Wirth Cooperative Grocery to Open

After nearly ten long years, the seed (planted by the Harrison Neighborhood Assn.) for a community food co-op is about to sprout!

But further back, since moving into neighboring Bryn Mawr in 1974 it became clear that the isolated location of this beautiful Minneapolis neighborhood community had many positive aspects until about twenty-five years ago when our closest large grocery store named Super Value (in the Harrison neighborhood on Glenwood at Cedar Lake Rd) closed its doors for good.

Thank goodness, the Bryn Mawr Market (formerly Fred's) has continued to help fill a gap and will always be valued as one of the greatest assets as a neighborhood anchor.

For those who currently grocery shop out of the neighborhood, please note: the new Wirth Coop Grocery (opening this summer) will

be closer in distance than any food coop or major grocery store. After a number of potential store locations, the southwest corner of Penn Ave N and Golden Valley Rd.....made the final cut in early 2016, a store front of the new Commons at Penn building, which is in a partnership with Building Blocks(a Devean George organization).

From day one, the Co-op will aim to offer local quality fresh and prepared food that will reflect the needs of community. Additionally, it will bring to the table an investment (particularly being membership owned), which is critical to the community heartbeat and its surrounding neighborhoods.

So, be watching for the Grand Opening Day via flyers etc. soon and/or check out the website www.wirth.coop for more information.

Approval of agenda
Accepted the minutes from the Annual Meeting/Approved minutes for April

Lisa Goodman gave the City Councilmember report
Lisa reviewed field trips planned for Lunch with Lisa: the newly opened Sculpture Garden and Target in September. Final presentation for Peavey Plaza forthcoming.
501 Cedar Lake Rd has been sold. They need a variance to build. Any-

one within 300 ft will be notified of the hearing on the variance. The City has a pro density point of view.
625 Queen Ave S requested a variance to replace single garage.
Household hazardous waste events going on this summer. Check the schedule.
The City attempted a move in the right direction by proposing a plastic bags ban. This didn't go through, so they are looking for ideas to progress with this issue
Mobile station—no update—they are in a quasi-judicial situation/going through the process with the city, they rejected the city's offer.
Lisa responded to a question about the \$15 minimum wage issue

Mpls Virtual Safety Network-Melissa Wisniewski Securonet-
Securnet works with all 5 Mpls police Department precincts, paid for by the police department.
Enables private and public entities to sign up to network cameras that are already in place at their site, such as cameras at a business or home.
Securnet does not buy or place cameras. They are involved in sharing data only.

BrightSide Farm Stands- Adam Kay/Adam Pruitt
Working for the past three years on decreasing food “deserts” in the city.
Have developed small farm stands to sell produce in areas with less options for fresh food.
Working with students at St. Thomas.

Set up small sidewalk stands in front of a corner store. Produce is sold by St. Thomas students and young people from the community who are paid/3 hour sell period.
Rogers store in Harrison is one of the corner stores.
Setting up a buyers club for the produce remaining after the sale—recruit neighbors to buy bundles of produce at the end of the day - \$10/share.
BrightSide is asking for a willingness and interest from individuals in buying the shares. They are seeking 10 families for \$10 each for 8 weeks. Patty will recruit people to do this – need commitment by July 9.
They will submit an article in the Bugle.

The Treasurers Report given by the BMNA Treasurer, Dennis Fazio.
Dennis presented some necessary corrections to our cash management policy. Changes moved by Dennis and seconded by Jessica, approved.
Dennis presented a proposal for a Bookkeeper, including separating Treasurer duties from Bookkeeping, and hiring a bookkeeper. City rules Consultation with NCR confirmed that it is permitted to pay Board members for professional services if they are well-defined, separate from Board duties, and of financial or other benefit to the organization allow us to pay a board member; proposing that Dennis be the contracted for bookkeeping services for 7-10 hours month. He would remain as volunteer treasurer with responsibilities at about 10 hours a month. Approved hiring a bookkeeper, moved by Barry second by Motion by Barry Schade to contract with Dennis for bookkeeping services with referral to officers to work out the details. Approved. Refer to officers to work out the details.
Recommended that we buy a screen and donate it to the church for use during our summer meetings. Approved up to \$250 for a screen. Dennis moved, Brian seconded. Dennis will work with the church on details.

North Side Service Area Master Plan CAC presented by Kevin Thompson
We have an option to add a Bryn Mawr/Harrison representative for park planning.
Currently on the CAC from Bryn Mawr are Kevin Thompson (appointed by Anita Tabb) and Mike Brennan (appointed by Lisa Goodman)
Tim Davis has applied from Harrison. Barry moved to appoint Tim as a joint Bryn Mawr/Harrison rep, Brian seconded. Approved.

Ad in SW Journal for Bryn Mawr Spotlight discussion led by Kevin Thompson.
SW Journal is publishing an article highlighting Bryn Mawr in 6/29 issue.
There was discussion around placing an ad for Bryn Mawr in the same

issue. Deadline for ad is June 26.
Decision was made to look at this for next year- advertising the garden tour or Bryn Mawr in general.
Minnesota Compass Website Tool presentation by Jessica Wiley
Wilder Foundation was funded to create Minnesota Compass, a neighborhood data tool with profile information on demographics, housing, workforce, trends.
Data can be accessed at macro and micro levels-state, county, city, neighborhoods.
Could be used for school committee, fundraising, advocacy, strategic planning. www.mncompass.org

Patty Wycoff gave an update as the Neighborhood Coordinator
Garage sales. Fewer families donated to our sale but record number registered their garage sales. Next year, we need to be sure we have a traffic cop at Penn and Cedar Lake Rd.
Neighbors in Area 4 behind the former hedge are concerned that the hill is not being mowed in a timely fashion.
Ice Cream social – July 13. La La Creamery on board, buy vanilla ice cream for the kids.

JoEllyn Jolstad gave a Bugle Report.
This month is the Graduation issue highlighting the many graduates we have this year.
Jay Peterson gave an update on the Website.
BMNA.org is receiving an average of 3500 visitors each month.
Looking at having 100 photos available for use as needed.

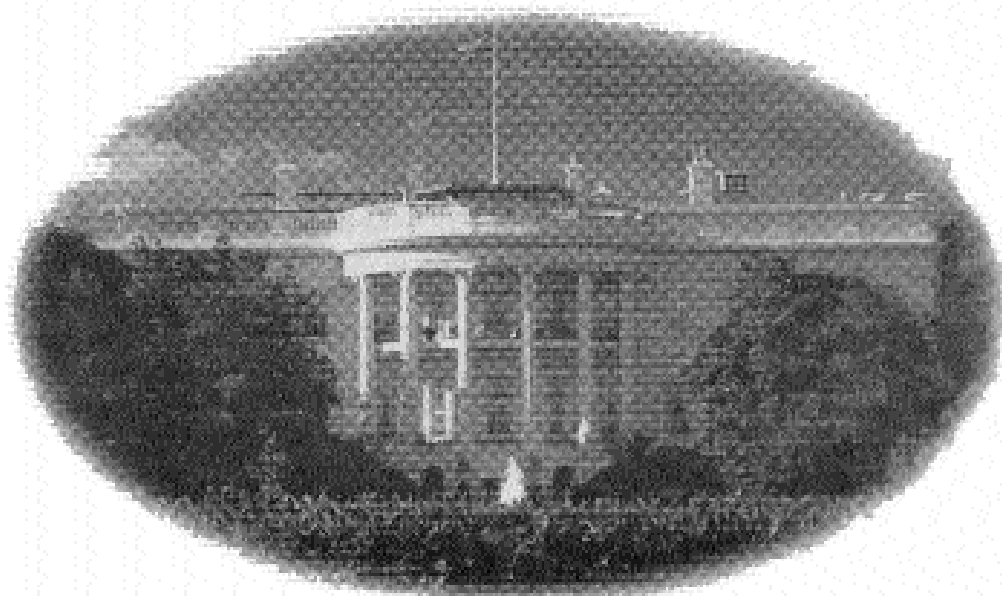

From the Editor

Well, it happened. After 22 years of having students in Minneapolis Public Schools, the last one graduated. It was a momentous occasion at Mariucci Arena shared by several neighbors. Check out the Graduations in this edition (pages 10-11). There are 13 high school grads featured this year - up significantly from five in 2016. Nine of them have been friends since Bryn Mawr Elementary and Anwatin Middle School.

I have mentioned before how grateful I am for everything MPS did for our children. But I am not sure I have said how much it has done for me. I too met great teachers and formed wonderful friendships.

Our daughter's graduation was commemorated with an epic six-family block party in Area 3. We closed off the street and welcomed close to 400 people to a celebratory brunch. The party was a blast and a great demonstration of this supportive community. But the truly amazing part of the event was the collaborative planning.

Six parents (one rep per family) with vastly different personalities actually got together to co-plan and host this impressive event. Because of our involvement in the schools, we have forged friendships independent of our children. This wasn't

six high school students who asked their parents to throw a common party. It was initiated by us.

We pulled it off without much conflict. We agreed upon what we wanted, divided the work and trusted each other to each be responsible for our part. In the end our efforts were worth the time and expense. We and our children had a fantastic day hanging out with each other and welcoming guests who otherwise would have attended six different parties. Among those who stopped by, were several Bryn Mawr/Anwatin teachers and a former Bryn Mawr School principal.

I was recently contacted by a mother of 14-month old twins who lives downtown. She and her husband were looking for information about the schools because they were considering a move to Bryn Mawr. I told her I would have to get back to her because I was heading up north for a weekend with friends. And, yes. Those friends are women I met on the Bryn Mawr PTA. When I get a chance, I will tell her that investing in my community by sending our children to the local schools paid off big time for me and our children and I am so glad we made that decision all those years ago.



Lifetime Bryn Mawr Resident (Area 2), Erika Bloomdahl, is excited to announce that her production team is producing their first show at a theatre venue in the Twin Cities! The Bechdel Show is coming to Bryant Lake Bowl July 13th-15th and 21st-23rd.

This is the newest project from Slap Happy Studios. The team, consisting of Erin Cargill, Beth Ann Powers, and Erika Bloomdahl, got their start creating theatre together with their first web series, Love in Idleness on Youtube, a significant amount of which was filmed in Bryn Mawr. Since then, they have staged a one act show at the University of Minnesota. Their new show, The Bechdel Show is a sketch comedy show inspired by the Bechdel Test that encourages the audience to rethink gender and sexuality representations and norms through the use of humor. The Bechdel Test is a metric created by Alison Bechdel that evaluates the realism of the representation of women in film and television. The show seeks to critique commonly observed media tropes and everyday expectations regarding gender and sexuality. Some examples of sketches include a shop where different forms of toxic masculinity can be ordered as one would order different ice cream flavors, depictions of the ridiculous beauty standards put on woman in apocalypse movies, and satirical portrayals of gendered products and commercials.

Eastside - 305 S Washington Ave

With many downtown streets detoured, getting to a restaurant at 6:30 is a challenge. We had to drive through the construction zone to get to the valet parking for Eastside, located on the corner of 3rd and Washington. Once inside, the bad traffic was out of mind. Eastside is a beautiful space, with striking tile work, large windows and a modern décor. Their menu borrows from a variety of cuisines. We tried small plates, including roasted cauliflower and asparagus. The entrees were large so we split the pork porterhouse with mustard spätzle and raisins. Also tried the lobster salad, with grapefruit, avocado and lime—fresh and tasty ceviche-style with no greens. Enjoyed three desserts; loved the chocolate cheesecake. Our server was great. Happily recooked our slightly underdone chop. It was a delightful meal.

Our book club has been on a quest for many years to find interesting restaurants and unique dishes. We appreciate comfort food too.

In a perusal of the places we've reviewed over the past five years, we were struck by how many we loved are closed; some after fairly brief runs and some years after opening. Just read that Bradstreet Neighborhood Crafthouse is closed, and we were really sad when La Ceiba stopped serving.

But those that are open beckon for a second visit. We'd definitely order the lobster and guacamole at 65Smith again, and the small plate of ribs at Lake and Irving. The caramelized Brussels sprouts with bacon and blue cheese are worth another visit to Birch's in Long Lake. The cocktails and cheesecake were memorable at the Commodore, as were the deviled eggs with trout roe at Coup D'etat. And there are many reasons to go back to Heyday, The Kenwood, and Smack Shack among others. If only there weren't so many new places to try!

Preschool Nature Camp in Anwatin Woods

“We’re in the middle of nowhere!” exclaimed George, age 4. It was day four of Nature Play Adventure Camp, organized by the Minneapolis Nature Preschool. Camp was taking place on the school property of Anwatin Middle School/Bryn Mawr Elementary. Deeply immersed in stick fort building and creek exploration, George and his 17 new friends had completely forgotten the city around them.

Each day incorporated child-led exploration of the forest, while seasoned teachers facilitated learning across multiple domains. Social-emotional development came easily as the group worked their way on and off of the trails. “This is teamwork,” Chakrika (age 5) said smiling, as she and three other girls pulled a heavy wagon up a hill. If a child needed a hand crossing a log, or digging a hole, there was always another camper nearby to lend a hand. From an outside perspective, it seemed as though this newly acquainted group of 4-6 year olds had known each other for months.

Children practiced balance and cooperation as they helped each other cross a creek on a fallen log. Before wading in to catch tadpoles, they



assessed risks by measuring water depth with sticks. Early math and literacy came easily. ¿Cuántos gusanos hay (How many worms are there)?” one teacher asked. Four year old Yaretzi looked quickly across the puddle and answered, ¡Hay cinco (There are five)! During a thunderstorm, the entire group worked together to map the forest and label landmarks, referencing drawings and notes made in their nature journals. Teacher, Wes Nugteren, gathered children to observe the three stages of development of a ladybug, all on one leaf. Each day offered rich opportunities to study nature as the group adventured within a small patch of forest.

The week ended with a community picnic near the Anwatin Community Garden. Families met each other as children introduced their new friends. Long after camp had ended, families conversed while children ran and played with their new friends. It was a wonderful way to end this debut effort by the Minneapolis Nature Preschool.

A huge thanks to the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association and community members who made this camp possible. Also, thank you to the families, children (6 from Bryn Mawr), and dedicated volunteers and teachers for making this week amazing!

This is a continuation of an article was written by Mrs. Eva Stolt in the 70s. Mrs. Stolt lived on Washbum Ave. N. for 44 years. Submitted by Judy Remington, Area 7.

Now, we will mosey along Glenwood Avenue for a few blocks. Between Newton and Morgan Avenues Hazel Holth grocery store, Louis Heard shoe repair shop, K. A. Johnson Meat Market and later Franke's and then Joe Hermes' Meat Market. Joe and Gunnie lived at 224 Xerxes for many years. Next to the Meat Market, was a bakery owned by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Breu, who lived at 221 Washburn Ave. No. Another grocery store---first owned by Hartwigs, then Larson and Nanfeldt, then Barquist. Also, Mr. Gandrud had a grocery store next to the Bakery, then an apartment building and then Redeemer Church. Homes were across the street.

The West Academy School used up all the area on that block. Former business places were Victory Market, Otto's Meat Market, Brynwood Theatre, Ben Franklin dime store, Halonen & Edberg tax office, a barber shop and beauty parlor. Across the street from West Academy, more places of business. On the corner of Cedar Lake Road and Glenwood, Cash & Carry grocery store, Siren's Tavern later Sutton's, Finnish Steam Bath (Sauna), the Glenwood Cafe, Juntilla Bros. Grocery, West End Bakery, Turk & Froberg Hardware Store, and the Finn Hall (which held dances). Later it became a bowling Alley, 2 dentist and doctor offices upstairs of the Western Ave. Pharmacy.

We must not forget Munsingwear (now International Market Square). In the late 1800's, the factory started mostly men's long Johns as time went by, many more new lines were added (several name brands). They always had quality merchandise. Many of the local ladies in our neighborhood did sewing at the plant. Munsingwear is still going strong in some Southern state. A few blocks further toward downtown was the Pearson Candy Company, home of the "Nut Goodie". Fritz and Aggie Pearson lived on Xerxes Ave.

Then coming back to our Bryn Mawr area was the company, Burma Shave, which now houses three companies, on the corner of Penn and Chestnut. Burma Shave had many signs along the nation's highways to advertise their product. Such as: "Bearded Lady Tried a Jar, Now She's a Movie Star." Does your husband, Hate to Shave? Grunt and Grumble? Rant and Rave? Shoot the Brute Some Burma Shave. "Beneath this Stone, Lies Elmer Gush, Tickled to Death, By His Shaving Brush."

FIRE STATION NO. 16

The station was established in 1891. For a short period of time it was located on Plymouth Ave. then they moved to 4th and James Ave. No., then the move to Glenwood Ave. which was made in the early 1960's.

In the early years, they used chemical retardents until they got their first pumper No. 3384--900 gals. per minute was the pumping capacity. This took place between 1916 and 1922. The name of the fire rig was "American LaFrance." The rig was in running order from 1923 to 1941.

The horses were always positioned in a "Ready to Go". When the alarm was sounded, the harnesses were dropped from up above, the men hitched up and away they went. The area serviced was Xerxes to the West, downtown (East), Plymouth Ave. and Old Superior Blvd., now highway 394. They serve the same area today.

No medical calls in the early years, 4 to 6 men on each rig. No. 16 was the last station with horses. The trucks became in use in 1922. Mr. Charles Ringer was the longest serving Fire Chief in Minneapolis, 1911 to 1933.

The 24 hours on and 24 hours off has always been the working schedule.

Most of these homes in this area were built in the 1940's. Average selling price then was \$5,200, 1954 - \$13,000, now 1996 - \$100,000. Bryn Mawr School was our elementary school located at Laurel and Newton. All our children would walk there.

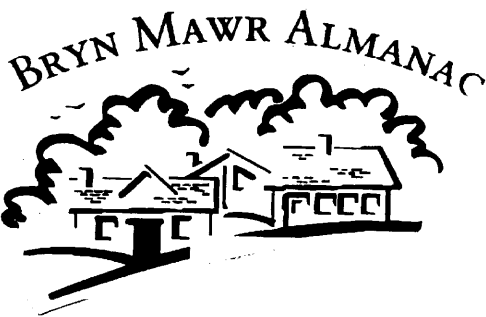

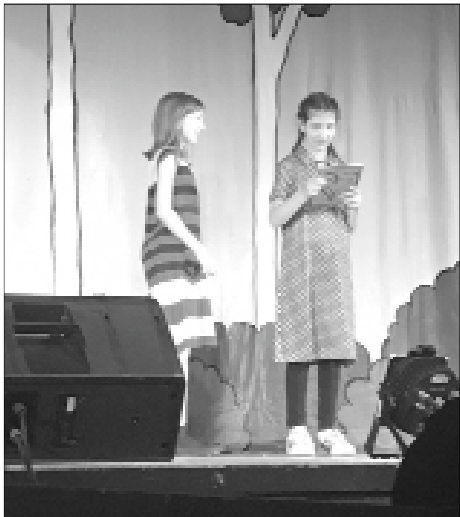


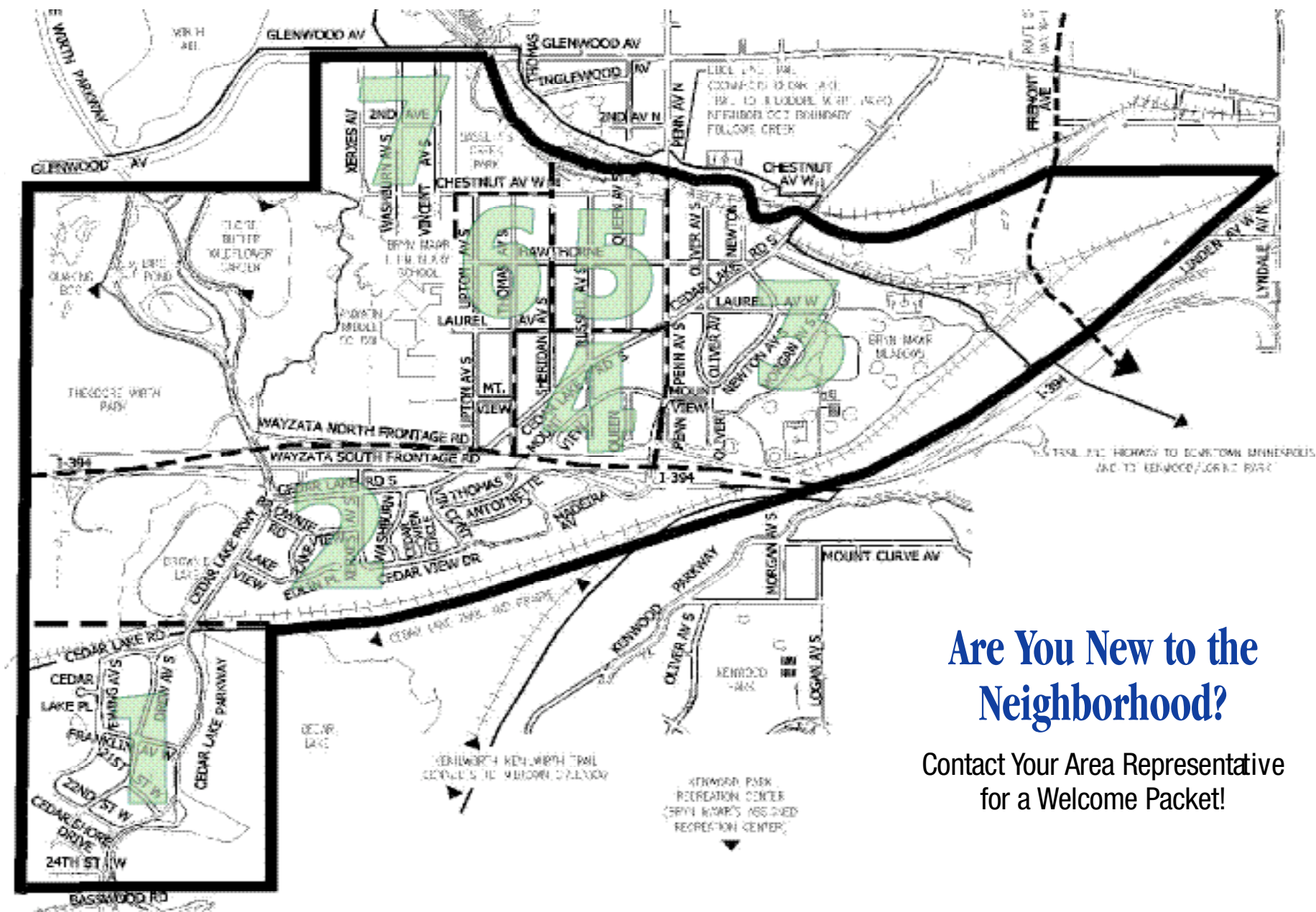
