Barry reported. The SW Corridor project has stalled because of time spent on Central Corridor. The draft is not expected until May. CAC morphed into organization supporting Met Council taking over planning and management of SW transit from Hennepin County. Bryn Mawr residents should note comments in report from Planning Commission re: Penn and Van White stations. The issues raised are lack of access to bike and walking trails. The report did not address concerns, or affimthe park-like setting of the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood. A report of BM concerns should be established and sent to Planning Commission. Lack of access to Cedar Lakes Trails is a major concern in the BM neighborhood. Sustainable Communities Grant for under represented communities is available for a total of \$800,000 for qualifying neighborhoods. Currently, Bryn Mawr has not been invited to the informational meetings. Documenting that the aged on fixed incomes could be way that BM can qualify. A non profit has been given responsibility for administering funds. Barry will compose article for Bugle.

Garden Group – Dave Logsdon

Group has discussed refreshing the downtown Bryn Mawr gardens. Proposed that funding be as a Community project. As the name, Bryn Mawr, is of Welsh origin and daffodils are on the Wales coat of arms, the committee suggested branding Bryn Mawr using daffodils by distributing daffodil bulbs to neighborhood residents. This is an on-going study.

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



Label two years working to open a new public French Immersion school. It has been some of the most rewarding (and stressful) work I have ever done and now the opening is less than five months away. In addition to all the intricacies of school development, enrollment, hiring, and budget, we are constantly facing the challenge of overcoming stereotypes about this highly effective educational model.

Pierre Bottineau French Immersion will be in the Jordan Park School building on 30th and Humboldt Avenues, in the heart of north Minneapolis. I am often asked, "What makes you think French Immersion will be successful in North Minneapolis?"

Well, there are 35 year of research that shows that students in all demographic groups do well on standardized tests when they attend a French Immersion school. There are two very successful French Immersion schools in Minnesota. L'Etoile du Nord on the east side of St. Paul and Normandale in Edina.

In fact, Normandale is ranked 5th out of 702 on Schooldigger.com's Minnesota Elementary School Rankings. But, while the school is significantly more diverse now then when it opened in 1994, it is still primarily white students of privilege, so their success does little to help us make a case for achievement for at-risk urban students in Minneapolis.

We found the evidence we were looking for at Milwaukee French Immersion School. This is a very diverse school where 93% of the students score proficient or higher on state tests (in English!), compared with 53% in the Milwaukee Public Schools district. In several instances, African-American and economically disadvantaged students perf o med as high or higher than the school average.


So guess where I spent Spring Break? (Try to contain your jealousy!) What we saw was amazing. Parents, students and staff of all races focused on high achievement and all the advantages that multi-lingualism brings.

According to the Streets Blog website, data from the recent census revealed that Milwaukee is the most segregated city in America. Milwaukee French Immersion School is located in north Milwaukee, yet this school is full of kids, not only from the predominantly African-American neighborhood, but from all areas of the city and suburbs.

My hope is that we can bring this same mix to north Minneapolis and someday, the people of the area will say what I have been able to say for years, "We have an excellent school in our neighborhood."

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The Pests in Your Trees: How to Spot the Emerald Ash Borer

The Emerald ash borer is a beetle that chews up ash trees quickly. The little larvae feed on the bark of ash trees. The hungry bugs destroy a tree's ability to absorb water and nutrients.

Experts think the Emerald ash borer arrived in the country inside wood packing materials transported from Asia. The United States Depart-

Since then the Emerald ash borer has killed millions of ash trees in Michigan alone and the spread of the beetle has left a path of destruction. The borer has destroyed tens of millions more in Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Minnesota, Missouri, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, and Wisconsin. Despite efforts to control the spread of EAB, each year tree experts say they creep further into the nation.

"The Emerald ash borer can do a lot of damage and the tree may be dead before you realize it," says Angie Hicks. "What people don't realize is that the trees in your yard can add 3-7 percent to the value of your home so investing in them can be a great return on your home."

Angie's List, the nation's leader in consumer reviews, surveyed about a dozen highly rated arborists who say more people are calling them for help to identify EAB. Here's advice on how to spot the green menace.

Signs of Emerald Ash Borer Infestation:

• Hear a Tapping Sound?

Increased woodpecker activity around your ash trees may indicate the borers are present. Woodpeckers dig into the tree to eat EAB larvae. • Looking Thin:

Look at the top third of the tree. If you notice the canopy thinning or dying back, it's a sign the beetles have arrived and are prohibiting water and nutrients from getting to that part of the ash tree.

• Give me a D:

When adult Emerald ash borers emerge from inside the tree, they leave D-shaped holes. Sometimes the holes look like a D with the flat side down. Adult activity is usually noticed June through August.

Finding the problem early is essential, say arborists. Treatments are always more cost-effective than having the tree removed.

Right now, the most effective treatment is a series of injections into the tree. You'll need a tree service to do this for you and expect several treatments to make sure the borer is gone. The injections range

Removing the tree could cost thousands of dollars depending on its size. The key to saving the tree without spending a fortune is finding the right tree service to help.

Why Hire an Arborist?

An arborist is a specialist in the care of individual trees and they are trained and equipped to provide proper care. Pruning or removing trees, especially large trees, can be dangerous work. Tree work should be done only by those trained and equipped to work safely in trees.

• Membership Card:

Ask if the tree service has members in professional organizations such as the International Society of Arboriculture (ISA), the Tree Care Industry Association (TCIA), or the American Society of Consulting Arborists (ASCA). This demonstrates a willingness on the part of the arborist to stay up to date on the latest techniques and information.

• Certified:

Find out if the tree service has an ISA-certified arborist on staff. Certified Arborists have passed an extensive examination covering all aspects of tree care.

• Ask for proof of insurance.

A reputable arborist carries personal and property damage insurance as well as workers compensation insurance. You could be held responsible for damages and injuries by an uninsured contractor.

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Anwatin March Food Drive a Big Success!



make positive choices. This year they have also teamed up with Anwatin to speak to students and support the March food drive bringing in almost 400 pounds of food. Thank you, CM3!










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The BMNA Communication Committee

hat started with BMNA board members assigned to review the Bryn Mawr Bugle has evolved into a full communications committee. This committee was asked to look at all of the communication vehicles of the BMNA and take stock of where we are.

As multiple modes of communication become available, the committee is charged to take a broad look and provide feedback for those responsible for each of the vehicles. Communication Committee members met on February 21, 2011, to discuss the Bugle, our BMNA website, the coordinator email distribution list, the community board in downtown Bryn Mawr, the Bryn Mawr directory, the BMNA Board Google group, and Bryn Mawr's presence on Facebook. The committee named one committee member to work with each communication mode.

Discussion centered on identifying target audiences and priorities and opportunities related to each mode of communication. Committee members recognize that the neighborhood needs both electronic and hard copy communications to reach all community members.

From our research, Bryn Mawr is unique in publishing our own regular neighborhood newspaper that is not commercial. We could not find another example in Minneapolis. Historically, the Bugle has served as the official voice of the neighborhood association for several decades. Meeting minutes are posted in the Bugle, local writers and columnists contribute, updates from committees are published, and activities and ads for local entre preneurs are a regular occurrence. While paying for a large part of its own way, the Bugle has always been subsidized with the support of neighbor membership dues and grants. While the paper is still able to support the majority of its funding, the committee discussed ways to increase the financial health of the newspaper as printing costs increase and ads decrease. The committee asked the Bugle editor to work with the BMNA treasurer to clarify how the financials are working.

Committee recommendations for the Bugle included raising the rates for classified ads to \$4.00 per ad and investigating options for the back page to be sold for display ads. Further areas to explore were giving discounts to people paying a year at a time; they currently get one free month of advertising, and to carry holiday personal ads for things like Valentine's Day and graduations. We recommended increasing the website presence in the Bugle and publishing Bugle classified ads on the website. We asked the editor to confirm that every business in Bryn Mawr is getting a Bugle. Other ideas discussed included expanding Bugle content by soliciting monthly contributions from the garden group, photo contests or juried art, book and restaurant reviews, and historical

biographies of favorite Bryn Martians. Area reps will be asked to contribute something twice a year, or find a neighbor to contribute from their area.

For the other communication vehicles, ideas discussed included increasing the website as a focal point of information for neighbors and those interested in the neighborhood, including realtors and potential businesses. Committee members agreed that data needs to be collected for both the website and the email distribution list about usage and desired content. The committees also discussed reviewing and updating the Bryn Mawr neighborhood directory and determining the value of having a Facebook presence. Is our Facebook presence communicating the right message for Bryn Mawr? Do we 'like' it?

There is a lot of positive energy on this committee, and we look for updates for communicating with you, our neighbors.

Bryn Mawr Community Solar Projects

Only 10 Grants Remain for Solar-Powered Hot Water Heating! Financing Available!

The Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association and Make Mine Solar H20 are excited to announce grants up to \$2000 for the installation of solar-powered hot water heating systems. The program is an initiative organized by the MN Renewable Energy Society (MRES) to enable easy and affordable installation of solar thermal systems through bulk purchase discounts, state rebates, federal incentives and local grants.

Several local contractors and two equipment suppliers have agreed to pre-negotiated prices for the installation and equipment costs which are typically around \$9000. The grants, discounts, and incentives reduce the final cost to \$3200-\$3600 and the variation depends on the panel manufacturer selected by the homeowner. Financing is available and the systems are exempt from sales and property taxes.

Property owners utilize their existing hot water heaters and the equipment installers connect the solar panel system to pre-heat the cold incoming city water. Thermal hot water heating systems require a smaller footprint than whole-house solar panel systems and commonly range from 20-40 sq. ft. for a family of 4-6. Help us contribute to our local economy and to a greener future and save money doing so!



Remember there are no income limits and only one grant is allowed per proper-

ty. The BMNA also continues to offer grants up to \$3000 for solar panel systems that supply electrical power to the entire home. Eligible properties include single family houses, businesses, owneroccupied multi-unit homes, condos, and town homes. Interested homeowners should act quickly because the funds are on a first-come, first-serve basis and all work must be complete by December 2011.

What all Bryn Mawr residents should know about their property taxes.

7e all know that we pay our property taxes from our incomes. We also know that the amount of our property taxes are assessor driven. For example, there are many of us, in similar situations, that purchased our homes for under \$30,000 but now the same house, for the same people, is valued over \$300,000 for tax purposes. The assessor is mandated to ignore the fact that the income of the same people, in retirement, may be the same as when they purchased the home for under \$30,000.


We all pay for the same CITY SER-VICES, but we don't have a uniform tax burden for those services. Most of us sense that there exists an inequity in our property tax burden, but we don't know what that is. However, now there exists a scientific Voss Report that defines our property tax burdens. It was prepared by the Minnesota Department of Revenue Research Department. Among many things, it shows that in Minnesota 3.17 billion dollars were collected in homestead property taxes on a total income of 135.5 billion dollars. That translates to 2.34% of household income that was paid, on the average, per household to property taxes.

If all of Minneapolis households had a 2.34% or a 3.5% property tax burden, we would not have a property tax problem. However, our State Legislature refused to recognize that an assessor driven tax is inherently inequitable. The Legislators prefers to mitigate the inequities by property tax relief checks. Data collected by the Voss Report shows that out of 1,306,500 households, 364,000 received property tax relief. That is about 28% of households that are subsidized. It is also very unfortunate that our Minneapolis political leaders are not advocating for an equitable local tax that would generate an equal or better revenue stream, based on an income driven tax rather than on an assessor driven tax without the need to subsidize any household.

Sadly, the cheery avian peeps are not the only noises that drift in the windows. A jarring racket of barking dogs, lawnmowers, and radios sometimes invades our homes. While it's true that we no longer dodge ice while walking, some piles of dog feces need to be given wide berth. Please let this article serve as a friendly reminder from the BMNA: Be courteous to your neighbors and obey the city ordinances regarding dogs and noise.

An excerpt from the City of Minneapolis website: Minneapolis city ordinances require:

Dog owners to pick up and dispose of their dogs' feces in a sanitary manner, whether on their own property, someone else's property, or public property.

Dog owners to keep their dogs from frequently or habitually disturbing others by barking.

Try to resolve animal complaints with your neighbors if possible.


Minneapolis Mediation Program can help mediate the issues with you: Call (612) 822-9883. To report violations of these ordinances, call Animal Control between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m. weekdays (8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. on weekends) at (612) 348-4250.

Common Noise Restrictions

- Construction/demolition noise is allowed 7am-6pm, Monday through Friday. An After-Hours Work Permit is required for work anytime on Saturday or Sunday.
- Garbage pickup noise is allowed 6am-10pm within 500 feet of a residential property. Complaints should be submitted to Business Licensing.
- Outdoor amplified sound audible above the level of conversational speech at a distance of 50 feet likely requires a Sound Permit at any time.
- Sound from motor vehicle sound system or audio system clearly audible beyond 50 feet from where it is originating is illegal.
- Power lawnmowers, power trimmers, power saws, leaf blowers, or similar tools are allowed to operate between 7am–10pm.
- Snow blowers/snow plows may be operated at any time as conditions warrant.

View From the Bridge

Nature Journaling - April 2011

any of the past columns from "View From The Bridge" can be considered examples of Nature Journaling. Nature Journaling is the regular recording of observations, experiences, impressions, and sensations of the natural world. Recording tools may include writing, use of visual art media such as drawing or painting, even audio and video recordings. Observing and drawing, or observing and writing can be mutually reinforcing activities. The act of recording what one sees can strengthen one's powers of observation.

Have a reason for journaling! I began writing "View From The Bridge" to educate neighbors of plantings and natural area restorations. From an early column, "While woodland wildflowers can be found in numerous parts of Bassett's Creek Park, the greatest concentration and diversity of plants are located south of Glenwood Avenue, site of 2001 and 2003 restoration projects." The 2003 columns began with a review of the history of Bassetts Creek Park and Fruen Mill and Glenwood Inglewood. The 2004 columns described wildflowers of Bassetts Creek Park adjacent to Glenwood Avenue. Beginning by describing the trees planted in downtown Bryn Mawr (Cedar Lake Road from Oliver to Queen Avenue, as well as nearby Penn Avenue), the 2005 and 2006 columns highlighted street and backyard trees found in Bryn Mawr Neighborhood. Columns of 2007 celebrated the 100th anniversary of Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden with unique plants found in or near this urban treasure The 2008 columns continued to explore Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden with a history of the garden and studies of wildflowers, grasses, and mushrooms found there. Then I discovered natural areas of greater Minnesota and wanted to share these with readers. Topics from 2009 widened the topics not only to greater Minnesota and surrounding natural areas (Isle Royale, Duluth's Hawk Ridge, North Shore, Lake Pepin, area nature centers) but to the broader topic of natural history (fall color change, mosses and clubmosses, ecology, birds). Many of the 2010 columns addressed water and its impact on our natural world: Lake Superior geology, snowflakes, glaciers, Fort Snelling State Park, aquatic and heath plants. Local natural areas and weeds are topics of 2011 columns. Have a reason for journaling - to develop your creativity; for the benefit of better gardening - to learn about weather and climate, to learn for yourself when to plant, weed, harvest, put the garden to bed; when to look for


and to address pests. No doubt, you will have different reasons to joumal.

Exercise your skills of observation; look and listen carefully! Exercise - Read a lot of literature, study a lot of art. Be in the mood to write or draw, maybe go for a walk and think, sit and think, write but when? A country western star sings, "Live like you were dying". I suggest, look as if you were leaving, listen as if you were losing. Think about the person that you love - certainly you know how they look, how they move, smell, feel. Approach your nature observations with no less care and attention. Words & pictures – writing and record-

ing tools!

Within your journal, it's all right to combine words and sketches whatever method words best to capture the scene or phenomenon in the time required. Use both words and pictures. Though a picture may tell a thousand words, it's tough to draw a smell, a taste, a sound, a sensation, a touch or a texture, the way that an experience makes one feel. Try to recall the scene or the image, visualize the story - then write down adjectives and descriptions, action words and feelings, and assemble the ideas into sentences. In a sketchbook or notepad, or scrap of paper, jot down bits of ideas. Find your style - prose, poetry, even song.

Use all the tools available to you. In writing: simile, alliteration, adjectives, scaffolding, brainstorming. In drawing: line, shape, form, shade/shadow, dots, scratches, cross-hatching, push/pull, edges, highlights, different widths of drawing tools, pencil, pen, charcoal, pastel, crayon, chalk, edges, sides of tools. Many people prefer to a bound, hard cover book that allows for writing and/or drawing. Zipperclosure plastic bags protect your journal and handily hold your writing and drawing tools. The date, time, location or habitat are useful data Recording weather and temperature are somewhat optional.



in a continuous line. The "Modified Contour" method produced a 3:30 minute sketch, using a similar method; though I allowed myself a few glances down to the sketch in progress. For the third sketch, I studied the birds for 5 minutes, then from memory drew a sketch for 5 minutes without looking at the subject. The final sketch is a 20 minute drawing - a sketch completed while studying the birds. Without restrictions beyond a twentyminute time limit, the final sketch is certainly more finished; and it allowed notes about feather coloration as well. A certain amount of "muscle memory" remains that allows my mind and hand to recall shapes and forms of basic bird form as well as feather patterns. Having studied and drawn the pheasants several time, I now have a clearer "picture in my mind".

The adjacent sketches illustrate one aspect of nature journaling drawing. I drew the same two ringnecked pheasants from dioramas at the Bell Museum using four different drawing methods:

Blind Contour method Modified Contour method Drawing after limited study Extended drawing

A hen and cock pheasant stand amidst a meadow diorama with poison ivy, milkweed, and closed bottle gentian plants nearby. Using the "Blind Contour" method, a 3 minute sketch, I kept my eyes on the birds, studying them, while my "blind" hand drew a representation of the couple keeping my pencil on the paper to ensure that, at a minimum, the drawn line would be connected




