# Kenilworth Trails Temporarily Relocated

s part of the construction of the Kenilworth LRT Tunnel in Minneapolis, Cedar Lake Parkway closed to vehicle traffic late last month. For the duration of this closure, the project has committed to preserving trail access across the corridor in proximity to Cedar Lake Parkway.

Trail access has shifted to the south. Trail users will utilize Depot Street and West 28th Street to cross the rail corridor. Signage and striping will guide trail users along the temporary path. This temporary trail alignment is expected to remain in place through a good portion of the summer as tunnel construction advances to the north through the Parkway area.

# **Area 6 - Wirth on the Woods Breaks Ground on New Senior Housing**

## **Groundbreaking July 14**

breaking celebration for Wirth on the Woods on Thursday, July 14, at 3 p.m. (2800 Wayzata Boulevard, Minneapolis, 55405)

With a tranquil, park-like setting on a rare, underdeveloped parcel in the Bryn Mawr neighborhood, Wirth on the Woods is a planned 200-unit apartment community for seniors. The project will contain two buildings – the Eloise (market-rate) and the Theodore (affordable) – to meet the needs of seniors in this community.

The location is a once-in-a-generation opportunity to repurpose a large parcel of land in an outstanding neighborhood close to transit, shopping and world-class recreational amenities. Please join us to celebrate and recognize the many collaborators who helped make this project possible. The event will include a brief program with remarks from project partners and local officials followed by an ice cream social.

Please note: The event will be in a covered tent outdoors near the construction site.

# Minneapolis Public Schools Seeks Community Partners to Provide Programming Next School Year

Selected community partners will receive funding through federal ESSER dollars.

inneapolis Public Schools (MPS) seeks Twin Cities-based community organizations interested in providing programs or services for MPS students, parents and caregivers that would begin in November and conclude next June.

Contract amounts will range from \$25,000 to \$75,000, for contracts totaling \$800,000, made possible through federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Act (ESSER) funding.

ESSER funds are intended to target and support students most impacted educationally and emotionally by the COVID-19 pandemic: low-income students, students of color, American Indian students, English language learners, students with disabilities and students experiencing homelessness.

Programs should be culturally specific and focused on one of the three following critical areas:

- High School Academic Supports
- Middle School Student Wellbeing Supportive Services
- Parent/Caregiver Capacity Building Supportive Services
  Interested organizations are invited to find the full Request for Proposals on our ESSER III contracting website. Proposals will be accepted through July 22.

The MPS ESSER III plan was shaped by feedback from an advisory committee (including staff members, union representatives, students and families, and community partners), American Indian tribal consultation, an online submission form, and direct input from individuals and organizations.





**Eviction Help** 

s of June 1, all restrictions on evictions have been lifted in the State of Minnesota. There are no remaining protections under the State's eviction moratorium. Help is still available through emergency rental assistance programs, financial assistance, legal assistance, online data and renter protections.

Minneapolis, through its community partners, has distributed more than \$20 million in emergency rental assistance to support more than 3,500 renter households since March 2020. Minneapolis is continuing to issue their remaining federal Emergency Rental Assistance Funds to applicants already in queue and those who have reapplied for emergency assistance.

The City will continue to submit requests to the U.S. Department of Treasury for reallocated federal Emergency Rental Assistance Funds as the opportunity becomes available. These are funds that other jurisdictions from across the country have been unable to spend. Minneapolis renters have a wide range of protections under policies and ordinances recently adopted by the City. These protections include:

Right to counsel.

A pre-eviction filing notice requirement. Renter screening and security deposit ordinances.

Relocation assistance. Notice of sale.

# Public Safety is On the Ballot Again This Year

n November, you won't see an obvious question on the ballot like last year's City Question #2. Nonetheless, almost every federal, state and local public office in the General Election affects policing and public safety in Minneapolis. The Mayor and Police Chief have direct authority over the Minneapolis Police Department (MPD), but those powers are limited by state and federal policies. When you vote, think about how these elected offices impact your community's safety.

CONGRESS instituted "qualified immunity" that protects public employees from being sued for actions taken on the job. Congress has the authority to make changes at the federal level. Since 2009, more than half of the cases brought against police officers have been dismissed based on qualified immunity.

The GOVERNOR, STATE SENA-TORS and STATE REPRESENTA-TIVES set the parameters for police union contracts and oversee both the State Patrol — which has statewide law enforcement authority — and the P.O.S.T. Board — which sets standards of conduct and training for police officers. They also can pass state-level civil

rights laws explicitly without qualified immunity.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS manage the social service agencies that provide mobile mental health crisis response and co-responders to accompany police emergencies. They also oversee County Corrections which runs county jails.

The COUNTY ATTORNEY decides which crimes are prosecuted and is responsible for getting guns out of the hands of felons and domestic abusers.

The SHERIFF serves warrants, subpoenas and orders of protection and has county-wide law enforcement authority, frequently providing back up for the MPD.

The SCHOOL BOARD is responsible for overseeing the management of safety personnel and systems that keep children safe on school property.

JUDGES oversee criminal and civil lawsuits, set bail and impose sentences.

So, if you care about equity in public safety and policing in Minneapolis, vote in every race from the top to the bottom of the ballot and on both sides!

More than one rep can be elected for each area. Joining the Board and working with someone already elected in your Area as a co-rep is a great way to learn the job. Terms are for 2 years. Other ways to get involved include volunteering at events, delivering the Bugle, or joining a committee (Schools, Garden, Traffic and Safety, Communications, Racial Justice).

Usually held during the holiday season, Anwatin staff had several special reasons to hold the event this Spring including the opening of the newly planted healing garden in the school courtyard, the accomplishment of Band teacher Ed Barlow among 10 finalists for Minnesota Teacher of the Year, the dedication of eleven tribal flags honoring each of the American Indian Nations in Minnesota, and a tribute to much beloved staff member Joe Brown who passed away earlier in the year.

The Bryn Mawr community craft fair held in the entry "nest" of the school showcased the wares of fifteen neighborhood artisans and crafters selling original artwork, jewelry, pottery, fabric arts and baked goods as well as student artwork and paved the way to the Taste of Anwatin in the newly planted healing garden in the school's outdoor courtyard.

The evening's program opened with three songs played by the Anwatin Middle School band including a version of the sea shanty "The Wellerman" with enthusiastic audi-

ence participation. Following the music, the Indian Education Department of Minneapolis Public schools officially presented eleven tribal flags to Anwatin Middle School. The tribal flags were provided to each school this year to be presented at district events and graduation ceremonies "in recognition of the history and first people of this land."

The highlight of the evening for many in attendance was a tribute to much-loved dedicated staff member Joe Brown. Students spoke fondly of Brown and unveiled two painted murals created in his memory on the courtyard walls. Capping the tribute, Minneapolis Aquatennial Queen of the Lakes Erika Tillmann presented Brown's wife, children and grandchildren with the Honorary Commodore Award for Joe Brown, who she said, "exemplified the Aquatennial Ambassador Organization's core values of community, leadership, and scholarship."

This Spring's event was well attended by staff and students who enjoyed games in the courtyard and a wonderful diversity of foods including empanadas, walking tacos, fry bread, and tamales, after the program. # **Skate Park**

new temporary skate park will begin to take shape starting next week in a small section of the North Parking Lot at Bde Maka Ska. With input from the skate community, Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) Trades staff are creating skate features using salvaged parts from old park furnishings and building new concrete skate features. Staff have been working to finalize site layout and will install skate features over the next few weeks. The skate park is expected to remain in place through 2023, then its condition and future use will be evaluated.

Last year unpermitted skateboarding features appeared at the northeast corner of Bde Maka Ska, which interfered with vendor operations nearby. The skateboarding features had to be removed, but the MPRB understands they were very popular and there's a lot of interest in a skate park near the lake.

MPRB staff worked with local skateboarding advocacy group City of Skate to review several potential skate park locations within Bde Maka Ska Park and identified space for a temporary, or "pop-up," skate park in a section of the north parking lot.


MPRB Trades staff agreed to create new skate features from parts saved from past park construction projects to help lower costs and bring the project to fruition.

This gives other prairie species a chance to compete. We don't live in Seattle or London so shouldn't expect perfect lawns here.

# A Lawn Time Coming

pon moving to Bryn Mawr four years ago I figured that I could easily revive my front yard. The space, a small steep hillside, primarily consisted of dirt and weeds. "How hard can growing grass be?" I thought to myself.

For the next three years every summer I visited the hardware store to pick up grass seed and supplies. I tried erosion mats, sprinkled bags of seed, and added dirt. Still by the end of each season I was left with only a few small patches of grass. The experience was rather disheartening.

This past winter I completed my Master Gardener coursework with the University of Minnesota. I was happy to see lawns as a module and paid close attention when the time came.

I can now happily report that my lawn is looking better than ever! I made a few small changes this spring that I would like to share with you:

- 1. Understand your soil. Years of winter salt applications to our front steps and sidewalks caused the soil to dry out and lack nutrients. I added organic compost amendments to the lawn this spring and seeded with a micro clover and fine fescue. The clover and fescue mix will require less water than most grasses. It is establishing well in the dry clay soil.
- 2. Purchase the right seed and spread your seed in the shoulder seasons. Head to your local nursery to ask for seed recommendations. You

will find very knowledgeable people that can assist you in purchasing a quality product that is tailored to your sun and soil needs. The seed options they carry are typically more specialized than what you will find at big box stores. Once you have your seed, time its planting for mid-August to early September. If you missed the fall window simply get an early start in the spring while the temperatures are still cool.

3. Once your turf is established, cut your lawn no shorter than 3 inches. By keeping your mower height high you are allowing the grass to shade out weed seeds and keep the soil cool. In addition, a high mowing height establishes a longer root. This in turn helps combats drought and

improve the overall health of the lawn.

Follow these tips and I am sure that you wont need four years, like I did, to establish a healthy front lawn.


Maya will be attending the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa this fall. She intends to major in business and market-

## John Davis, Area 6






## Allen Reckin, Area 7
