co-treasurers have met with Lynda, Jesscia, and JD to go over budget, processes, QuickBooks, and our online banking. Will plan a Finance meeting for late August for their input on changes. Jessica will attend the city meeting about requirements for funding. Gateway Project - Karen Frederickson/Dennis Juillerat June planting delayed due to plants not being available. Looking at a weekend in September for planting. Addressed compost that was pilfered. Was paid for by MNDOT and they will provide more when needed. The wood chips came from lilac trees that were removed and there is enough for the project.

Parks – Chris Etz/Barry Shade Input for the Cedar Lake/Lake of the Isles master plan ends July 15. Racial Justice – Kate Knuth/McKenzie Erickson/Jessica Wiley

Liv reported that a trainer has been identified for the Board diversity work in September, author Sun Yung Chin, A Good Time for the Truth, which deals with race in Minnesota. Will look for dates that don't conflict with the garage sale or Gateway planting.

Safety/Traffic – Chris Etz/Rod Miller The speed sign is being moved around the neighborhood; the capability has been expanded to track data. The info from the downtown area of Laurel indicates that cars are generally in compliance with speed limits, with a couple of outliers.A traffic study will be conducted for the 2800 Wayzata project. We can expect heavy traffic during construction at the site, and in the downtown area along Cedar Lake Road. (Neighbors are reminded they can sign up for construction information and updates by emailing construction@swervo.com.) Schools – Lynda Shaheen/Colleen Dhennin

Play date occurred at Bryn Mawr Meadows. Families reported that it was successful. Reading Partners at Bryn Mawr Elementary is offering training and looking for volunteers. Will be posted in Bugle.

Discussion Items, New Business, Updates and Announcements

1) Sign request for former Bolin building. Discussed the issues around a larger sign and the regulations that are currently in place. Will wait to hear how the city responds to the request.

2) 2800 Wayzata Blvd site representation. Rod asked the Board to consider BMNA representation for the new residences. Discussed whether we need to create a new Area 8. There could be 400 new neighbors, which is larger than any of the current areas.

The eviction moratorium is ending. Your lease could be terminated if you have not paid your rent and are not eligible for COVID-19 assistance. Between now and October 12, property owners must give tenants a 15 day notice before they file for eviction. Apply for help at RentHelpMN.org or call 211.

Apply for Minnesota's Energy Assistance Program. More Minnesotans than ever before are eligible for the program. The Minnesota Department of Commerce has received an additional \$167 million in federal funding through the American Rescue Plan Act to fund Minnesota's Energy Assistance Program.

Homeowners and renters can qualify for energy assistance.

Commerce has raised the income level for households to qualify, so more Minnesota households

annual income of up to \$65,228 to qualify.

You could receive up to \$1,600 for energy bills and may qualify for an additional \$1,200 to cover past-due bills.

By applying for energy assistance, Minnesota households can qualify for Minnesota's

Weatherization Assistance Program to pay for free home improvements to conserve energy and permanently reduce that home's energy costs.

City implements even-odd water sprinkling restrictions in response to drought

The City of Minneapolis is implementing even-odd water sprinkling restrictions until further notice. The city is now included in a drought warning as defined by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Drought Action Plan.

The Mississippi River has reliably provided the City of Minneapolis with drinking water for over 150 years. The City assures the public of its continued ability to produce sufficient quantities of high quality water for its residents and wholesale customers. The City's sprinkling restrictions are in place to help reduce demand on the Mississippi River during the ongoing drought. Other metro cities have similar measures in place.

Sprinkling restrictions

- Sprinkling lawns is NOT allowed from noon to 6 p.m. on any day.
- On calendar days that are even numbers (examples: July 26 or Aug. 18), the even side of the street CAN sprinkle lawns outside of the noon to 6 p.m. time window. Examples: 1238 Oak St. or 2574 Cedar Ave.
- On calendar days that are odd numbers (examples July 27 or Aug. 19), the odd side of the street CAN sprinkle lawns. Examples: 1247 Maple St. or 2561 18th Ave.

Exceptions

- Bushes and flowers may be watered with a hand-held hose as needed.
- Vegetable gardens and new sod

Ranked Choice Voting..... Easy as one, two, three!

The fourth in a series of articles about the 2021 Municipal Elections brought to you by the League of Women Voters Minneapolis.

Interpret to the end of the second se

Here's how RCV works:

Choose the candidate who best represents your views, and fill in the circle beside their name under the 1st Choice column. You can then proceed to indicate your second and third choice candidates by marking the circles next to their names in the 2nd and 3rd choice columns. There is no Primary election runoff, so no candidates are excluded before Election Day. You can choose any candidate among every candidate who files to run for office.


You don't have to choose three candidates, but here's why you might want to:After the polls close, all first Choice votes will be counted (including absentee and vote-by-mail ballots). If there is a clear winner – that is, if one candidate receives the highest vote count ABOVE the 50 percent threshold - the race is called, and that candidate is declared the winner. If no candidate reaches 50 percent, then the counting moves to round two.

In round two, the candidates with the lowest vote count and no mathematical chance of winning are eliminated, and their voters' votes are shifted to their second choice candidate. If, after round two, no candidate reaches the threshold, the counting moves to round three, four, and five etc. until the candidate with the most votes above 50 percent is declared the winner.

With Ranked Choice Voting, every candidate is on equal footing, and no candidate is a "spoiler."

Consumers with past-due utility bills: Contact your utility company to request to set up a plan for repayment. Regulated utility companies will not charge late fees or penalties (first two weeks from placement) may be watered on any day but not during the prohibited afternoon hours of noon to 6 p.m. Trees may be watered with a dripping hose, bucket or tree watering bag as needed.



It feels great to be giving these kids and families the opportunity to experience theatre again. I only wish I could say that it will be a smooth glide to the end of summer after it closes.

But after taking Saturday off, I will launch straight into tech and six performances of Matilda the Musical. Like the middle school show, this 16+ production is not your typical pre-pandemic effort. This summer, Minneapolis Public School has not allowed adult programs inside buildings so this show has been rehearsing and will be performed outside. That means, no stage, moveable set pieces (that fit in actor's cars), no stage lights and last minute costume and sound load-ins.

The great news is that performances will be only a few blocks away at Bryn Mawr Elementary School. Beyond all the challenges, this is going to be an amazing show - and how fun to experience this on the lawn at our own community school. 

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


Area 6 - Matilda the Musical at Bryn Mawr School



Goats In The Park

Did you see them? Yes, those were goats in Wirth Park the last couple of weeks in June. About 60 goats were munching Buckthorn in an area of the park near the intersection of Wirth Parkway and 394.

The goats were contained in a large paddock surrounded by a double, white mesh fence which can be powered by solar. In this instance, the power was off, the goats having learned to avoid the electrified fence.

Half a dozen years ago, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board considered using goats instead of pesticides to control invasive plants like Buckthorn. Goats have now been in MPRB parks for about four years, chewing up Buckthorn.

The goats in Wirth Park earlier this summer were brought here from Southeast Minnesota by goat-herder Jesse who is part of Diversity Land Works. Jesse says that Buckthorn removal by goats works best if done in early summer and again in the fall. It takes about three years to have a lasting effect on the Buckthorn. This is similar to the effort needed when we humans pull the Buckthorn.

The goats you may have been lucky to see were predominantly female, with a few neutered males. Breeds of goats like the white Kiko



goats are especially good at Buckthorn removal. Kiko goats were developed in New Zealand for meat production under harsh conditions.

Goats in general have a natural preference for spiney woody plants like Buckthorn, and are being used elsewhere around the State. The rough texture of Buckthorn stimulates the release of an enzyme in the gut of goats, making it a food easy for them to digest.

The goats were fun for some of us to see in our urban neighborhood. They also turn out to be a helpful ally in the work some of you have been doing to remove Buckthorn from the park areas.



Partnering with Young Readers

ryn Mawr Community School will launch the Reading Partners program this Fall, which pairs K-5 students with a community volunteer to help students develop strong reading skills. Reading Partners adds to a variety of exciting new offerings at the elementary school this Fall.

First piloted in Colorado in 2015, Reading Partners has been shown to significantly raise reading levels for participating students with especially dramatic increases shown for English language learners. Reading Partners

hires college graduates from Ameri-Corps to organize and administer the program in each building. The program administrators support community volunteer tutors who read books with students once or twice a week depending upon the time commitment of the volunteer. Students select the books they read with their partner. Some Minneapolis schools have had the Reading Partners program for a few years, and the volunteer tutor with whom I spoke loves the program and can't wait to get back to reading with kids in school. The program tries to maintain the same partner with each young reader throughout a ten week session.

Tutors are trained to help students with their reading skills, and there are already two training sessions scheduled for people in the community who may be interested in learning about the program and becoming a volunteer tutor at Bryn Mawr Elementary: August 26th from 4:00-5:30 p.m. and September 1 from 3:30-5:00 p.m. If reading with kids appeals to you as a way to invest in our community, you can learn more or sign up at Tommy.Lindquist@ReadingPartners.o rg The BMNA website will also post details about the format and location of the training sessions as they are finalized.

Katie already is immersed in graduate school at University of Cincinnati pursuing a Master of Art Education. She also is researching public art in a Graduate Assistantship.



Apeirogon: A Novel Colum McCann

olum McCann is a storyteller, and this story begs to be told. It is the true tale of two fathers who lost very young daughters in 1997 and 2007 to political violence in the Mideast. McCann weaves their real-life experiences with history, fiction, and ecology to create an understanding of loss that is timeless, placeless.

Bassam Aramin, a Palestinian, and Rami Elhanan, an Israeli, come to know each other through a parent grief group for those whose children have been killed in the conflict in Jerusalem. They are fathers on disputed land, living along walls and check points, forbidden streets and neighborhoods. They feel compelled to tell their shared experience of anguish and loss, despite the dangers of aligning together, because the Israeli/ Palestinian conflict has become so personal to them.

The book is a collage of personal and historical vignettes. Some chapters are one sentence long. There are chapters on the migration of birds through Israel, the wars and Intifadas, letters between Einstein and Freud about the "mythology of instincts," the music of John Cage, the history of the Molotov Cocktail and Shrapnel, a daring tightrope walk across Jerusalem meant to bring peace to the area. The structure mirrors the tales of A Thousand and One Nights. As Scheherazade's stories kept her alive, each time the fathers tell their story, their daughters live on. And McCann's vignettes bring the circle of history to light.

Though Bassam and Rami's loss is timeless and placeless, it also is specifically about the Palestinian/Israeli conflict.The Occu-

pation, the oppression the Palestinians live with, the fear and history of oppression the Israeli's are bound to, is clear in the stories told here. It is an indictment of the tragedy, horror, and terror of the conflict between Israel and Palestine.

This is not an easy read. It is based on a complicated political and historical scene, and while McCann's writing is poetic, the structure of the text was difficult for some. But it's a book worth the trouble.


