Treasurer Report– Report shared from Roberta Jordan


Everything is good. Our insurance company is no longer providing insurance to nonprofits; covered through the end of the year. Exploring new companies.

Racial Justice Film Series

The Racial Justice Committee will continue our film screenings in the new year, and we're working on lining up titles and speakers. In the meantime, the beautifully renovated Capri Theater is partnering with MSP Film Society and the Minnesota Historical Society to present First Thursday Films. The series is billed as "noteworthy films with good conversation that follows each screening." All of them examine some aspect of race and culture through cinema. There are two more films this year:

Lakota Nation vs. United States November 2, 7:00 PM

This film tells the story of the Lakota people's fight to reclaim control of the Black Hills. It is a provocative, visually stunning testament to a land and a people who have survived removal, exploitation and genocide – and whose best days are yet to come.



Post-film conversation features director Jesse Short Bull

Chevalier December 7, 7:00 PM

This film is based on the factual story of the French-Caribbean composer Joseph Bologne, aka Chevalier de Saint-Georges, the illegitimate son of an African enslaved and a French plantation owner, who rises to improbable heights in French society as a celebrated violinist-composer and fencer, complete with a love affair and falling out with Marie Antoinette.



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Fall Street Sweeping Begins Oct. 17

rews are preparing to sweep streets across Minneapolis this month and November to clean the streets before winter. Street sweeping helps keep leaves and debris out of the storm drains and from ending up in our lakes and creeks and the Mississippi River.

Minneapolis Public Works will begin the big task of curb-to-curb street sweeping throughout the city Tuesday, Oct. 17. During the four weeks of the comprehensive fall street sweep, crews will clean about 1,000 miles of city streets. To make sure crews can do the best job possible, temporary hot pink "No Parking" signs will be posted at least 24 hours in advance so streets will be clear of cars when they're swept. The first signs will be posted Monday, Oct. 16, and sweeping will begin the next day. Anyone who parks on the street will need to follow posted parking rules or their cars may be ticketed and towed.

Ways to stay informed of the parking rules:

Interactive web feature – The Street Sweeping Schedule Map is available on the City's website. Visitors to the website will be able to find out which week their street is scheduled to be swept. Then, on the weekend before each of the four weeks, the schedule for the upcoming week will be broken down to show which day of the week streets are scheduled to be swept.

"No Parking" signs – City crews will post "No Parking" signs at least 24 hours before sweeping any streets. Parking will be banned from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on the day a street is swept. However, the "No Parking" signs will be removed as soon as possible after a street has been completely swept to allow people to resume parking after the signs are removed. Vehicles not in compliance with "No Parking" signs may be ticketed and towed to the



Minneapolis Impound Lot. The sweeping takes several steps, so people should not resume parking until the signs are removed.

Email and text alerts – You can sign up to get an alert automatically emailed or texted to you at the start of street sweeping.

Social media – The City will use Facebook and Twitter to post periodic street sweeping updates and information.

Videos – Street sweeping is explained in English, Spanish, Somali and Hmong on the City's YouTube channel and on Minneapolis City TV.

Clean streets mean healthier water

Minneapolis streets are swept completely curb to curb with enforcement of parking rules once in the spring and again in the fall. You can do your part by not pushing leaves, grass clippings or other debris into City streets. It's bad for our lakes and waterways, it can cause safety hazards and it's against the law.

Leaves that wash into storm drains end up in our lakes and creeks and the Mississippi River. They may quickly begin to break down, creating pollutants that overfertilize lake water and help harmful aquatic plants and algae grow. The murky lake water that results is not good for swimming or fishing and can harm wildlife and pets.

Election Day is November 7 -Make a Plan to Vote!

Because of the 2022 redistricting process every Minneapolis City Council member is up for election to a 2-year term. This is your opportunity to select the person who best represents your voice in city government, who carries your concerns to city hall, and who advocates for you when you need assistance.

The best way to make sure your voice is heard is to make a plan to vote with these simple steps:

Register at your current address. In Minnesota, you can register in person at Minneapolis Elections & Voter Services, 980 E Hennepin Ave (October 18 - November 6), or on Election Day (November 7) at your polling place. If you are registered to vote at your current address, you do not need to show an ID to vote. If not, you can register on Election Day at your polling place site but you will need an ID or other proof of residence to vote. Not sure if you're currently registered or want to register online? Visit mnvotes.gov or vote.minneapolismn.gov. Find the League's nonpartisan voting guide for general information on registration at LWVMpls.org/for-voters.

Know the candidates. The National League of Women Voters provides information related to the candidates running for City Council. It includes the candidates' views on current issues that may affect your choice. The best place to research candidates' views is at www.Vote411.org.You can also watch the two Ward 7 candidate forums on the League of Women Voters You Tube channel, link at www.LWVMpls.org Various news outlets have candidate interviews available as well such as Southwest Voices, SPEAKMpls, and MinnPost. After making your decision, consider looking up a sample ballot to review more information on the candidates. Sample ballots are available through the Minnesota Secretary of States' office at mnvotes.gov.

When and how to vote.

To vote early in person go to Minneapolis Election & Voter Services, 980 Hennepin Ave. E. Early inperson voting is open through 5 p.m. on Monday, November 6.

Vote on Election Day.Vote at Bryn Mawr Elementary School, 252 Upton Ave S, on November 7 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. If you can't easily leave your vehicle or are not comfortable voting inside, you can opt for curbside voting.As long as you are in line to vote by 8pm you have the right to cast your ballot so, stay in line! For detailed information on how to vote by mail and in person you can access the League of Women Voters Minneapolis Nonpartisan Voters Guide 2023 at LWVMpls.org/forvoters

Give some thought to whether you need to make special arrangements. Perhaps you need a ride to the polls; or you need childcare (though children can come to the polls with you); or you need to find time during or around your work schedule to vote. Minnesota law requires employees to allow workers time off to vote without losing pay or taking personal or unpaid time off.

This local Minneapolis city election will be decided by ranked choice voting. To assist you with ranked choice voting go to vote.minneapolismn.gov/rankedchoice-voting/. Get ready to rank your vote for city elections this fall. In a ranked-choice election, instead of choosing just one candidate, you have the opportunity to rank your first, second, and third choices. If a candidate has more than 50% of the first-choice votes, they win. If not, the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated, and those voters have their second choice counted. This process continues until one candidate reaches a majority and wins. Remember: Your second choice only counts if your first choice is eliminated. Rank all the candidates to give your vote as much power as possible. Ranked choice voting eliminated local August primaries; so you only have to come to the polls once and can consider all the candidates in a single election.



Bike Amenities Coming to Theodore Wirth and Bryn Mawr Meadows Parks

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) has begun construction of new natural surface trails at two locations:

Back 40 Loop addition at Theodore Wirth Regional Park

Construction of this long-awaited addition is underway now. The new trail will include an advanced segment just northeast of the existing mountain bike trails. It will likely be the longest downhill segment in this area of the park, with some fun features built by the trail contractor and volunteers from Minnesota Off-Road Cyclists (MORC).

Work will take several weeks to complete; however, no trail closures are expected. Please watch for construction equipment and avoid areas under construction.

Do not ride on the new trail until "open" signs are installed. Doing so will add costs for the trail builder and volunteers.

Skills Park at Bryn Mawr Meadows Park

Catering to beginners and more advanced riders alike, the course incorporates features once located on the park's old tennis courts. They are being reinstalled in the park's northeast corner, in the woods near the Luce Line Trail and new pedestrian/bicycle bridge to the Bassett Creek Valley Station on the Metro Transit Green Line. The new location allows cyclists to build their skills in a wooded setting similar to Twin Cities mountain bike trails, with plenty of shade.

The skills features will be laid out along a natural surface trail in a loop with two entry/exit points. Riders will be able to choose whether to ride over some of the more challenging features, like a teeter-totter or 6inch balance beam.

Work will be completed by November, 2023. Construction is part of the Bryn Mawr Meadows Park Improvements project.

Local Author Shares His Story with Bryn Mawr Elementary Students

Bryn Mawr Elementary students enjoyed a visit from local author Anthony Walsh, who read his children's book, Hockey Is for Everybody, to them and shared his experience as the only Black player on the 2013 Edina High School state hockey championship team.

When Beth Thompson, owner of Big Hill Books in Bryn Mawr, heard Walsh interviewed on MPR last Spring followed by meeting Anthony's adopted dad when her store opened in July, she felt an author visit was meant to be. Seeking to reach kids with the book, Thompson thought of our school as a logical place for Anthony to share his story, so she reached out to neighbors to connect with Bryn Mawr Elementary and arranged the visit for our students.

Walsh sported a mile-wide smile and lively demeanor introducing himself as he began reading his book, which was shown on a large screen for students gathered in the gym. The third through fifth graders quickly engaged in his story relating his experiences breaking into a sport with few players of color. They were also treated to a couple of surprises as Walsh related his story to historical struggles to integrate sports by removing his Mosaic Hockey Collective jersey to reveal a Jackie Robinson jersey, which he also removed to reveal a Kansas City Monarchs jersey. While students were largely familiar with Jackie Robinson, their interest was piqued to learn that the Monarchs, which is Walsh's team name in his book, were actually the longest running franchise in baseball prior to integration, winning ten league championships. The strongest connection for kids, though, likely came as Walsh related to them by asking,"How many of you have a best friend?" As hands raised high around the gym, Walsh's story continued to show that



he was taunted by competing teams and the ways his friend Matt became an ally to help him overcome the doubts and fears instilled by the bullying. He mentioned several times throughout his reading that, "not just hockey, but everything is for everyone" and he wants to spread the message that we should all feel empowered to engage in any activity we wish. A student asked if he has written any more books. Fortunately, Hockey Is for Everybody is a trilogy including Anthony Goes to Camp and Anthony's Goal.

Inspiring to say the least, Anthony Walsh has accomplished much in his 28 years and aims to do much more. Writing Hockey Is for Everybody while attending school in Washington, D.C. in 2020 he felt the need to return to his hometown, "because the events I was reading about Minneapolis were not the city I knew." His book was published in July of 2021, and he recently earned his law degree from Mitchell Hamline Law School, coaches hockey, and is working with the Mosaic Collective, a nonprofit that "focuses on empowering players of color with resources to grow the game." He sums up his motivation saying,"BIPOC players are in a unique position to spread positivity and unity."


