Saturnalia Wagon Rides & Road Closure

Saturday, December 8th is Saturnalia 2012 in Downtown Bryn Mawr. Please note that on this day, Cedar Lake Road from Laurel Avenue West to Russell Avenue South will be closed to through traffic from 3:30 PM to 7 PM. Barricades and safety cones will be placed at each end of the street so that emergency vehicles and the hay wagon can pass through.

We ask residents who live on this street for their understanding and to please enter and leave the roadway by the west end (the Russell Avenue entry rather than the Laurel Avenue entry).

We ask residents and businesses located within a few blocks of Downtown Bryn Mawr (in other words, within a few blocks of Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church) to please turn porch or holiday lights on!

Also, we ask for supervision of children riding the hay wagon. Children may not climb on or off the wagon while the wagon is moving. Doing so is very dangerous and may result in injury.

City of Minneapolis Impound Lot Update: Atif Saeed

CPED acquired property near Impound Lot and wants to combine with other parcels for development. The plan is to reduce amount of land for impound lot and free up for development and upgrade grounds of building. CPED will collaborate with neighborhoods for design of development and reduction of land in lot. Consultants will be hired for meetings with Harrison, ROC and BMNA. By end of June, they will have recommendations.

HC Environmental Services Recycling Grants: Paul Kroening

Hennepin County has grants available for businesses upgrading to single sort recycling from \$10,000 to \$50,000. News release for Bugle will be prepared.

CEE Home Energy Squad Program: Emma Struss-Next month.

SW LRT Project update: Barry,

Jay and Vida Project on hold for 3 months to allow project office staff to look at alternatives. Staff is reviewing relocation and existing vegetation. There will be a report in January on freight rail relocation including recommendation for replacement of existing vegetation. There will have to be a supplemental Environmental Impact Statement for shallow tunnel.

Garden of Hope and Healing Update: Kathryn Kaatz

There have been two clean-up site events. Community service group sent people to help. The Basset Creek Watershed can use Round Up,. paint stumps or torch stumps. The committee sent Shereen email to discuss vacating property. Between the Park Board or her, Shereen is considered the best choice because the Park Board requires more steps. Pat is planning a design charrette for Jan or Feb. A link to BMNA website from committee website will be established.

Treasurer's report: Dennis Fazio-

Repaid \$10,000 to City for Solar Program. Total assets \$72,000. All need to fill out documentation for expense reimbursement. Excel forms will be put on the website.

Standing Committee Reports Communications Committee-

They are managing the BMNA website. All are encouraged to send feedback. Reviewing of staff contracts is also part of this committees' responsibility.

Schools-

5 year enrollment plan did not affect Bryn Mawr. New version-recommends to move immersion program out of Bryn Mawr. (UPDATED version will not move immersion out of Anwatin. It will stay dual IB/Immersion).

Meetings are being held to review. Attendance areas in Bryn Mawr are not affected.

Gardens-

Last meeting of year was held and developed goals for next year. They decided to move the meetings to BM Elementary School Cafeteria. They are also planning to put up signs for work sessions and install plaques for the public gardens. A treasurer for the committee is needed. There will be no Garden Tour next year. May sponsor Pedal to Petals.





11. The best part of my work (at Community Education, the Bugle, Project SUCEESS) is feeling like I make a difference in my community.


12. I tend to be indecisive, but some of my best decisions have been made impulsively.



Call for Volunteers: Ideas and Energy Needed for Bryn Mawr's Neighborhood Priority Plan

ome one, come all! The BMNA is looking for ideas and volunteers, and volunteers with ideas and energy, to participate in a working group for the next round of the CPP (or Community Participation Program) of the city of Minneapolis. The CPP is the successor of the Neighborhood Revitalization Program (NRP), that Minneapolis replaced earlier this year.

As part of the CPP, the program introduces Neighborhood Priority Plans (or NPP), designed to allocate funds to Minneapolis' neighborhoods. These funds can be used to support the BMNA's community engagement activities and other expenses, as well as to fund other work on priorities identified in a Neighborhood Priority Plan. For the year 2014 to 2016, about \$56,000 have been allocated to Bryn Mawr.

In the past, NRP funds have been used for Bryn Mawr's business façade project, downtown lighting and street improvements, solar program, raingardens, and many other neighborhood initiatives. This time around, the working group will rely on the community's participation to go forward and improve Bryn Mawr's identity of "a neighborhood within a park": any and all ideas and projects will be welcome.

Ideally, the working group will meet once a month in the early stages, as ideas and projects are thrown around in brainstorming sessions, and will then whittled down to fit Bryn Mawr's needs. Ultimately, project proposals will be submitted to the City's Neighborhood and Community Relations staff for approval and funding.

If you are interested, or know of someone else who might like to attend and offer ideas for local projects, the working group is open to all in the neighborhood. Enrollment Plan for Minneapolis Schools - Listening Session at Anwatin December 4, 6:00 pm

In September, Minneapolis Public Schools (MPS) made a proposal to the Board of Education to make changes to program offerings, attendance areas, school pathways and capital improvements designed to address issues of enrollment at schools. The plan seeks to find ways to accommodate an increase in enrollment in MPS by creating more space at over enrolled schools and expanding or adding programs in buildings where space is available.

Although the possibility of changing the high school options for Bryn Mawr students was considered during the development of the proposal, the plan presented to the Board did not include this recommendation. Instead the district is proposing an addition to Southwest in 2016 and shared space for Washburn High School at Ramsey Middle School in 2015.

The current proposal also makes changes to the schools which feed into Anwatin Middle School. Students who attend Bethune will now be pathwayed into the re-opened Franklin Middle School.

Also in the plan is a new Spanish Dual Immersion (SDI) high school program in the Roosevelt building. Students who are in the SDI program at Anwatin would pathway to Roosevelt to continue their IB/Immersion education.

The district has held several "Listening Sessions" around the city to hear what the public thinks of the plan, so it can be refined before the final vote by the Board on Dec. 10. The last session before the vote will be on December 4 at Anwatin Middle School.

The anticipated topic of discussion will primarily be the high school pathway for the immersion program. But the full plan, as currently being proposed, will presumably be reviewed.

At the Listening Session at Washbum High School on November 20, Board of Education Director Rebecca Gagnon told the audience that she believes that the board will not make amendments on Dec. 10, but rather vote for or against the full plan as it is presented. She stated that all the recommendations are interconnected and changing one part would have a ripple effect on the rest of the plan.

Who Let The Moms Out?

Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books and Food

Cutting for Stone, by Abraham Verghese At over 650 pages, including a great deal of medical detail, this book is an intense read. A complex story with compelling characters, it will probably end up on our "best books" list. Twin boys, Marian and Shiva, born conjoined at the head in 1950, are raised in an Ethiopian hospital affectionately called Missing. The boys' lives parallel their adoptive parents' as they find themselves captivated by medicine. Growing up in Addis Ababa, poverty and political tu moil haunt their lives. The story involves numerous supporting characters, all given a full history, and an intricate plot, based loosely on historical events of the past 50 years.

The themes of love and betrayal dominate the writing. Marian struggles with betrayal by his father, his brother, and the love of his life, Genet, only coming to terms with forgiveness as an older man. All the main characters live in exile, and the yearning for home is finally appeased when Marian realizes that "home is where you are needed."

According to a New York Times review, the reader's mind stalls among all the medical descriptions. But the consensus in our group was that the detailed accounts of treating disease, infection, aiding difficult births, and organ transplants were enthralling. The author, himself a doctor, depicts the contemporary situation where a facility in a poor Boston neighborhood acts as a donor hospital for a facility for the rich. That the value of the lives of the poor was enhanced by the exploitation of the exclusive hospital is only one of the dichotomies explored in the book.

The storytelling is gripping; moving back and forth from India to Ethiopia, following the Ethiopian civil war that forces Marian to New York and Boston. This is a good book to curl up with on a cold winter evening. **Spill the Wine**

If you're looking to go out, fun can be found at Spill the Wine, newly located from their Washington Avenue space to Lake Street and Bryant. The food was excellent and affordable. And there's a \$10 coupon in the Chinook Book. We tried several of the small plates and found them all to have a skillful blending of ingredients. The new space was sleek and modern but saddly all those hard surfaces made for an extremely loud evening and we found it almost impossible to carry on a conversation.

While it's only wine and beer, they plan to have a full bar early next year. The mussels were spicy; the lobster crepes rich. The dessert menu was extensive and our propensity for trying new things and sharing meant our bill was higher than usual. We were lucky enough to be seated in a cozy booth near the back of the restaurant where we found it easy to carry on conversation. The service at both places was excellent. What the Moms are reading now: Everything Matters!, by Ron Currie.


