



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

### Dennis Spears to Record Live Performance CD

The Capri Theater's "Legends" series marks another first with "Down on Broadway," two live performances on April 17 and 18 that will be recorded for CD release. Dennis Spears, the artistic director of the Legends series, headlines the show, with Sanford Moore on piano, Jay Young on bass, Daryl Boudreaux on percussion and Steven Jennings on drums. The song list will include hits from Funny Girl, Showboat, The Wiz, and--yes!--Rocky Horror Picture Show. The concert begins at 7 p.m. on Saturday, April 17 and 3 p.m. on Sunday, April 18. Tickets are \$25 for the evening show and \$20 for the matinee. They can be ordered online at thecapritheater.org, or by calling OvationTix at 866-811-4111.

The live recording fulfills the idea that came to Dennis Spears during the dress rehearsal for the first concert he directed at the theater three years ago, "Classic Capri," which led

to the creation of the Legends series. "I have to do a recording in this space!" Spears notes, "From day one I realized that the Capri is acoustically a performer's dream."

Spears says the theme for the performance comes from his feeling that the Capri Theater location on West Broadway is, like its Manhattan namesake, "this big, beautiful space bursting with gifts." Using the concert as the basis for his first CD in six years is also a natural. "I like the spontaneity of a live recording," Spears says. "I?m a live performer. I?ll be pushing the audience to push me."

"Down on Broadway" is the fourth of this season's five-part "Legends" series. Tickets for the last three shows sold out. "Our little baby is growing up," says Spears. The final concert, The Great American Songbook, featuring Debbie Duncan with her original trio, will be Friday, June 4 at 7 p.m.

### Bryn Mawr Neighbor to be New Principal at Ramsey International Fine Arts School

In addition to teaching, Sharon's arts experiences include accompanying various choirs; directing adult church choirs; serving as a church organist; composing, arranging and producing youth musicals and performing as a soprano vocalist in groups such as a festival chorus.

Sharon's strong fine arts background and skills as a positive instructional leader who gets results make her an excellent choice for Ramsey International Fine Arts School.



#### More on South Wirth Trails

n the February Bugle's Parks column, Dick Adair, area 6 resident and BMNA representative to the Park Board Lake District Council, wrote a wonderful and wide-ranging piece about Wirth Park with some historical background and extensive descriptions of the many fine features that endear this vast park to many in the Bryn Mawr community. As Board president of the Friends of the Wild flower Garden, I am writing to commend his appreciative commentary and to add some additional information about South Wirth, the Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden and Bird Sanctuary, its buffer zone and the ski racing trail known as the Loppet.

In his account Dick refers to an agreement regarding South Wirth trails between the Park Board, BMNA, the Nordic Ski Foundation and the Friends. For the record, there were a series of meetings related to South Wirth usage and trails in 2005-6 facilitated by MPRB Planning staff, and there were 2 additional participant groups, the Minneapolis Audubon Society and the Minneapolis Off-Road Cycling Association, who had originally proposed a biking trail in the South Wirth area.

The majority of the parties to this process were strongly in support of maintaining South Wirth as a nature preserve area, where light recreational use, such as snowshoeing and traditional cross country skiing in the winter months by individuals and small groups, would be appropriate, while ski racing on wide, machinegroomed trails would not. Major concerns were access for the 'low intensity users' and loss of valuable habitat for the established bird, raptor, owl and small mammal species in the area. However, the Loppet was already present in South Wirth with a strong following and a popular presence, and the idea of moving the racing trail away from the Garden and out of its buffer zone became the best possible compromise. In the spring of 2007 MPRB staff presented their recommendations to the Commissioners incorporating the

community process and their own research. A schematic design for South Wirth trail improvements that specified moving the Loppet, closing renegade paths, removing invasive plants and correcting erosion was the focus of the plan. The MPRB officially approved these recommendations on May 16, 2007 and instructed staff to undertake these actions, including moving the Loppet trail away from the northeastern boundary of the Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden and Bird Sanctuary. No targeted funding was authorized, however, and this part of the trail improvement plan has yet to be accomplished.

Presently, there is some action on this commitment, and while the process has been slow and frustrating, MPRB administrative staff and key leadership at the Nordic Ski Foundation are in support of fulfilling the 2007 decision. It is possible that Lessard-Sams Legacy funds for South Wirth restoration will play a part in meeting this goal.

I hope this addendum is helpful both as background and update. The Friends welcome your comments and input, and we can also provide more detail on all of the above, if desired.

### **Garage Sale for a Cause**

Live at 244 Thomas Av S. I'm excited to join a group of adventurous trekkers to hike the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu in Peru this August. It will be a 4 day, 43 mile trek on the actual stone path built by the Incas over 600 years ago.

The trek will benefit Smile Network's medical mission to Cusco, Peru which I am honored to take part in after the trek. Smile Network was founded by my sister-inlaw, Kim Valentini. It is a non-profit humanitarian organization that performs surgeries on children that were born with the debilitating birth defect of a cleft lip or cleft palate. This is one of those rare charities where virtually everyone connected to it is a volunteer. The doctors, nurses and non-medical people volunteer their time to make this happen.

Please know that I will be paying all of my own expenses on this trip but every penny I raise will go to the Cusco Mission where over 150 children will receive life-altering surgeries. ### **Home Tour FAQ**

What is the home tour? The Minneapolis and Saint Paul Home Tour is an annual event that promotes city living. The tour brings thousands of home enthusiasts together for a weekend of sharing home remodeling ideas. The Minneapolis Neighborhood Revitalization Program (NRP) sponsors the home tour in cooperation with the Planning and Economic Development departments of both cities, local financial institutions, developers, contractors and other businesses. The home tour's most important partners, of course, are the homeowners who volunteer to open their homes.

tractors are present, so are the homeowners. Projects range from small to large and cover a wide range of housing eras, where other tours show just luxury or historic homes. It is not limited to specific neighborhoods (other than that they are all within the city limits of Minneapolis or Saint Paul), though there are some geographic clusters of homes. And it's just one 11-hour weekend...not to be missed!

### When is the home tour?

Homes will be open to visitors from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 24, 2010, and from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, April 25, 2010. The home tour will take place regardless of weather conditions.

### What kinds of homes are featured on the tour?

The tour features a variety of homes in neighborhoods throughout Minneapolis and Saint Paul. Homes on the tour are chosen to reflect the quality and variety of city housing. By popular demand, the focus is on remodeling and expanding of existing, occupied homes...from a single room such as a kitchen or bath, to a multi-story addition or entire home renovation. Any new homes selected are examples of energy-efficient or green construction.

### How does the home tour work?

The home tour is a free, self-guided event. The home tour Guide (a tabloid-newspaper-sized publication), which includes a description of each home and maps showing home locations, is made available through various public locations in the month before the tour, and at the homes themselves on tour days. Visitors can tour as many or as few of the homes as they wish. Multiple visits are encouraged so visitors can get a feel for the diversity of the housing stock and neighborhoods. Each home on the tour is identified with a home tour street sign and signs from major intersections. In most cases, homeowners greet visitors. Visitors can also speak informally with experts about home buying, remodeling and other topics.

### **Adventures in Remodeling**

I f you remodel a house built over eighty years ago you'll probably find some surprises. Sometimes the surprise is a vivid (read hideous) paint color. (Our living room was once baby blue, our kitchen was once bright parrot yellow. No lie.) I've also heard tales of drywall ripped open to reveal money, live bats, and fire damage.

In the case of Area four's Janis and Jason Lajon, their 1922 bungalow yielded surprises such as old 1920s magazines, a blocked off living room closet complete with hangers, an unpaid bill for three dollars from the Minneapolis Electric Company, and an armadillo shell.

Since they moved in January of 2002, the Lajons have been improving their two-bedroom bungalow. The roof was redone; no more curling shingles and sagging areas! A badly constructed addition on the back of the house was demolished and yards of pink shag carpeting were yanked. A 1970s Harvest Gold toilet and multiple layers of linoleum and wallpaper were removed from the bathroom. The Lajons recently finished the living/dining/kitchen/bedrooms and bathroom, and let me tell you, it is beautiful. The oak and maple floors gleam. New cabinets brighten the kitchen. There

is no trace of the textured paint that once covered the ceilings and baseboards. When planning the remodel, Janis and Jason wisely tried to stay true to the era of the house. The majority of the house is It's now back to its original lay-out.

I think Janis and Jason generated some good karma when they restored their house to its original state. That would explain the map they found in a local antique store. While browsing through a stack of maps, the Lajons found a 1914 hand-colored map of the Bryn Mawr neighborhood. Their lot is on the map, but the address was one digit off from what it is today: another surprise!

The 1922 City of Minneapolis building permit and address labels on the magazines in the attic confirm the alternate address. The map also shows barns (quite a few of them) and homes (not so many of them). It is framed and hangs in the living room.

A lot of effort and planning went into the Lajon home. It looks great. It feels clean and happy. I'm glad for the Lajons that it is done, because now they can concentrate on their next surprise-filled adventure: parenthood. :)

### Revised meeting schedule for Wirth Park Citizen Advisory Committee

### The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board to begin planning additional beach and picnic area improvements at Theodore Wirth Park

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board's (MPRB) Citizen Advisory Committee for the Phase III improvements to the lake area at Theodore Wirth Park met for the first time Thursday, March 25. The group was introduced to the park and the citizen advisory process, and discussed the various issues and opportunities related to the site.

The committee also made changes to the previously published meeting schedule.

The April 1 meeting will be a site visit at Theodore Wirth Park. An additional meeting has been added to the schedule on April 15. As with all the CAC meetings, both these meetings will be open to the public. Those attending the site visit on April 1 will meet in the Wirth Lake parking lot at 6:30 p.m. to tour the park. The April 15 meeting will be held in the board room of the MPRB headquarters building, 2117 West River Road from 6:30 to 8:30.

Visitors to Theodore Wirth Park can look forward to enhanced recreational offerings in coming months as part of the continued revitalization of one of the Twin Cities' premier regional parks. From innovative play features to trail connections, the enhancements will add to the outstanding amenities that have made the park a popular recreation destination.

Phase III of the park's revitalization will focus on the Wirth Lake beach and picnic area located in the center of the 760-acre park. To assist the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) plan the improvements, a Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) has been established to get ideas from the park's neighbors and users.

Phase III planning will update the 1980 Wirth Park Master Plan, envisioning facilities that will encourage family and group use, support youth programming, and invite park users to connect with the natural resources of the greater park. A revitalized picnic area with state-of-theart facilities, innovative play features, water-based recreational activities, and trail connections are some of the components that will be included in the plan.

Plans will encompass the areas surrounding Wirth Lake and bounded by Theodore Wirth Parkway on the west, Highway 55 on the north, the railroad tracks on the east, and the picnic pavilion area on the south. (The picnic pavilion will not be included in the scope of this planning effort.)

Phase I Wirth improvements were completed in 2005 and included a beach house and utility replacement. Phase II, currently underway, includes a new playground, fourcourt sand volleyball, a half basketball court, new trails, sidewalks, site furniture, shade shelters, plantings and themed play areas.

In its commitment to the 2007-2020 Comprehensive Plan goal to focus on northside parks, the MPRB has continued to seek funding for Theodore Wirth Park improvements. In 2009, funding in the amount of \$2.19 million was awarded for the continued development of Theodore Wirth Park. This funding was made possible through bond funding from the Metropolitan Council as well as through the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment passed by Minnesota voters in 2008. The amendment increased the general sales and use tax rate by three-eighths percent, and 14.25 % of the revenue generated by this increased sales tax is dedicated to the Parks and Trails Fund to support parks and trails of regional significance. The MPRB will continue to seek additional funding for Wirth beach improvements from the Parks and Trails Fund, as well as bond funding from the Metropolitan Council this year and in 2012.

### View From the Bridge

Freshwater Mussels April 2010

hen this column began in October 2003, the name "View From the Bridge" was selected because of the neighborhood bridges from which nature could be viewed — particularly the Bassett Creek Park area of restoration that Bryn Mawr Neighborhood has committed time and resources for many years. This month, the column focuses on a life form found in waterways like those which are part of the annual Earth Day Cleanup - this year scheduled for Saturday, April 17, 2010. This cleanup precedes the fortieth anniversary of Earth Day, April 22, 2010.

Bassett Creek and the river into which it flows, the mighty Mississippi River, are home to freshwater mussels. April is an appropriate time to study mussels not only because of Earth Day but also because open water begins showing on lakes and rivers in early spring; and open water means boating! And, boating means that it's time to be on the lookout for invasive species like Zebra Mussels!

Forty-eight different species are native to Minnesota. In addition, two non-native mussel species, including the Zebra Mussels, live and breed in Minnesota. Zebra Mussels were transported from the Caspian Sea of Eastern Europe to the Great Lakes in ballast water of ships.

Mussels may live for decades and even over one hundred years! Freshwater mussels are relatives of snails and slugs. Creeks and rivers offer more varied conditions than lakes. Consequently creeks and rivers typically harbor a more diverse collection of mussel species.

The reproductive cycle of mussels is quite complicated. Male mussels release sperm into water. The sperm then fertilize the eggs which mature into small larvae within the female mussel's gills. The larvae are then expelled into the water where they complete their next stage of development as parasites on a host fish. To attract fish near oneself to provide a host fish, the female mussel may employ decoy extensions and behaviors that resemble prey fish. Not only are some female mussels endowed by this camouflage, but they may actively operate these extensions to better resemble a prey fish. Once mature, the larvae fall off their host fish and hold themselves within the sediment at the waterway. Often mussels are only seen as the shells remaining on the edges of waterways... Mussels have two shells bound together by a hinge. Identification of mussels relies on the use of a field guide, like the




Field Guide to Freshwater Mussels of Minnesota, by Bernard E Sietman. Clues to mussel identification include shell shape, texture, color, size, as well as the type of waterway and geographic region where the mussel was found. Names are fairly descriptive and often amusing: Heelsplitter, Wartyback, Elephantear, Pigtoe, Washboard, Pistolgrip, Mapleleaf, Pimpleback, Monkeyface, Fragile Papershell, Mussel shells are typically rough and ridged on the outside and smooth and shiny on the inside. Radial rays may be layered over growth ridges. The exterior of the shell may be black, brown, purplish-brown, yellowbrown, or greenish-brown. The interior of mussel shells may be shiny white, pink, purple, orange, or a combination. Size ranges from ?" long (Fingernail Clams or Pea Clams) to 8" long.

Though mussels typically live in a stationary position, they can move themselves by using their "foot" to pull itself across the bottom of a water body.

Mussels play an important role in ecosystems. By eating micro-organisms and other organic material out of water, mussels can help to clarify the water. Their digestive system consists of a siphon to draw in water, gills to remove food and oxygen, and another siphon to expel water. Besides filtering water, mussels contribute to the ecosystem by serving as food for muskrats, raccoons, and several fish. Mussel shells remain to stabilize river bottoms and to serve as egg laying sites for other animals.

Humans have used mussel shells for tools, as sites from which to harvest natural pearls, and as source material to make pearl buttons. "After the Minnesota Territory was opened to settlement in 1849, Lake Pepin saw a brisk commercial traffic generated by lumbering and agriculture. Huge rafts of logs, some 1,200 feet long and 300 feet wide, were towed down the river. Steamboats brought in thousands of new settlers and carried out the wheat and flour produced on the rich land. The lake itself provided resources for commercial fishermen and for clammers, who sold the clam shells to be used in button making."1



way construction; as well as leaves and grass clippings on streets or sand used to improve winter traction. In a rare act of serendipity, sedimentation has helped to bury some of the pollutants that once flowed from the Twin Cities, including vast raw sewage sludge deposited before and even after the formation of the sewage treatment plants in the metropolitan area.

With female Zebra Mussels producing 100,000 to 500,000 eggs per year, Zebra Mussels threaten native mussels. Because they reproduce many times more quickly than native mussels, Zebra Mussels can literally cover the bottom of waterways as well as the shells of native mussels. Hairlike fibers extending out from the shell opening anchor Zebra Mussels to native mussels, waterway bottoms, and to boats and docks. Zebra Mussels grow up to 2" long. Their shell is marked by distinctive dark stripes on a field of mussels or other non-native invasive species being transported from an infested lake to a non-infested lake.

### The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds boaters to...

- Remove visible zebra mussels and aquatic plants and drain water before transporting boats and equipment from one water body to another.
- Report suspected new infestations to the MN DNR (651/259-5100).

Also coming in April is the opening of Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden. Free naturalist programs are offered on Saturdays and Sundays at 1 PM and 3 PM. Birding walks are offered Saturday mornings forming at 9:30 AM in the parking lot of the garden. Some weekday programs are offered as well. Opening day is planned for April 3, 2010. Visit www.minneapolisparks.org or call 612-370-4903 to learn more.

Mussels suffer greatly from waterway pollution and sedimentation from dam impoundments. In the past, overharvesting of mussels was a source of their decline.

Examples of sedimentation and pollution abound in the various pools impounded by man-made dams on the Mississippi River. Even a natural dam such as the one that forms Lake Pepin may lead to some sedimentation. Sediment settles from the slowing river. This sediment originates as soil erosion from cropland or building and highcream or light brown.

Zebra Mussels are present in many waterways in Minnesota from Lake Superior and the rest of the Great Lakes to the Mississippi River from the mouth of the Pine River in Crow Wing County to the Minnesota Iowa River. In the St. Croix River, the High Bridge and the St. Croix Boomsite Recreation Area mount the north-south division between infestation and virgin waters. For this reason, the DNR prohibits upstream boat travel on the St. Croix north of this point. Recently, discussions between the DNR and lake home owners are considering the possibility of not adding public boat landings where none currently exist. The reason is to reduce the likelihood of zebra

### **City of Minneapolis Receives** National Award of Excellence for Sustainable Community **Development for Ripley Gardens Redevelopment represents historic** preservation, affordable housing, and sustainable construction

n December 16, the Home Depot® Foundation recognized the City of Minneapolis and their nonprofit partner Aeon with the Award of Excellence for Sustainable Community Development for Ripley Gardens, located at 301 Penn Avenue N. This national award recognizes the City's and Aeon's thoughtful construction of green affordable housing to create a sustainable community. The site, a former maternity hospital built in the early 1900s in honor of Dr. Martha Ripley, was redeveloped to address the City's financial, social and environmental community issues through thoughtful design, land use, and building. The development preserved three historic structures and constructed three new buildings, creating 52 rental units with a range of affordability and 8 for-sale townhomes. Ripley Gardens' green building strategies revitalized a prominent corner that stood vacant and boarded for several years.

"Ripley Gardens illustrates that there's a direct relationship between community/social change and the physical environment around us. Building green affordable homes has a positive impact on our community - both now and for generations to come," said Alan Arthur, president of Aeon. "Ripley Gardens strengthens the lives of its residents, and is an asset to the broader community."

Minneapolis and Aeon's Ripley Gardens development was selected based on a number of criteria, including resource conservation, resident/pedestrian connectivity, environmental sustainability and green infrastructure, as well as how well the needs of the local community were met while maintaining affordability for the residents.

"We are excited to recognize the city of Minneapolis and Aeon for their outstanding work and hope that their public-private partnership will serve as an example to others working to find long-term solutions to the issues facing our cities."


### **Volunteers Needed to Study Flora and Fauna**

ave you ever experienced the living wonder of a wetland? Have you wanted to wade in, get your hands wet, and discover the plants and animals that live there? If so, Hennepin County and its cities have a unique volunteer opportunity - the Wetland Health Evaluation Program (WHEP).

Adult volunteers - who do not need a science background or previous experience - work under the direction of a team leader and receive training on wetland monitoring protocols,

including both plant and insect identification. They wade through wetlands to collect and identify dragonflies, snails, cattails and more. The total time commitment is 20 to 40 hours throughout the months of May, June and July. All equipment is provided. Participating cities use the collected data to help determine the health of water resources and assist with natural resource management. 




