Agenda approval moved, seconded. Motion carried. Minutes from January 11 moved, seconded. Motion carried.

## Minneapolis Community Clay Courts (MCCC) - Charles Weed, Pres./Mike Tieleman, Area 2

MCCC builds public clay tennis courts in cooperation with Mpls Parks and Rec Board, such as the two clay courts at Waveland Triangle Park in Linden Hills that are 1.5 yrs old. Clay courts are better for the environment, much easier on joints (especially for senior players), and maintenance is a community project organized and performed by MCCC. The concrete courts on Chestnut were built in 1941 and are ideal for clay conversion.

Discussion: Maintenance is easy and embraced by players. Site is designated WPA. Is that a problem? No. Adam Arvidson, MPRB Director of Planning, will pursue only if BMNA communicates support. Bethanne Turnbull will be liaison. etc being worked on.Wording and placement comments welcome.

Extra work hours are required to make up for weather delays. Watch for notifications. Minn asked which is preferred: working 10-11-hour days Mon-Thur and 9 hours on Fridays, OR working 9-hour days Mon-Thur, 8hour Fridays, and "a few" Saturdays. Both schedules are allowed. Liaison Rod Miller will check with Upton neighbors.

Website: Lupe is aware of confusion. 2800 Wayzata.com will be directed to new website. Focus is generating interest, leads for WOTW, but website includes tab for construction update, tab for feedback. Leasing office for both Eloise and Theodore on 1515 Glenwood, with parking and handicapped access. Leasing begins Apr 1.

Liaison Rod Miller: Lupe and Swervo are separate entities building different residences on Wayzata Blvd site. (Only Lupe represented tonight.) Please read articles from BMNA website or developers' website to find out what is actually happening. Lots of misinformation being spread.

Lupe eager to connect new residents to neighborhood! BMNA can provide the info to be delivered by leasing offices. BMNA will vote in March on proposed addition of two new areas to neighborhood association representation.

to people. For example, he said that every year at the start of winter they send out a message reminding people not to leave their cars running to warm up out in the street or the alley. He wants that message to be seen and not lost amongst all the others. He said they will send out a message if there is a pattern of crime or if there is a solid description of a suspect that is helpful. For instance, one time he had a suspect that several people said was 6 foot 5 so he felt that was helpful information because it was distinct. He said his general advice for people is to follow all of their safety recommendations all of the time. He said if you're interested in knowing every time there is a crime, then you could follow one of the scanner sites or one of the crimewatch sites. He said those sites and groups get the info out for those that want it. He will definitely communicate with the BMNA anytime there is something alarming we should know about or to neighbors individually if they are signed up for the email list.

Topics included 1) update on WOTW. 2) park board good at engaging in planning stages but not good at following through. 3) big concerns about litter in Lake of the Isles. 4) Loring Park is a success story of local stewardship. 5) Luminary Loppet postponed to Feb 18 due to moving course to solid-ground trails because of dangerous ice conditions. 6) Area 1 neighbor wants to accelerate rejuvenation of reserve block 40 playground by diverting park funds dedicated for the Bryn Mawr Meadows project to this playground. The money comes from developers, goes into a pool, and must be used for projects in the neighborhood. He's working on a public/private partnership.Though this Area1 playground was renovated in 2004, the equipment is not holding up and parts are expensive and hard to get because they come from Germany. BMNA Board must agree before the Park Board will consider diverting funds. The park board uses quantifiable criteria that focus on racial and economic equity to ensure that capital investments are targeted first in parks and communities where they are needed most. That Area 1 playground currently has a NPP20 "need" rank of 101 out of 104 parks, i.e. very low priority. The BMNA supports the park board's equity-ranking concept. When the Loppet Foundation trailhead building took precedence with the Park Board even though it was not in the masterplan, many neighbors were opposed. We are waiting for more details about the request. Racial Justice - Liv Nielson/Steve Harvey.

Under their stewardship the "Market" soon became a neighborhood hub. Paul was generous to a fault, Sometimes extending credit and often times getting burnt, yet he never stopped trusting because of it.

Many neighborhood kids got their first jobs there and many adults took their turns behind that counter, including me.

Driving non-stop from Lake Tahoe with Paul was a memorable experience. He did the bulk of the driving and had one CD; the soundtrack from "Joseph and the Technicolor Dreamcoat". He couldn't get enough of that CD and I liked it, the first two times I heard it, not so much after that.

Through the years the cast of characters that came through the market doors inspired me to write my monthly column (Counter Talk") for 18 years. Paul was certainly one of those characters with his love of spoonerisms and bad jokes!

He was always someone who had one foot in the spirit world and was an amateur "Ghostbuster". Now my friend has both feet in the spirit world now and I'm sure his spirit will be hanging out in the market for a long time. When you visit the market now, don't hesitate to use a spoonerism and maybe hum a few bars from his favorite musical, he'd Rest in Peace Paul Anderson.



## Lottery to Buy \$30 Trees Now Open Through March 31

Mineapolis property owners can now enter a lottery any time through March 31 to buy a \$30 tree for their Minneapolis property. The tree sale is so popular, a lottery will determine who can buy a tree this spring. The City will offer 2,000 5- to 8-foot shade, fruit, evergreen and flowering trees. One entry is allowed per Minneapolis address. Those selected in the lottery will get an email in April with the date when http://www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us

they can order. Those who buy a tree can pick it up May 20, 21 or 22 (subject to change). The location is to be determined and will be emailed to people who bought a tree.

In the past 18 years, the City Trees program has provided more than 25,000 trees for planting on private property. Since 2006, the City of Minneapolis has funded the City Trees program, a low-cost way for folks to help the city's tree canopy grow and enjoy all the benefits of trees.

## Winter Parking Restrictions in Place

inneapolis officials decided to implement Winter Parking Restrictions beginning 9 p.m.Thursday, Jan. 26 to ensure city streets are passable for emergency vehicles, buses and other travelers in the face of heavy snow accumulation this winter.

When Winter Parking Restrictions are in place, parking is banned on the EVEN numbered side of non-Snow-Emergency routes until April 1, unless conditions allow the City to lift the ban earlier. Parking is allowed on Snow Emergency routes, parkways, and the ODD numbered side of non-Snow Emergency routes, unless otherwise posted. Drivers parking in Minneapolis must follow these Winter Parking Restrictions, or they could be ticketed and towed. Winter parking restrictions include critical permit parking areas as well.

Minneapolis had over 52 inches of snow prior to January 26. The heavy accumulation has narrowed streets, which pose a safety hazard when emergency vehicles cannot navigate these streets to reach people who need assistance.

## Unless Otherwise Posted, You Can/Cannot Park:

YES: On the odd side of streets that are not Snow Emergency RoutesYES: On both sides of Snow Emergency RoutesYES: On both sides of parkways (where parking is allowed)NO: On the even side of streets that are not Snow Emergency Routes NO:Where temporary "No parking" signs are posted

NO: In severe winters, temporary signs may restrict parking on other Snow Emergency Routes as needed.

If the city declare a Snow Emergency while Winter Parking Restrictions are in effect, Snow Emergency rules come first.

## Winter Parking Restrictions During Snow Emergencies

During a Snow Emergency, Winter Parking Restrictions are suspended. For Days 1, 2 and 3 of the Snow Emergency, follow Snow Emergency parking rules.

On Day 1 of Snow Emergency

- Starting at 4 p.m., you may move your vehicle off of Snow Emergency Routes and onto either side
- of streets that are not Snow Emergency Routes. Beginning at 9 p.m., follow the stan-
- dard Snow Emergency parking rules for Days 1, 2 and 3. When the Snow Emergency ends
- Winter Parking Restrictions begin again at 8 a.m. the morning after Snow Emergency Day 3. If your vehicle is on the even side of a street that's not a Snow Emergency Route, you will need to move it.

She has founded and managed two civic organizations, one a nonprofit that funded and built a community center and two, a global platform that is bringing climate education into classrooms in several countries.

Katie understands that public safety and housing development are the top concerns for neighbors and looks forward to supporting policy solutions that make our City and Ward affordable for all.

# **Bridging the Faultlines: Stories of Racism, Resistance and Repair**

n Spring 2021, the Racial Justice Committee of the BMNA encouraged Bryn Mawr neighbors to use the interactive maps at Mapping Prejudice to find out if the deed for their property includes a racially restrictive covenant. The deeds for about fortyfive privately owned lots in Bryn Mawr specify "No lot shall be sold, conveyed or leased to, or occupied by any person who is not of the white or Caucasian race, but this restriction shall not apply to domestic servants employed by and living with a qualified occupant of any part of the premises."

Restrictive covenants were one step in a sequence of legal maneuvers that cemented racial segregation and generational economic disenfranchisement for people of color in Minnesota. Twin Cities Public Television's documentary Jim Crow of the North, an Emmy award-winner, explains how white residents, real estate developers, city planners, and financial institutions each contributed to this discriminatory process. And it all takes place in Minneapolis and our inner-ring suburbs. (You can watch Jim Crow of the North free at www.tpt.org/jim-crow-north/)

Bridging the Faultlines: Stories of Racism, Resistance and Repair will focus on the new TPT documentary shorts production, Jim Crow of the North Stories, and include music, poetry, and food. 



## **Carjackings and** Auto Thefts on the Rise

inneapolis Police Department (MPD) reported more than 700 vehicle thefts in January. A marked uptick over last year. Additionally, there were over 30 carjackings, with some victims being robbed at gunpoint (including such a robbery that happened on Queen Avenue in Area 5 on January 11.)

Many carjackings are carried out by juveniles and are crimes of opportunity that can occur anywhere and at any time. Your car is not the primary target. It is likely to be abandoned when the tank is empty and may also be used in another robbery. Carjackers are looking for cash, credit cards, electronics, items of value. Your cell phone can yield the highest returns; and do you the most amount of damage. Assailants will move very fast, forcibly taking your keys, wallet, purse, laptop bag, etc. and they will typically demand that you open your phone (or even specific apps.) MPD strongly urges people to comply with these demands, especially when a weapon is involved.

Read on for best practices to limit your risk of being carjacked, including tips for action steps that can mitigate the fallout should you become the victim of a carjacking.

## **Everyday best practices:**

Go out with only the cards/cash/ checks that you need. Know what is in your wallet.

Consider not carrying a purse/bag. Limit the number of banking/shopping apps on your phone. Set up maximum security on all apps.

Keep your car keys/fob and house keys on separate key rings. Put house keys in a pocket where they may not get taken if you are



- Walk with confidence, head up, eyes swiveling - NEVER BE ON THE PHONE.
- Load/unload the car as quickly as possible.
- Immediately lock car doors, keep windows up at all times.
- Drive off right away.
- Continue to be vigilant on your trip, especially when driving slowly or when stopped. Carjackers may bump into your car to make you stop, or try and hem you in.
- NEVER SIT IN YOUR CAR ON THE PHONE OR WHILE SELECTING MUSIC.

## You've been carjacked – now what?

- Get to a safe place before calling 911. If you have been able to drive away
  - from an attempted carjacking, report the incident to 911.
- Immediately contact your bank, credit card vendors, Uber, Venmo, Amazon, etc. Carjackers will be on your phone within minutes trying to access funds/services via apps and accounts.
- Promptly change passwords for accounts on any device that was stolen.
- Change your locks if the carjackers got your house keys.
- If your garage remote is stolen, take steps to have the entry system reprogramed.
- If the robbery occurred in the neighborhood, be sure to tell your neighbors and ask the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA) to spread the word about the crime.
- Check security camera footage to see if any images were captured that could help MPD identify the crimi-

robbed.

Don't leave anything of personal value in your car.

NEVER leave your car running to heat it up or while making a delivery. Remain super vigilant both getting IN and OUT of your vehicle.

## Tips to reduce the risk of becoming the victim of a carjacking:

Be observant of your surroundings. Trust your gut! If something feels wrong, it likely is wrong! Maintain 7-10' of personal space while walking in public areas. Keep your finger on the panic button of your fob as you walk to and from your car.

nals. Apply for a replacement driver's license if it was stolen.

Good communication is the number one deterrent to becoming a victim of any crime according to CPS Bill Magnuson. Get to know your neighbors, BMNA Area Reps, and board members. Don't ignore car and house alarms. Call 911 if you see suspicious activity. Install security systems like Ring cameras. And at this time of year, pay attention to your surroundings when outside dealing with ice and snow.
