Saturnalia Wagon Rides & Road Closure

Saturday, December 8th is Saturnalia 2012 in Downtown Bryn Mawr. Please note that on this day, Cedar Lake Road from Laurel Avenue West to Russell Avenue South will be closed to through traffic from 3:30 PM to 7 PM. Barricades and safety cones will be placed at each end of the street so that emergency vehicles and the hay wagon can pass through.

We ask residents who live on this street

for their understanding and to please enter and leave the roadway by the west end (the Russell Avenue entry rather than the Laurel Avenue entry).

We ask residents and businesses located within a few blocks of Downtown Bryn Mawr (in other words, within a few blocks of Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church) to please turn porch or holiday lights on!

Also, we ask for supervision of children riding the hay wagon. Children may not climb on or off the wagon while the wagon is moving. Doing so is very dangerous and may result in injury.

City update: Councilmember Lisa Goodman

The City of Minneapolis Precinct 7 had highest voter turn-out at 92.1% . City elections voter turnout summary for Ward 7 is 85.6%

Single source recycle starting soon. Information will come out on Nov 26th and Dec 31st.

Patty Wycoff, NC activity report

The 4th annual Sip and Stroll was well attended. Business owners emailed Patty to thank BMNA for sponsoring the event.

Saturnalia plans are complete. Horses, drummers and permits have all been completed.

The Accent Signage account has \$17,726.49 in it. Patty requested assistance with the names and addresses. The Board will determine exactly who will receive the donations-families of the deceased and, perhaps, the families of the injured, also.

Give to the Max MN is on Thursday and BMNA usually gets several donations.

JoEllyn Jolstad, Bugle Report

Articles on Memorial Service, Harvest Dinner and Saturnalia will be in next Bugle. There are some new advertisers. JoEllyn passed around a sign-up sheet for Board members to sign up for writing monthly articles. Local announcements will be added to Bugle Notes.

Update on Accent Signage memorial -Kathryn Kaatz

Two ways to remember the deceased were discussed-a memorial and an event in the neighborhood. Memorial would be a visual reminder, perhaps, in heart of downtown or a stone for each victim in garden or closer to the site, perhaps, a labyrinth in the adjacent park. Event envisioned is a sing-along vigil. Songs of hope and healing-in the meadows or the parking lot at school. Musicians could participate. Could have information tables for charities. Could be on Garage Sale weekend. Memorial Fund- could use some of the donations to off-set costs

Update on Harrison efforts to bring Surly Brewery to neighborhood

Chris Kirwan met with Harrison group and city planner. It is probably not going to Harrison.

Treasurer's report- Liz Pederson-

BMNA has \$90,500 Total- Marlin and Liz are meeting with personnel to provide professional back-up for Liz.

BMNA Website

Web Site-It needs a lot of work and BMNA has a volunteer who is willing to work on it. She plans to meet with Dave and come back with proposals to make it simpler to operate and easier to maintain. Carolyn Bastick, the volunteer, suggested it be a paid position.

NCEC report – Scott McLaughlin

Business façade report-5-6 businesses have not finished work. City will extend deadline from 120 days to end of calendar year.

Rain garden project ends next year The solar program is still ongoing but it expires 12-31-12. The report for CCP is almost done. Patty will review prior to turning it in. BMNA will put together a group to look at our priorities for future planning. Include an article in Bugle asking for neighbors to volunteer.

LRT Project updates-Barry

EIS study and public forums -The EIS is a large document and was emailed to Board members. Dec 11th is deadline to return comments. On Tues. 11-20-2012 a meeting for the neighborhood will be held. Some comments to date are as follows: There will be limited access to LRT and Kenilworth trail if there is no Penn Station. Main issue is freight rail should be moved to St. Louis Park. The report recommended removal of line to St. Louis Park. The route is environmentally preferable and supports Met Council's preference. St. Louis Park City Council has to sign off on project. Locally preferred option is supported by the Board, Jay and Barry.

Standing Committee Reports

Communications Committee – Jay-The committee discussed Patty's contract. The committee recommends extending her contract and Marlin will conduct her review. They are compiling a list of responsibilities and number of contract hours.

The official communication vehicles are BMNA. Org, communication board/kiosk, Bugle, Email blasts. Unofficial vehicles are gogglegroup.com for the Garden Club, the BM Facebook site, and NextDoor Bryn Mawr. Area Reps should plan face-to-face opportunities for communication with neighbors. Some Area Reps have put flyers on doors to invite neighbors to neighborhood gatherings. Writing articles for the Bugle is a great way for Reps to communicate.




you got your big guy in red suit, your got your drummers, and most of all you got your neighbors!

to middle eastern delights brought by neighbors. Area 2 Representative, Lynda Shaheen, won a \$25 gift certificate donated by Cuppa Java, along with a bottle of wine for her delicious Lebanese Kibbi. (Recipe follows!) Todd Marshall (husband of Lynda Shaheen) was the winner of "guess how many M&M's are in the jar." Excellent food and company was shared by all.

My grandfather's family came to the U.S. from Lebanon. This is a recipe we made frequently when I was growing up. Traditionally it's made with ground lamb but

you can substitute ground beef. It's also available at Emily's Lebanese Deli in Northeast Minneapolis and at Holy Land Deli. From Lebanese Cuisine by Madelain Farah, "Kibbi is one of the prizes of Lebanese cuisine and is served largely on special occasions. Kibbi, colloquial for kubaybah, is in fact

renowned among all Middle Eastern dishes. The word comes from the verb that means to form into a ball."

BAKED KIBBI 8-10 servings

(you'll need to make Kibbi stuffing and basic Kibbi) **Kibbi stuffing** 1/4 c pine nuts 2 T butter

1/2 lb ground lamb or beef1 medium onion, finely chopped1/8 t. Cinnamon1/8 t. AllspiceSalt and pepper

Brown the pine nuts in the butter until golden, then add the meat and sauté for 10-12 minutes. Add the onions and spices and cook until the onions are limp. Remove from heat.



- 2-2/3 cup bulgur wheat, plus 1/2 cup more if using lamb instead of beef
- 1 large onion minced
- 2 T salt
- 1/4 t. Pepper
- 1/8 t. Cinnamon
- 1/8 t. Allspice2 lbs ground lamb or beef

Cover the bulgur with water. Soak for 10 minutes. Drain and press between the palms of your hands to remove any excess water. Work the onions and spices together with your fingers. Knead the meat and spices thoroughly, add the crushed wheat and continue kneading. Dip your hands in ice water while kneading in order to soften the Kibbi. Run the kneaded mixture through a food processor 1-3 times for a finer consistency.

At this point you can make balls of the basic Kibbi, use your finger to make a hole in the middle for the stuffing, and seal up and bake in a greased pan at 375 for 20-30 minutes or butter a 9x12 pan. Spread 1/2 inch layer of basic Kibbi on bottom. Spread the stuffing over the Kibbi. Then spread the remaining Kibbi on top. Smooth well. Score the top layer 1/2 deep in 1 inch diamond shapes. Pour 1/2 cup melted butter on top. Bake at 400 for 25 minutes, lower the heat to 300 and bake 20-30 minutes more until golden brown.

Metal Cans No trash. Io yard waste.




December 2012, First in a Series

ver the past ten years, this column has addressed Bassetts Creek Park history, wildflowers, trees of street and forest, and weeds. The former name of the column first referred to the Glenwood Avenue bridge next to the park where much restoration and planting took place. This month, a new name and a new topic comes to the column. Besides the obvious meaning of its first word, the title "Drawing on Nature" underscores that the column studies interrelationships between the monthly subject and the broader natural world.

This month's column begins a year-long study of bulbs. The promise that spring will bring fresh green shoots and colorful buds sustains one through the long, dark, cool winter that we've now just entered. Bulbs are some of my favorite flowering plants. I've enjoyed presenting my mother and sister, both born on April 11, with birthday greetings of bulb gardens whether I'm with them in person or whether a florist serves as my understudy. Bulbs can provide color in the landscape throughout the growing season, even though each bulb variety glows in the garden for a few weeks.

A very broad definition of a "bulb" - a swollen underground structure allows inclusion of a broad range of flowers. This column examines different types of bulbs, including both "true" bulbs and those that many of us consider to be bulbs. Then from February onward, each month, flowers will be described in the order that they can be found blooming, whether indoors or outdoors. Finally, to aid you in creating your own bulb garden next fall, topics will include bulb selection, placement, landscape use, planting and post-planting care.

The word "bulb" refers to both plants that store the recipe for their entire life within an underground storage structure, and to the structure itself. The principal function of this structure is to store energy reserves in the form of nutrients to ensure the long-termsurvival of the plant. In




this sense, a bulb is similar to a seed and yet not quite equivalent to the offspring of a flower's reproduction.

For the most part, bulbs are perennials. Though many are hardy to our Zone 4 USDA plant hardiness region, others must be dug up and stored in an area free from freezing. The bulb that we purchase and plant represents the dormant stage of the plant's life cycle. After a period of rest, often marked by darkness, drought, and cold; the bulb sprouts and thrusts a green shoot that flowers and produces leaves. Roots anchor the bulb and absorb life-giving water and nutrients. Photosynthesis recharges the "battery" of the underground bulb. After foliage dies down to the ground either from the summer's heat or the cool of autumn, the bulb reenters a resting phase awaiting reanimation in the following spring or summer.

A scientific investigation of each type of bulb includes classification of its parts into leaf, stem, root tissue. What we think of as a bulb may be classified into several categories: true bulb, corm, tuber, tuberous roots, and rhizome. The characteristics of fleshy roots offer similarities and differences to bulbs. True bulbs include Tunicate and Imbricate Bulbs.

True Bulb - Tunicate Bulb

A true bulb has a rounded, somewhat spherical shape with a pointed end. Think of the onion you cut up for breakfast, lunch or dinner. A protective, papery sheath cloaks a Tunicate bulb, shielding it from damage from excessive dryness or wetness. The onion's rings are concentric scales of leaf tissue surround an embryonic flower bud. Persisting for many years, a true bulb adds new scales from the center of the bulb. The scales are joined together by a basal plate from which roots develop and around which offsets may form. After growing sufficiently large, these offsets, or bulblets, produce their own flowers. When this growing family of bulbs crowds its growing space, flowers gradually grow smaller and smaller. This is a signal to excavate and divide the bulbs. Examples of Tunicate bulbs are: tulips, daf-



fodils, hyacinths, grape hyacinths (muscari), and alliums. True Bulb - Imbricate Bulb

Without a protective shield, an Imbricate bulb must be kept moist to prevent damage to the scales before planting. Asiatic and Oriental Lilies are common Imbricate bulbs. Corm

Though a corm may resemble the form of a true bulb, a corm is comprised of solid stem tissue, while a true bulb is assembled from nested leaf tissue. Corms tend to be slightly flatter compared with the more spherical true bulb. Cutting open a corm yields no visible rings as is the case with a true bulb. Fibrous or smooth, a thin tunic envelops the corm. A growing tip identifies the planting orientation. A basal plate develops from which roots develop. Instead of bulblets forming around its basal plate, a new corm forms above last year's com, which withers away at the end of a growing season. Gladiolus, Crocus, Autumn Crocus are examples of coms.

Rhizome

A rhizome is an underground stem that grows horizontally instead of vertically. Often they resemble a swollen root. Examples of rhizomes include Agapanthus, Lily-of-the-Valley, Bearded Iris, Canna, and Calla Lily. Note that Siberian Iris grows from fibrous roots rather than from a rhizome.

Fleshy Root


Some plants have underground structures that, on first inspection resemble tuberous roots. Instead, such plants, including the Peony and Daylily, possess fleshy roots.

A tuber is an underground stem swollen with energy stored as carbohydrate. A tuber is often short, fat, and rounded. Fibrous roots form from the bottom of the tuber. Several growing buds, known as "eyes" sprout from the tuber and grow upwards. The tubers of the brightly variegated Caladium and the solidly colored Elephant Ears resemble the common potato, which is also a tuber. **Tuberous Root**

Tuberous roots are modified, specialized roots that enlarge to store energy. A cluster of tuberous roots is joined together at the bottom of a stem, which contains the growing point for the following year. Because the stem is necessary for plant growth, the cluster can be divided only if each root is paired with a portion of the stem. Examples of tuberous roots are Dahlia and Sweet Potato.

Get to the root of the matter of bulbs ... it will be worth your effort!

fter a walk around Lake of the Isles and a visit to Birchbark Books, many of us frequented Isles Market and Deli (most recently called the Kenwood Café). So we looked forward to eating at the latest restaurant to inhabit the space, The Kenwood. The new owner, Don Saunders, has imbued the old deli with a manly touch. An English hunting club atmosphere has been created by Kenwood resident Jim Smart, of Smart Associates, who chose the plaid wallpaper and hunting dog décor.

On his website, Chef Don Saunders' states that his vision is to serve the neighborhood what it wants in the way of coffee, pastries, breakfast, brunch, lunch and dinner while tempting outsiders with some of the Twin Cities' finest dining. Saunders also owns In Season, which has a strong emphasis on local, sustainable, in-season ingredients. We started with the duck offal "cigars," very flavorful brick dough, and the hummus olive oil flatbread. It was a crazy Indian spice mix, very tasty. The small plates were wonderful. We tried seared scallops, Swan's Island mussels (really rich broth), the wild mushroom tart and the spiced blue prawns. The aroma was captivating.

The soups and salads were very good. We tried both the butternut squash and the lentil soup, grilled Heart of Romaine, and roasted beet salad. The Limousine beef burger was a bit dry, and the fries were very tasty, but a little limp.

Desserts are much loved by our crowd. The choco ginger pots de creme got a "wow" response, and the double chocolate bread pudding, subtlety laced with chocolate, was a favorite. We all look forward to another meal at The Kenwood.


