Help Improve Minneapolis Parks

The goal of Earth Day Cleanup is to provide a volunteer experience and environmental education to Minneapolis residents and park users. This annual event involves cleaning Minneapolis parks, neighborhoods, watersheds and water bodies including the Chain of Lakes, Lake Nokomis, Lake Hiawatha, Powderhorn Lake, Diamond Lake, Shingle Creek, Minnehaha Creek, Bassett's Creek and the Mississippi River. Since the inception of the Earth Day cleanup we have removed more than 140,000 pounds of garbage from Minneapolis parks.

It's easy to get involved in Earth Day Cleanup 2016. No pre-registration is required! Arrive at any site between 9:30 am and noon, bring a pair of gloves to pick up trash, and check in at the registration table. A site coordinator will provide you with gloves (if you did not bring any) and bags, and instruct you where to go and where to leave trash. Every site has a coordinator available to assist volunteers and to answer any questions you may have. This event is free and open to all ages. No registration required.



WE HAVE LOST A LONG-TIME RESIDENT -

The Bryn Nawr <u>BUGLE</u> received the following letter:

My mother, who lived at 609 Upton Ave. So., Mrs. Mary Ryan Bousette, age 92% years, died in her home September 4th, 1977.

Mrs. Dousette has lived in Bryn Mawr since 1908. The reason for moving into the Bryn Mawr area was that my father, John J. Dousette, Sr., was an engineer on the Minneapolis and St. Louis Railroad and it was closer for him to walk to work since they did not own an automobile. He retired from the M & St. L RR with 52 years service.

Bryn Newr was zoned <u>NORTH</u> Minneapolis at that time, so their first home was on Logan Avenue N. When new duplexes were built on Knox Avenue N., they moved into <u>93 Knox Avenue North</u>, which same address became 412 Knox Avenue. South when the areas was rezoned in approximately 1924. They raised 7 children in the Bryn Hawr area, one of whom still lives on Upton Avenue -Georgiana, who was born at 412 Knox S. From the Knox address they moved to 620 Morgan S. and after three years they built their home at 609 Upton Avenue South on the lot they purchased in their early years which originally was part of the Halloran estate, and they moved in in September 1936.

I recall, when we lived on Knox Avenue, our landlord used to tell us that the Park Board was going to build a park across the street from us (which faced the railroad tracks). At that time they were busy filling in the area and a creek ran through also which was ultimately piped or disposed of by the dumping. So 50 years later it was all accomplished (Bryn Maer Meadows), but in our youth we eagerly looked forward to having a park "just across the street".

Mrs. Dousette also has been a lifetime member of the Basilica of St. Mary Parish. She first attended the old Immaculate Conception Parish located at Seventh Street and First Avenue North in downtown Minneapolis.

Her grandparents ware pioneers in Renville County-Norton-Olivia, Winnesota area.



Recollections of a 1950's Park Property Land Sale

s an area 2 Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association co-representative, I volunteer to write a piece once a year for the Bugle.

Because I grew up in Bryn Mawr and was a child in the 1950's, an event that happened within my recollections is always challenging to research after so many years have passed. I am referring to the large parcel of land purchased in 1952 from the Minneapolis Park system as one such recollection.

As a youngster living two blocks south of Brownie Lake on Drew Avenue, I recall the controversy of Prudential Insurance Company buying 32 acres of land to build a regional headquarters. This land was part of Theodore Wirth Park, west of Brownie Lake and adjacent to what was then State Highway 12. (This highway was later widened with even more park property taken for I-394.) The price paid by Prudential was \$200,000 and was the largest piece of park land ever sold for private development. Public opposition was intense, with the Park Board saying that the benefit to the Minneapolis economy was to the greater good, rather than keeping it as park land. They rationalized that because of increased traffic on Highway 12 and the widening of that road, land to the west of Brownie Lake had already been isolated from the rest of Wirth Park.

The result of this opposition was a law suit that went as far as the Minnesota Supreme Court. Its decision in 1953 was in favor of selling the land. Construction of the 8 storied building began in 1954. I can recall how the landscape changed dramatically what with tree removal and soil relocation. There was a natural spring on or near that property



and I recall a rumor that Prudential was given rights for unlimited access to it and thus didn't have to pay for city water. (Was that why its lawns were always so green?)

I couldn't find any history to verify or deny this memory. Many of us who grew up in Bryn Mawr learned to drive on the expansive level parking lot to the west of Prudential. (The only trouble we could get into was failing to stop the car at its edge and going down a hill onto the railroad tracks.)

A large parking ramp was added in the 1980's to accommodate the growing number of car owners who worked in the building. In 1995 Prudential sold the building to the Target Corporation. Its huge auditorium which was offered and used for community events was no longer available because of privacy issues.

Now the Target building is once again on the market after a sale didn't materialize. Will it be sold, rezoned and remodeled for a huge condominium site? Let's all be good land stewards and keep abreast of news on its sale.

Bryn Mawr is known for its livability because of our parks and proximity to city lakes. The Minneapolis Parks and Recreation Board has a wonderful web site to inform you of its goings-on. Please visit it often and stay informed. www.minneapolisparks.org.

Brian tells me, "A story can be told in many ways." There shouldn't be just one way to get a message across and Sossy Mechanics explore this in their performances. Their stories are playful and have a very intentional message.

When asked about their style, it was hard to pinpoint just one medium. They called it simply, "A piece of theatre". It has a script, movement, a story arch, physical comedy, and incorporates elements of minishow unlike how musical theatre inserts random dance numbers. Love is at the core

of everything that they do. Sossy Mechanics want to make sure they are adding to the world, not taking away. They want their audiences to leave with a sense of joy

Audience participation is very important when viewing a Sossy Mechanics show. Their audience has to have a willingness to "come along with us and play". Don't worry! They won't pull you up on stage to dance in the physical sense, but your imagination and emotions may be asked to "take a ride". Their approach is fantastical at times. They want to keep their audience guessing. They want their audience to not know what will happen next, but to keep asking themselves: What is going to happen next? And then be pleasantly surprised about what does happen next.

The Craft(ers)

When devising a new show, they want to make each story different from the last, but still have an overarching theme of love interwoven into each piece. Before they had



a new kind of love story can be told. When asked if they would ever put their show out there for other companies to produce, they said that putting together a show is both "exciting and

maddening". "We

are constantly changing and updating the show. Making it better each time we perform it. We like that we have the ability to change so much about what we perform because we created it. It's much harder to performa piece that has been published or performed in a certain way, we can take more creative liberties." They would love other companies to take what they made and produce it themselves, although it may be difficult to copy it exactly. This is just what happened when they decided to turn their current show Trick Boxing and turn it into a family friendly show, Swingin' in the Ring, that they can perform for schools and at other family friendly events. One of their favorite parts of performing for schools is their offering of residencies with students before or after the performance.

Teaching

Teaching has become a bigger part of their work. Most recently, they spent several weeks down in Texas, at the University of Texas at Dallas working with a group of students and incorporating their Creativity Pedagogy. They realized that they were "uniquely qualified" to teach creativity and began to research how creativity could and does benefit everyone, from the preschooler to the corporate CEO. Their approach teaches people how to "get out of their heads" with creativity and feel good in their bodies and minds. When people (especially adults), get out of their own way and comfort zone they have the capacity to create something that they have never created before or find the courage to solve a problem in a non-conventional, out-of-thebox way. Brian has done contract work with the Guthrie Theatre, helping to audition children for roles at the Guthrie, (among his many other talents and time spent with the Guthrie) he says that there is something that kids have that adults lose. They have a "curiosity and an openness" to progress. They are so helpful and encouraging to one another, where sometimes adults see auditions or the workplace as "the only way to succeed is to help myself", kids see it as an opportunity to explore, make new friends and share their gifts.

Brian continues, "Many adults lose the ability to break out physically and emotionally. They are stuck in this small box of physicality and emotion. If only they could break out of this box and get moving, they could be doing so much more learning through these new movements. They have traveled all over the world performing their work and exploring different types of theater. Their home base for the most part has been Minneapolis, with stints in New York and Canada in the past 10-15 years, but finally settled on Bryn Mawr after growing out of the Uptown scene.

They liked how their neighborhood in Uptown had a good "walk score" - everything, or nearly everything was in walking distance. They moved to Bryn Mawr, when they realized that their neighborhood was no longer a neighborhood they wanted to raise a family in and found that Bryn Mawr was immediately welcoming and had a "neighborhood" feel. Brian says he had lived in the neighborhood for a week and kids that lived nearby said "Hello" to him. He knew that if kids felt comfortable talking to a stranger, he knew that they were in the right community. There is no other neighborhood quite like it. Brian and Megan have two kids, Misha (8) and Mahira (6). When they are home, they like to play outside games with their children, bike around the neighborhood and attend theatrical events. 

Camp in a Van Returns for Another Summer



Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

The Housekeeper and the Professor by Yoko Ogawa

k ladies, the next book we will be reading is about number theory, or the study of positive whole numbers and the interesting and unexpected relationships between different sets of numbers! Whoa, not exactly the bodiceripping branch of mathematics; some of us were skeptical.

But in this poignant and bittersweet novel by Yoko Ogawa numbers are presented as something spiritual, brilliant, and beautiful.

The book is set in modern-day Japan, and narrated by the housekeeper, a single mother with a young son who takes a position cleaning and cooking for an aging former professor of mathematics. She learns that the professor was the victim of a serious car accident that left him with brain damage, and that she is the ninth housekeeper to have attempted to care for him. His case is unique and challenging. His short-temmemory only lasts for exactly 80 minutes, then resets to zero. He copes by pinning dozens of notes to his jacket, reminders of who he is, his daily routine and most importantly, that he only has that 80 minutes. However, he does remember things that happened before the accident, although he appears to be stuck in 1975.

Each day, the housekeeper arrives at his home and she must introduce herself to him again and explain why she is there. He responds by asking her questions such as her shoe size and her phone number, and then excitedly explains why those particular numbers are so interesting. As time goes by, the housekeeper becomes intrigued by the concepts he introduces and begins to explore numbers on her own, particularly prime numbers. When the professor learns that she has a young son who she leaves home alone after school into the evening, he insists that she bring him to work and that they have dinner together everyday. He calls the boy Root, because his head reminds him of the symbol for a square root, and the two bond over their love of baseball (a game of statistics and numbers-surprise!) and Root's curiosity and struggles with his math homework. Gradually the three develop a friendship, and you get the feeling that a little family unit has formed. The professor seems to thrive despite his memory failing him, but his beloved numbers remain a constant, a way for him to make sense of his world, and the housekeeper and Root sensitively support his particular expression of communication.

The pace of the book is somewhat slow at times, as elaborate math equations are patiently explained, defined and illustrated while moving the story forward, but it gently forced even the math-phobic in the group to view numbers as a secret world to be discovered, as an elegant new world of language, and as a surprisingly effective way to enter, or for some, to remember their joy of the math experience.

As we move deeper into the story, through several twists and tums, the author weaves throughout the themes of the nature and makeup of friendship and family, permanence and impermanence, perfection, and imperfection, loneliness, love and loss. In particular we were struck by the question of whether a relationship can truly exist with a person whose memory only lasts 80 minutes. Can you have a relationship with someone without the foundation of shared memories, or is living in the moment, providing enjoyable moments for someone just as important? One only has to reflect on experiences with friends and family that have encountered the devastation of Alzheimer's disease to know the answer is undeniably affirmative to both. What the Moms are reading now: Between the World and Me,


