The Future Is Bright! Community Solar Power Program Announced

ver thought solar power was too expensive or not practical for use in Minnesota? Think again! Federal Income Tax Credits, Minnesota State Rebates, Excel Energy Rebates, and now a grant from the BMNA have greatly reduced the out-ofpocket cost as well as the pay-back period for solar panel systems! The BMNA and NRP are excited to announce that grants in the range of \$1000-\$3000 will be available to property owners for the purchase or lease of a solar panel system. This is a pilot program that is placing

as a leader in community-based solar energy. Our project goal and timeline is to install 20 solar panel systems by October of 2010. The power can be connected to your electrical system or you can choose to install a solar powered hot water heater. There are no income limits and only one grant is allowed per proper-

ty. Eligible properties include single family houses, businesses, owner-occupied multi-unit homes, condos, and town homes. To help answer additional questions the BMNA is coordinating a workshop for community members to learn about solar energy and panel technology.

The Community Solar Power Program workshop event is planned for June 16th at 7:00 PM in the cafeteria at the Bryn Mawr Elementary School (252 Upton Ave S). The event will provide an opportunity for neighbors to meet with solar panel contractors. You will learn about some of the factors used in solar power calculations such as roof slope, roof orientation, shading, age of roof and mechanical systems and solar radiance. Information about system sizes and costs will be available. Some of the contractors will provide a free home assessment. **If interested you should"**

1. Attend the workshop June 16th at 7:00 PM at the Bryn Mawr Elementary School Cafeteria.

2. Call any solar panel contractor to schedule an appointment for a technical home assessment. Contractor lists can be found at www.eere.energy.gov or www.solar-estimate.org and several local experienced contractors will be at the workshop.

3. Review the proposed Project Guidelines (see article on page 8-9) for more information. Start to learn about solar panel technology, contractor licensing, rebate and tax credit benefits by visiting www.energy.gov and www.seia.org.

4. Fill out an application at the workshop or download a copy from www.bmna.org starting June 16th, 2010. The application deadline for the lottery of the first round of applicants is July 10th, 2010. Guidelines allow for applications to be accepted and placed on a waiting list if received after July 1

Bryn Mawr NRP Plan Modification:

-Today, May 12, 2010 the BMNA Board and neighborhood residents at BMNA's annual meeting will vote to reallocate \$35,550.00 from Affordable, Senior, Multi-Unit Housing Planning/Education (Phase II Housing 10.1.2, page 10) to Improve Neighborhood Environment (Phase II Environment 16.1.1, page 16). This modification will enable BMNA to institute our Community Solar Program, which is aimed at increasing the quantity, accessibility to, and quality of solar energy projects in our neighborhood. Specifically, the program will provide neighborhood grants to property owners who install solar panels on their homes or businesses. More details on this program will become available to residents in June, 2010. This proposed modification was discussed at the April BMNA meeting and again at a special meeting held on May 6, 2010. Currently the Bryn Mawr Community Solar Program has the unanimous support of the BMNA.







White and the changes in Minneapolis Public Schools for next fall, I imagine there are a lot of people saying "It's the end of an era." This evening is the Park View Spring Fling. It includes a celebration of the school's past as it prepares to close at the end of the school year.

I do not know the whole history of Park View Montessori, but I know it was moved to the Bryn Mawr schools campus six years ago as part of a cost-saving effort by the district. Before the move they were a very successful and popular school with a long waiting list.

Unfortunately, the northside families who supported the school did not follow them to their new address and enrollment declined. Despite the beautiful location and stable, dedicated staff, they could not overcome the loss of committed families and high student turnover rates are not good for any school.

Now, another round of budget cuts and district restructuring have led to the decision to end the Park View Montessori era. It is terribly sad because I know how hard they have worked and how much they care about students. Thank you Park View, for everything you did for the children of Minneapolis.

Bryn Mawr Community School and Anwatin Middle School will go on and even grow next year. In fact, our youngest child will be making the transition from the local elementary to middle school. This is a huge right of passage for us.

She is the third of our children to have the amazing Bryn Mawr School experience. This school has meant so much to our family and now I am having a hard time accepting that in seven days we will no longer have a student there.


I was pregnant with this very child when I first started working at the school as a family involvement specialist and now, that too is coming to an end. For thirteen years I have had the privilege to work with and on behalf of some of the best teachers and most amazing parents in the world. I will miss it so much.

But, when one thing ends, another often begins. I will still be the family involvement specialist at Anwatin next year. I will be part of the team adding an International Baccalaureate middle grades program for students coming from dual Spanish immersion elementaries. I will also be part of a team bringing French Immersion to north Minneapolis.

Hopefully, both of these programs will help energize the district and keep families in the city. Maybe we can end the era of budget cuts and closing schools and invest in our children and the future.




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Bryn Mawr Church Building Addition and Renovation

ryn Mawr Church plans to break ground in early July on an addition and renovation project to make the building more accessible. The roughly 1,000 sq. ft. addition will house an elevator, a new stair case and two additional meeting rooms.

Changes to the first floor include a more spacious greeting area, removing the walls in the current meeting room so that it can be used for fellowship and making both first floor restrooms fully accessible. Educational space on the lower level will be renovated and includes a new nursery, two classrooms and two fully accessible restrooms.

For years the church has limited all church dinners and activities in the lower level fellowship room because it was not accessible to people who couldn't climb stairs, so

the addition of an elevator will help the congregation live out its mission to be fully inclusive. The congrega-


tion has also outgrown the limited space in the parlor which is the gathering spot for coffee and conversation after worship. A

more inviting greeting space and fellowship area will provide for the kind of welcome and hospitality the church wants to extend to all who walk through the door whether for worship, choir, lessons, A.A. or a meeting of the BMNA.

The church hopes this building project will benefit the community as well as the congregation. BMPC hopes to minimize any disruption to neighborhood residents during construction and, while access to the building may be limited during the week will continue to worship at 10:30 on Sunday mornings. These materials include: compact fluorescent light bulbs, a programmable thermostat, low-flow showerheads, gasket seals, safety caps, pipe wrap and more. Homeowners will receive this \$400 package for a copay of only \$30, however the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association will cover the co-pay for the first 100 homeowners who sign up, giving you a \$400 value for FREE!

Homeowners are also provided with 12 months of energy tracking. This unique feedback allows you to compare your energy use to others, see how much energy your home is saving and how much more you can stand to save. Participants are also given information on financing, incentives, tax credits and access to rebates available to only participants of Community Energy Services.

The Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association has teamed up with the Center for Energy and Environment, CenterPoint Energy and Xcel Energy to offer homeowners this comprehensive program. Funding for this project was provided by the Minnesota Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund.

Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Street Resurfacing to Begin in June

Letter (below) delivered to affected neighbors

June 1, 2010

Starting the week of June 7, construction work on Phase 1 is scheduled to resurface many of the streets in your neighborhood. The project boundaries are show on this attached letter. The work in phase 1 will be substantially completed in four weeks, and it will extend the life of the street by many years. We are coordinating our work for phase 2 with Minneapolis Water and Centerpoint and their schedules. Currently, they are expecting to finish their work in September.

The work will consist of milling (removing a portion of the existing asphalt pavement surface) and placing a new surface over the entire street. The actual work in front of your home will take one day to do the milling and a second day to install the new pavement. The two operations may not occur back to back, but they should occur within two weeks of each other. the project, the street will be posted NO PARKING in front of your home or business. This is necessary to complete our construction activities. During these times we ask that you bear with us and park somewhere else. To get the work done, we will have to tow any vehicles to the City of Minneapolis Impound Lot if they are parked on the street where the NO PARKING signs are posted.

Our construction activities may cause you some inconvenience, but we hope that you will be patient and understanding as the work progresses. For our part, we will do our best to keep these inconveniences at a minimum. If you have any questions or concerns about this improvement project, please call Tracy Lindgren at (612) 290-5898. Bryn Mawr Community Solar Program

Proposed Program Guidelines Program Overview:

This program is designed to increase the quantity, accessibility to, and quality of solar energy projects in the Bryn Mawr neighborhood, specifically solar photovoltaic (electric) panels and solar thermal water heat systems. It gives property owners a choice between leasing or purchasing.

Eligible Applicants:

Anyone owning a residential or commercial property within the Bryn Mawr neighborhood. More than one grant can be received if an owner owns more than one residential or commercial property, but only one grant will be provided for each property. If a lottery is required, however, only one grant per property owner will be allowed in the initial round of funding. Renters within a residential or commercial property within the Bryn Mawr neighborhood may participate in this program only with the cooperation of the property owner. There is no property owner income

limit for participation in this program. Grants will not be awarded for projects started before Commitment Letters are sent. (See "Application Process"). Multiple Participation: Properties that receive (or have received) assistance through any Bryn Mawr NRP Home Improvement Program or Commercial Improvement Matching Grant program may participate in this program.

Eligible Properties:

Properties must be located in the Bryn Mawr neighborhood. The properties can be either owner-occupied or absentee-owned. Condominium or townhome associations shall be eligible to participate in this program. At least \$23,000 of the total funds available must go to residential projects.

Eligible Projects:

To be eligible for a grant, solar electric projects must be at least 2 KW in size and provide for "net metering". Smaller projects may be considered on a case-by-case basis. Solar thermal projects for water heaters qualify for this program.

Work by Owner:

All work must be performed by a licensed contractor.

City Permits:

All applicable permits must be obtained by the contractor.

Grant Amount:

The grant amount shall be dependent on whether the property owner leases or purchases the solar systems, and with purchasing a distinction is made between solar electric and solar thermal.

- For leases: the grant will cover installation fees, not to exceed \$1,000.
- For purchasers of solar electric the grant will be \$3,000 or 25% of the project cost, whichever is less.
- For purchasers of solar thermal the grant will be \$2,000 or 25% of the project cost, whichever is less.

Application Process:

The Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA) will host a "solar open house" to introduce this program and provide an opportunity for questions and answers.

BMNA will set an initial application deadline, and will begin accepting applications after the open house. If more applications are received than can be funded, BMNA will conduct a lottery to select grantees. If a lottery is necessary a member of NRP will

be present to facilitate the lottery procedure. After the initial deadline, applications will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis until all funds are committed. Members of the BMNA Board of Directors may apply for these grants at the same time as other residents.

All applications must be submitted to BMNA, which will serve as the Program Administrator. The application will include a description of the proposed project, a statement of whether the property owner will be leasing or purchasing the panels, and the name of the proposed vendor for the project.

Property owners will be notified by BMNA within 30 days of receipt of their application if their application has been accepted, if they are on a waiting list for this program, or if all program funds have been used. Applicants accepted for the program will receive a "Commitment Letter" from BMNA.

Work Completion:

Weather permitting, all project components must be installed within 120 calendar days of the date of the Commitment Letter. BMNA can make exceptions to this on a caseby-case basis.

Reimbursement Process:

Reimbursement to the property owner will be made upon completion of work and the owner's payment to the vendor. The following items must be received by BMNA prior to disbursement and within 180 days of the date of the Commitment Letter:





Heath Family Flowers and Berries June 2010

ate May 2009 finds me paddling slowly on Cherokee Creek, traveling to Cherokee Lake, north of the Sawbill Trail entry to the Boundary Waters Canoe Wilderness. Just beyond the water's edge dotted with clumps of Pitcher's Plants are mats of low growing shrubs. Little green leaves and drooping flowers hang from these shrubs that remind me of plants growing in Raspberry Island bog at Isle Royale. Many of these shrubs are Heaths. Health family members are low growing shrubs that grow in bogs, shorelines of waterways, moist to dry forests, and rocky soils of Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Canada.

Heaths (Ericacaceae family) survive and thrive in mineral poor soils and acidic conditions. Leathery evergreen leaves reduce energy loss that accompanies the production of new leaves during a short growing season. Waxy or wooly qualities of the leaves conserve water loss during both cold winters and hot summers.

To identify specific Heath species, look at both sides of the leaves the tops and bottoms of leaves, as well as flowers or berries that may be present. Examine the flowers or berries, but not just their size and appearance but also their arrangement on these small plants. Do the flowers or berries drop in rows or do they appear in upright clusters at the ends of flower stems? Do the flowers appear to be blooming simultaneously or is there a pattern to the order of blooming? When do the flowers and berries appear? Where are the plants growing along waterways, in bogs, or on drier uplands?

The pattern that specific Heath species bloom at different times is an important aspect of their role in the ecosystem. Most Heath plants bloom from late May to June though Wintergreen blooms in late July or even early August. Plants bloom in a specific annual order to aid their pollination. In this way, pollinating insects will visit plants of one species at a time, delivering the correct pollen to the correct flower. In return, successive blooms furnish food to these insects over a wide period of time. In turn, insects provide food to various nesting birds over the development of their baby birds which will benefit from this meal. Though a bird's usual diet throughout the year may consist of seeds and berries, insects offer greater energy than plant sources for their rapidly developing brood.




on top and brown on their undersides. Flowers hang down in a row below leaves on an upright or drooping stem. Five white sepals of flowers are fused into a tiny bell. Flowers bloom from mid-May though early June – around May 10 through June 14 according to Mark "Sparky" Stensaas.

Bog Rosemary (Andromeda glaucophylla) under 20" tall

Bog Rosemary blooms from around May 20 through June 10 according to Mark "Sparky" Stensaas. This small shrub grows in bogs and swamps and sometimes on edges of rocky pools. Narrow evergreen leaves have rolled edges, and whitish green undersides. These rolled edges visually narrow the 1" to 2" long leaves leading to their resemblance with the herb Rosemary. The blue-green color of the top sides its leaves distinguish the plant from other common bog plants, Leatherleaf, Bog Laurel, and Labrador Tea. Nodding urnshaped pink blooms are borne at the ends of stems like Bog Laurel, though Bog Rosemary blooms are much less conspicuous.

Bearberry (Arctostaphylos uva-ursi) 6" tall x 3' wide and spreading

Bearberry or Kinnikinnick (its Native American name) has a botanical name that describes one of the animals for whom its berries serve as food. Arctostaphylos is Greek for "bear-grape"; uva-ursi is Latin for "bear-grape". Brilliant red fruits appear in August and remain edible all winter. But to humans, its red berries do not resemble grapes, but instead are mealy and tasteless. Native Americans used Kinnikinnick as tobacco, mixing dried leaves of Bearberry with the inner bark of dogwood and smoking it in pipes. Besides the Algonquin "Kinnikinnick" and the transliterated "Beargrape", Bearberry is also known by the names rock berry and upland cranberry. Bearberry grows in sandy rocky areas in cool, open woodlands, along elevated shorelines or well-drained forest and trail edges that receive sufficient sun. The mall leaves are beaver-tailshaped, thick, glossy, but green instead of brown. Pinkish drooping urn-shaped flowers bloom during the last two weeks of May.



United States. Brewing Labrador Tea leaves yields a weak and bitter tea that should be drunk only in moderation, if at all. Consumed in excess, a toxin in the plant can cause headaches, cramps and vomiting. One must examine carefully to note that the leathery leaves are fuzzy underneath – because the margins of leaves are rolled under.

Bog Laurel or Swamp Laurel (Kalmia polifolia) under 28" tall

Bog Laurel blooms around May 25 through June 15 according to Mark "Sparky" Stensaas.

Leaf blades are under 1-1/2" long. Narrow leathery leaves are dark green above and whitish-green below. The opposite arrangement of its leaves distinguish it from alternate-leaved Heath family members like Bog Rosemary, Labrador Tea and Bog Leatherleaf. Flowers resemble the Mountain Laurel commonly found in Pennsylvania. Stands of flowering Bog Laurel become a sea of pink blossoms. Pink saucer-shaped flowers bloom red berry, 1/4" to 1/2" long is edible.

Creeping Snowberry (Gaultheria hispidula) under 6" tall

Tiny Creeping Snowberry hugs the ground in tight mats under pine, spruce, and cedar trees. Tiny, 1/4" leaves alternately edge its creeping stems. One often misses the tiny flowers (blooming in the last half of May) since they are partially hidden amongst leaves and stems. Ripening in September, its white berries are much more noticeable for their size -1/3" inch in diameter, and for their porcelain white color – "white as snow". Berries are edible; and are distinctly wintergreen flavored. Steeping leaves in boiling water for several hours yields a refreshing tea. Like Wintergreen, Creeping Snowberry contains an aspirin-like compound, methyl salicylate, and should be avoided by those sensitive to aspirin.

Leatherleaf (Chamaedaphne calyculata) 2' to 4' tall

Leatherleaf is a very abundant shrub. Its evergreen leaves are paddle shaped, and are alternately borne on stems. Leaves are green

Labrador Tea (Ledum groenlandicum) 1' to 3' tall

Leathery, 1" to 2" long leaves have furry wooly undersides. Flowers are 3/8" to 1/2" wide with five white petals. Flowers are borne in dense clusters at ends of stems in groups of twenty-four to thirty-two flowers per stem. Labrador Tea flowers in late May to June (around June 1 through June 25 according to Mark "Sparky" Stensaas. Labrador Tea grows from Labrador, Canada (its namesake) west across northern on the ends of plant stems.

Though these last two woody shrubs may be mistaken as Heaths, Wintergreen and Creeping Snowberry are not True Heaths.

Wintergreen (Gaultheria procumbens) 3" to 5" tall

Thought of as a wildflower, the woody stem of Wintergreen or Teaberry means that officially it is a tiny shrub. Tiny shiny, leathery leaves are 1" to 2" long, oval with a slight point. Crushed leaves and berries offer a wintergreen fragrance; and were once used to flavor candies and medicines (now these are artificially flavored). Original Tea Party members (of the Boston boycott of British tea) used, as a substitute, tea from the leaves of Wintergreen. 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

Schools Committee Update

The BMNA School Committee met on Thursday, May 27, with school board member Pam Costain to discuss school board priorities and the challenges facing the district in the years ahead. A summary of that conversation will appear in the July Bugle.

Committee members also reviewed the November school board election process. The school board will go from seven to nine members by 2012. Three members will be elected at-large, 6 will be elected based on the geographic areas aligned with Park Board election districts. Bryn Mawr is in Park Board election district 4. In November, 2010, two school board members will be elected at-large and three will be elected from Park Board election districts 1, 3, and 5. The Bryn Mawr community will be able to vote for the 2 at-large candidates in the November election. At this date, nine candidates are running for the two at-large seats; Chanda Smith Baker, David DeGrio, Rebecca Gagnon, Shirlynn

LaChapelle, Richard Mammen, Mohamud Noor, Marika Pfefferkorn, Dick Velner, and T. Williams. Each has their own website that the curious can access. More information about the candidates and their positions will follow.

The committee also discussed the district plans to move the TAPPP child care program into the Park View Montessori. classrooms (see letter below.)

IMPORTANT UPDATE FROM CSO

Current Southwest High School students who live in attendance area 1D, Bryn Mawr and Harrison, will receive transportation next year, 2010-11. These students will NOT be eligible for the Go To Cards program. They will continue to have Minneapolis Public Schools bus transportation from the neighborhood to the school and back home. District Announces Plan for Classrooms Left Vacant After Park View Closure

The following letter was sent home to parents of students at the neighborhood schools.

Dear Families of Anwatin, Bryn Mawr, Emerson and Windom,

We are committed to keeping you informed and because of your school's connection with the Anwatin/Bryn Mawr campus we want to update you regarding plans for using the former Park View School building next school year. A childcare program for the children of high school student parents will be moving to Park View for the 2010-11 school year only.

The Teenage Pregnant and Parenting Program (TAPPP) childcare currently located at Broadway High School serves infant, toddler and preschool children of high school student parents. The Broadway High School site is slated to close as a part of the Changing School Options transition process. Student parents currently using TAPPP at Broadway High School will attend classes at North High School.

Park View is an appropriate site for this childcare program because of its number of classrooms, the availability of water and restroom facilities in each classroom and easily accessible entries and exits for adults transporting young children.

Locating the TAPPP childcare at the former Park View site for the 2010-11 school year will not have any effect on plans for moving the Emerson K-5 program to the Anwatin/Bryn Mawr campus for the 2011-12 school year. The Minneapolis Kids program located at Park View will also remain at the site. The school district plans to work to develop by early fall a long-term solution for a program location that will accommodate the needs of the Broadway High School students and TAPPP children beginning in the 2011-12 school year.

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
