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



From the Editor

In preparation for the coming school year, I have been doing a lot of work around bias, equity and race. By "work" I mean reading, attending workshops, and seeing performances that can help me grow professionally and personally. I hope everyone went to see "Disgraced" at the Guthrie directed by neighbor Marcela Lorca. Such great work!

I have come to recognize race as a social construct created when a culturally diverse group of lightskinned people sought to distinguish themselves as superior in order to create a social and economic structure that favored them.

I read a wonderful article by Marion Wright Edelman. In it she quotes Bryan Stevenson, the founder and Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative. He says, "I don't think the great evil of American slavery was involuntary servitude and forced labor. I think the g reat evil of American slavery was the narrative of racial difference that we created to legitimate it."

He asserts that American slavery did not end in 1865, that it evolved into domestic terrorism of people based solely on their color. I was so moved when I read this. (If you a re intrigued to read more, you can find it at www.childrensdefense.org "Childwatch column, August 5, 2016.) As I said at the start of this, it is the beginning of another school year. In addition to the work I do directly with diverse youth, my heart and mind are always with Bryn Mawr and Anwatin. I am not sure there are enough words to express how glad I am that our children had the chance to learn and grow at these amazing places.

In addition to excellent teachers in a nurturing, differentiated environment, the opportunities to interact with a genuinely diverse population is something that all parents should seek out for their children. And to anyone who decided these schools were not the "best fit" for your child, I would say, "check your bias."

Everyone (let me repeat EVERY-ONE) has bias. It's not your fault. Bias is learned through experience. The question is, are your biases hurting someone else? Are they denying someone opportunities and keeping you (or your children) from living in a truly harmonious world?

Absolutely all of this is a work in progress. The more I learn about myself and race in America, the more I realize I have yet to learn. I hope everyone who starting reading this made it to the end and that I've given you something to ponder.

Something New

T twos about two months ago that two friends took me to a new restaurant on Broadway, Breaking Bread Café. It was a great lunch, and it started me thinking about my neighborhood, Bryn Mawr.

I've been back to Breaking Bread Café several times since, and each time has been a delight. The menu has a global flare, and each item has had me coming back to request a repeat perf o mance. The restaurant has comfortable indoor dining and a spacious outdoor patio. The staff includes at-risk youth from the area, all of who have welcomed me and my friends with friendly enthusiasm.

This is a big change for this Bryn Mawr resident. During my 30 years of living in this neighborhood, I have spent little time that I would call "a delight" north of Glenwood. Based on some of my early experiences, I've seldom gone north, except occasionally to North End Hardware, and more frequently to Milda's.

I've often been part of a neighborhood discussion about how Bryn Mawr is a South Minneapolis neighborhood and NOT part of North Minneapolis. Highway 394 has given us a northern identity that we have disputed and resisted. Many of us who have raised kids in Bryn Mawr, have insisted that the School District see us as "southern" to make sure that our kids have the option of good education.

Maybe, as Chris Etz told me recently, it is time to explore whether Bryn Mawr is actually "West Minneapolis." The concept emerged with the West End Development, and it is showing up more with projects close to home. The planned development in "east Bryn Mawr" adjacent to the SW LRT will do more to identify us as "west of downtown." We will no longer be just a residential neighborhood hidden among an assortment of parks.

I would welcome a discussion of what future identity we want for our neighborhood. We've wrestled with identities imposed on us in the past. Maybe we can shape our own.

In the meantime, check out the Breaking Bread Café. I'd probably drop what I'm doing to join you. - Barry Schade, Area 6





New Trash and Recycling Collection Vehicles Operate in Minneapolis' Regional Parks

Bins change from metal to plastic to improve trash and recycling pickup

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) is transitioning to a new trash and recycling process that makes collection safer, cheaper and more environmentally friendly.

New plastic receptacles without liners (pictured above right) are replacing the old, round metal cans with plastic liners (pictured below). In addition, new collection vehicles



a re replacing the old system of manually emptying receptacles.

This system has already been implemented at Minneapolis' neighborhood parks, now it's rolling out to larger, more popular regional parks like Minneapolis Chain of Lakes, Theodore Wirth and Minnehaha.

Implementation at Regional Parks The new trash and recycling con-

tainers are arriving in batches of 100, not all at once. MPRB staff is working hard to install the new containers as soon as they arrive.

Regional park users may notice lids on the old metal containers have been removed. This is because the metal lids damage the new collection vehicles. This is just a temporary measure until all of the new plastic containers can be installed.

The MPRB is excited to complete its safer, cheaper and more environmentally friendly trash and recycling collection program and appreciates the public's patience while the program is implemented.


"THE OLD CABIN HAS COME ALIVE"

--by Molly Burke Since Molly and Tim Burke, 1936 Drew South, began rebuilding their house two years ago, the old cabin has come alive through relics the Burkes have found. The house, built around 1900, was moved in 1939 from its original site on the shore of Brownie Lake by a gang of Cedar Lake neighbors who (if the tale isn't tall!) literally carried it on their backs. Once lowered into its present foundation on Drew Hill, the cabin was remodeled and modernized inside leaving only the graceful 19th century style sleeping porch . Tim found that the walls were insulated with 1939 newspapers. That year the cost of a movie at the Bryn Wood Theatre, Glenwood and Cedar Lake Road, was only 10 cents.

When Tim pried open a boarded trap door discovered under the carpet pad, he found no stash of hidden money, but in the attic he did find an elegant silk parasol. The delicate hand painted flowers on the porcelain handle reminded Molly of the days when Cedar Lake was a resort for the wealthy. Many genteel folks from the Crocus Hill area of St. Paul kept cabins on Brownie and Cedar because they could travel on the convenient horse-drawn street car line (the precursor of Interstate 94!!) Ladies in starched blouses sat under sun parasols, and gentlemen in white shoes and straw hats shot golf on the Bryn Mawr Course (see <u>History of the</u> Calhoun-Isles Area).

The cabin at 1936 Drew has a new face, but its old skeleton, its beams, chimney and oak floor, have endured through many eras.

I'm gathering information about the homes (and families) that had been in the Bryn Mawr Meadows through the 1960s. Some of those families stayed in Bryn Mawr after their homes were demolished for the park expansion. If you would like to share your story, please contact me: Kevina Munnich kmunnich@gmail.com. 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

Minneapolis Board of Education approves resolution to place properly tax referendum renewal on Nov. 8 ballot

The Minneapolis Board of Education has approved a resolution asking voters to renew an existing property tax referendum of \$1,604.31 per student. The renewal decision will go to Minneapolis voters on Nov. 8.

The current property tax refere ndum, which generates 13 percent of Minneapolis Public Schools' (MPS') 2016-17 budget, will expire this year. If approved by voters, the renewal will extend the funding for nine years. Property taxes for most Minneapolis homeowners are not projected to increase if the refere ndum passes.

MPS relies on referendum resources to manage class sizes and provide supportive services and activities for students. This year, refe rendum revenue is funding more than 750 positions, including 591 classroom teachers, 82 academic and behavioral specialists and 81 teachers and support staff for English learners. It also funds math, science and literacy curriculum and materials as well as classroom technology. MPS is committed to using referendum funding to impact student achievement. Birch's on the Lake: Brewhouse and Supper Club

1310 Wayzata Blvd, Long Lake

There are so many choices for outdoor dining in the Twin Cities. Rick Nelson has run a number of articles in the Star Tr ibune this summer about the most enjoyable restaurant patios and decks. So why drive to Long Lake for dinner? Because it's a beautiful lake, a great restaurant, and easy parking not far from Bryn Mawr. We were surprised at how close Long Lake is; a 15 minute drive at rush hour using the HOV lane.

Birch's Supper Club was started in 2008 in downtown Long Lake. Founder Burt Joseph was looking to revitalize his club when he met a St. Louis based brewer, Brennan Greene. They joined efforts and moved to an iconic building on Long Lake in 2015. Birch's on the Lake is the latest in a long history of supper clubs that called the cabinstyle building home, including The Hanson House in the 1960's and 70's, and Billy's Lighthouse, which closed in 2006 after a 21 year run.

Birch's serves classics like a relish tray, and fried fish, but also modern dishes like caramelized Brussels sprouts with bacon and blue cheese, which we loved. We tried the herb crusted walleye and shrimp and grits, both of which were tasty. The smoked baby backed ribs were good, but a bit dry.

Downstairs, the brewpub has a beer hall menu to complement Greene's craft beer. Birch's also features an outdoor patio overlooking Long Lake. Its first come-first served, but had a quick turnover on a Friday night.

The design downstairs feels like other brewpubs—a bit industrial. Upstairs blends a north feel with the ambiance of a Vegas lounge. We listened to piano music in the upstairs bar from our rounded booth, with a most lovely view of the lake. **What the Moms are reading now:** *Homer & Langley*, by E.L. Doctorow


