ach year the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association (BMNA) holds its annual membership and neighbor meeting in May. Please plan to join us on Wednesday, May 14, in the Community

Park & Recreation Board (MPRB) and City of Minneapolis Solid Waste and Recycling, the Minneapolis Earth Day Clean Up was initiated in 1995 to draw attention to the water quality improvement needs of Minneapolis' lakes and the effects that individual actions have on urban water quality.

The goal of the Earth Day Clean Up is to provide a volunteer experience and environmental education to Minneapolis residents and park users. This annual event involves cleaning Minneapolis parks, neighborhoods, watersheds and water bodies including: the Chain of Lakes, Lake Nokomis, Lake Hiawatha, Powderhom Lake, Diamond Lake, Shingle Creek, Minnehaha Creek, Bassett's Creek and the Mississippi River.

1. Call to Order & Introductions Board Members and Staff attending are as follows:

2. Approval of Consent Agenda-

Moved, seconded and passed Minutes of last month's meeting Today's Agenda

3. Garden Tour Update: Carolyn Bastick

New chair of Garden Tour, has already started, has updated website for this event, it shall be 1st weekend in May, promotions have started, has some volunteers. Included in budget for 2014. An expense report with receipts should be turned into the Treasurer for reimbursement.

4. Minneapolis Impound Lot Update: Beth Grosen (CPED) and Jon Wertges (Public Works)

Presentation of city owned property near the Impound Lot for City of Minneapolis. Goal is to shrink the Impound Lot and attract developers to the area. The March presentation is an introduction to the proposal. In April there will be an updated presentation. The process will include community input. In May further presentations will be made and then taken to the City Council in June.

Recommendations-Reduce size of the impound lot, improve the facility or build new. Combine adjacent parcels for development.

There are two approaches to the existing building; either remodel or build a new one.

The site should be studied to determine if and how the lots can be shrunk.

CEPED-Development-Braun Intertec has been hired to report on soil and site conditions and conduct a feasibility study, reports will be filed next week, by end of April they should have a good sense of soil conditions, CEPED is close to the selection of a real estate marketing professional to assist in making the decision as to what should be built. Light industrial or housing are two possibilities. In early 2015, an RFP for the publically owned property should be ready. Federal money has been used for some of the current purchases so MNDOT approval is necessary.

5. Hamison "Bridge" Program: Jerry Schaefer (HNA)

HNA Alternate-Changes in make-up of the Board have been implemented. The Staff driven Board has changed to a resident-driven board. There are four new members to ROC. The current board wants a productive relationship with BM. They believe that education is a key to making changes in the Harrison Neighborhood. They have started to work with the State University bridge program (catch up program for freshman) to expand into neighborhoods. They are looking for a school room where professors can run a program in Harrison. Adult volunteers will be needed as mentors and tutors. They will continue to keep us updated.

6. Area 5 Representative Nominations and Election

Beth Tu mbull was nominated by Barry for Area 5 Rep, seconded and passed.

7. Neighborhood Coordinator report: Patty Wycoff

BM was approved for 3 hydrants by the Mpls. Park Board. BM uses 5 and pays for 2.

Malik Holt Shabazz-Mpls. Bicycle Coalition advocates and lobbies for bike lane development. They have requested that BMNA sign on as a sponsor supporting their work. Barry moved to sponsor, seconded and passed.

Membership drive will be handled by Jessica and will market PayPal options, per month or quarterly,

Garage Sale-April begins sign up phase. Patty is asking for more board involvement i.e. picking up donations, passing out maps, and working the sale. She will bring a sign-up sheet to the next meeting.

Annual Meeting-One rep from each area should bring a table centerpiece and Board members should commit to attending.

8. Report on "Financing Great Places" workshop: Sandie and Vida

Speakers on Crowd Funding, Cooperatives and traditional investment presented to the Urban Land Institute as way of funding development. BMNA can be a funding pass-thru.

9. Report on Bassett Creek Watershed Bank Improvements

Shoreline on west side and downstream is being improved. Taking some trees and a new park trail will be part of the improvements. Vida is advocating for the plan for the park commons in the Basset Creek Masterplan to be incorporated into the 10 year plan.

10. SW LRT Project update: Barry Schade and Vida Ditter

L RT is at a political level with details in the morning paper tomorrow. The Minneapolis City Council is against keeping freight lines in Kenilworth corridor. By June 30th , the funds could be shifted to Bottineau Line.

11. NPP Coordinator-Yonathon

Community Investment Fund will award grants for community improvement. Proposals will be accepted from neighborhood groups.

12. Standing Committee Reports

Communications: Jeneen Hartley Sago They are in the middle of a pilot project to manage the website and to develop requirements for posting on it. The Committee has the right to turn down any posting.

Gardens: Jason Rathe

They met and discussed the Garden Tour and possibly allowing artists to show their work in the gardens.

Nominating: Dennie Juillerat and Vida Ditter

They are putting together a ballot for the upcoming year. If anyone is interested in serving, let a Committee Member know.

I saw seven 10-minute skits designed to expose "Rights and Responsibilities" in history. I got to read a couple pages about their research process and a bibliography of their source materials. Best of all, I got to ask them questions and learn even more about their passion for the subject.

It was a great day that went by all too quickly. The auditorium was packed with students and their supporters. and 12 Anwatin students advanced to the State History Day competition with 8 more receiving honorable mention awards.


This may not sound like your idea of a good way to spend a Saturday, but I came away even more excited about today's youth and the positive impact they will have on the future for all of us.





Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

Good Lord Bird James McBride

ne of the early books read by our neighborhood mom's book club, was The Color of Water by James McBride. That book was subtitled a Black Man's Tribute to his White Mother. (Appropriate for a mom's group, don't you think?) It was a serious autobiography about a contemporary family and about race in America. This most recent book club selection, also by McBride, covers those same topics but in a completely different way. It's a novel set in the 1850's and is very funny. The narrator is a completely fictitious boy, a twelve year old black slave who spends virtually the whole novel disguised as a young girl called Onion. The other main character in the book is the very non-fictitious anti-slavery activist John Brown. The plot consists of Brown stealing Onion out of slavery after his father is killed in a bar brawl, and then leading him and a gang of misfits around western Kansas and eastern Missouri attempting to fulfill Brown's abolitionist quest. Now, obviously, there is nothing funny about slavery, but its unique treatment in this novel gives us permission to laugh, mainly at the wry observations of the young protagonist about the goings on around him, and also at the dialect used very effectively throughout the book.

We all liked the book. Some appreciated the historical detail more than others. There were a few too many fight scenes, and a few too many descriptions of Brown's extremely overwrought prayer recitals, but generally there were plenty of interesting characters and situations. The whole thing ended up at Harpers Ferry and history tells us what happened there. The book is very readable. A good y am Much of it is written in the supposed dialect of the day, which some found off-putting. Overall, the moms give this book, and James McBride, a big thumbs up. **Coup D'état**

Oup D'état has opened to rave reviews and we echo them! It was hopping on a Friday night. We had a booth just off the bar where we could watch all the action. As is often a problem for us, it was loud! But there are some quiet spaces in the back that we would ask for next time.

There is a French New Orleans feel to the décor, high ceilings and beautiful chandeliers. There is a very adventurous appetizer menu, and other small plates, so we decided to forgo entrees and taste the small plates and salads.

We started with deviled eggs, creamy and absolutely yummy, with a salty taste of trout roe. The frog legs were huge, breaded in a tempura crust and glazed with a spicy honey. The Italian sausage pizza crust was light and crisp, and the baby octopus, with red chile citrus vinaigrette served on grilled bread brushed with yogurt, was delicious, although a bit chewy for some. We followed up with three salads, brussels sprouts, and a margherita pizza. The beet salad brought groans of satisfaction to the beet lovers, and the escarole and treviso and the arugula were filled with nuts, dried fruit, and cheese. The brussels sprouts were roasted with bacon and walnuts. What else needs to be said?

Three tasty desserts topped if off; tiramisu, carrot cake, and panna cotta. The service was exceptional. The wait staff was friendly and attentive- we almost got one server to juggle for us. Our only complaint was that the bar service was a bit slow—"Where's our beer?" and we had to hold off on eating dessert while we waited for freshly brewed coffee.


