

Rebid repaying trails beginning next year for BM Meadows. The Work would include repair of base and then re- pave. There were no bidders in the fall.

### **City of Minneapolis: Councilmember Lisa Goodman**

Lunch with Lisa is scheduled for Oct 23 at Opus Hall @ 11:30 am. The presentation will be a discussion with candidates for Park Commissioner-at-Large. There may be a change in format in the future. Street sweeping is scheduled to begin Oct 23rd. It is against City policy to allow contractors or neighbors to sweep leaves into street.

Election judges are still needed. If interested, please contact Lisa. City's budget is in process. On Nov 11th, a public hearing is scheduled. Cultural volunteers are needed for a team to deal with crises. 6 to 7 weeks of training is included. A Choice of Weapons is the choice for Mpls One-Read.

### LRT Project update: Barry **Schade**

Station Support Resolution-Vida, Jay and Barry wrote a resolution to support the shallow tunnel option. The Corridor Management Committee chaired by Sue Haig of Met Council voted to support the shallow tunnel option rather than the relocation to St Louis Park. They support cutting the last station in Eden Prairie and 21st street station. The rationale is the need to keep moving forward with LRT. Penn Avenue and Van White stations are still in project along with both tunnels.

Barry moved to pass resolution, Jessica seconded.

Discussion included that the Bottineau impact statement is to be released in December. Bottineau supporters don't want to see SW be a negative example. There are also unknown environmental concerns and many people have come out against co-location. It was suggested that a public process take place before passing a resolution. Lisa says that the Minneapolis City Council will not vote for this plan. Other neighborhoods are opposed to it. Effect upon hydrology is unknown and approximately 1000 trees will be lost. No study of pollution has been done. No money is in budget for these ideas. BMNA is on record for supporting LRT without co-location. Guthmann moved to table motion, Longsdon 2nd the motion. Motion passed to table the resolution.



In addition to a new career, he has also launched a website (www.greglecker.com) to promote his drawing and painting, which I imagine will keep him busy.

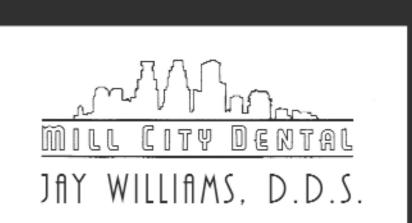
Many thanks to Greg for his years of service to Bryn Mawr. I know we will see great things from him in the future and hope our paths cross often in the years ahead.

### Wirth Co-op Efforts Continue to Grow!

Solve to build a solve the effort to build a local food co-op north of 394 continues to grow. With a mission is to provide healthy, local and organic food choices and to help build community in North Minneapolis and the surrounding neighborhoods, the Wirth Cooperative Grocery aims to provide foods specific to neighbors' needs including non-traditional ethnic foods, deli items, local and organic produce and more.

A co-op is a business organization owned and operated by a group of individuals for their mutual benefit--owned and controlled equally by the people who use its services and by the people who work there. Rather than rewarding outside investors with its profits, a co-op returns surplus revenue to its members in proportion to how much they use the co-op. This approach to business results in an economic force that benefits the co-op, its members and the communities it serves.

In 2008 the Harrison Neighborhood Association took the lead in coordinating

Wirth Co-op's creation by working with a volun-

teer board of directors recruit and northside neighbor- Holzap

hood groups to create the mission and logo for the developing project. In 2010 and 2012 the McKnight Foundation invigorated the project with two grants to performa feasible study, build a board, and then formalize a business plan to recruit co-op members. In 2013 the Landon Group, a local community development fim, was hired to organize the ideas and past work of the Wirth co-op to physical fruition.

The Wirth Co-op is working hard toward a goal of 400 members by the end of this year! Efforts for community education and member recruitment are happening with door-to-door conversations, presentations at church and neighborhood groups, and neighbor hosted house parties. Wirth Co-op membership is \$100 with a choice to pay all at once or in four installments of \$25 within one year from registration.

Lois served on the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association Board and was a regular contributor to the Bryn Mawr Bugle.



### Bryn Mawr Writer's First Novel Receives Warm Reception

### **Drawing on Nature**



#### November 2013, Eleventh in a Series Harvesting and Storing Tender Bulbs

illing frosts will have ended the 2013 growing season by the time this column is published. If you've not done so yet, you may still be able to remove and salvage tender bulbs for re-use in 2014.

Many bulbs are hardy and can remain in the garden year-round: Daffodil, Tulip, Snowdrops, Squill, Crocus, Hyacinth, Grape Hyacinth, and Allium. However, others originate in tropical regions and will not survive a Minnesota winter. Such tender plants include: Canna, Tuberous Begonia, Calla Lily, Gladiolus, Dahlia, and Caladium.

Many gardeners harvest and save bulbs and bulb-like structures year after year. They often share plants with friends, neighbors, and relatives. With care, it's possible to propagate these plants. Mature tubers and rhizomes of some varieties may be stored with a fairly reliable level of success. Some varieties produce larger tubers or rhizomes that can be divided often. However, tubers and rhizomes of some varieties grow more slowly or mature later in the growing season. In this case, storing and dividing tubers or rhizomes may be less successful.


Though instructions for harvesting and storing each type of tender bulb (or corm, rhizome, or tuber) vary slightly from one plant to another, there are several key consistencies. Except for Caladium, store bulbs in a cool but not freezing location. Store each color or cultivar separately with labels for the following year's reference.

#### **Tuberous Begonia**

During a dormancy period, tubers must be stored inside, away from frost and cold. To prepare tubers for dormancy, reduce watering and stop feeding by the end of August. After the first killing frost or when foliage begins to yellow, whichever comes first, dig up and remove tubers. Cut away stems to about five inches long and "cure" tubers indoors, in a dark place, until stems dry and loosen. Remove stems and roots and soil, but don't wash tubers. Store tubers in a perforated plastic bag with peat moss or vermiculite in a cool, dark place such as an unfinished area of one's basement, attic, or three-season porch but above freezing temperatures. Ideal storage temperatures are forty to fifty degrees. If this is unavailable, a spare refrigerator may be used. Monitor tubers for decay, softening, or withering and discard. Caladium Following tuber harvest at the end of the season, tubers must be "cured" by warming to 90 degrees for three days, and then stored at 70 to 75 degrees for at least six weeks. Relatively high humidity (seventyfive percent) and good air circulation are required for storage. Fungal diseases are common in improperly stored tubers or in tubers grown in unfavorable conditions. Do not store below 70 degrees! **Canna** 

It's not uncommon for a Canna rhizome to have nearly doubled in size, often growing together with its neighboring rhizomes. After the first killing frost has discolored the standing stems and leaves, cut off stems near the level of soil. Do not allow rhizomes to freeze. While temperatures allow digging in soil, grab a shovel and dig carefully at some distance around plant stems to avoid damaging rhizomes. After dislodging the root mass, carefully lift it from the surrounding soil. Even better yet, if Canna are planted in containers, turn the container over and empty the pot. Then, remove soil from the mass of rhizomes and refill the container. Store the ceramic or terra cotta containers indoors, protected from damage from freezing temperatures. Plastic containers may be stored outdoors, though shading pots from sun will prevent fading or deterioration from the sun's ultraviolet radiation.

Removing the majority of soil and separating rhizomes is the next step in preserving them. As the soil dries out, it will be easier to remove by hand. It's easiest to use gloved fingers to carefully separate soil clods which should fall away. Next, examine the conglomeration of rhizomes, and determine where it may be pulled apart. Cut stems very close to the rhizomes so as to conserve storage space. I've had good experience storing Canna rhizomes in five-gallon plastic buckets in my tempered, but unfinished basement. There, temperatures do not fall below freezing but do drop below those experienced in the living spaces upstairs. This moderation and the dryness prevents or slows disease development. A detached or even an attached insulated garage is unacceptable, unless some minimal level of heat is maintained. Next spring, examine the recycled rhizomes \_ for signs of softness. Rhizomes should be firm;



new corms. Remove old, damaged or diseased corms. Treat for insects and fungus. Store corms in paper bags, cloth sacks or nylon pantyhose to allow ventilation. Store in temperatures of 35 to 45 degrees F; but do not allow corms to freeze. Miniature corms (cormels) that have developed during the summer may be saved and replanted annually until they grow large enough to produce flowering plants.

#### Calla Lily

Unlike its relatives, jack-in-the-pulpit and Skunk Cabbage, Calla Lily is not hardy in Minnesota. Tuber-like rhizomes must be dug up and stored inside over the winter. After frost has killed foliage, remove rhizomes and store in a light planting medium such as peat moss or vermiculite. Some air circulation is required during storage; and yet, rhizomes should not dry out during storage. Amaryllis and Paperwhite Narcissus The subject of the second column in this series, Amaryllis and Paperwhite Narcissus are also tender bulbs. However, these bulbs are

and color should be white to red. Discard those that are shriveled and wrinkled, soft, or blackened.

#### Dahlia

Instructions for harvesting and storing Dahlia tubers are similar to those for Canna rhizomes. One difference is that Dahlia tuber are brown forms, without the color of Canna rhizomes.

#### Gladiolus

Remove corms about four to eight weeks after foliage dies naturally, and after frost if not before. Cut stem just above each corm. Cure corms for two to three weeks in a warm, dry, well-ventilated area at about 60 - 70 degrees F. After curing, old corms will easily separate from the bottoms of the new corms that grew during the summer. Discard the old corms and save the planted indoors not outdoors. Outdoors, temperatures may be dropping. Indoors, we are cocooning in our warm, dry homes. Consider planting up Amaryllis or Paperwhite Narcissus to bring color and fragrance to our dark Minnesota homes this winter!



November 10, 2009 6th straight sunny day with high in the 60s during a spell of Indian summer.

- November 13, 2005 Red fox in the Bryn Mawr Elementary School parking lot at twilight.
- November 17, 2013 Full moon, the Ojibwe Freezing moon.
- November 28, 2013 Comet ISON's closest approach to the sun, 724,000 miles. This is a one-time comet never seen before, expected to become as bright as Venus, with a tail visible to the naked eye. It will be brightest as it loops around the sun but lost in the sun's glare until it moves away through the month of December to pass about 40,000 miles from earth on December 26. During this time it will move from low in the eastern sky to a more northerly position and be 2° from the North Star on Jan 8. Best viewing (higher in the sky, farther from the sun) should be mid-to-late December. This assumes it will not break into pieces as it passes the sun, which is considered unlikely since it's thought to have enough mass to hold together.


