Acceptance of this month's Financial Report (available online)

City update: Councilmember Lisa Goodman

Report by Lisa Goodman. Ian Alexander was introduced. He is running for House of Representatives in District 59B.

Paula Pentel was introduced. She is running for Hennepin County Board member.

Jeff Winter was introduced. He reported on People for Parks. He is meeting with Neighborhood Associations to spread the word on what they do. They are a grass-roots 501(c)(3) organization that contributes volunteer time and money to park projects and programs throughout the Minneapolis park system. Donations are accepted.

Patty Wycoff, NC activity report -

Garage Sale Update-30 families donated items to sell. Made over \$1,100 on sale and map registrations. Unsold items were donated to charity.

Membership Update- 319 people have joined and \$14,000 raised. Second mailing is not needed.

Ice Cream social is coming up. Safety Committee-On June 20 a walk thru the Area 3 neighborhood is planned. Meet on church lawn. Rowena Holmes is spearheading a Neighborhood Watch program.

Patty is running for District Area 4 school board. Margaret Kelliher is her campaign manager and Linda Shaheen is treasurer. Her name will be in the primary.

BMNA By-laws

Scott suggested that the NRP position be taken out of the by-laws. The Community School representative should also be removed. The process is to publish a notice in the Bugle the month preceding a vote.

Treasurer's report- Liz Pederson / Dave Holets

Liz reported that BMNA may deposit money into a USAA savings account for a rate of 3%.

NCEC report - Scott McLaughlin

Projects- 14 businesses have signed up for the Bryn Mawr Façade Improvement Project with a total investment of \$107,377. Leftover money from the Solar Program and leftover money from the NRP contract is \$25,650. Scott moved as follows:" The BMNA will provide \$12,825 from its general fund to Bryn Mawr businesses participating in the Bryn Mawr Business Façade Improvement Project in 2012, which is an addition of \$4,066 from our previous approved amount." The motion was seconded and passed.

Light Rail-Barry Shade-

No funding from MN State Legislature. The Preliminary engineering is moving ahead. Penn Station may not be in the final plans. Van White is expected to remain in the plans. Penn Station will function as a gateway to the Northside. Lisa recommends pushing for access to Van White.

Committee Reports

Community Projects

A "Little Free Library" has been installed in front of Honeyshine. They cost less than \$300. There are plans for a second one. The solar trash can may still be purchased but the cost is high. Rick is talking with Parks and Rec. Nice Ride is still under consideration.

Schools Committee – Jessica Wiley

District 4 school board member elections are coming up. Committee will be putting information about the school board elections on BMNA website. Information will also be published in The Bugle.

Garden Group - Dave Logsdon

There was a work party to clean up the downtown area with two more planned for the hedge and medians. The Garden Tour is coming up and tickets are for sale on our website.

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





From the Editor

This is the first summer in a very long time that I have worked full-time. As you can imagine, it has been quite an adjustment. Not only am I working 8 hours a day, 7 days a week, but my position is with the State of Minnesota's Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED.) This means I arrive at 8:00 and go home at 4:30. I know that some people thrive on this kind of structure, but I have always been one who needs more flexibility in my week.

The work (except for the bureaucratic paperwork) is very interesting and rewarding. I helped interview about 300 youth age 14-18 and place them in intern positions at local non-profit organizations. Now my job is to monitor the quality of the work experience for both the employer/supervisor and the youth.

I have have the added bonus of interacting with kids who I know from my days at Bryn Mawr and Anwatin schools. Of course, there are many who I have never met before and it is equally rewarding to be a part of this learning experience with them - to let them know that someone supports them and believes they can have a bright future.

I work (punch in and punch out) at the Minneapolis Workforce Center on Plymouth Ave. N. From there I get to go out to the work sites to

visit with supervisors and youth. The sites are quite varied from children's summer camps to professional offices. This week I got to spend an hour at Father Hennepin Park with a group who are working on landscaping projects with Tree Trust.

The youth in this program (called STEP-UP) are low-income, inner-city teens. They have been through job readiness training and are for the most part, hard-working and optimistic about their future. However, I quickly learned that, as in the public schools were I worked, there is often an unsettling back story which impacts their lives. and ability to be successful in the workplace.

I was horrified by the senseless, violent death of Stewie George, the 5-year-old boy who was killed by a bullet fired into his grandmother's home while he slept on her couch. My heart sank when I learned that he was the cousin of one of the wonderful interns who works with me in the DEED office. I cannot imagine her pain. Unbelievably, she is planning to return to work tomorrow, just two days after the shooting. Sadly, this is (the financial) reality for her. Even though random tragedy like this can happen to anyone, but it seems more likely to impact those for whom life is already difficult.

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
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Who Let The Moms Out?

Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books and Food

The Translation of Dr. Apelles, By David Treuer

ranslating the Native American experience is a challenge that many authors throughout American literature have taken on, with varying degrees of success. Here, two stories are interwoven in this surprise-ending novel by local author David Treuer. Treuer is a member of the Ojbwe nation and was raised on the Leech Lake Reservation in northern Minnesota.

In this book, a lonely translator of Native American languages discovers a document never before translated. It is an archetypical Native American love story: two children who are best friends, become teenagers in love. Will their families allow them to be together? What will happen? How many barriers will they overcome? Will this end happily or tragically as in so many such stories? It's a simple story, but this is the best part of the book.

Not all of us appreciated the interwoven modern day story of the narrator/translator who recognizes truths about his own life in the text that only he can read. His is not the most captivating of personalities. His own love story is less compelling, but at least he was inspired to finally seek out love.

The language throughout the book is beautiful and lyrical. Some in our group especially appreciated the use of some Algonquin (without translation) in parts of the book.

Themes in the book include the necessity of beauty, the nature of knowledge (is it created or discovered? how is it transferred? how is it stored?) who can best narrate the Native American experience?

There's symbolism in the names Apelles and Campaspe. These two characters in this book share the names of two lovers in ancient Greek history. The ancient Apelles was a renowned painter and court painter of Macedonia, of Alexander the Great fame. According to the Roman author, Pliny the Elder, while the painter Apelles was sketching one of Alexander the Great's concubines (whose name was Campaspe),

Apelles fell in love with her. To show his appreciation for the great painter's work, Alexander presented her to him.

This is a book that begs discussion and interpretation. There are many levels of meaning. If you are not worried about spoiling the ending, we recommend reading a few reviews before you read the book.

We think knowing the surprise twist will help you appreciate the book even more. Turns out Apelles was not translating an ancient text after all, but was rather translating himself so that someone else (Campaspe) could "read" him - it's right there in the title!

Reading this book, not understanding it completely, researching it and then, best of all, discussing it with our book club confidants, was great fun. This is a perfect example of the value of book clubs. (And you thought they were just for the wine!)

If you think you might want to read this book, we have placed a copy in the new "Little Free Library" in front of Basset Creek Arts and Honeyshine on Penn Ave.

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



View From the Bridge


Early Summer Weeds - Of this month's plants, Purple Loosestrife is the most invasive.

Stinging Nettle (Urtica dioica var. procera) Nettle Family, up to 6' tall. Stinging Nettle consists of a tall, unbranched stalk with leaves arranged opposite one another. Stems are four-sided. Leaves are 2" to 6" long, commonly lance-shaped, but sometimes egg-shaped or ovalshaped. Inconspicuous yellowgreen flowers form at intersections of leaves and stems. Egg-shaped fruits follow flowering. Rather than irritating the skin by transmitting a skin irritant by contact as is the case with Poison Ivy, Stinging Nettle transmits its toxin via hairs found on stems and on the bottoms of leaves. When the sharp tips of the hairs are broken off into skin, these hairs inject a mix of toxins. Effects include immediate pain, then prolonged itching and numbness, and occasionally reddish swelling. This weed spreads by seeds and by extensive rhizomes, which spread quickly - reportedly more than seven feet in a single year. Stinging Nettle grows in damp, rich soil such as is found in pastures and along lowland streams and ditches, but also in nurseries, orchards, and vegetable gardens. Some herbalists and others harvest tender new leaves - which they then cook lightly to neutralize toxins.

Dame's Rocket (Hesperis matronalis) Mustard Family, 1' to 3' tall.

Dame's Rocket resembles Garden phlox but with different number of petals. Flowers may be blue, white or purple; however the latter color is most common. Like garden phlox, if Dame's Rocket is cut back immediately after flowering, it will bloom a second time. Flower nectar attracts butterflies, moths, and hummingbirds. Like the aggressively invasive Garlic Mustard, Dame's Rocket flowers turn into wiry seed pods (1/2" to 3" long) that split open lengthwise and release many tiny black seeds. To differentiate between Dame's Rocket and garden phlox, with which it may be confused; count the petals. Phlox family relatives have five petals; while Mustard family members have four petals. Leaves are lance-shaped, and one to three inches long. Fine hairs cover both stems and leaves. The non-native annual or biennial, Dame's rocket, escaped garden cultivation to establish itself throughout Minnesota. Dame's Rocket grows on wet and dry sites in sun and shade, and along roads, open fields, and old homesteads. In past years, Dame's Rocket has colonized the northern portion of the bowl within Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden. The garden curator and staff plan are making efforts to control this weed.

Soapwort or Bouncing Bet/Betty (Saponaria officinalis) Pink or Carnation Family, 1' to 3' tall.



common plant name, Bouncing Bet,

also has its origins in this plant use;

as Bouncing Bet was once a nick-

name for a washerwoman. Online recipes suggest making liquid soap by boiling plant leaves in water. Suggested ratios include: twelve leafy stems to a pint of water or a cup of crushed, loosely packed soapwort leaves and three cups boiling water. Simmer or boil the mixture for fifteen to thirty minutes; and then cool and strain the liquid. Reportedly, this liquid soap keeps for only about a week. In addition, care should be exercised when using this natural soap as some individuals may experience skin irritation. Bryn Mawr Soap Company has nothing to fear of competition from Soapwort.

Soapwort plants thrive in full sun to light shade and will grow in any well-drained soil. Withstanding neglect, Soapwort grows well as groundcover in empty flower beds, woodland edges, or rock gardens. Plant colonies typically bloom from midsummer to fall. Formed tightly at the top of the plant stems, flower clusters are pale pink to white and lightly scented. Deadheading can often bring about additional blooming. After flowering, seed heads form, typically beginning at the top and moving downward. Slightly longer and thinner than flower buds, seed heads often have bits of flower remainders hanging from the ends of the heads. Deadheading is an important control method to prevent soapwort from becoming too invasive. Soapwort leaves provide food for butterfly larvae.

This non-native flower, or weed, is native to southern Europe and southwest Asia. Soapwort is considered an invasive or noxious weed in some states, but not yet in Minnesota. With its persistent rhizomes, Soapwort has invaded portions of Oliver Triangle garden (intersection of Cedar Lake Road and Oliver and Hawthome Avenues). The current Soapwort flower explosion and the subtle flower fragrance wafted on a light breeze almost justify keeping this somewhat pushy plant.

Purple Loosestrife (Lythrum salicaria) Loosestrife Family 2' to 5' tall

Until its disastrous effects were discovered in the 1930's, non-native purple loosestrife was a popular garden plant, and valued by beekeepers for the food source it provided for honeybees. From Martha



Hellander's book, The Wild Gardener, I discovered that Eloise Butler, herself, planted purple loosestrife in the garden in 1916.

Loosestrife grows in sunny moist areas of lakes, ponds, marshes, swamps as well as in damp upland areas. I once removed a single plant growing on the boulevard of then Bryn Mawr Coffee Shop, now Sparks Restaurant.

In June or July, when its showy flowers are an obvious key sign, Purple Loosestrife can be found in only fairly small populations at the Arboretum or on Minneapolis Lakes, a bit more commonly in some wetlands or lakes throughout southernand central Minnesota. Education and control efforts are making a difference.

The branched stems of Purple Loosestrife bear flowers clustered in long spikes (1' to 2' long). one-half-inch to three-quarter-inch wide flower has four to six purple petals with yellow centers. Though individual flowers are small, the overall effect of countless flowers assembled on flower spikes is impressive. Fading flowers are replaced with small seed capsules containing many seeds. Unbelievably, a single prolific Purple Loosestrife plant may reportedly produce between two and three million seeds in a year! One "plant" may occupy a large area since its rootstalks are extensive and may send up thirty to fifty flowering shoots!

One-inch to four-inch long lanceshaped leaves are arranged opposite one another and in whorls around flower stems, growing smaller near the top of stems – resembling some crazy spiral ladder. This Eurasia native was imported and grown for its showy flowers. It is found in sunny moist or wet areas including still waters of rivers, ponds, lakes, marshes, and swamps throughout the state and nation.

Wetlands offer the most diverse and productive of all nature's ecosystems. Unfortunately, this non-native aggressively displaces native water plans such as cattails and bulrush and impacts habitat for wildlife. Because of aquatic growing conditions, digging, handpulling, cutting, and chemical control are difficult. Fortunately, success has been seen with leaf-eating, root-boring, and flower-eating beetles tested as biological control. Researchers expect that, though eradication is unlikely, reductions of purple loosestrife infestation by eighty percent is hopeful and even possible ten to twenty years after establishment of the beetles.

Grand Opening of New Wirth Beach Area on June 9

n Saturday, June 9, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board held a grand opening to mark the reopening of Wirth Beach and completion of the many new features around the lake. The community celebration featured activities for all ages, including facepainting, water play, volleyball and orienteering led by the City of Lakes Nordic Ski Foundation. Food and



refreshments were served and lifeguards were on duty.

Improvements to Wirth Beach Area include a new 280-foot long beach boardwalk that wraps around the swim area, playgrounds, sand volleyball courts and parking lot. A new boardwalk along the north end of Wirth Lake completes a trail loop around the lake, while a restored wetland and other enhancements will improve the lake's water quality.

Improvements to Wirth Beach began in 2006 with the Wirth Lake Beach House renovation. Much of the subsequent work was completed last year, but the May 2011 tomado destroyed the newly installed floating dock, creating safety concerns and causing the beach to remain closed for the 2011 summer season. The swim dock was rebuilt last fall.

At 759 acres, Theodore Wirth Park is the largest park within the Minneapolis Park System. The CAC, which was formed to look at options for the Wirth Lake Area, was reconvened in October 2010 to consider other park needs such as winter recreation/active sports facili-




ties, operations facility consolidation, Wirth Chalet revitalization (including consideration of a restaurant), picnic pavilion rehabilitation, and trail and parkway upgrades.

A 19-member Community Advisory Committee (CAC) was appointed by Park Board commissioners, other government agencies, and community groups. Members represent a

wide range of park user groups and include three appointments by the Youth Coordinating Board. The CAC, which includes members appointed by the BMNA Board, has identified key needs for the park, engaged park users and area residents, and developed design statements and developed program ideas for areas of the park.

July 18, 2012

New moon. Even in Bryn Mawr one can see the "summer triangle" of bright stars grouped together. At 10 pm, start with Vega in the constellation Lyra, which is directly overhead and the brightest star in the sky. Slightly northeast find Deneb, at the head of the constellation Cygnus, which looks more like a cross than a swan to me. Directly south from Deneb is Altair in the constellation Aquila. Stargazing is a lot easier away from downtown.

Anwatin and Nellie Stone Johnson Ski Teams hit summer training mode!

"Cross-country skiing? What do you guys do in the summer?" That commonly asked question resonates with most Minneapolis fair weather folks who are eagerly anticipating upcoming days of beaches, barbeques and basking in the sun. While some prefer to bury their winter memories in the sand, the youth on the Anwatin and Nellie Stone Johnson Middle School Ski Teams are seeking out winter... on dryland.

"You only get to ski four months a year," said Anwatin Ski Team coach Allie Rykken. "We want to show the kids that cross-country skiing is a lifestyle, one that involves active outdoor adventure all year round." Diving into summer training mode, the athletes have continued to meet at Theodore Wirth Park for practices that involve mountain biking, roller skiing (simulates cross-country skiing on wheels), trail running and orienteering.

The Anwatin and Nellie Stone Johnson Ski Teams, run by the City of Lakes Nordic Ski Foundation, recently united for an Adventure Race at Theodore Wirth Park. Coach Rykken spent time constructing a one of a kind obstacle course that involved wit, teamwork and skill - amidst getting dirty, and having fun. "We were looking to do something that the kids could train for," said Rykken who meets with Anwatin skiers three times a week for summer practices. "Adventure races have different components so we used those parts as mini goals to focus our training on throughout the spring. They worked on their map reading (orienteering) skills and endurance in preparation for the race."

The race began with a mountain bike ride nearly two miles to the high point of Wirth. From there they ran and biked a 3 mile course that required them to complete seven stations including: fixing a flat tire on a bicycle, tossing a Frisbee into a bucket, maneuvering a tractor tire around cones, answering trivia about skiing and mountain biking on the trail, and ultimately balancing for five seconds as a team on the skeeder todder (a glorified see saw) without it touching the ground.

Arenzo Jones, who skied for Nellie Stone Johnson, celebrated after his team won the event. "I love how much air you get when you hit the bumps!" he said describing his mountain bike ride. Jones leamed how to ski in elementary school in the Foundation's Minne-Loppet Program and continued to ski on the middle school team. He was happy he still gets to practice with his coaches in the summer. "I want to ski more when I get older, and encourage my sisters to ski too."

and quality sound, lighting, sets and costumes, resulting in beautiful, funny, and moving performances.




Calvin Leitch-Lodge, Area 3




and pursue a career in physical therapy. She will also be competing on their track team. Her parents are Gary and Janet Pashibin.
