Winning Stew Recipe

Paul and Reggie would like to thank Mary from Area 1. At a community ed cooking class earlier in the month, Mary taught them how to make roux to thicken a stew. Thank you to all who voted this stew as your favorite. There were many dishes that were quite tasty and delicious. We look forward to the harvest dinner each year. It's a great time to see old friends and meet new people.

Porchetta Roast Stew - created by Paul and Regina Markert Porchetta roast (Ours was from the Zup's in Ely, MN) 1/3 cup red table wine (we used a Cabemet)

6 cloves of garlic

1 onion

2 cans stewed tomatoes

salt

pepper

1 cup of carrots

2 cups of potatoes

For the roux: 4 Tablespoons butter and approximately 1/3 cup flour.

Place roast in crock pot with two cans of stewed tomatoes, wine, onion, and garlic. Add a pinch of salt and pepper. Slow cook for six hours on low heat. Steam potatoes and carrots. Make a roux to thicken the soup: Melt butter in saucepan and add flour while stirring. Do NOT let burn. Once butter is absorbed and roux is the consistency of peanut butter, remove from heat. Take roast from crock pot. Add roux to crock pot and stir until dissolved. Cut roast into bite-sized chunks. Dump cooked carrots and potatoes and roast into crock pot. Cook on low heat for thirty minutes. Serve with your favorite bread.

City update: Councilmember Lisa Goodman

Met Council Commissioner- Vita Ditter will serve on Brownie Lake Advisory Committee. \$1M for upgrades to Brownie Lake.

Requested presentation on Inglewood Addition/Anwatin Woods - Mpls Public Works, Paul Miller 373.3603

Development of parcels in Bryn Mawr-Private Owner proposing to build on selected parcels and needs for City to extend utilities.

Paul Miller with City Public Works Dept, PM, presented. Frank Stuckey intends to develop parcels for single family homes. Cities are obligated to allow Owner to build if follow zoning and codes. The parcels are along Xerxes and Vincent Avenues. Improvements will be made according to standards of City and the developer will pay for improvements to infrastructure. City Council must authorize. The Terms of Agreement will layout standards and specs that roads and improvements will be built to, will then go thru Planning review and Code review for approval. Back to Council for approval.

Questions:

What is time line? Council authority is granted and will work with Owner to determine Terms of Agreement. Roadway design will match similar in neighborhood. Two months for Terms of Agreement to be approved by City Council. After improvements are designed Site Plan is submitted for review and approval. Next Spring is the soonest that construction could start.

Why is the City working with these difficult sites? In the past a builder came in with street design but could not build on lots. The City will provide the parameters and will maintain roads. The Terms of Agreement will assure that the improvements are built to Cities' standards. This is the third plan brought to

community. Opinion of resident that it is not financially feasible. Some lots not buildable.

Requested presentation on Linden rail yard layover – Barry/Vida Ditter

The County proposes to build a passenger rail layover facility in the same location as Linden Yards, a heavy rail layover facility. It will function as a resting place for light rail passenger and diesel trains during the day. Because the diesel trains emit smells, dust, noise, Harrison Neighborhood is against the plan. The property lies inside Bryn Mawr and is present in the Bassett Creek Valley development plans. Ryan Companies was interviewed and selected to develop plans for the parcel. They propose to develop Office Buildings above the layover facility. Vida advocates getting involved in the development so Bryn Mawr can have a voice in decisions. 2500 jobs in the building projected. Trains housed in buildings. Development above train buildings will be parking and offices. Harrison objects on grounds of environmental and economic justice. Vida supports because development in Bryn Mawr needs a jump start after 14 years of active participation. Members of Harrison's Board will be invited to speak to BM Board at a future meeting to hear their views which oppose a layover facility. The city has rescheduled an open presentation at Harrison Neighborhood Center at 7 pm, October 24th. The issue will be revisited after the presentation. Brownie Lake CAC appointment of Colleen Smith, Area 2- Motion seconded and passed to appoint Colleen Smith to serve on Brownie Lake Advisory Committee. Rick Carter is also a candidate for appointment.

Patty Wycoff, NC activity report

Final bill for water hydrants is \$25 per hydrant and BM will receive a refund; Sip and Stroll -Oct 13; Harvest Dinner-Thurs Oct 26; Saturnalia-\$1200 is needed. No BM business grant this year, so businesses asked to contribute to Saturnalia as they can, i.e. sponsorship of fire pit, etc. Motion for \$1200 was seconded and passed.

-Rain garden first phase being installed. Church garden will be highly visible prototype. 10 more are planned for spring installation. 10 more will install on their own and submit receipts to Scott for any eligible reimbursements.

-Bryn Mawr Business Façade Improvement Program using guidelines from City of Minneapolis. Planning for 10 businesses to participate. This commits up to a total of \$12,500 in BMNA dollars, along with business owner matching commitment to leverage city NRP dollars. Moved, seconded, passed.

- Solar Panel Project: The Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association is being honored for the environmental programs we have created for our neighborhood, such as, solar panel project, rain gardens, the energy challenge and hosting CEE sponsored course for free energy audit.. Well, that should do it for another somewhat insightful, mildly amusing trip through the murky meanderings

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



Bassett Creek Development Updates

Tn 1998, the City Council created the Bassett Creek Valley (BCV) Citizen's Advisory Committee. The Committee's task was to create a master plan for development in the Bassett Creek Valley. The City Council determined that membership on the committee should consists of 4 members each, from the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association, the Harrison Neighborhood Association, and the BCV Businesses. The committee also included 2 members for each of the two City Council Members with responsibility for the BCV. Additionally, the Mayor had one representative as did "Friends of Bassett Creek."

Bryn Mawr has been an active participant on this committee from

day one. Ideas, recommendations and plans generated by the committee have been shared with the neighborhood. The Master Plan, presented to the City Council reflects the ideas, wishes and dreams of all who chose to join in reviewing the final product.

In 2006, members of the Bassett Creek Valley Redevelopment Oversight Committee (BCV/ROC) presented a Master Plan for the Bassett Creek Valley. The Minneapolis City Council approved the Master Plan, and in 2007 rezoned the valley area to conform to the uses outlined in the Master Plan. The Bassett Creek project is bound on the west by Morgan and Cedar Lake Avenues, on the north by 4th Avenue North (one block north of Glenwood), on the east by Lyndale Avenue and on the south by I-394.

Over half of the project area lies within Bryn Mawr boundaries and includes such wonderful tourist sights as the impound lot and "the Banana" (the city's rock/cement crushing facility and its attic storage facility). "The Banana" lies fully within Bryn Mawr and also lies parallel to and adjacent to I-394.

Ryan Companies assisted the Citizen's Advisory Committee in creating the Master Plan, which addresses green spaces, roads, office/mixed use spaces, and hopefully job creation through advocacy for the development. The Master Plan also addresses the infrastructure needed for building a community - roads, stormwater control, etc.

The first goal of the Master Plan to materialize will be the building of Van White Memorial Bridge. It is a smaller bridge than originally planned due to the current economy and lack of sufficient funding. The bridge, which will divide Linden Yards into Linden Yards East and Linden Yards West, will be completed in 2013, if all goes as planned.

The second part of the Master Plan moving forward will be mixed use development on Linden Yards West. Ryan Companies which assisted the ROC in formulating the Master Plans, has a provisional exclusive development contract (through 2015) for the city-owned land in the Banana. Ryan is currently performing due diligence at the site and hopes to both build and find tenants for building (or at least make strong progress in both efforts) by 2015.

The third development impetus at this site was the approval of a SW-LRT station at Van White. This would be the second in Bryn Mawr, the first being the Penn Avenue station that lies by the trails beneath the bluffs at the south end of Penn Avenue.

In 2005, the ROC first became aware that Hennepin County was looking at Linden Yards East site for a diesel passenger commuter train layover facility. This site is intended to have no overnight train storage. The county perceived this site as a location at which, without extensive fuel costs to shuttle the trains back and forth, trains bringing commuters into the city could be stored until they were needed in the afternoon to transport passengers home.

The plan for a commuter rail layover facility expanded in 2011 to include a maintenance facility to meet the needs of the high speed train to and from Chicago which the County hopes will layover during the day at the Linden Hills East facility.

The Metropolitan Council provided a \$100,000 grant which the city and the county supplemented to study the feasibility of air rights over the layover facility. The question studied by city and county technical staff and Ryan

The question studied by City and County technical staff and Ryan was, 'Can any kind of a development be created on top of a passenger rail layover facility?' Currently no other example exists in the USA.

The results of the study, which were rolled out at an open house on October 24, 2011 were very encouraging. The study showed that

the site could accommodate spatially all the passenger train needs of Hennepin County Rail Authority.

Information from the Oct. 24, 2011 presentation:

Development Assumptions

- Two Office Towers -250,000 rentable sq/ft each. 10 stories in each tower.
- Four levels of parking.
- Remaining deck area will cover layover facility, serve as overflow surface parking and host relocated Cedar Lake Trail.
- Approximately 1,940 parking stalls for development.
- Accommodates SW LRT Station.
- Would generate between 2,000 2500 jobs to the area and the City.

Cost Estimating

- Identified the additional costs for vertical development with Layover Facility and High Speed Rail Maintenance Operations
- The cost differential is approximately \$45 million
- enclosed layover facility\$13 million
- Relocation of Linden Avenue \$6 million
- Additional Foundation Costs \$1.3 million
- Additional Structural and Building Costs - \$16 million
- Administrative, Legal and Engineering \$ 9 million

Issues not yet addressed,

Require Further Study

- Environmental Issues
- Air quality
- Noise and vibration
- Contamination (soil and/or groundwater)
- Detailed stormwater management and treatment
- Traffic Operations
- Access to Van White Memorial Boulevard
- Timing/Construction Phasing

The study showed only that it is feasible to build above a passenger rail layover facility. The discussion about whether there should be a rail layover facility at this site is just beginning. The study also showed that such a development would cost less than anticipated. And finally, the study assumes that the rail layover facility will be screened/walled in from passersby and drivers.

The critical issues that the study did not address will be the topic of major discussions and further studies in the future. And if there are impacts, what will they be and how will they be mitigated.

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Development Presentation to BMNA

t CM Lisa Goodman's request Paul Miller, a Project Manager in the Public Works Department, was asked to attend the October 12th meeting of the BMNA Board to provide an update as to the most recent proposal regarding the vacant properties in Inglewood Addition.

Mr. Frank Stucki, the owner of a number of vacant platted lots along Xerxes Ave. S. and Vincent Ave. S. has approached the City with his intent to build new single family homes on these properties. As an initial response to this proposal the City Attorney's Office provided the following statements:

- Cities are legally obligated to allow owners of land to develop their property in a manner that is consistent with the area's zoning.
- A refusal on the part of the City to allow such development, or insistence on meeting unreasonable conditions, could be viewed as a taking of the property - a taking claim would be very costly for the City.

Specifically, Frank Stucki has requested of the Public Works Department, that the public infrastructure (roadways and utilities) be extended to serve the lots along Xerxes Ave. S. and Vincent Ave. S. The Public Works Department informed Frank Stucki that:

- The requested improvements would be at the Owners cost.
- That the improvements would be based upon the current design standards and specifications of the City.

Based upon Frank Stucki's acceptance of these terms, and in response to his request, as is standard procedure the Public Works Department is requesting City Council authorization to negotiate the terms of a Public Improvements Agreement with the Owner. This agreement will define: the standards and specifications for design and construction of public improvements, all applicable building codes and City Ordinances, all required City Processes (such as site plan review), all required permits, and the Owners responsibilities for all costs related to design, inspection and construction of the public improvements. Once the agreement has been drafted, it will go back to City Council for approval.

Bryn Mawr Folk Appointed to the Brownie Lake Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC)

id - 2010, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) determined they would create a Citize's Advisory Committee (CAC) to study Brownie Lake and make recommendations on improving Brownie. Rick Carter, Colleen Smith and Vida Ditter indicated interest on working on the Brownie CAC.

Vida Ditter has worked with the maintenance staff at Target Center on the problem of banks eroding into Brownie Lake. She had also worked on the Buckthorn removal events for Brownie organized by MPRB. Finally, this is the Lake in which her children, now in their early 40's, fished for groppi and sunfish.

Rick Carter also worked with Target Center on the problem of the banks below their parking lots eroding into Brownie. Additionally, he was the driving force in getting the Park Board to build a canoe rack on the north side of Brownie, a goal of Bryn Mawr's NRP Plan. Bryn Mawr paid for the rack out of its NRP funds (these had been set aside at inception for this use) and MPRB built the rack.

Colleen Smith is an Area 2 resident and a long time admirer and user of Brownie.

In 2011, when MPRB announced that the Brownie Lake CAC would now be created, these first three individuals were selected to serve on the Brownie CAC. Rick Carter was appointed by Jim Brimeyer, Bryn Mawr's Met Council Commissioner. Colleen Smith was appointed by the BMNA. And Vida Ditter was appointed by Council Member Lisa Goodman.

Park Commissioner Anita Tabb appointed Dick Adair, a long time Bryn Mawr advocate of the Parks around the neighborhood, and a frequent volunteer on work to improve these same parks.

From those who completed applications to serve on the CAC when the call went out in 2011, Mike Tieleman, a family user of Brownie, was appointed as the Mayor's representative to this CAC.

Finally, Keith Prussing, a Bryn Mawr resident and a founding member of the Cedar Lake Park

Association (a volunteer group working on improving the north shore of Cedar Lake) is that organization's representative on the Brownie CAC. He has been an active volunteer on behalf of the parks around Bryn Mawr, especially the north shores of Cedar Lake.

Bryn Mawr is very fortunate in having this many residents who have volunteered over the years on behalf of the Parks and Lakes surrounding the neighborhood. And Bryn Mawr is extremely fortunate that they are willing to donate more of their time on this CAC.

Meetings are open to the public. Meetings are tentatively scheduled for Tues., November 29, 6:30-8:30 pm; Tues., January 10, 6:30-8:30 pm; and finally Tues., January 31, 6:30-8:30 pm. Visit www.minneapolisparks.org/brownielake for updates and a link to a community survey.

The CAC process will provide an opportunity to discuss the best ways to protect this getaway within the city. "Improving Brownie Lake," said 4th Park District Commissioner Anita Tabb, "is not about development. It is about protecting the area so that it can be used and enjoyed for generations to come."

The Board's charge to the CAC is as follows:

The CAC shall advise staff, technical advisory committees, and consultants on regional park visitor interests in the development of a schematic plan for Brownie Lake regarding trails and connections, environmental improvements, recreation activities, and maintenance. The recommendations shall be informed by previous planning efforts, studies, and reports that affect Brownie Lake and its surrounding parklands and trails. CAC members will represent the range of park user groups. In addition to appointments by park commissioners and other elected officials, the CAC will include an appointment each by the Cedar Lake Park Association, the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association, the Cedar-Isles-Dean Neighborhood Association, and the Kenwood Isles Area Association.

View From the Bridge

ontrol of thistles is difficult. Identifying the thistle species is important. Eradicating perennial thistles like Canada Thistle most likely requires use of broadleaf herbicides to combat the plant's creeping rhizomes (underground stems).

Controlling biennial thistles like Bull Thistle and Field Thistle is far easier. Biennial thistles live for just two years. Thus, these plants may be hand removed during the first year to prevent seed-bearing flowers the following year. Alternatively, flowering second-year plants may be removed before seeds are produced.

Seeds are brown to straw colored with white parachutes. As is the case with many of composite flowers of weeds described in this year's columns, this type of seed is called an "achene".

To distinguish between types of thistles, look at flower heads and especially the bracts that surround flowers, as well as leaves and stems. Bracts are leaf-like forms that enclose the flower bud. As the flower opens, bracts remain visible at the base of the flower.

Canada Thistle (Cirsium arvense) 1' to 4' tall

Creeping Thistle, Small-flowered Thistle, Perennial Thistle, Green Thistle


Canada thistle is the most prevalent and persistent broadleaf weed in Minnesota. Whereas most other thistles are biennial, Canada Thistle is a perennial that aggressively spreads via underground rhizomes. Canada Thistle reproduces via seeds and creeping rhizomes. Its extensive rhizomes may extend more than three feet underground to produce numerous young Canada Thistle shoots that will grow into mature plants.

Upright stems are grooved, slightly hairy when young, increasingly hairy as they mature, and branched at the top. Leaves are alternate, have crinkled edges, spiny margins, and are somewhat lobed. Canada Thistle differs from Bull Thistle in that the former has smooth stems and upper leaf surfaces. In contrast, Bull Thistle has spiny winged stems and rough hairs on the top of its leaves.

From July through September or early October, Canada Thistle blooms with numerous, small, clustered pale lilac flowers, each less than one-inch in diameter. Flowers are surrounded by bracts that are fairly smooth and purplish, with overlapping pointed triangular forms. Seeds mature about eight to twelve days after blooming is completed.

Bull Thistle (Cirsium vulgare) 2' to 6' tall, Aster Family

Oval-shaped buds produce small to medium sized reddish-purple flowers on end of branches Bull Thistle flowers are reddish-purple, much more deeply colored than Field Thistle. Flower heads are compact, one to two inches in diameter and each flower head is surrounded by spine-



tipped bracts. Flowering occurs from late June through August.

Bull Thistle is the spiniest of Minnesota thistles. Bull Thistle leaves are stout and robust; and this is especially noticeable in seedling and basal rosette phase. Leaves growing from the flower stem extend downward along the stem, thus creating the appearance of "wings" along the stem. Bull Thistle leaf spines are very sharp; and sharp coarse hairs grow along the large, branched stems as well.

Leaves are alternate, dark green, coarsely lobed, with 3 to 4 points per lobe, each ending in a long sharp spine. The upper surface of the leaf is covered with short, stiff hairs and spines, and the underside of the leaf is whitish green, being covered with dense, woolly, gray hair.


This non-native biennial produces a low rosette of thistle leaves in its first year of growth. The next year, the plant sends up two foot to four foot stems which flower and produce seeds. Maturing in July through October, thistle seed, bearing a dandelion-like parachute, is a favorite of the American Goldfinch, which eats the seed and uses thistledown to line their late summer nests.

Field Thistle (Cirsium discolor) 3' to 5' tall, Aster Family

Each plant bears five to twenty flower clusters of pale purple flowers in July and August. Each twoinch wide flower cluster opens from a large, green, spherical spiny receptacle, which is in turn, embraced by sharply divided bracts. Bracts and leaves are long, spinetipped, pinnately divided leaves. Stems are mostly smooth. Tops of the leaves are medium green; while the underside of leaves is covered with white hairs. This wooly fuzz is characteristic of Field Thistle, distinguishing this plant from the many thistles growing in Minnesota. Bull Thistle is somewhat similar, but Field Thistle flowers are much paler and its leaves are not as prickly. Field Thistle is most often a biennial; occasionally acting as a shortlived perennial.

Nodding or Musk Thistle (Carduus nutans) 3' to 4' tall

A biennial, plant seedlings expand into a basal rosette of leaves; the following year, a flowering stem rises. True to its common name, one to two-inch flower heads often nod as they open at the ends of their flower stalks. Flower heads are one to two inches wide with most often reddish purple blooms. Nodding heads bear strongly reflexed (backwards) pointed bracts at base of flower head; and large spiny leaves surround the base of the flower head. Plants bloom in May and June. Leaves are deeply lobed and margins turn into spines. Leaves often continue as prickly wings growing along plant stems. Foliage is waxy and pale green.



Common Burdock (Arctium minus) 3' to 5' tall

Cockoo-Button, Thorny Burr, Beggar's Buttons. Cockle Buttons. Love Leaves.

Common Burdock is a large weed with sixteen to twenty inch long leaves, and a large, thick, fleshy taproot that extends twelve to fifteen inches deep into the soil. Large, thick leaves are heart-shaped with a broad leaf base. Leaves are smooth and dark green above and wooly and lighter green below. Flowers bloom July to October. Small spherical thistle-like flower heads are one-half to one inch wide.


Plants spread by seed carried away by animals that pick up seed heads in their fur. Seed heads truly are the bane of animals with fur as well as humans wearing cotton, wood, and especially fleece. The prickly seed globe is a cluster of seeds with hooked ends that act much like Velcro. In fact, a Swiss inventor studied the hook-and-loop burrs of Common Burdock as a model for the man-made Velcro fastener system. Growing up in westem Pennsylvania, I remember calling Burdock "bobolice" – "lice" possibly for the difficulty of ridding one's clothing of the seed heads.

Dried dead erect stems retain these seed burs until the following year. Common Burdock is a weed of landscapes, woodland openings, fence rows and roadsides, and uncultivated and waste areas.

The city has organized a free session at which parents can have toys tested for lead. Suggested toys include vinyl ones such as dinosaurs, farm and zoo animals, vinyl lunch boxes and backpacks, play foods, children's dishes, rubber ducks, painted wood toys and chewable toys.

The test is quick. Lead contamination is more common in older toys and those made in China.

Although the number of Minneapolis children with elevated lead levels in their blood has been dropping in recent years, 79 more children were identified by testing last year, the city said. Such a finding often triggers an order by the city's Department of Regulatory Services to abate the conditions, which often are caused by lead paint in older homes.


Graduation Congratulations!

SKIING THROUGH THE NEIGHBORHOOD (REPRISE)

s co-chairs of Area 3, my wife Jeanne and I agreed to write a story about the neighborshood for the Bugle this fall. Not knowing exactly what we would write about, I remembered that I had written a story some years ago and dove into the digital archives of my laptop's hard drive to see if I could find it. There it was, from December 2005, almost six years ago. I wrote a story about a three- hour ski that I took one snowy post- Christmas afternoon on the Park Board trails through our neighborhood. Along the way I passed many familiar sites, including the schools that my kids attended, my favorite par three golf course, and the site of our wedding along Wirth Parkway, almost 30 years prior.

A lot has happened since then. I wrote in that story that I was training for the Birkebiener, a 52kilometer ski race in Wisconsin that would take me 4-5 hours. I actually did ski it that year and it took me 4 _ hours. This last winter, after learning to skate ski, and spending many hours training on the hills behind Bryn Mawr Elementary, I skied the Birkie again and took an hour off my time. In addition to that race, I always do the freestyle race at the City of Lakes Loppet, the coolest urban ski race in the world! We start at the main chalet and after skiing 33 kilometers, covering many the trails in the neighborhood, and looping around the lakes, we ski up Hennepin Ave. into the heart of Uptown.

Our son Eric, who skied at Southwest High School, and trained at Wirth Park, graduated that year and went on to become a Division I Nordic skier at the University of Vermont, one of the very best ski teams in the country. In addition to getting a degree in Exercise Science, Eric was an Academic All American, the highest honor combining athletic and academic achievements. He recently graduated with a master's degree from the University of British Columbia where he skis for and coaches the UBC ski team, at their home course in Whistler, the location of the 2010 Olympics. Today, the schools he and his younger brother Chris attended during their elementary and middle school years (Bryn Mawr and Anwatin) have their own Nordic ski teams where future Academic All Americans train with the generous support of the City of Lakes Nordic Ski Foundation. Kids who might otherwise be sitting in front of a screen of one kind or another are out in nature, strengthening their bodies, and learning the life lessons that teamwork, and mental and physical challenges provide.

In that article, I also mentioned skiing over Brownie Lake where "I hope someday, to see a small, discreet, walk-in canoe rack". Lo and behold, after a fifteen-year effort by the neighborhood, we actually have a canoe rack on Brownie Lake. Many weekends this summer I walked or biked over to the lake, grabbed my canoe off the

rack, and paddled alone or with a friend through Cedar, Isles and Calhoun and back. On any beautiful day I can see literally hundreds of city folks out enjoying the lakes in all types of people powered boats, and along the shore on rollerblades, roller-skis, strollers and bikes.

Two years ago, a friend and I did the City of Lakes Tri Loppet race, where we paddled my sixty- year old aluminum canoe from the south end of Calhoun to the north end of Brownie. My friend did the running leg, winding through the woods behind the Quaking Bog, the schools, and out towards Wirth Beach which has been completely redone this year, and is a spectacular place to hang out. It is now a far cry from the sad little beach that my younger son Chris and I used to go to. I tagged off for the final leg, riding a classic single speed mountain bike on the off road trails created by MOCA (Minneapolis Off Road Cycling Advocates) that wind around on the west side of Wirth Parkway, west of the Par 3 course. It had started to rain and was getting messy. I was covered with mud when I finished. I had the time of my life. As a bonus, my friend and I won the "two old men doing the race as a team"

As I said five years ago, for someone who loves outdoor activity, silent sports, and wants to live in the city, there is no better place to live than Bryn Mawr. We would like to extend a huge thanks to the City of Lakes Nordic Ski Foundation, MOCA, Minneapolis Park and Rec Board and staff, the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Board, the staff at Anwatin and Bryn Mawr Elementary, the businesses in Bryn Mawr and all of our great residents for keeping it that way.

As a post-script, I have had the unbelievable fortune to have my professional life cross over into my love for this neighborhood. Several years ago, my architectural and engineering firm was hired by Target Corporation to assist in the design of a stomwater management solution for their Financial Center building up above Brownie Lake. It has been a huge success story and has resulted in a clean bill of health for the lake. In addition, I have been appointed to sit on the Brownie Lake Citizens Advisory Council (CAC) which started meeting in October. Our firm also donated services to CoLNSF to provide concept planning for an Olympic Training Center in Wirth Park, a building that would be dedicated to biking, skiing and similar activities, especially for youth. As a result, the MPRB, with the help of CoLNSF, was able to get \$1.7M from the last minute bonding bill this summer and the planning stage is to begin shortly. Finally, we were hired by MPRB to design the timing shed

for the Junior Olympics, which was just dedicated this October as the John Schmitt building, to a

I hope to be able to write another story five years from now after the many improvements planned throughout Wirth Park and around Brownie Lake are complete.




