General Election November 4, 2014

on't forget to vote on November 4 at Bryn Mawr Elementary School, 252 Upton Ave S. On the ballot will be races for United States Senator, United States Representative, Governor, and Lt. Governor, Secretary of State, State Auditor, Attorney General, State Representative, County Commissioner, County Attorney, Sheriff, Minneapolis School Board Director, Supreme Court Justice, Court of Appeals Judge, District Court Judge as well as two yes/no questions.

The first question is:FILING FEE FOR CITY ELECTED OFFICES

Shall the Minneapolis City Charter be amended to increase the filing fees for candidates seeking City elected offices from the current fee of \$20 for each office to \$500 for the office of Mayor, \$250 for the office of Council Member, \$100 for the office of Board of Estimate and Taxation Member, and \$100 for the office of Park & Recreation Commissioner and, as an alternative to payment of a filing fee, allow a candidate to submit a petition of voter signatures as provided in state law?

The second question is: REMOVE MANDATORY FOOD REQUIREMENTS FOR WINE LICENSES

Shall the Minneapolis City Charter be amended to remove the requirement that businesses holding on-sale wine licenses in the City must serve food with every order of wine or beer and to remove mandatory food to wine and beer sales ratios?

To vote for a question vote yes, to vote against a question vote no.



At their August BMNA meeting, the board took a vote in support of the initiatives to remove the 70/30 and 60/40 requirements for food/alcohol ratios. The requirements have placed a burden on our neighborhood restaurants and they will have more flexibility in pricing without them. New rules will do more to address the issues of bar space and rowdy patrons than the ratio requirements have done. The city council voted on Friday, September 19, to end the decades long requirement to have a 60/40 ratio in place. For other establishments governed by the 70/30 ratio, the city charter must be changed. Voting yes on the above question will remove the ratio requirement.

School Board

Seats on the Minneapolis Board of Education are also up for election. In the Bryn Mawr area we will be voting for two at large candidates. The two highest vote getters will advance. Candidates are Iris Altamirano, Ira Jourdain, incumbent Rebecca Gagnon, and Don Samuels. In the next election we will vote for our area rep for School Board.

2. Approval of today's agenda.

3. Approval of minutes of last month's meeting.

4. City of Minneapolis: Councilmember Lisa Goodman

Lunch with Lisa will be held September 24 at noon at St. Thomas in Opus Hall. There will be a briefing on the proposal to change the 60/40 Charter amendment for percentage of food to beer/wine. Sparks and Cuppa Java support change. A Community Meeting will be held September 17th at Kenwood Rec Center from 7-9 to discuss proposed change in F-1 zoning to allow adding 1 dwelling unit to property. It could be on top of the garage or stand-alone in back yard. The square footage has not been determined.

5. Neighborhood Coordinator report: Patty Wycoff

Over \$11,000 in membership donations have been received. Sip and Stroll-11 businesses have signed up.

6. Bugle Report: JoEllyn Jolstad

The publication of The Bugle went smoothly last month. Joanne signed up for this month's article. JoEllyn is looking for additional contributors.

7. Possible New Business at Cedar Lake Rd/Penn Ave

Gretchen Skedsvold/Mark Henry Considering opening a wine store but not zoned for it.

8. CPP Meeting Recap: Jessica Wiley

Changed from NRP program to CPP (Community Partnership Program).

The NRP was project based and the CPP is communication based. Our events count and BMNA will receive \$18,000 per year from 2014 to 2016.

NPP-Neighborhood Participation Program-Project based funding and the process involves neighbors getting together to discuss projects and generate ideas for neighborhood projects. There is no budget for NPP. A volunteer for Project Coordinator is needed to continue the process.

The 2013 report was submitted and we need to submit 2014 thru 16. We need Board participation to talk about adding projects or change.

SW Journal reported the City will review neighborhood participation in neighborhood boards, consisting of a demographic survey to see if board membership lines up with neighborhood demographics.

There are minutes from Yonathon's neighborhood meeting. Kevin requested the minutes be sent to him for review.

NRP-There are still projects for a total of \$56,000 and not closed out. Need to be clarified with the City.

Community Projects Committee will take over the NRP funds and look at the budgets.

Jessica will write an article.

9. Standing Committee Reports Schools- Lynda Shaheen

Sept 25th meeting, craft fair coming up.

10. ROC Update: Vida Ditter-

The next meeting will be Tuesday. Vida is concerned the City is only shrinking Impound Lot but the Master Plan was passed to remove. Police holds will be stored under highway. Beth Grosen will be speaking about the issue. BMNA and Harrison is supporting the Master Plan.

Push presented their design plan with crossing lines at grade from Burlington Northern. They have renovated the interior of building.

Washbum Children's Center opening will be in September. An email will be sent by Vida.

Lawsuits on SWLRT filed to stop construction.

11. SWLRT

Official group from BMNA will look at the plans for the Bryn Mawr station and other structures. There was a meeting to address the visual access near Thomas and some bushes were removed. They will be moving into the next engineering phase.

11. Penn Avenue Corridor Update/Transportation Developments Affecting Bryn Mawr: Jay Petersen-

Steering Committee meeting planned for October 20th. The study has identified nodes. They are now studying alternatives and opportunities for nodes. Bike travel and bus lines will impact Bryn Mawr and will be a part of the study.

12. Solar Garden Update: Barry Schade

He met with another consultant that would build solar arrays. He is continuing to explore ideas.

16. Discussion Items, New Business, Updates and Announcements Conflict of Interest Policy will be sent out again by Sandie. If not already done, the Board members should print, sign and scan then email back.

Email from Clarence-Good time to leverage changes to neighborhood with MNDot, i.e. clean up ramps and add sidewalks. Anita Tabb reported (at earlier BMNA meeting) the Park Board bid out a redo of Bryn Mawr Meadows path but can't get contractor to do it. Patty will contact Anita to find out the status. 17. Adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

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

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

Natural Step Center for Heath & Conscious Living - in Area 4

All the Tai Chi movements when explored from this place of soft limit have the effect of 'opening and releasing' the system which allows a deeper healing to take place.

Tai Chi can be done by people of all ages, physical abilities and health conditions. The benefits along with stress reduction include strengthening, increased balance, weight loss, increased concentration, lower blood pressure and assistance with both acute & chronic illnesses. The practice of Tai Chi improves the body's resistance to disease and the movements assist with the function of all major organs including the heart, brain and lungs.

There is no special equipment or clothing required and only a few minutes are needed to calm the body and mind. The movements are slow and gentle and done "slower than the speed of habit"





which also adds a meditative quality to the practice. Tai Chi is easy to learn and is fun.

Natural Step School of Tai Chi's founder and principle instructor is Colin Snow from the U.K. He has studied Tai Chi for 30 years and taught for 20 of those years. His study of Tai Chi is with Master Richard Farmer, Honorary President for the Tai Chi Union of Great Britain, where Colin became a qualified teacher. Colin has an extensive list of teaching credits and has created many programs including the "Vitality at Work" course where he teaches movements which can be done in the workplace while sitting at a desk. Colin not only teaches the movements, but gives information on how we can use Tai Chi in our everyday lives.

Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

Gone Girl, By Gillian Flynn

If you are attracted to crime fiction, or TV shows like Law and Order and Criminal Minds, *Gone Girl* will be difficult to put down. The book was chilling, suspenseful, and dark.

The first half of the book is a study of a conflicted and failing marriage, and a possible murder. None of us felt great empathy for any of the characters, although we did feel compelled to find out what happens to them, which is a testament to Flynn's elegant writing.

Through an incredible twisting and turning series of events, the reader is forced to confront the motives and veracity of all of the characters.

This novel delves into issues of human character, mental health needs, dependent relationships, and the power of the media to define what a crime is and who is criminalized.

Note: this book is 419 pages, so you better get started if you want to finish before the movie is released on Oct. 3rd of this year.

Heyday - 2700 Lyndale Ave So

Memories lingered during our dinner at Heyday. The space was the first site for Egg and I back in the 80's, where there was often a wait on Sundays that stretched out to the curb. Then for the last years, Sunnyside Up Café occupied the spot. Heyday has rehabbed the breakfast space and the laundromat next door. It was beautiful, with the use of the barn wood, the fanciful chandeliers, and the gorgeous bar. The restaurant owners call out their reverence for a Minneapolis icon; a

painted wall reads: Heyday: a song by the Replacements—(although the Replacement song was spelled Hayday)

Have you ever wanted to lick your plate of all the tasty sauce left? That was an inclination after every dish we tried. They were small portions and out of greed, we kept wishing we had ordered our own meals instead of sharing. The dishes not only looked beautiful but they lived up to the waiter's hype for taste. We had mussels with a cold cuke, frozen yogurt "snow." There was Dorade with pistachio and avocado, cod with sweet corn and elderberry capers, and roasted squab with fresh fig. We also had the roasted vegetables with bagna cauda and charred herbs, and sweet companna cotta, which were all yummy too. Prices were reasonable, except maybe the \$14 Tripel Karmeliet beer that someone had to have! The desserts delighted; chocolate and hazelnut sorbet, corn shortbread, peaches and cream, and five little treats including cashew brittle.

It was especially interesting that in perusing the menu ahead of time nothing seemed really great. It just shows you have to get out of your comfort zone every now and then and let a place do their thing! The staff was spot on, and the owner, giving tours of his artwork, hugged us and thanked us for coming.

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

Bottles and jugs:

- Ketchup and salad dressing bottles
- Dishwashing liquid bottles and detergent jugs
- Shampoo, soap and lotion bottles

Cups and containers:

- · Yogurt, pudding and fruit cups
- Disposable cups and bowls
- Margarine, cottage cheese, and other containers

Packaging:

Clear packaging from toys and electronics

NO: Plastic bags, Styrofoam*, motor oil bottles or other bottles that held hazardous substances

Autumn Colors and Splendor in the Garden!

It may be the end of the season but there is still plenty to see at the Wildflower Garden. Visit the prairie to see the last of the asters. Bring along binoculars (or borrow ours) and look for migrating raptors and waterfowl as they head south for the winter. Take a quiet walk through the woodlands to see to gorgeous autumn foliage of the Garden's maples, hickories, and oaks. Spend a quiet day or two at the end of the season to take in the beauty of another season, nearly spent and yet again splendid, at the Wildflower Garden.

Every weekend and on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 4:30pm Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden Naturalists offer free programs about wildflowers and more. Learn about the latest blossoms and birds on these fabulous (and free!) explorations of the Garden. Each Saturday morning at 9:30am a free autumn birding program is offered for new and experienced bird watchers. It's a wonderful opportunity to spend time in the field with a seasoned group of birders.

Themed tours on a variety of natural history topics are available on Saturdays at 1pm and Sundays at 3pm. These programs will delve a little deeper into particular subjects like Minnesota native tree identification, birding skills, wildflower identification and more. Autumn is here! Enjoy the late season blooms in the wetland and the prairie and look for dragonflies, butterflies and other insects. Come often for a short naturalist led walk to see our Garden blooms in the autumn.

Garden Highlights Nature Hike

Leam about the current blooms, bird sightings, and animal antics in the Garden while hiking the trails with a Naturalist. The Garden Highlights Hike will focus on what is of interest on the day that you visit, so each hike will be a new exploration into the most up-to-date curiosities and wonders of the Wildflower Garden.

Magnificent Mushrooms

Behind the scenes of the Wildflower Garden, hosts of mushroom species are hard at work recycling nutrients and helping plants grow. You will learn the basic structure of mushrooms and how to identify some species.

New Moon Creatures of the Night Hike \$5 per person/\$10 per family Pre-registration required

As darkness washes over the Garden an array of sounds, smells and sights greet our senses. This is also a great time to see nocturnal wildlife of the Garden, including bats, nighthawks, owls, and raccoons. Come to learn more about these wonderful creatures of the night at the Garden this autumn. Meet at the front gate.

Quaking Bog Tour

The bog is home to many unique plants with interesting adaptations for survival. Discover the characteristics that make a bog habitat what it is and take part in hands-on analysis of the water in the bog. Learn about what is being done to preserve this special habitat. Season's End Garden Tour

Join a Garden Naturalist for the year's final stroll through the Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden and Bird Sanctuary. Enjoy the colors of autumn and the sights and smells of this magnificent place before the gates close on this glorious season.

The Garden's diverse woodland habitat offers a g reat opportunity to delve into the fascinating world of tremendous trees. You'll learn what to look for when identifying trees, hear some tree lore, and discover where the Garden heritage trees are located. Appropriate for children ages 8 and up.

A Year of Wildflowers

After 10 years of black and white, Greg Lecker turns to color.

¬rom 2003 to 2013, Greg Lecker dillustrated his Bryn Mawr Bugle nature columns with black and white illustrations he drafted to match the written narrative. This summer, Greg turned to oil pigment to capture over fifty wildflowers in a series of plein air paintings completed at Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden, the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum, and in Bryn Mawr gardens. The French art word, Plein Air, translates to "open air"; and it describes the revolution facilitated by the invention of metal tubes to transport ground pigment and linseed oil from the relatively dark artist studio to the brilliant out-

Each wildflower portrait requires one hour to three hours. Greg admits that his painting speed has increased over the summer. And, the increasingly earlier closing time of Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden gives added incentive. The paintings are gem-like – just five inches by seven inches. Viewers are invited to come in close to view the flower from two to three feet – the same vantage point from which the plants were painted. Note cards reproduce the images and their brushwork texture.

Why paint "Plein Air"? Why not just take a photograph? Greg explains that the time spent studying the subject fixes in his mind the day and allows additional benefits:


- To have the luxury to watch a yellow ladyslipper's "balloon" inflate with the warming sunlight of a quiet Sunday moming.



- To watch a bumblebee force its way into a turtlehead or bottle gentian flower, a hummingbird feed at jewelweed, a dragonfly alight on one's paint box, a tree frog leap onto a boneset leaf, or a gray squirrel repeatedly sneak past me with black walnut fruits in its mouth to the same tree to gnaw on its quarry over and over!

- To observe spent brown leaves dry from dew and rain, then move just enough to release a snow trillium bud and stem which bounce upward on a spectacular Easter Sunday.



Neighborhood Program to Feed Hungry Kids Expands

Redeemer Center for Life (redeemercenter.org), from the Harrison Neighborhood, has joined Bryn Mawr Church (brynmawrchurch.org) as a second community partner to help feed Bryn Mawr School students who don't get enough to eat on the weekend.

"We're thrilled to have Redeemer joining this important partnership," said pastor Jamie Schultz of Bryn Mawr Church. "This expansion means that fewer children will be going hungry for the coming school year."

Bryn Mawr Church began a partnership with Bryn Mawr School and Sheridan Story in January 2014. Sheridan Story is a nonprofit that focuses on fighting child hunger. The program got its start when it became apparent that students at another Minneapolis school were hoarding food on Fridays so that they would have something to eat on the weekend. Administrators at Bryn Mawr School confirmed that the same thing was happening with some of their students, a high percentage of whom qualify for free school lunches. In the initial months of 2014, Bryn Mawr Church members and friends paid for and distributed 988 bags of food at Bryn Mawr School.

The program depends on a partnership model to succeed. Sheridan Story sources the food through Second Harvest Heartland. Bryn Mawr School identifies students in need, works to secure parental permission, and supervises storage and distribution of the food bags. The community partners provide funding to purchase the food and volunteers to distribute the food bags.

And that's where we invite you to join the partnership, too! We need volunteers to place food bags in kids' backpacks at Bryn Mawr School on Fridays from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. It's an easy task and doesn't require heavy lifting. The program is expanding this year. However, funding is not yet in place to serve all the children who potentially qualify. Just \$130 is enough to cover an additional child for the entire school year, but donations of any size are welcome! 
