### **Racial Justice Film Series**

his month the Active Transportation and Racial Justice Committees of the BMNA will host the screening of two films documenting noteworthy bicycling achievements by African Americans during the 1890s. We have invited several predominantly African American bicycle organizations to join us for these screenings.

The first film, "The Bicycle Corps: America's Black Army on Wheels", documents the trek of an African American army regiment based in Montana from their home base to St. Louis Mo. The 1900 mile trip, completed in 41 days in 1897 was intended to demonstrate the utility of the bicycle for military purposes. The second is a short film, "The Six Day Race: The Marshall 'Major'Taylor

Story". It tells the story of a black teenaged cyclist who enters the fabled six day endurance bicycle race held at Madison Square Garden in 1896 some six moths before the adventures related in the first film. Marshall 'Major' Taylor goes on to be a world champion and is still considered to be one of the greatest America sprint cyclist.

Screening of these two films will be at the SRF Building auditorium, 3701 S Wayzata Blvd, on Wednesday, February 21st, at 7pm. 

## Banned Books for All!

uring her semi-annual teeth cleaning, Beth Thompson of Big Hill Books was approached by Dr. Jay Williams of Mill City Dental with a business proposition. "Let's talk shop." Thompson listened, nodded and gurgled her excitement as Dr. Jay explained his idea and examined her teeth. It may seem odd to have a book proprietor and a dentist working together, but what came from this collaboration is inspiring.

During the month of December, Dr. Jay led an effort to support the circulation of banned books in the community by offering a donation to Big Hill Books. This donation was able to purchase over two dozen children's and young adult banned books to give to customers and community members for free. Thompson and her team purchased books found on the American Library Association's 2022 list of frequently banned books and made a display for neighbors to choose from. Books that were selected are frequently banned for their LGBQT+ themes or mentions of race, critical race theory or discrimination.

The year 2023 has been fraught with discussions of "what books are appropriate for our communities to read?"

According to a recent MPR article, nearly 700 attempts occurred to ban books from schools and libraries in the first eight months of 2023 (A. Archie, 2023), with many more by the end of the year. Organizations like "Moms for Liberty" are leading the charge to ban books in schools and libraries across the country.

The response to the initiative at Big Hill Books has been "heart-warming" says Thompson. Patrons are proud to support the idea of getting banned books into the hands of children and youths. The donated books were quickly nabbed and dispersed across the Bryn Mawr neighborhood and beyond.

Thanks to the efforts of Dr. Jay Williams and Beth Thompson we are directly confronting attempts to create division in our community and protect our access to diverse literature.



### From the Editor

ike so many couples before and since, my parents meet at University. They were both local students commuting to Philadelphia from their parents' homes in the suburbs. They shared their pursuit of degrees in medicine (my dad a physician and my mom a lab tech.) The east coast was the only life they new.

Despite them having this in common, their families were very different. My father's Mayflower English Episcopalian, country club family was not crazy about "their son the doctor" marrying the child of working class, Catholic, Italian immigrants. And my mother's parents were equally dismayed by the unlikely pairing.

Because of the family tensions, my parents relocated at the first opportunity - first to Alaska and ultimately to Rochester, Minnesota. They had five kids and created their own nuclear family.

When it was time for those kids to head off to college, our parents made it clear that they had no intention of letting us scatter to the winds. They explained that they wanted our family to remain close and if we went far away we would likely meet and make a life there. I went to the Minneapolis, two of my brothers went to St. Cloud. My sister went all the way to Grinnell, Iowa and the baby brother, all the way to Madison.

For the most part, he got their wish. One of us is still in Rochester, three of us are in Minneapolis and only the middle child landed all the way in Chicago.

So in 2009, when our oldest was looking at schools, my father warned me about letting her go far away. Of course, she ended up in Boston. I reasoned that advances in travel was making the world smaller and I never allowed myself to believe that she would not eventually come home.

After she graduated from BU she applied to several medical schools including the U of M and Mayo in Rochester. She decided on my parents' alma mater, Temple in Philadelphia. She sent me flowers on Mother's Day apologizing that she was going to be gone for another four years. At Temple she predicably met her now-fiancé and they have since stayed back east to do residencies and fellowships. They are currently planning their wedding in New York this summer.

Now, 15 years after that fateful decision was made, the seemingly impossible has happened. They have both accepted jobs in the Twin Cities and are moving back in August.

I truly do not have words to express how over the moon we are. Except to say how much I think they will love making a life here and welcome home!

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# Does Someone You Know Qualify for Minnesota's Energy Assistance Program?

Innesota's Energy Assistance Program helps homeowners and renters pay their electric, heating and water bills.

Grants of up to \$1,400, based by on household size, income, and energy costs. The average grant is about \$500. In addition to the initial grant, Crisis funds are available:

Up to \$600 more to help prevent energy shutoffs, get energy reconnected, or get emergency fuel deliveries. Funds to help homeowners get their broken furnace repaired or replaced.

### New Tenant Landlord Laws in Effect

### **Changes include :**

Landlords must issue a 14-day written notice before filing evictions for non-payment of rent

Landlords must disclose all nonoptional fees on both the front page of the lease and in any advertisements—calling it the 'Total Monthly Rent.'

Between October 1 and April 30, landlords must maintain a minimum temperature of 68 degrees in rental units.

Landlords must give a minimum of 24 hours notice before entering

Repair emergencies will now include a non-working refrigerator, promised air conditioning, serious infestations and a city notice of an intent to condemn the property. In limited circumstances, this law allows a tenant to end their lease early to move into a medical facility with two month's notice.

### **Cold Weather Rule**

he Cold Weather Rule is now in effect. The Cold Weather Rule means that if you can't pay your home heat bill, your heat can't be shut off Oct. 1-April 30. If you get a notice about disconnecting your primary heat source, make sure to immediately contact the utility and set up a payment plan.

# Margaret Anderson Kelliher Sworn in as City Operations Officer

argaret Anderson Kelliher was sworn in Jan. 3 as the City's new city operations officer. The position oversees the City's Office of Public Service and its 17 departments including Public Works, Community Planning & Economic Development and Regulatory Services. Anderson Kelliher will lead thousands of employees Citywide to ensure high-quality, coordinated City services.

A 34-year resident of Minneapolis, Anderson Kelliher previously led the City's Public Works Department and the Minnesota Department of Transportation. She served 12 years in the Minnesota House of Representatives with four years as the speaker.

Under the City's new government structure, the city operations officer is one of four direct reports to the mayor and oversees the Office of Public Service. Core functions of the



Office of Public Service include internal services; communications and engagement services; and development, health and livability services. These departments primarily support the work of the enterprise, address community health and livability, foster racial equity, and administer performance management.

# **Early Primary Voting Open**

arly voting began, Jan. 19, in for the presidential primary. Minneapolis voters are among the first in the nation to cast in-person ballots in this highprofile primary race, and they can do that at the Early Vote Center from Jan. 19 through the day before the March 5 primary. The Early Vote Center is at 980 E. Hennepin Ave.

Unlike with other elections, voters in the presidential primary choose which of the two participating major party's ballot they want. The party they choose is not public information, though it will be available to the selected major party.

Standard hours for the Early
Vote Center are 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.
Monday-Friday. The center is
closed on Presidents Day, Feb. 19.
The center is also open the last
two weekends before the primary.
Besides the Early Vote Center, voters can vote early at the downtown Hennepin County Government Center, 300 Sixth St. S. You
can find more information on
early voting options on the City
website.

### Vote early by mail

Any voter can vote early by mail; no reason is required. Please allow



enough time to complete the process by mail. It can take up to seven days. You can complete your applications online on the City website.

### Make sure you're registered to vote

While people can register to vote at the polls, preregistering speeds up voting on the day of the primary. Voters can check the status of their registrations on the City website. If you've moved to a new address or had a name change since last registering, you'll need to reregister to vote. If you haven't voted in the past four years, you'll need to reregister.

Preregister online, or fill out and mail in a registration application. These are available at government offices and the City website. Preregistration ends 21 days before the March 5 Protection from heat being shut off

### Active Transportation ue to a series of factors - geogra-

ue to a series of factors - geography, timing, and historical coincidence - American communities have developed largely in a sprawling fashion that cater to the dimensions and speed of four wheels rather than two legs. Many of us (including yours truly) appreciate and rely upon the convenience of vehicle-based trips. And yet, the car has been so successful in its psychoeconomic ingratiation that it has effectively marginalized other forms of travel and warped entire industries and places.

We've shaped our landscape around the automobile, and in turn, the automobile shapes us.

The Twin Cities lag global counterparts in walking, biking, and pedestrian safety. In many non-central U.S. communities, sidewalks are not even available, and access is limited to those who cannot afford to drive their own vehicle. Our reliance on cars for most trips nationwide (even trips close to our homes) has contributed to social disconnection, obesity, environmental pollution, and personal and household debt. We are orders of magnitude away from true transportation equity or sustainability, and our sprawling road infrastructure will be more and more expensive to maintain as global warming increases those pesky freeze-thaw cycles (not to mention, as the price of carbon fuel starts to match its pollutive impacts).

These and many other reasons make it increasingly important to retrofit and improve our streets and sidewalks to accommodate safe walking and biking. These modes of transportation are collectively referred to as "active transportation" and are less expensive to maintain than automobile-exclusive infrastructure.

Active transportation is not new. Walking is an evolutionary birthright; our senses are attuned to it, and it's scientifically proven to boost our moods. Not coincidentally, some of our most iconic and beloved places (such as our Main Streets) are walking-scale and not built around the spatial demands of the vehicle. Ironically, Americans pay hundreds of dollars to experience active transportation in theme parks such as Disney World. Many fondly recall walkable lifestyles on college campuses as if such walkability belongs to a bygone era, and not something that can be integrated into our current neighborhoods and land uses.

There is a path forward that is economically, socially, and environmentally positive: retrofitting our existing transportation network to become walkable, bikeable corridors that are appropriate for the very young and the very old. These corridors should also be fun and safe to drive. By tilting the balance towards safety and comfort for pedestrians and bicyclists (even in winter), Minneapolis can knit and improve upon its already strong reputation as a leading-edge City.
