Saturnalia Wagon Rides & Road Closure

Saturday, December 13th is Saturnalia 2014 in Downtown Bryn Mawr. Please note that on this day, Cedar Lake Road from Laurel Avenue West to Russell Avenue South will be closed to through traffic from 3:30 PM to 7 PM. Barricades and safety cones will be placed at each end of the street so that emergency vehicles and the hay wagon can pass through.

We ask residents who live on this street for their understanding and to please enter and leave the roadway by the west end (the Russell Avenue entry rather than the Laurel Avenue entry).

We ask residents and businesses located within a few blocks of Downtown Bryn Mawr (in other words, within a few blocks of Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church) to please turn porch or holiday lights on!

Also, we ask for supervision of children riding the hay wagon. Children may not climb on or off the wagon while the wagon is moving. Doing so is very dangerous and may result in injury.



From the Editor

f you regularly read this column, you know that I think that it is truly wonderful that our neighborhood invests in itself in the form of the BMNA Community Project. Over the past several years, the BMNA board has done small (\$2000 or less) improvement projects in the neighborhood. These project ideas come from and are implemented by Bryn Mawr residents. You can read about the latest one (a bench at Brownie Lake) on page 6 of this Bugle.

We also do larger projects through City of Minneapolis initiatives like NRP, NPP and now CPP (Community Participation Program). The BMNA has appointed Nick Cichowicz to be the new leader of the CPP process for our neighborhood. I have not had the pleasure of meeting him yet, but I welcome him aboard and thank him for his willingness to serve.

Intuitively, I have always seen the benefit of bolstering our local businesses and green spaces. It feels good to live in a place that is so well cared for. But, other than the "feel good" factor, is there evidence that this is a good fiscal strategy with long-term community benefits? Turns out, there is.

Last week I attended a conference for people in the field of adult education. One of the keynote

speakers was Charles Marohn. He is a nationally known community planner. He used pictures and stories from his hometown of Brainerd, MN to illustrate the importance of building strong communities.

He made terrifying predictions about unsustainable development incentives and shared his theories about how new developments, especially those requiring increased infrastructure are creating huge financial burdens on cities and towns.

According to him, the most sustainable business districts develop where communities support and maintain what they have and value. A "blighted" property in a caring community has much brighter future than a drive-to-it, park-at-it, corporate profit center.

I'm sure I am not doing his message justice. But, I came away with a renewed appreciation for our little village. I love that if you look at an old picture of Bryn Mawr you recognize it. It's the same only better and growing and changing to meet the current needs of the community.

I am so grateful to live here and want to thank the BMNA board and all the neighbors who make it such a great place to live.

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2014 Minneapolis Awardees Revealed at Metro Blooms' Garden Award Event

(November 7, 2014) The top 2014 Minneapolis Garden Awards were presented at Metro Blooms' Annual Garden Awards event on November 6, 2014.

Bryn Mawr Garden Among Those Recognized Best Edible Garden: Claude Worrell and Kim Faith (1112 South Cedar Lake Road)

There have been several gardeners tending to the neighborhood garden just down the street from Claude Worrell and Kim Faith's home. As the third owners of what once was a vacant property, they have incorporated their love of cooking and their knowledge of plants and insects into a bountiful garden, providing an education to those who live nearby who come to see how food is grown.

The focal point of this garden is a wroughtiron pergola covered with a tangled canopy of honeysuckle and hops, which dangle like festive party lights above a small table and chairs, nestled beneath the pergola. A series of paths divide the garden into four areas of cultivation. Larger than most home gardens but not quite the size of a community garden, this primarily edible garden deserves its own classification. One can find a strawberry patch, different kinds of raspberries, asparagus, peppers, purple and rattle snake beans and more.

Most of the vegetables grow in neat woodframed beds. Most admirably, Claude cooks, cans, and shares what he does not use with neighbors and a nearby food shelf. Along with the vegetables, Kim has planted a host of colorful perennials, providing color that change as the season progresses. Even the dried seedbeds provide a feast for goldfinches and other birds.

This colorful and edible garden provides a way for Claude and Faith to spend time together, continuing with a tradition of gardening in their families. Their advice to novice gardeners? Says Kim, almost immediately: "Don't be afraid." Warns Claude, just as quickly: "Don't think it's ever done."

We've Come a Long Way -One Sort Recycling

Then a BMNA board member was sent this picture of Jessica Likins helping her mother at the Bryn Mawr recycling center in 1977, it brought back a lot of memories. Although Minnesota had enacted recycling legislation in 1973, it was incumbent on individuals to figure out how to get their recycling to a center.

Bryn Mawr neighbors, always at the front of community action, set up bins for recycling along Highway 12, where the current Penn Avenue east bound exit is from 394. That land was vacant as 394 had yet to be built. Neighbors brought their sorted bottles, cans, and paper to the bins, where the recycling was eventually picked up. It wasn't pretty, but it worked.

Hopefully, citywide one-sort recycling will improve our recycling rates. According to the city, formal recycling, which started in Minneapolis in 1982, has never moved above 20 percent and has been stagnant or in decline over the past 10 years.

Minneapolis needs to almost double its recycling rate by 2015 to comply with a goal set for the city by Hennepin County so it can comply with a new state-imposed requirement to achieve a 45 percent recycling rate.



BMNA COMMUNITY PROJECT: We keep working on the 'hood!

The BMNA Community Project program has been in place for the last eight years. Projects completed are:

- Redesigning the Upton garden in Area 4. Our first community project; we completed a remake of the Upton garden and created a plan for ongoing maintenance. Drive by to enjoy the beauty.
- Energy Challenge. Over 80 neighbors joined the challenge and received statistics about their energy use. From this project we leveraged our relationship with SEE to receive two cash awards that benefited BMNA initiatives.
- Ash Bore identification project: A team identified more than 800 ash trees in Bryn Mawr and presented neighbors with a variety of options.
- Downtown banner project: Part of a joint City of Minneapolis/BMNA NRP project. The banners are up!
- 2011 Pedal to Pedal garden bike ride; which culminated in a very successful 2012 BMNA garden tour.
- Construction of a Little Library on Penn Avenue in front of Bassett Creek Arts.
- Buckthorn removal in Chestnut Park/Fruen Mill area
- Construction of a bench at Brownie Lake

Got a good idea?

Ideas for projects that will improve our community are being solicited from neighbors. The Community Project Committee (Jay Peterson, Area 6; Steve Harvey, Area 7; Jessica Wiley, Area 3; Susan Verrett, Area 2, and Joanne Michalec, Area 4) will take suggestions and create a prioritized list, making a recommendation to the BMNA board in the spring.

The categories of projects considered:

- Environmental (e.g. Ash Tree identification)
- Energy (e.g. Energy Challenge project)
- Downtown (e.g. Banner project)
- Transportation
- Community (e.g. Upton Garden Redesign)

The committee evaluates suggestions using criteria including:

- Is it possible (politically, physically)?
- Does it meet the budget (\$0 \$2000)?
- Is it sustainable long term?
- Does it have neighborhood wide impact?
- Is there leadership (an identified neighbor) to get the project done?

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Keeping our sidewalks free of ice and snow is the neighborly thing to do . . .

Together, we are all responsible for keeping Minneapolis safe and comfortable for winter walking. For your own benefit and to help your neighbors, people pushing strollers or using wheelchairs, and the many people in Minneapolis who walk, please do your part.

... and it's the law.

Minneapolis ordinance requires that property owners clear sidewalks after the end of a snowfall within

- **24 hours** for houses and duplexes
- ** Four daytime hours for apartment and commercial buildings (daytime hours begin at 8 a.m.)

When you shovel snow and clear ice

- * Shovel the sidewalks on all sides of your property, the full width of the sidewalk down to the bare pavement.
- Remove all ice from sidewalks. After the sidewalk is clear, sprinkling a little sand can help prevent slipping on frosty sidewalks.
- ** Pile snow onto your yard and boulevard.

 It's against the law to shovel snow into streets and alleys.
- If you have a corner property, clear curb cuts at corners and crosswalks to the street gutter. You are not required to clear snow ridges or piles left by the plows beyond the gutter. City crews will make an effort to return to do this work as quickly as possible, but with some 20,000 corners to clear across the City, it may take a while. However, your neighbors would appreciate it if you could clear an opening sooner to help shorten the wait and provide a clear passage.

Avoid a ticket

- * If the City of Minneapolis gets a complaint or discovers that a sidewalk is not properly cleared, Public Works will inspect the sidewalk and give the property owners a chance to clear it.
- * If the sidewalk has not been cleared upon re-inspection, the property owner may be issued a citation with a fine.
- ** Crews will remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk. Property owners will be billed for this service, and unpaid bills will be added to the owner's property tax.

Remember

- * You are as responsible for clearing ice on your sidewalk as clearing snow. Ice can be more dangerous and intimidating than snow.
- *The sooner and more completely you shovel, the less likely ice will form.
- ☼ Make arrangements for someone to take over while you are on vacation.

With many years in the business that they love, (Nancy with 35 years and Juliette with 32) they are on their way to becoming a fixture in





Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

Third Bird 1612 Harmon Place

Opened in August 2014

hird Bird is another new restaurant opened recently by the award-winning Kim Bartmann, of Bryant Lake Bowl and Red Stag fame, among many others.

It's located on Loring Park, in the site where Café Maude's lasted just over a year, and Nick and Eddie spent four tumultuous years. It's in a wonderful old row of brick industrial buildings; at one time it was the sales floor of a Packard dealership.

Third Bird has taken advantage of the remarkable alley in the back and is using that door as the main entrance. Although you can still come through from Harmon, the host stand is at the alley door. According to Andy Sturdevant (MinnPost 3/28/12) "this is possibly the greatest alley of them all. It's actually very unlike any other alley in the city – not perpendicular to the street, but running off Harmon at an odd angle, rambling through the block and shadowed by the multistory buildings around it."

After a great deal of debate about it, we started with the poutine, a Canadian specialty of fries with beef gravy, cheese curds, and bacon. It was a first for some, and we couldn't stop eating it. Next came several other small plates- and the emphasis has to be on small—roasted carrots glazed with coffee, buttermilk curd, and hazelnuts, and salsify (a relative of the carrot) with caramel. They were very good and crunchy. The

beets had a variety of treatments, including vanilla, burnt cinnamon, orange, and macadamia nuts, but we were surprised at how small the portions were, given we were paying \$9 - \$12 for root vegetables.

For our next course we shared "pearls before swine," braunschweiger, pickled shallots, and smoked trout roe on toast. This was a real favorite of those of us who like liver pate. We also tried the sockeye salmon, scallops and clams, and the half roasted chicken with stuffing, which was more like a pate than a traditional stuffing. Everything was tasty.

Our excellent waiter, Jeremy, recommended the Pavlova (baked meringue on panna cotta with cherries) for dessert. Although we each had only one cherry, it was really yummy! We also had chocolate custard condensed into a bar with lime curd.


We thoroughly enjoyed the food, our waiter, and the ambiance, but couldn't get over how small the portions were. When the Pavlova arrived, we laughed out loud. Overall, the menu seems a bit overpriced for the portions offered when placed in comparison to similar restaurants we have visited. When we go again, we won't be sharing plates!
