#### **Councilmember Report**

#### Lisa Goodman

• June lunch field trip to Givens Violins was well attended.

- The request of 28 Newton South for a variance was approved.
- The 1946 Cedar Lake Parkway variance was approved.

• Hennepin/Lyndale reconstruction work continues. Should be completed by Oct/Nov 2016. The intersection at Groveland is currently closed.

• Early voting for primary is open, polling location is across from city

hall. Election judges are needed! Contact Lisa or the BMNA board for more information.

• National night out is Aug 2nd. Apply now! Permits applied for between now and July 19th are free. Applications submitted after 19th of July until July 27th are \$100. After that, no permit will be issued.

#### Metro Transit C Line Update

#### C-Line Rapid Bus, C Terrence Anderson, Comm. Outreach, Metro Transit.

Presentation on the Potential Long Term Realignment or the C-Line Rapid Bus Line from Olson to Glenwood. Currently runs between Brooklyn Center Transit Center to Down-

town Mpls via Penn and Olson Memorial.

- The C-line would stop every quarter mile instead of every block.
- C-Line stations along Penn Ave. will have enhanced amenities over current bus stops. Minimal amenities, however, along Olson Hwy since those stations are planned as temporary pending Bottineau LRT.
- Payment for tickets will be made at pay stations prior to boarding. Buses will be 60 foot accordion type.
- Currently stations are planned at Olson and Penn, Olson and Humbolt, Olson and Bryant, and Olson and 7th.
- Proposed new locations would run parallel along Glenwood with stations yet to be determined.

Realignment Study Outcomes and Metro Line work will inform the decision to relocate.

F requency for the proposed Rapid Bus C line would be approximately every 10 minutes, similar to Light Rail during peak times.

Looking for community input on benefits on C-line route changes. Concerns regarding buses running along Glenwood. Recommendation for or against relocation planned to be presented to the Metro Council for Nov/Dec 2016.

#### **Route 9 Bus Service**

Scott Janowiak, Metro Transit Proposed changes to Route 9. West End has one of the highest concentration of jobs in Twin Cities.



- Route 9 currently has multiple stops West of Minneapolis.
- The Goal is to simplify route structure and improve service to West End.
- Changes would be made gradually and reduced service to existing stations would ensue.
- Rapid bus would be near level entry with 9in curb to assist with accessibility, an example of which can be found at 7th and Olson floating stations.
- Two open houses Sept 8 Harrison Education Center Sept 10 at Icon Showplace Community Room, West End.

**Treasurer's Report Dennis** Fazio The BMNA received money from

Mpls CPP. Year to Date donations a re slightly below budget and Newspaper ads are quite a bit lower than budgeted. For the Garden Tour, we're anticipating \$3500 in expenses, ticket sales hopefully of \$4-5K, and donations of \$1200. No unusual expenses. Web development is nearly com-

plete, so the related expense will be nearly complete.

The Board reviewed the current balance sheet.

#### **Updated Financial Policy Dennis Fazio**

Review of proposed changes to the BMNA Financial Policy.

Discussions included the option to give budgetary authority to Chairs with spends exceeding set limits requiring board approval, clarification of government filings, more indepth control over pre-approval, confirmation of receipt and authorization to pay invoice process. Additional changes include merging the competitive bid policy into the Financial Policy Document and updating the Cash Management process focused on multiple approvals.

#### Discussion on The Expense Reimbursement Process and Policy.

The Board is attempting to limit personal funds used and respective limits on incidental payments. Dennis proposed approving changes to Financial Policy as amended during the meeting. Seconded. Motion carried.



#### EDITH OLSEN, RESIDENT OF EARLY BRYN MAWR

Edythe Scheidegger sent the Bugle a note about the passing of her mother, Edith Olsen, at the age of 79. Mrs. Olsen had been a member of Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church and Past Matron of Bryn Mawr Chapter O.E.S. "Mother lived at 20 Penn when Penn was a trail down across the creek and there was but one other house on the hill, writes Mrs. Scheidegger, "Her Dad drove a team of horses for Glenwood Inglewood Water and she loved Bryn Mawr. It is also the roots for my brother and me as we grew up with the neighborhood. Please continue to send your newsletter to my address as I enjoy the news even tho' many names are new. I realize how important neighbor news is, since I am involved in the Camden Community."

I'm gathering information about the homes (and families) that had been in the Bryn Mawr Meadows through the 1960s. # 2016 Featured Gardens

#### 1. Ron and Chad, Area 1

A series of dramatic terraces built into the hilly site allows for sweeping beds that a re filled with assorted perennials and, most spectacularly, over 2,500 lush annuals all hand-reared by Chad in the elegant greenhouse that crowns this property. The plants are not alone in flourishing to enviable dimensions—



the Koi nurtured by Chad and Ron are not to be missed.

#### 2. Liz & Doug, Area 2

"We bought this property in October 2010, after renting for three years in Area 4, because we loved the Bryn Mawr neighborhood so much. Since it had been unoccupied for nine months we had a terrible mess on our hands, but we dug in and after two weeks had removed all the unsightly thick weeds, with our new neighbors cheering us on. I started with the hill garden, which contained one or two salvageable perennials, and the small plots by the back door."

#### 3. Dennie and Kevin, Area 3

Purrington pavers and a pea gravel pathway that frames a raised cobblestone planter. To finish off the front yard "room", two rusted metal trellises have been installed. A serene water feature completes the setting. The back yard remains an oasis with its laughing waterfalls and two ponds with hardy water plants, including white and red water lilies. And behind the garage is a large veggie garden.

#### 4. Paul and Katrina, Area 3

"We love our playful layout and terracing with a slight Asian theme. We have used many boulders and stones to create a natural and interesting landscape and pathways. Some of our favorite features include our newly c reated raised vegetable garden, unique stone lanterns, tropical plants like Voodoo Lily's Canna's and bananas, blueberry hedge, hosta arrangements and the overall feel of our little back-yard oasis."

#### 5. Larry and Marcia, Area 3

"First off, I am by no means a master gardener but do enjoy keeping a nice yard. This is our third summer on Oliver Ave S. and our first Bryn Mawr Garden Tour. The house features a professionally designed yard/garden/patio by Tangletown Gardens featuring a grass foot path meandering between berms of native plantings. It is primarily a shade garden thanks to the 30+ trees on the property including crab apple, weeping red elms, river birch, ginkos, staghorn sumac, bur oaks, redbud, horse chestnut, pagoda dogwoods, yellow wood, and magnolia."

#### 6. Mike and Karen, Area 3

A beautiful yard and garden that balances plantings and a peaceful water feature with the need to be kid friendly and provide play space. Proves you can have it all!



#### 7. Kathy, Area 3

"My favorite plants are: my Japanese Peony that gives me blooms 9 inches in diameter. The blooms open during the day and close at night. My clematis and peonies. These are flowers grown by my grandmothers and my mother. Peonies on the boulevard are from my Grandparents and family f a m Plant materials that I have come to value are mulch and my compost bin. I know mulch helps retain moisture but I never realized how it keeps the weeds down.

What I love best about my garden is seeing how it has changed over the years. I have limited direct sun areas, more shade and partial shade areas. The struggle over the years has been in figuring which plants do best in which areas. Over the years I have worked to have different plants that bloom from April to October. Each day the color palette is different. Of course I constantly struggle with the bunnies. Now instead of yelling at them I have a stern 'you are not welcome' conversation with them."

#### 8. Barry, Area 5

"I've worked mainly with bricks, pavers and many rocks. My front boulevard is a raingarden that captures water from mine and my neighbor's house. All the rest of the rain water is captured in another part of the garden. Butterflies and bees like the blooming plants on the sunny boulevard. I like the intimacy that the garden offers, wherever you happen to be."

#### 9. Kathy and Jay, Area 6

"The majority of the hardscape in our yard is made from limestone pavers. They are fairly easy to install, are permeable for healthy rain run-off and their placement can be altered, if needs be. Using them is like doing a giant jigsaw puzzle—a little challenging and super fun! Choosing a favorite plant is tough...I really like epicediums. Also all plants with 'peltate' leaves, where the stem is in the middle of the leaf."

#### 10. Nadine, Area 6

"My favorite plant is usually my most recent purchase. Beyond that, my favorites are plants that continue to look good even when they're not blooming - hostas, black snakeroot, european ginger, coral bells and various ferns. In the past few years, I've been adding more and more native plants for both the birds and pollinators, including ironweed, joe pye weed, indian physic, prairie smoke, goldenrod, pulsatilla, chokeberry, veronicastrum, bee balm, pussytoes, swamp milkweed and smooth blue aster.

I've lived and gardened here for more than 25 years, but the current design of the garden is mostly less than 5 years old. I was able to have a fence installed and a short retaining wall built along the south that enabled me to plant along that edge of the lot. That began a complete redo that included a patio, a pergola over the back door, raised vegetable beds, and new flower beds along the front. I'm still working on the fountain..."

#### 11. Jeff and Jeff, Area 7

"At least 90% of our garden is under shade, so over the years we've learned about the great variety of shade- loving plants. We appreciate the different textures, shades, and heights of different plant materials. Tovara and mukdenia are our recent favorites, but we've learned that these can be invasive plants and have simply learned to remove new 'babies' that spring up in the most unlikely parts of the garden.


It's a relatively low maintenance garden. There is very little grass to mow, and we installed an irrigation (drip and sprayer) system to eliminate the need for time-consuming watering. We save just a small space for annuals, so the need for new plant materials keeps decreasing each year. There's usually a good amount of weeding that's required every Spring, but we've leared the value of composted horse manure as a mulch – not only does it look good, but it retards weed growth, and it's a chemical-free renewable

# The 33rd Annual **Minneapolis National Night Out**

#### Tuesday, August 2, 2016

Tational Night Out is an annual nationwide event that encourages residents to get out in the community, holding block parties and getting to know their neighbors as a way to encourage crime prevention. It's a great way to promote community-police partnerships and enjoy a Minnesota summer evening surrounded by friends and family.

As with many past National Night Outs, Minneapolis was ranked #1 among all U.S. cities over 250,000 population in 2015. Over 1,500 events were registered in 2014. Was yours one of them? We hope so! And save the date for this year: NNO is set for August 2, 2016.

National Night Out (NNO) in Minneapolis is an annual event on the first Tuesday of August that involves all segments of the community in building a healthier, safer community. NNO generates support for anti-

crime programs and strengthens police/community relations.

National Night Out is not just one night of the year, but the culmination of year-long crime prevention activity in all Minneapolis neighborhoods: people working together in block and apartment clubs and other networks to prevent and address crime and other neighborhood problems. It is an occasion to celebrate past successes, discuss current challenges or issues, and re-dedicate to collaborative efforts with neighbors, police, businesses and others to improve the quality of life in our city. NNO is the largest event of its kind in Minneapolis and the nation.

NNO is an opportunity for all parts of the community including businesses, corporate sponsors, religious institutions, city agencies, and news media to come together around the shared goal of a safe, healthy community.

- NNO reinforces the partnership of citizens and police to combat crime.
- Utilize NNO to expand and strengthen Minneapolis' network of block clubs.
- Increase the number of block clubs, multi-block events and individuals who participate in NNO.
- Involve the Minneapolis Police Department with citizens by participating in National Night Out events together.
- Promote increased involvement of youth with their neighbors.
- Promote crime prevention strategies and increase ways that citizens can protect themselves, and their property.

Also up for consideration at the public meetings is the potential realignment of the soon-to-come Penn Avenue C-Line BRT (Bus Rapid Transit). The realignment would, in the long tem take the route downtown tuming off of Penn Ave. on to Olson Hwy and realign it to Glenwood Avenue if/when the Bottineau LRT gets up and running.
