Communications & Development Report - Lynda Shaheen

Ice Cream social expenses still being processed. Had a more casual

approach to donating this year. Collected \$1100 in donations and sold \$500 in merch. Member Night at Utepils on September 22.

Event Report -Patty Wycoff

Thirty-four volunteers helped. Lost a fifteen-gallon ice cream donation at the last minute when a vendor was unable to contribute; Cuppa Java donated two tubs to make up for it. Nineteen bags of ice donated from Market, Brian and Brenda donated chalk and other items for kids to use. Expenses were \$757 including ice cream, posters, sandwich boards. Didn't vote for favorite flavors this year, made the line go faster. \$352 in-kind income including ice cream from Ben and Jerry's, Sebastion Joe's, La La Homemade Ice Cream, and Cuppa Java. Kids were thrilled with firetruck. Great band.

Meadows update. Lowest bid within budget. Park Board votes on contract in early September, construction start by end of September to run through summer 2023. Cedar Lake Master Plan continues meetings. Circulation subcommittee will finalize recommendations on August 10. Could affect private landowners on Cedar Lake southeast side. The Trail Loppet race will be September 17 and 18th. Lots of volunteers needed.

Racial Justice - Steve Harvey/Liv Nielson Steve Harvey has stepped up to be co-chair of the committee. Sacred Sites tour not geared to young children.

Schools -Colleen Dhennin

School starts September 6, teachers back on August 22. Many opportunities for volunteer activities with the PTA. brynmawrpta.org to see what they're doing and sign up to volunteer. Hosting a breakfast for teachers;

volunteers to donate items. Beloved principal is moving to an interim associate superintendent position at the district offices. New principal will be Kevin Oldenberg, he comes highly recommended.

SWLRT Update

Miscommunication about the tour. Josh will try to go in September.

Discussion Items, New Business, Updates and Announcements –

2800 Wayzata - Wirth on the Woods. Discussed Rod's proposal to create two new areas for BMNA Board representation, Area 8 and Area 9, with up to three reps for each area, consistent with all seven current areas. Kate started the IRPR (Issue Review Process Request) to address issues with the creation of two new areas. Executive Committee will look at the IRPR. Board will vote on a plan in the future and make recommended changes to the by-laws. Question about what affordable housing is, what percent of AMI. Supply chain issues are delaying the project, preventing rentals from starting in September 2022. Parking is occurring on Upton and other city streets because of limited parking for the workers. \$125,000,000 project. Difficulties finding workers.

Charles Peterson -

Promoting the Cricket Tournament on September 3rd and 4th in the Meadows. Cricket is the #2 sport in the world. There will be one cricket field in Meadows when work is complete.

Kudos to Steve for NNO organizing in Area 7.

Neighbors have questioned the large musical events that are taking place at Utepils. The owner has been notifying neighbors when things will be loud. The Utepils coordinator is very responsive to neighborhood needs; Lynda will push out the messages she gets from Utepils.





HomeHelpMN Gives Homeowners More Time to Apply for Assistance

program changes last week that expand eligibility.

The cap on assistance was increased to \$50,000 per household. The prior limit was \$35,000.

There is no longer a time restriction on past-due expenses. Previously, expenses had to be incurred after Jan. 21, 2020.

For applications being processed, the new criteria will be used and no additional action is needed. Applicants who were previously denied but are still in need of assistance and meet eligibility criteria may request http://www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us

HomeHelpMN also lifted the August application deadline earlier this month. Homeowners with past-due mortgage payments and other eligible housing expenses can apply for assistance as long as funds remain. While there is no application deadline, homeowners with past-due expenses are encouraged to apply as soon as possible.

Applications for assistance can be submitted online at HomeHelpMN.org or over the phone at 800-388-3226. The website and application are available in English, Spanish, Somali and Hmong. The call center supports these languages and more. Call center hours are from 8 a.m. - 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

The tour offers an opportunity to learn about Minnesota history from a Native perspective through storytelling and experiencing the sites in silence / meditation / reflection.

young children. Rev. Jim Bear Jacobs (Mohican) and Kelly Sherman Conroy (Oglala Lakota) lead the tour as part of the Healing Minnesota Stories initiative of the Minnesota Council of Churches. This initiative is an "effort to create understanding and healing between Native American and non-Native people." Scott Russell of Healing MN Stories also

explains, "Native people have suffered deep trauma over many years, losing their land, language, and culture, and all who call Minnesota home are the lesser for it."

Watch out, They're Here

there is a good chance that they have already arrived in a yard near you. Jumping worms have been invading Minnesota. Gardeners in Bryn Mawr are already dealing with rabbits, squirrels and deer. Now jumping worms are showing up. The only proven way to control them is prevention.

Jumping worms look a lot like common earthworms, except they wiggle, jump and are very active. They live in the top few inches of soil and in leaf litter. They change the soil texture to appear and feel like coffee grounds. They are especially a problem because they strip the rich soil of nutrients and kill an assortment of plants.

Unlike common earthworms, jumping worms have a ring-like collar or clitellum that is smooth, milky-white and somewhat constricted. It is located about 1/3 down the length of the worm and is different from the swelled saddle-like clitellum of common earthworms.

As their name implies, they are characterized by the way they wiggle when disturbed. They primarily move from place to place as eggs, which are very hard to detect. Be aware of any plants you bring into your yard and determine if the source is free of jumping worms. Well-established nurseries are alert to the jumping worm menace, but be careful of buying plants from any source that sells plants as a sideline. Well-meaning friends who share their plants can easily be a source of jumping worms.

Bryn Mawr's Bike Paths

s I introduce myself to folks around our neighborhood as a new co-rep for area 4, I find myself reflecting on why our family chose to live in Bryn Mawr—the bicycle infrastructure. Bryn Mawr is the 'Neighborhood Within a Park" and as Minneapolis Parks have great designated bike paths, we are also the neighborhood within bike paths. So let's explore our trails.

Luce Line Trail The Luce Line has its beginnings in Bryn Mawr Meadows Park. A bicycle commuter could head East to downtown on Dunwoody BLVD. Heading West, the trail follows Cedar Lake Rd S to Chestnut Ave before running along Bassett Creek. The trail leads bikers past Utepils Brewery to Glenwood Ave and North through Wirth Lake Park until it meets and runs parallel to Hwy 55. The trail then turns to follow Theodore Wirth PKWY North to just South of Loppet's The Trailhead. The trail then turns West all the way past Medicine Lake, Hutchinson, all the way to Cedar Mills.

North Cedar Lake Regional Trail/Kenilworth Trail/Kenwood Parkway These paths junction just south of 394 and Penn Ave S. and can be accessed by a sheltered path that runs along the 394 eastbound onramp. Going East, a person can get to The Walker, Loring Park and Nicollet Ave. on Kenwood PKWY. On the Cedar Lake Trail...when it reopens, cyclists can head east to Target Field and the river just north of the Hennepin Ave Bridge. Heading West on The North Cedar Trail, cyclists can peddle to West End and Knollwood Village shopping or continue to The Depot Coffee Shop in Hopkins. Westbound on the Kenilworth

Trail...when it reopens, will take cyclist shoppers to the shops along Lake St. North of Bde Maka Ska.

Theodore Wirth Parkway Running North/South along our neighborhood's western border and a part of The Grand Rounds Scenic Byway, this path can connect a peddler to much of the city. Peddling North, adventurers can get to The Loppet area for mountain biking, golfing or meals. Further North, the trail changes to the Victory Memorial Dr. and continues on to The Northeast Community. Peddling South will lead to Lake St., The Midtown Greenway, The Chain of Lakes and South Minneapolis.

Peddling these paths can be great for relaxation, exercise, family time and fun with friends. They can also be great for transportation. As mentioned, some of these trails are being disrupted by the work being done to complete the SWLR. Detours through quiet neighborhoods do exist by following the orange detour signs. Places I regularly use these trails to get to are work, the Theodore Wirth mountain biking trails. Utepils Brewery, Cub foods, Target, my son's activities and meals out. It's good to remember while using our city's bicycle infrastructure, that some businesses lost free street parking when the infrastructure was added. It's important to let these businesses know that cyclists contribute to their business.

Youth & Schools

Partnering with Young Readers Tyn Mawr Community School

Bryn Mawr Community School will launch the Reading Partners program this Fall, which pairs K-5 students with a community volunteer to help students develop strong reading skills. Reading Partners adds to a variety of exciting new offerings at the elementary school this Fall.

First piloted in Colorado in 2015, Reading Partners has been shown to significantly raise reading levels for participating students with especially dramatic increases shown for English language learners. Reading Partners hires college graduates from Ameri-Corps to organize and administer the program in each building. The program administrators support community volunteer tutors who read books with students once or twice a week depending upon the time commitment of the volunteer. Students select the books they read with their partner. Some Minneapolis schools have had the Reading Partners program for a few years, and the volunteer tutor with whom I spoke loves the program and can't wait to get

back to reading with kids in school. The program tries to maintain the same partner with each young reader throughout a ten week session.

Tutors are trained to help students with their reading skills. The BMNA website will post details about the format and location of the training sessions as they are finalized.


