BMNA Community Projects Selected

The deas for projects that will improve our community were solicited from neighbors during February and March. The Community Project Committee created a prioritized list, evaluated the projects, and made a recommendation for three 2014 projects at the April 2014 BMNA meeting.

The BMNA Board has elected to pursue two projects in the coming months. The first project involves exploring building a picnic table at Brownie Lake, and the second is to build homes for screech owls who are losing their nests as ash trees are taken down.

The Board also approved exploring the sponsorship of a neighborhood event during the Loppet ski race in February 2015.

This year many ideas were submitted for improving the Bryn Mawr Meadows and the Chestnut Street Park. Our Park Board Representative, Anita Tabb, has assured us that the Park Board has plans for fixing the perimeter path at the Meadows. We will continue to follow this as the weather improves and work can begin. Another neighbor has volunteered to contact the Park Board about the shabby conditions at the Chestnut Street Park.







A letter to BRYN MAWR residents

Tthink that every body in Bryn Mawr should be concerned by Lthe recent notice, from the assessor, what our homestead market value increases will be for tax purposes. Therefore, next year, our homestead property taxes will increase because of that and all the political rhetoric that our homestead property taxes are supposed to decrease, will be out of the proverbial window.

The homestead property tax continues to be a problem for the homeowners because it is a tax on our incomes. I don't think that anybody can dispute the fact that we all pay our homestead property taxes from our incomes. And since there is no alternative how else to pay the property taxes, it creates a problem of inequity between individual taxpayers. Last year Governor Dayton stated that the homestead property tax is the most unfair tax in Minnesota. But things don't have to be unfair. There is a solution how to implement a fair and affordable homestead property tax for every homeowner.

Last year, a fair homestead property tax adjustment concept, based



on the Voss Report, was advanced to Senator Dibble and Representative Hornstein. They agreed to draft a bill for a hearings at the Senate and House tax committees. However, to this day, no bill has been drafted. It looks like we will not get a fair homestead property tax adjustment by next year, but instead, another unfair tax increase.

For people who are not familiar with the Voss Report, a brief summary is as follows: It is a report prepared by the Minnesota Department of Revenue that measures the homestead property tax burden based on our incomes to generate the same tax revenue as the assessor driven tax does now. A fair homestead property tax burden for the Bryn Mawr residents would be around three percent (3%) if it was based on our incomes.

I know that most of us in Bryn Mawr are paying more than three percent (3%) of our incomes in homestead property taxes this year. Therefore, if you are interested in a fair and affordable homestead property taxes that are around three percent (3%), please call Sen. Dibble (651-296-4191) and Rep. Homsteit (651-296-6753) and ask them what happened to their promise of drafting a bill for fair homestead property tax adjustment.





Want to Keep Your Neighborhood Safe? Form a Block Club

he 4th Precinct of the Minneapolis Police Department covers Bryn Mawr. On January 25th, precinct leadership held an appreciation party for Block Leaders from all the neighborhoods in the precinct. Over 100 people attended.

Crime data indicates that blocks that have organized block leadership have less crime. Bryn Mawr has been part of the Block Leader program for decades. Many of our blocks have identified Block Leaders who organize events like National Night Out and other block parties. If you are interested in serving as a block leader, contact Tim Hammett at timothy.hammett@minneapolismn.gov and he will help you get organized and provide support.

Speakers at the appreciation event on January 25th included Police Chief Janee Harteau, Hennepin County Attorney Gail Baez, 4th Precinct Inspector Mike Kjos, and City Council member Barb Johnson. All thanked Block Leaders for their work as part of community crime prevention, and offered helpful tips for dealing with crime.

Court Watch is a collaborative, community based approach to criminal justice. Concerned citizens partner with police, prosecutors, probation officers and others to promote sentencing accountability within the court system. Each month the 4th Precinct offers a session for those who are willing to write impact statements to address public safety needs. 
Livability crimes include drug dealing, prostitution, weapons violations, and unlawful alcohol sales. Nuisance crimes undermine public safety and need to be reported. The first step for neighbors is to call 911 if criminal activity is suspected; or 311 if an ongoing nuisance problem is occurring. Reporting must occur, both to intervene in the activity and to create a record in cases where the activity cannot be immediately stopped. The Hennepin Attorney's Office can also help you with nuisance crimes. Their citizen's line is 612-348-2146.

Block Leaders are a connection to the Minneapolis Police Department's community crime prevention strategy. Support the department; support your block; become a block leader.






Bringing Purple Martins back to Bryn Mawr

f you drive past the Children's Garden on Glenwood Avenue today, you'll notice a new Londo development in the neighborhood – a 14-unit purple martin house. 



New Children's Mental Health Center Being Built Near Bryn Mawr

inneapolis Mayor Betsy Hodges joined Washbum Center for Children on April 1 to help raise the final beam on the nonprofit's new facility, located in nearby Harrison neighborhood.

The new 55,000 square foot building at the intersection of Glenwood and Dupont Avenues will be home to Washbum Center for Children, Minnesota's leading children's mental health center which provides therapeutic support to children with anxiety, depression, learning difficulties, trauma or other emotional challenges. The 131-year-old nonprofit provides a vital community resource and serves nearly 2,700 children and approximately 8,000 family members each year through center-based, in-home and school programs.

The new children's mental health facility responds to the community's growing needs. One out of five Minnesota children will experience mental health challenges, yet only 20% of these children will get professional help. Washburn Center for Children has expanded its services and doubled the number of children served, which put an insumountable strain on its current facility at 2430 Nicollet Ave. The new facility provides an expanded and nature-infused therapeutic environment to help children heal and grow into



happy, healthy members of the community.

The development, recently recognized with a "Best in Real Estate" award from Minneapolis St. Paul Business Journal, is scheduled to open in late 2014.

Nearly \$1.3 million remains to be raised to complete the \$24.5 million capital campaign. State support as well as charitable donations from corporations, foundations and individuals have made this vital community resource possible. Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

I-Robot, by Isaac Asimov

7ritten in 1950, the story takes place in the mid 2050's. By then, robots were standard in the human experience, although not universally loved. Asimov envisioned human progress in developing robots at a much faster pace than reality has bome out. That said, the Star Tribune reported on April 19, 2014, that "Robonaut, the first out-of-thisworld humanoid, is finally getting its space legs. For three years, Robonaut has had to manage from the waist up. This new pair of legs means the experimental robot now stuck on a pedestal — is going mobile at the International Space Station. "Legs are going to really kind of open up the robot's horizons," said Robert Ambrose." Maybe Asimov's predicted future is finally coming. A favorite part of the book was in the last chapter—a five paragraph summary of the last 500 years of world history.

While we found the writing to be quite inelegant, with characters telling each other to "Shut up, you make me sick," and "Oh go bash your skull," we enjoyed talking about the three rules of robotics and the dilemmas they posed:

A robot may not injure a human being or, through inaction, allow a human being to come to harm. A robot must obey the orders given to it by human beings, except where such orders would conflict with the First Law.

A robot may not injure its own kind and defend its own kind unless it is interfering with the first or second rule.

There were big questions raised about human relationships with technology, like what if the last kindness a person feels comes from a machine? Asimov felt that "it is easier to ask such questions when the technology is personified: when you can look it in the face."

We agreed that the book was more of a cautionary tale about the economic and social upheaval potential of robots, not a morality or religious warning. Even though the author used the term "fundamentalists" to describe the anti-robot crowd, they used religion as a cover for their real fear of robots taking everyone's jobs. The book could have been written yesterday.

We had a lively discussion while drinking lemon drop martini's with cukes, using Prairie Organic vodka made in Minnesota. Whoo wee! Now there's something a robot can't really enjoy.


