Agenda approval moved, seconded. Motion carried. Minutes from March 8, 2023, moved, seconded. Motion carried.

### City of Minneapolis -Councilperson Lisa Goodman

Lunch with Lisa rescheduled for April 26 with Margaret Kelliher Anderson, Public Works Director. On May 31 will host Senator Scott Dibble and Representative Frank Hornstein for a legislative review. Cedar Lake Rd bridge temporarily closed. Bridge supports compromised by an encampment, determining whether the bridge is safe. Public meeting to talk about full closure of south Wayzata and access to the 394 entrance. Pedestrian and bike paths will be open. North Wayzata temporarily closed to put in a sewer line. Street sweeping starts Tuesday. Call 311 to report potholes. Filling with hot asphalt now. New bike share companies bringing in bikes and scooters— Lime, Spin and Veylo. Community Connections conference June 10.

### Public Safety Report

Kate shared. Community Safe Officer sends a report every two weeks. No reported crimes first two weeks of March. Second two weeks; swindle and recovery of a stolen vehicle on Morgan. Businesses should reach out to Shannon for safety evaluations. He will be invited to our annual meeting and will connect quarterly with the Board.

### HERC/Hennepin County Zero Waste Plan – Cam Gordon/Nazir Khan

Promoting shuttering the downtown garbage burner. Asking the county to develop milestones for getting to zero waste. Lobbying for a closing date of the burner. Issues with burner; being kept operational beyond use (built in 1989 with the intention to shut down in 20 years), expensive to keep running, emits large amount of greenhouse gasses, 55411 zone highest rates of hospitalization, pollution from 200 garbage trucks/day. Questions raised about where garbage will go. Discussed rates of composting and recycling and increasing those. Issue raised about landfills being environmentally unclean.

### **Treasurer Report- Roberta Jordan**

2022 books are resolved. Expenses were less than income by \$5000.We have \$47,000 checking/\$100,000 savings. Closer to Vanguard investment being complete. Profit and loss posted in Drive and on website.

### Communications and Development Report - Lynda Shaheen

Communication centered on Winter-Fest, Racial Justice film. WinterFest was a financial success. Took in \$775 in merchandise, \$70 in cash donations, \$4000 ticket sales, \$4000 from sponsors, \$2500 from silent auction. Purchased meals from LaDona. 200 people attended. Expenses just under \$3000. Made \$8400. Great fundraising event. Membership letter just out, Timing different than other years.

### **Event Report – Patty Wycoff**

Brian shared report. New venue for WinterFest worked great. Plan to stay there next year. Garage Sale. In addition to La Mesa, Cuppa Java and Bryn Mawr Pizza having food there will be 3 food trucks, Mr. Egg Roll, Mill City Tasty Treats, and Pimento. No event permit needed as food trucks will be in private drives. Each truck will make a \$100 donation to the BMNA. Arranged for portable toilets located by Cuppa Java, extra toilet paper, traffic control.

Kicking off with garden stewards next Monday, formalizing needs for key gardens. Approval

resources on the park-owned proper-

ties. Hydrants connected by April 26.

Setting up free SignupGenius account to automate volunteer registration. **Racial Justice- Liv Nielson/ Steve Harvey** Another successful film screening. About 30 attendees for "Stories I Didn't Know".

Active Transportation – Josh Nichols Committee was formerly Traffic Safety. Six new committee members voted to change name and focus of committee. Vision Statement: "We will create a walkable, bikeable, drivable, safe neighborhood with connectivity to the larger city and readiness to face and combat climate change. Schools – Colleen Dhennin Plant sale online orders through April 21. Need volunteers on May 4 to help with plant pickup. Sign up on

SignupGenius on PTO website. Schools are a significant contributor to waste. Obtained a small grant to create milk recycling stations. Divert leftover milk and 400-800 milk cartons/day.

Wirth on the Woods – Rod Miller North Wayzata Blvd closing for water main work April 17, anticipate a week. Leasing office for senior building delayed. Occupancy dates: October for The Theodore, November for The Eloise. Last four townhome buildings will be erected this spring. Occupancy dates for the loft apartments and townhomes have not been announced. Parking continues to be a concern for some neighbors. Parking on the surrounding streets is legal. Workers asked to be considerate of neighbors and observe parking restrictions.

### **CITY COUNCIL CANDIDATES ARE ON THE BALLOT—WHAT HAS CHANGED SINCE 2021**

Article #1 in a series of articles about the 2023 Minneapolis City Election, brought to you by League of Women Voters Minneapolis

ecause of the redistricting process completed in 2022, every Minneapolis City Council member will be up for reelection this year to serve a two-year term. In 2025, Council Candidates will be back on the ballot returning to the traditional four-year term.And this will be the first time the 13 City Council members will be elected following major changes to the City Charter (the City's constitution).

Charter Amendment No. 184, passed in the municipal election of 2021, has redefined the City structure. Before this process, the Government Structure Work Group described the City "as a complex patchwork of existing laws that has been in place since 1920." Known for years as a "Weak Mayor-Strong Council" system, Minneapolis has been transformed into an "Executive Mayor-Legislative Council" form of government. But what does that mean? What role will the City Council play now?

In the 1980s Mayor Don Fraser failed to pass a Strong Mayor Charter Amendment, after multiple attempts had been made throughout previous decades. He devised a compromise which passed. He proposed an Executive Committee made up of up of the Mayor, the City Council president, and up to three City Council members. Together they had a say in hiring or firing department heads. But this was described over the years as an unruly "governance by committee". In 2004, Steve Berg, writing in the Star Tribune, called the city's structure "one that makes no one accountable and

puts no one in charge". He called it inefficient and costly.

Close to twenty years after that article appeared the situation has changed. The 2021 Charter Amendment No. 184 has consolidated all administrative authority under the office of the Mayor - the City's chief executive officer - in a single chain of command. The Executive Committee has been eliminated. All department heads are chosen and supervised by the Mayor alone. The City Council confirms all of these appointments. Previously the Mayor had appointed only the Chief of Police.

Removed from the day-to-day operations of the City's administration, the City Council, the City's legislative and primary policy-making body, is charged with enacting local laws and public policies. Council members serve ward constituents as advocate and ombudsman. The City Council appoints the City Clerk, establishes an independent Audit Committee, and has general oversight authority, holding the Administration to account. Under the Charter "neither the City Council nor the Council committee or member may usurp, invade, or interfere with the Mayor's direction or supervision of the administration." Clear lines of authority and responsibility have been drawn.

While the Mayor represents the entire city, each Council member serves a ward of about 34,000 people. Your Council person is your public advocate - a link to your community and its' specific issues. Who you elect can determine the outcome of which policies you care about; policies that are not only heard, but ultimately incorporated into decision making. Vote local! Your vote matters!

# **Kenilworth Trail Detour:**

### **Through Fall 2023**

s part of the construction of the Green Line Extension LRT Project, work at the West 21st Street Station will progress in May to perform utility, road and LRT track work. This work necessitates a closure of the Kenilworth Trail between West 21st Street and the trail intersection to the north with the North Cedar Lake Trail.

Starting Tuesday April 25, trail users will follow the existing detour route on Lake of the Isles Parkway and utilize Kenwood Parkway to connect to

the Cedar Lake Trail by I-394. Detour signage will be adjusted to reflect this change.

This detour is expected to be in place for the duration of the roadwork occurring at West 21st Street into fall 2023. Updates on this work will be provided through the project's weekly construction update.

### **Two Month Summer Detour**

The intersection of Penn Avenue and South Wayzata Boulevard will be closed to motorized traffic for approximately two months starting in June 2023. Access to and from eastbound 394 ramps will be maintained with some adjustments. This temporary closure is part of the construction of the Bryn Mawr Station area for the Green Line Extension LRT (SWLRT) project.

On Tuesday evening, April 18, Project staff provided a briefing on the closure to members of the neighborhood during a virtual meeting. Residents learned that during the two month closure, motorized traffic will be detoured along North Wayzata Boulevard to Cedar Lake Road and Penn Avenue. Bike and trail access will be maintained with adjustments.

During the meeting, neighbors raised concerns about safety at the juncture of Penn Avenue, So Wayzata Blvd and eastbound 394 ramps. An already dangerous intersection will become further challenging by the increased pedestrian, bike, bus and car access to the new station. This is a consideration which has been brought to the Project staff over the past two decades, and no apparent resolution has been reached.

There is also concern for bike traffic on Penn Avenue. This is already a problem and the increased traffic related to access to the Bryn Mawr Station will make it even worse.

Detouring traffic for two months from South Wayzata Blvd. to North Wayzata Blvd and Cedar Lake Road will be challenging for anyone using that route. There will also be one day in May when the eastbound lane on South Wayzata Blvd, will be closed to allow delivery of the remaining section of the pedestrian bridge that leads to the station. - Barry Schade, Area 6

- May 16, 2012 So much cottonwood cotton on lawns, screens, everywhere!
- May 22, 2011 Tornado with massive damage in Golden Valley, Wirth Park, and North Minneapolis. The scars are still easily visible from places such as the "Tornado Alley" ski and bike trail north and east of Bassett's Creek. This is peak tornado season in Minnesota, when cold Canadian air meets warm air pushing up from the Gulf of Mexico.



# **Construction Has Resumed on Bryn Mawr Meadows** Improvements

### Laurel/Morgan Avenues intersection:

Crews are working to connect the water quality ponds newly constructed by the City to storm sewer pipes under Laurel Avenue. They will also construct four new pedestrian ramps for improved access to the park and along Morgan Avenue. This work involves one day of limited driveway access for two or three properties near the intersection. Notification and timing for this work will be delivered directly to those impacted homes and include contact information for the contractor, who will do their best to accurately predict the date for this work.


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

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
