



Mni Sota Makoce Honor Tax: A concrete step to support land justice

new program, initiated by lawyer and treaty rights expert Jessica Intermill, offers Minnesotans a way to voluntarily contribute to the Dakota community as an acknowledgement of how they have benefited from Dakota land. Many organizations have created land acknowledgements, formal statements based on an understanding of how U.S. treatymaking and broken treaty promises took the lands from Indigenous People. While this is an act of respect, Intermill wanted to do more. She was struggling with the notion that her family in Nebraska had benefited from stolen land. Based on a California plan, she worked with the Lower Sioux Community, a federally recognized tribal nation in Minnesota to create the Mni Sota Makoce Honor Tax.

Like a property tax, a voluntary honor tax is paid to a sovereign nation which in turn allocates those funds according to their own priorities. It is not considered a donation and is not tax deductible. It was important to Intermill to return wealth back to the tribal government, where it was taken from.

According to Intermill, people "who live in, work on, and visit traditionally Dakota land" can make payments directly to the tribe. It is entirely voluntary and each individual decides what the correct amount is. Contributions have come from all over Minnesota and as far away as New York and California. According to Aziza, a donor from Minneapolis, "I wanted to be accountable. My family has benefited from these lands for three generations." (mnhonortax.org)



Resources for Renters

there's a reminder about heat rules and winter preparedness for renters.

Heat Rules for Minneapolis

Minneapolis renters must have access to heat Oct. 1-April 30.
The heating equipment must be capable of keeping your space at 68°E


If the heat stops working in your rental unit, tell the property owner or manager right away. If the heat can't be fixed immediately, the property owner must provide two temporary heat sources to each rental unit.
If the property owner or manager doesn't respond, you can report it to the City to get help from an inspector.

Call 311 or 612-673-3000 to report an issue. 311 is open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on weekdays and 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on weekends. Outside of 311 hours, call 911 to report low or no heat. The 311 agent or 911 dispatcher will take your contact information, and an inspector will contact you to set up an inspection as soon as possible. From Sept. 15 to May 15, there is always an inspector on duty to help renters who report heat issues.

Winter Preparedness

While property maintenance is the responsibility of the property owner,



keep your home safe and warm this winter:

• Check smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector batteries monthly, and change the batteries every six months. Smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors are required in every rental unit in Minneapolis.

• If you use space heaters, make sure you're using them safely. The National Fire Protection Association has tip sheets in multiple languages for heating safety.

• Consider using an inexpensive window insulation kit to keep your apartment warmer and save money on utility bills.

• Review your lease to see if you're responsible for snow removal or other seasonal maintenance. Call HOME Line at 612-728-5767 if you have questions about your lease. **Report rental issues to 311** Contact 311 to report rental housing

issues or speak to a housing liaison. You can also track complaints online on the 311 property complaint dashboard.

Protection From Heat Being Shut Off

The Cold Weather Rule is now in effect. The Cold Weather Rule means that if you can't pay your home heat bill, your heat can't be shut off Oct. 1-April 30. If you get a notice about disconnecting your primary heat source, make sure to immediately contact the utility and set up a payment plan.



Consider Adding Life-Saving Naloxone to your First Aid Kit



ccording to the Minnesota Department of Health, the opioid epidemic affects all Minnesotans, with overdose deaths remaining at a devastatingly high level.

What is Naloxone?

Naloxone is a potentially life-saving medication that can reverse an overdose caused by opioids such as heroine, morphine, oxycodone/oxycontin, fentanyl, and methadone. It can be administered by intramuscular (IM) injection or a nasal spray, and also intravenously by medical professionals. It will not reverse a non-opioid overdose caused by alcohol, stimulants such as cocaine or Adderall, or anti-anxiety drugs.

Good Samaritan Law

In situations involving substance use, the fear of legal action can deter people from both giving or seeking help. 'Steve's Law' is Minnesota's Good Samaritan and naloxone access law, expanding availability of the drug, and allowing anyone in Minnesota to carry naloxone. It grants civil immunity to those administering naloxone and provides some criminal immunity for someone calling 911 while experiencing an overdose.

Naloxone Available to Purchase

Naloxone in IM injection form, Narcan®, and other nasal spray brands can be bought online without a prescription. Many pharmacies now carry naloxone.

Where to get free naloxone and fentanyl test strips

In researching this story, I found the Steve Rummler HOPE Network (SRHN) enormously helpful.Their website includes a map of sites where you can pick up SRHN's free overdose IM

naloxone kit and also fentanyl test strips that can detect the presence of fentanyl in opioids and non-opioids. Go to the following link for a site near you: steverummlerhopenetwork.org/what-wedo/naloxone-access-points/ Free individual and group training

Learning how to identify and react in an opioid overdose situation, and getting comfortable with administering either IM or nasal spray form naloxone, are all key to saving a life. SRHN offer Zoom training sessions, their online training module is on demand, and you can request free group training. Visit the SRHN training page to learn more: steverummlerhopenetwork.org/resources/i-want-naloxone-training/

Who should have naloxone in their first aid kit?

In a word - everyone! Including businesses. SRHN's Executive Director, Alicia House, told me that bringing this awareness to the general public is vital to reducing the number of opioid overdose deaths. Please share this article!





Crews were working on the bridge from Penn that will connect with the platform, either by stairs or an elevator. The bridge will be glassed in to protect pedestrians and bikers from wind, rain, and snow, but it won't be heated.

There is no specified parking near the bridge, but there is a circular drop off where buses, Ubers and cars can pull over to let riders off.

Kaydee and a project engineer explained how once the line is complete, there is about a year of testing trains and fine-tuning timing before the line can open. The suburban stations, St. Louis Park, Hopkins, and Eden Prairie may be able to begin testing in a year. The whole line is scheduled to open in 2027.




