Neighborhood Schools Committee Donates Signs for Anwatin School



he Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association school committee recently had new signs made for Anwatin Middle school. They celebrate the school's status as an International Baccalaureate (IB) and a Spanish Dual Immersion school. Anwatin became an International Baccalaureate World School in 2010. Anwatin is also home to the only middle school Spanish Dual Immersion program in the Minneapolis Public Schools. All Anwatin students participate in the IB programme. One-third of Anwatin students also participate in the Spanish Dual Immersion program, where

they take three of their classes in Spanish.

The unique education experience at Anwatin emphasizes academic rigor plus connections to one another, the community and the world beyond the classroom walls. The result is that students become principled, open-minded, inquiring members of a global community who are prepared for IB and other advanced coursework in high school.







A Semester Studying Abroad – Not Just for Kids

Kathy Ripke and Jay Peterson's Four Months at Sea

any families in Bryn Mawr have had the experience of sending their college-age kids abroad for a semester. Typically they come back with wonderful stories of their studies and life in a foreign country. Kathy Ripke and Jay Peterson's daughter, Zoe, spent her semester abroad in Dublin as part of her college education.

Nearly a year ago, Kathy and Jay returned from their own "overseas" learning adventure. They spent four months, a full semester, studying with 600 college students and seventy other Life Long Learners, experiencing twelve foreign lands. They went on a trip of a lifetime, sailing around the world aboard the MV Explorer as participants in Semester at Sea (SAS). This program is run under the direction of the Institute for Shipboard Education (ISE). Their "Voyage of Discovery" (not a cruise) was aboard a mediumsized ship, where they took college classes. The semester they attended was the fiftieth anniversary sailing of this program.

Jay and Kathy each audited three college classes and sat in on large-group lectures while at sea. Classes they attended included – Biology for the Millennium, Literature of Exile, Iberia in the World, and African Cinema. The lectures they attended were on the subjects of Global Religion, Global Music and Global Nutrition. Several dozen other classes were also offered.

The classes were accredited through the University of Virginia. There were about seventy faculty members onboard teaching, from all over the world. Students were also from all over the world and from nearly every state within the United States

Neither Kathy nor Jay has been on a traditional cruise and this sailing was certainly not the norm. While there were a few ports where the stay was only one day for refueling, arriving in the morning and leaving that evening, most of the stops were for four to six days. The ship traveled to twelve countries and stopped at nineteen ports. Some favorite ports were in Vietnam (Ho Chi Minh City and a trip to Hanoi), Myanmar (Yangon), India (Cochin and a trip to Agra and New Delhi), South Africa (Cape Town) and Morocco (Casablanca with a

trip to Marrakech). While their cabin was pretty small, equipped with bunk beds, they quickly made friends with people staying in large rooms with balconies. Many hours were also spent relaxing in the Glazer Lounge, which was the adultonly bar on the seventh deck.

Neither endless shrimp buffets nor pastry tables are offered and while the meals could be compared favorable to those served at many college buffets, food was certainly not the reason to sail with SAS. However, Kathy and Jay made friends onboard that are lasting and they continue to see people from the trip. They also continue to be in contact with students they became close to on the ship as part of their "extended family."

If you are thinking about a semester abroad experience for your college-aged children, Kathy and Jay strongly recommend that you take a look at Semester at Sea. They also strongly recommend looking into the SAS experience at www.semesteratsea.org and consider this unique way to see the world yourself. Kathy attended Semester at Sea forty years ago as a young college student. She can attest that a Semester at Sea, regardless of your age, is a life changing and life enhancing experience.

Bryn Mawr Photographer, Paul Markert, Honored by Minnesota Books Awards

ongratulations to Bryn Mawr resident and former BMNA ✓Area 4 co-rep, Paul Markert! Minnesota Farmers Market Cookbook: A Guide to Selecting and Preparing the Best Local Produce with Seasonal Recipes from Local Chefs and Farmers, by Tricia Cornell, was nominated for a Minnesota Book Award this year. Paul Markert, Area 4, was the photographer capturing the beautiful creations prepared by Cornell. "The book's photos are bright and inviting without feeling staged or overproduced — they've got a natural feeling to them, perfect for the subject matter and likely a product of the book's intense photo production schedule", wrote James Norton, Heavy Table reviewer. "We did it over the course of three days and we cooked 10 recipes each day," says Cornell. "For lunch we sat down and actually ate the food we made. It was exhausting. It was exhilarating and exhausting."

Minnesota Book Awards are in their 27th year. They are a program of the Saint Paul Public Library, supported by numerous sponsors, honoring the rich literary scene in Minnesota. "The Minnesota Farmers Market Cookbook is organized alphabetically by vegetables, fruits, and other foods sold at markets across the state. Each entry



includes tips for choosing, storing, preserving, and preparing fresh, ripe, topquality produce—including heirloom and other exotic varieties.

Author and local food writer Tricia Cornell provides time-tested kitchen shortcuts, tips on choosing each food in season, and plenty of advice on how to turn the fresh bounty of the farmers market into easy, delicious meals.

The centerpiece of the cookbook is a collection of 80 recipes contributed by local chefs and farmers. For those who want to become more familiar with Minnesota markets, there are also band-drawn maps of market locations in the state and the metro area, a short history of Minnesota markets, and plenty of mouth-watering photographs of the produce and the prepared dishes. The Minnesota Farmers Market Cookbook not only lets you enjoy Minnesota's unique, renowned farmers market culture, but helps you make the most of it in your home kitchen."



Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics, written by Daniel James Brown, published in 2013.

ike most of the people who have read and reviewed this book, we loved it. There are layers of great stories to follow; the rowing crews in the 1930's, one boy's personal journey to adulthood, and the German Olympics of 1936, which included not only the rowing team featured in this book, but Jesse Owens and Louie Zamperini.

Brown starts with the story of Joe Rantz, one boy who aspires to be part of the 1936 team, and weaves myriad events and tales around it. Joe loses his mother at age 4 to throat cancer and is abandoned by his father and stepmother at age 15. His resiliency is admirable; his circumstances build character and independence. Being part of a world class rowing team helps him understand his emotional needs and to trust others. He comes to know the beauty of working as a team, and the serenity when the "whole boat is into the sweep of the race. It was like rowing in the stars."

The years before the 1936 Olympics are epic—the depression, the dust bowl, prohibition, dramatic swings in the weather, lasting remnants of WWI, and hints of WWII lend excitement to the story of the working class boys of the University of Washington finding their place in the elite world of rowing. There was constant tension for rowing dominance between the sons of famers and lumberjacks on the western teams and the scions of the eastern upper class.

The descriptions of the German preparations for the Olympics and the strides that were taken to hide the discrimination and violence going on behind the scenes in Nazi Germany are gripping. The author dips briefly into filmmaker Leni Riefenstahl's role in producing award winning propaganda films about Hitler's rise; her work is crucial to elevating Hitler's profile on the international level. (They can be viewed on YouTube)

Our only criticisms were that the details of the rowing practices bog down the reading a bit, and there are a number of overly dramatic scenes. But it's a great read—we can't recommend it strongly enough. Salsa A La Salsa- Restaurante Mexicano

family owned restaurant in the former Old Chicago space on Hennepin, Salsa A La Salsa's claim to fame is authentic Mexican recipes from the central part of Mexico that have been in the family for generations.

The décor is distinctly Day of the Dead; plenty of skulls, skeletons, and wedding themed scenes. Our booth for six was cozy. It was good food in a casual setting; the service on the Friday night we were there was perfunctory.

We recommend the guacamoles and the tostones con camarones. Also, the combo platter with chile relleno, enchilada and flauta was crispy and good. The enchiladas with mole was a favorite, particularly spicy and flavorful. The green beans were a highlight, but the blackened salmon was very salty, as was the soup.


