LUCE LINE TRAIL COMPLETED FROM WIRTH PARK TO MEDICINE LAKE

In mid June, the long-awaited last link in the Luce Line Trail was completed through Wirth Park south of the golf course to Schaper Park in Golden Valley.

You can catch the trail just south of the par 3 clubhouse on Wirth Parkway. It follows a former service road and an existing cross country ski trail so the disturbance to this forested area has been minimized.

There is a nice glimpse of Hidden Lake from a new bridge that spans a ravine just before crossing the CP Rail tracks into Schaper Park. Heading west through Golden Valley, previously completed parts of the trail skirt the Golden Valley Country Club, the city center, and Plymouth Road. At Medicine Lake, it connects with another Hennepin Parks Regional Trail heading north, then winds through Plymouth under Highways 169 and 494 to Vicksburg Road. The unpaved portion of the trail then extends well into central Minnesota.

While surprisingly scenic and hilly, this trail is also an important route for bicycle commuting between the western suburbs and downtown. After a short stretch south on the Wirth Parkway Trail, bicyclists can follow the Luce Line

along Highway 55, through Bassett's Creek Park in the Harrison neighborhood, Bryn Mawr Meadows in Bryn Mawr, and finally the Cedar Lake Trail to the multimodal transit center at the new Twins ballpark. This route will allow safe off-road bicycle commuting to downtown, and to the U of M and St. Paul when the Central Corridor LRT line begins operation.

Thanks go to Boe Carlson, trail coordinator for the Three Rivers Park District which built the trail, and also to the Golden Valley City Council, and the MPRB and Minneapolis Public Works Department who built the Minneapolis section of this trail a few years ago. For more than a decade, citizens from Bryn Mawr, Harrison, Willard Hay, and Golden Valley have advocated for the trail and helped find a route through a complex area full of railroads, creeks, freeways, and golf courses.

This is another victory for private citizens and public employees working together to make this part of our planet a bit greener. The Twin Cities is now one of the most bicycle-friendly metro areas in the nation.

See 10 very unique gardens designed and maintained by Master Gardeners. The homeowner and other Master Gardeners will be on site to respond to your questions.

Each garden has a different theme and demonstration. Themes include a fairytale garden, a low maintenance garden, woodland retreat gardens, a farmhouse in the city, container gardening, a sanctuary garden, and a shade garden with a labyrinth. There will be practical, informative demonstrations at each site. Master Gardeners will conduct interactive demonstrations at 10, 12, and 2 on a wide range of topics. You can learn how to create small space, container, and vertical gardens, build low maintenance water gardens in a weekend, create garden rooms and rain gardens, using color to create moods, and how to grow vegetables.

A boutique will feature garden related crafts, concrete leaves and stepping stones, gardening books, and other items for sale.

The gardens are clustered in the Edina-South Minneapolis-and three

are in Bryn Mawr. The Bryn Mawr gardens include an urban woodland garden, a vertical space garden to maximize space and a garden that emphasizes native plants.

The intent of the tour is to provide an interactive and informative experience. Bring your questions! Bring your camera! Proceeds benefit Hennepin County Master Gardener community programs.

Call to Order and Introductions

City Council Report – Council Member Lisa Goodman

- Lunch with Lisa on July 22nd at St. Thomas will be an Instant Runoff Voting tutorial, including election of the group's favorite candy bar as a trial for ranking choices.
- Lisa is enthusiastic about the Minneapolis Mosaic Art Festival which continues through August - www.minneapolismosaic.com
- Newsbites - 'Results Minneapolis' - www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/results City's credit rating was recently updated – Fitch & Standard & Poor's give us AAA (highest possible), Moody's Aa1. All three agencies noted Minneapolis' strong financial management as key to earning high ratings.
- Emerald Ash Borer has now reached MN, with the State's first case discovered in St. Paul.
- National Night Out will be on August 4. Apply by July 21st and street closure is free.
- Beware of Home Alarm System Scams going on – especially door-to-door sales. Before you buy, visit www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/police/crime-prevention.
- JULY 23RD ICE CREAM SOCIAL - Lisa will scoop ice cream.

Patty Wycoff's Neighborhood Coordinator report.

- Permit for Ice Cream Social is secured. Patty needs help picking up ice cream from Sebastian Joe's and Ben & Jerry's.
- The hydrant is finally hooked up at Oliver/Cedar Lake Rd. Greg Lecker bought 300 feet of hose, we have a permit to water the public garden there.
- Monday July 14th Margaret Kelliher, Mark Stenglein, and someone from the School Board will hold a public meeting in Bryn Mawr, about property taxes and how they're determined. Patty will send out an

email and possibly post some information before the meeting.

Budgeting & Fundraising Committee – Ron Sterbenz

- Our membership goal has been met already! We voted by email to approve a supplemental allocation to the Upton Garden for upkeep supplies. We discussed it briefly tonight and confirmed our approval.
- Ron passed out copies of the current budget numbers.
- The Ice Cream Social planning is underway. The event will be on Thursday July 23rd (instead of the traditional Wednesday of the Torchlight Parade). We can always use more volunteers, especially for setup and cleanup.
- Ron moved, several seconded to change the signatories on our accounts from Ron & Chad to our new Treasurers, Adam Maki and Ben Horn. Approved.

Energy Challenge project.

CEE is not coming through as promised with the updates, and the committee is frustrated. When we asked for a reduced fee because they reduced the amount of work they were going to do, they said they'd waive the charge completely.

2009 Capital Project

Sticking with the 'downtown improvement' theme, we are looking at a Bulletin Board sign in front of Studio 411. There's a paved space adjacent to the sidewalk, which is their property. The Bryn Mawr Business Association is on board. The board would announce upcoming meetings/events of the BMNA, and possibly an advertisement section for the businesses to use on a rotating basis. The committee will work on specific proposals/options for next meeting (July).

Bugle Committee – Jay Peterson

The Bugle Editor position was posted in the last two Bugles. There has been only one applicant so far.

Land Use Committee – Larry Skov reporting

There is a variance request for an addition at 704 Cedar Lake Road. LUC votes in favor of recommending that the City grant the request – the Board concurs.

Schools Committee – Lynda Shaheen

The School Board has postponed the decisions about school closings and community school boundaries, etc. The Superintendent/Administration was told not to bother bringing their proposal in May - it would be rejected. So they're back to the drawing Board.

New Discussion items

Shaun Malady is an Area 3 neighbor and a professional Arborist. He saw mention in the Bugle that we were discussing a possible project involving our neighborhood's large population of Ash trees. He's here to ask what we're thinking about doing, if anything, about the Emerald Ash

Borer. We explained that the initial project was just to map out where the trees are in Bryn Mawr, to get an idea how the EAB will affect our neighborhood. His company makes/will sell chemicals to protect the trees for \$28 per year - do-it-yourself. He is willing to host an informational meeting about how to do it. Scott says we have NRP environmental funds unused that may be appropriate. We will look into what exactly those chemicals are/do, and whether it is an appropriate use of funds.

- Ice Cream Social Thursday July 23.



Energy Challenge Update

Back in 2008, the BMNA voted to pursue a Capital Project called The Energy Challenge. This project was proposed by Tracey Cook and Bekah Padilla, two very enthusiastic neighbors. The idea was for neighbors to register their address with the Center for Energy and Environment (CEE) and give them permission to monitor gas and electricity usage. The CEE agreed to monitor participants' energy usage every month and compare their usage to the prior year. They were also going to provide ideas for how you could reduce your usage.

The CEE had a formula for computing and comparing the usage for each area in Bryn Mawr. The project was to have the seven areas in Bryn Mawr compete for the lowest usage. 92 neighbors signed up to participate.

In January, the CEE was given all of the information necessary to track the 92 participants' usage. In March, our Capital Project Co-chairs



learned from the CEE that they would not be able to monitor and compute usage MONTHLY because of restrictions with the gas company but they could do it every 6 months for the year.

If you are participating in the Energy Challenge you should have received your first update in May via email. This is not 6 months of usage. The CEE will send the information when they receive it from the gas company.

The BMNA had agreed to pay the CEE \$1000 for their work on this project. The CEE has since agreed to accept \$0 because their work has been reduced due to the gas company restrictions for reporting.

The BMNA hopes the participates (and all Bryn Mawr residents) are still taking measures to reduce their energy usage. Even though we have been unable to receive regular updates, we still expect to be able to get a final report for each household that signed up and compare those results to others who are part of the challenge.

Thank you again to all the neighbors that signed up to participate. Hang in there and be patient!

Crime Prevention Corner July 2009

MINNEAPOLIS National Night Out is coming up fast. If you haven't already, now is the time to start making preparations on your block for the night that brings neighbors together. This year, National Night Out is Tuesday, August 4. Minneapolis wants to make it easy for block clubs and neighbors to get started now on their plans.

To get started, use this checklist to begin your planning:

- Register your NNO event. There is a single online process to register your NNO event and apply to close your street. If you want to close your street for your event, street closure is free if you apply by July 21. You need permission of 75 percent of your neighbors to be approved for street closure—please have their names and addresses with you when you apply. (You do not need their signatures.) Get started at www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/nno. If you don't have Internet access, you can register your event and apply for street closure by calling 311 (or 612-673-3000).
- Want a police officer, firefighter, or canine officer and dog to visit your event? Because demand can be very high for visits, we can't promise that one will be available, but feel free to request a visit when you register by calling 311 (or 612-673-3000) to put your name on the list. Sorry, we can't take requests for mounted patrol.

- Make rain plans. Decide if your event will go forward if it rains, or be rescheduled for another time. If you apply to close your street, you'll have a rain date of Wednesday, August 5 unless you decline it during the application. If you don't close your street, you can choose any date that works for your group. Plan ahead!
- If this is your first time holding an NNO event, you can request a start-up kit. There is a limited supply of free NNO start-up kits for blocks holding NNO events for the first time. They contain plates, cups, plastic utensils, napkins, etc. for 50. If your block is new to NNO this year, call 612-673-2956 to see if a kit is available.

Each event organizer will receive Mystery Point Passes for Nickelodeon Universe at the Mall of America and vouchers (each good for 2 tickets) for Minnesota Twins games to use as door prizes. Each Mystery Point pass is worth either a single ride, a day of rides or a whole season of rides. If you register your NNO event by July 14, you will be entered into a drawing for other door prizes donated by Minneapolis businesses.

National Night Out is a tradition in Minneapolis, and in Bryn Mawr. Let's all come together to make this year's NNO the best ever!

Community Input Sought During Listening Session

MPRB survey gives public opportunity to share ideas on park and rec needs

From protecting environment to safety A public survey on community park and recreation needs is being conducted by the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) as part of its 2010 budget planning process. The 2010 Budget Priorities Survey <http://www.surveymonkey.com/s.aspx?sm=f8ZITfkBtJ5Fcrgyg-MuEww_3d_3d> is available online at www.minneapolisparcs.org (located at the bottom of the left navigation) through Oct. 7.

During the community input processes for the MPRB's 2007-2020 Comprehensive Plan, five categories of top community park and recreation needs emerged on which the survey will focus:

- Involving children and youth in positive activities.
- Protecting or spending time in the natural environment.
- Providing health and fitness opportunities for residents.
- Keeping parks clean and well maintained.

- Providing safe parks.

In addition, the survey queries the public on funding possibilities, such as partnerships with businesses and opportunities for cost savings or revenue generating.



View From the Bridge

July 2009 – Water Lilies

“For coolness, rest and peace go to the lakes encircled and islanded by the refreshing white lilies serenely resting on the surface of the water among the large, round leaf pads... The flowers are closed at night. At sunrise, if one chances to be at a lily pond, he will be entranced to see the flowers burst open all at once under the influence of the sun – a sudden transformation of the dark water into a scene of enchantment.”

“...The stout subterranean stem scarred with the evidence of former leaf and flowerstalks has also tubers which break off to propagate new plants.”¹ Eloise Butler wrote in “Wild Plants of Minnesota – Milkweed Flowers Much in Evidence during July; Harebells, Ox-Eyes, and Water Lilies Also Bloom in Abundance; July 9, 1911” for a weekly column of the Sunday Minneapolis Tribune.

When visiting the new Brownie Lake canoe rack and continuing woodland restorations, take time to note the water lilies in this hidden gem of the Minneapolis Chain of Lakes. In the shallow waters of Brownie Lake especially, you will see these “stars fallen in the water”.

Plentiful are Native American legends describing the origin of water lilies.

- A star maiden, tired of wandering the sky alone, wished she could live on earth enjoying its warmth and beauty. She wished so hard, she grew wings. Flying near earth, she wondered what shape she would take. She watched children swimming in water. The next day, elders saw their children playing amid new floating star-shaped flowers, their wings now floating as circular green leaves surrounding the flowers.
- A star and her sister stars chose to become water lilies – floating flowers to be closer to the Ojibwe – the “canoe people”
- A star maiden and her sisters chose to leave the sky and the night and join the water and the day to light the lake.
- Stars were the embodiment of good people taken by the Great Spirit. Some stars have chosen to live in the water where they can watch their earth-bound friends and family members as they swim in the water or float by in canoes.
- Finally, from David Beaucage Johnson, writer and illustrator:
- “Long ago a star spirit looked down upon the earth and saw an orange glow in a clearing beside a lake. Curious, the star dropped lower for a closer look. The star



could now see that the glow was a fire and that there were people gathered around it. The star moved closer still and she realized that some of the people were telling stories, some were dancing, and others were singing. The star watched for a long time because she loved to stay and listen to the laughter and music but also knew that she must return to her home in the sky.”


“As she began to climb skyward, she glanced down for one more look. Directly below, in the lake, was another star! Perhaps stars can live in the water, she wondered. Quickly, she descended toward the lake. She didn’t realize that the other star was her own reflection in the water. When she moved to embrace the other star, she touched the water and was instantly transformed into a beautiful star-shaped flower. This was the first water lily. The water lily always grows close to shore where it can enjoy the sounds of laughter and music that surrounds campfires. The next time you are paddling through a patch of water lilies, remember the star who lived in the sky until she found the magic in a wish.”²

Nymphaeaceae Family (Water Lily Family)

Throughout Minnesota, water lilies grow on small lakes, channels, and shallow bays, especially those with mucky bottoms. The plants prefer quiet water where their large roots (rhizomes) provide support and energy storage. As fall and winter approach, nutrients are stored in the hardy roots. These rich roots are a favorite food source for beavers and moose in areas like the Boundary Waters. Canoeists may discover these oddly shaped swollen forms floating on and just under the surface of small waterways connecting BWCA lakes. Water lily leaves and stems possess air-filled channels and thus float in the water. Water lily leaves shade the water surface and the bottom of the water body, thus eliminating competition from other water plants, including algae. From seeds, plants grow for several years before producing a flower that will bloom for just four or five days. Flowers close at night, or during cloudy or cool days. Flowers open in the early morning and on warm sunny afternoons.

While Water Lily flowers float on the water or very near the water, Yellow Water Lily flowers typically bloom above the surface of the water. Yellow Water Lily flowers remain fairly tightly closed compared with the much more open White Water Lily.

Yellow Water Lily (*Nuphar variegatum*)
Common names include: *Bullhead*



Lily, Flapperdock, Spatterdock, Beaver-Lily, Cow-Lily, Dog-Lily, Frog-Lily, Indian Pond Lily, Yellow Lanterns

Its 3” to 8” long leaves are round or heart-shaped, deeply notched, toothless, shiny green, and floating on the water surface. Flowers are 3” to 5” wide, cup-shaped with four to six yellow petals surrounded by three small sepals.

The fairly tightly closed flowers of Yellow Water Lily guarantee cross-pollination. A bit of background on flower parts and pollination is necessary here. “Perfect” flowers such as water lilies possess both male and female parts. The male parts are the stamens, which are topped with pollen-laden structures called anthers. The female parts are the typically centrally located pistil, which is made up of the ovary and the stigma, which receives the pollen.

Yellow Water Lily flowers are fairly tightly closed. Those that are more mature, and more open, expose their pollen-topped anthers to bees that leave the flower with pollen grains sticking to their body or legs. Then, the bee may visit a more tightly closed, younger flower. The bee must force itself into the flower and brushes against the stigma of the pistil. The pollen grains are deposited there and pollinate the ovary leading to the formation of seeds.

Common White Water Lily (*Nymphaea tuberosa*)

Common names include: *Toad-Lily, Pond-Lily, Water-Queen, Water-Nymph, Beaver-Root, Alligator-Bonnet, Cow-Cabbage, and Fairy-Boats. The 5” to 12” leaves are round or heart-shaped, deeply notched, toothless. Twenty to thirty pointed white petals form a double flower with a yellow center.*

Related species include:

Fragrant White Water Lily (*Nymphaea odorata*) is most commonly found in northern Minnesota. Flowers are scented and tinged pink; and leaves are purplish underneath.

Small White Water Lily (*Nymphaea tetragona*) has flowers that are only half as large as the Common White Water Lily. Small White Water Lily grows in far northern Minnesota.

Henry David Thoreau supplies these final words: “The *Nymphaea odorata*, Water Nymph, Sweet Water Lily, Pond-Lily, in bloom. A superb flower, our Lotus Queen of the waters. How sweet, innocent, wholesome its fragrance. How pure its white petals, though its root is in the mud!”³

Isaac Zuckerman, Area 2


