4. City of Minneapolis: **Councilmember Lisa Goodman**

- Variances for 2 Queen approved. - Sidewalk replacement going quickly in Bryn Mawr

5. Treasurer's Report

Adoption of policies (Records Retention, Competitive Bid)-Explained by Vice President Wiley. Asked for questions and received none. Dennis moved, seconded and passed. Additional Corporate Credit Card-Easier for Patty. Purchases still will

require preapproval. Dennis moved, seconded and passed.

Discussion of office re-location in Uptown Community space vs. save money with smaller space at current location. Dennis reported-BMNA is using some services but not the office space. New Uptown Community space could be alternative. It would give us an address and space for a phone. At current location, we can change from an office space to a cubicle. We would have some storage, an address, and a location for a phone. Dennis suggested we supply the Uptown space with a projector and screen and put in Wi-Fi. The officers met to discuss and recommend that at this time we downsize to the cubicle space at the current location. Con-future plans not completely known, may not get what we need, non- HC toilet in basement with poor access down poorly designed stairs. The toilet and stairs could be up-graded. Difficult parking downtown. Pros-Connecting with Areas 1 & 2 by having space in office building on Wayzata Blvd. Neither space would be used for Board Meetings, only for committee meetings or work areas. The City has no problem with BMNA working with a business owner.

6. Memorial Bench update: **Kathryn Kaatz**

Liability is arranged for church to be custodian and will maintain it. BMNA will be fiscal agent and invoiced for expenses. There is a design of stone bench, engraving and landscaping. \$7100 for everything including landscaping, \$2500 shy of funds. The Committee is contacting UPS for financial support since they originally pledged \$10,000 for former plans. Drawings will go up in the church's foyer for fund raising. September 27th is the anniversary of the shooting. "Memorial of Hope and Healing" has been replaced with new design.

7. Bugle Report: JoEllyn Jolstad

Color in The Bugle has encouraged more advertisers. The goal is have enough content for 16 pages. Need Board Members to volunteer to write articles for The Bugle. A signup sheet was passed around.

8. Standing Committee Reports Communications-Jay Peterson

The website will be redone and a search for a web page designer is underway. New Webmaster has put Ice Cream Social on calendar and doing some updating of the current design. Four groups will be interviewed and. invitations will be sent to Board Members to attend.

Schools-Jessica Wiley

There are new Principals for both Bryn Mawr Elementary and Anwatin Middle School and also a new Assistant Principal at Bryn Mawr.

Gardens- Nadine Thuel reported

Contract is signed for maintenance of Bryn Mawr Gardens. Field gave a detailed response with a \$21000 bid which was scaled back. A neighbor signed up for watering the hedge, The Newton triangle is planted and mulched and the Committee is talking to businesses to maintain their adjacent gardens. The maintenance company was hired for hedge pruning, some watering and a redesign in front of Market and Gas Station. An article for Bugle will be written to solicit volunteers. Explain plan in article. Social media sites can be used for communication.

ROC is waiting for Abdo Properties and hasn't met for several months. The design was nice but ran into soil issues. In mid-July will be next meeting. Ryan is waiting on resolution of SWLRT station.

11. SWLRT Update, Penn Station issues—Vida Ditter/Barry **Schade**

The Metropolitan Council has mandated that \$340,000,000 be cut from project. Presented four scenarios being explored. A letter was sent from BMNA pointing out unfairness of plan. CAC will make a recommendation by end of month.

The Annual Meeting and Garage Sale reports are in The Bugle. Hydrants are connected but the hose is missing so, Patty is buying another hose.

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
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From the Editor

ELLA YE (BRYN MAWR'S LONGEST RESIDENT) REMEMBERS by Marion Notaro

Wednesday, November 11, Ella Ye, 36 Queen Ave. So., celebrated her 82nd birthday.

In the spring, when Ella (Meme) Ye was 11 years old her family decided to move from Minnehaha to Horseshoe (Browne) Lake.

"I remember it well," said the tiny, whitehaired alert Ella.

"Dad had a dairy farm. He and two men drove the horses on clay roads to the new place," With him went Chris Ewald, a neighbor, but he went further north and settled in McNair. Mother rode on one wagon with the furniture, Sister, Ann, and I came out on the tiny horsedrawn streetcar that turned on Oliver Ave. Cedar Lake Road was paved with wood blocks. No other roads were graded. There was much mud. Woods were cut through with paths that led to a sprinkling of farm houses. Dominating all was a big, red house with a smaller second house on Upton between Laurel and Cedar Lake Road. A man named Holloron lived there with his two sisters. From Upton to Sheridan to the Boulevard was a huge golf ground. Across from where we live now (36 Queen) was a gravel pit. Glenwood Avenue was called Western Avenue

We rented a big house near the lake and had a 30-40 cow dairy farm. "No," I never swam in Horseshoe Lake as we were warned it was bottomless. We did have many picnics there. One of the scandals was that boys jumped off the bridge naked.

On the hill was a cornfield. It is now called North Tyrol. South Tyrol was a pig farm. The man who owned it boarded at our house. He collected garbage from the downtown cafes to feed the pigs until a law was passed that all garbage had to be covered to prevent the spread of TB. My sister and I sat on the ground where North Tyrol Hills are now and shucked corn for 3¢ a bushel. Our hands were cold. If we helped on the pig farm we could make 35¢ a day.

We churned our own bûtter and ground our coffee in the warmth from the nickel-plated stove. Firelight flickered through the isinglass. It was so pretty--I wish we had that today. Wehn the fire flickered one of the adults would put a scuttle of coal on top. Sometimes the wall phone would ring and we'd chat with our neighbors. Our water came from a pump.

We walked in mud to Harrison School. We children could only go Cedar Lake Road, then the Boulevard, and had to stay together. Gypsies used to camp on the point where the Voyager Motel now is.

Sundays we went to the Congregational Church where the Masonic Lodge House now is. Members tied up their horses and buggies.

Sometimes we went blueberry picking. Once with our parents we walked over to McCarthys -- then called the First and Last Chance Saloon.

We were not allowed to go to Keegon's Lake (Theodore Wirth) as there was a saloon there. Brawls often resulted in someone being thrown in the lake.

A 50-foot ski jump was located where the Wild Flower Garden is.

In the meantime, our friends, the Ewald brothers, began going door to door with a little horse-drawn wagon. The price was 5¢ a quart to have milk dipped into your pitcher.

In 1913 a typhoid epidemic hit. William Fruen had an acre on the edge of Keegon's Lake. In 1884 while digging a trout pool in a little walley behind his house, he discovered a spring. This was the source of Glenwood-Inglewood water. Glenwood-Inglewood used 35 water wagons during the typhoid epidemic, drawn by 70 horses, to supply people with spring water. The newspapers warned, "Beware! City water contaminated! Do not drink without boiling!"

As I remember, smallpox was more prevalent than ${\sf TB}$.

On the hill across from Horseshoe Lake was a TB camp. It consisted of wooden buildings with canvas roofs. We'd see beds with patients scattered across the hillside--even on the coldest days as the theory was they were to get fresh air.

We stayed at Horseshoe Lake three years until the Park Board bought all the property. Dad received \$300 from the Park Board, and our hired hand bought the cattle.

Dad then built a white frame house on 232 Sheridan Avenue South (where Robert Nelson, nephew, now lives). Dad took a job with the M. & St.L. Railroad as an oiler.

I dropped out of school at the 8th grade to take a nurse girl job at Lake Minnetonka for \$1.50 a week.

When I was sixteen I worked at Ford's General Store on Oliver and Cedar Lake Road for \$8 a week. We sold everything from carpet tacks to knife-cut UT Plug tobacco.

I was a tomboy and had lots of boyfriends.

John Ye, who in 1917 became my husband, lived next door. He worked for Columbia Record Co. He was a very quiet fellow, and when I saw him coming I used to go upstairs so he would not ask me for a date. When John was 17, his father suggested he buy a lot across from the gravel pit, and he built the house I've lived in ever since.

Despite 3 heart attacks, Ella had to mount the stairs to show us pictures of her children and grandchildren of whom she is justly proud. "They were all here for my birthday," she beamed, and I received over 30 cards from dear, long-time Bryn Mawr friends.

WHO HAS LIVED IN BRYN MAWR THE LONGEST?

CPP Priorities

he Community Participation Program Committee met in June and has put together a plan to move a portion of our Minneapolis Neighborhood Revitalization Program funds into adjusted priorities.

Currently the BMNA has \$51,967.52 available in the NRP funds not committed yet. The proposal being presented at the August neighborhood (more overall details will be shared at the meeting and you'll have the opportunity to ask any questions) meeting is to

move the following amounts:

- \$28,500 out of Home improvement program and senior multi-unit housing planning and education
- 1,000 out of Improve safety of parks

- 1,000 out of Improve Fruen Mill access
- \$3,000 out of Minneapolis kids/sports arts program

into the following three focus areas:

- 1. BMNA Communication Efforts: Web site redesign and maintenance Bugle production and distribution
- 2. Improve Neighborhood Environment Community Gardens
- 3. Neighborhood Coordinator and admin

Follow the law and be a good neighbor when having a backyard fire

Tt's OK to have a recreational fire in the backyard of your home, **L**provided you follow the City's rules. Stay safe and be a good neighbor by remembering these laws:

- Postpone a fire when Minneapolis is under an air pollution advisory or alert. Fires release fine particles that contribute to air pollution and are implicated in a number of health problems, including strokes, heart attacks and asthma. You can sign up for air quality alerts online at mn.enviroflash.info.
- Bum only untreated, unpainted, dry wood. Never burn cardboard boxes, trash or debris, because the smoke can be toxic.
- · Outdoor fires are allowed between 9 a.m. and 10 p.m.
- Keep fire small, less than three feet in diameter and two feet high.
- Have outdoor fires at least 25 feet away from a structure or com-

bustible material and in a fire ring or pit with edges more than six inches high.

- Have a hose or fire extinguisher on hand.
- Postpone outdoor fires when wind speeds exceed 10 mph.
- Make sure outdoor fires are always attended by someone 18 years or older and that the fire is completely out before you abandon it.

Any illegal burning can result in a \$200 fine.

For more information on recreational fires or to register a complaint about a recreational fire, call 311 or email Minneapolis311@minneapolismn.gov, or to register a complaint about a recreational fire outside 311 hours, call 911. The Fire and Police departments are authorized to extinguish a fire immediately if it is hazardous.

DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT . . .

Door-to-door sales

IN MINNEAPOLIS

linneapolis has some brand new rules around door-to-door sales that make it easier to know who you're dealing with when you open your door. The new rules also make it harder for out-of-state companies to exploit youth workers.

If a salesperson knocks on your door:

- . They are required to wear a City-issued photo identification card so you know they're properly licensed or registered.
- If a salesperson doesn't have a City-issued photo ID card, do not buy from them
 - · If you believe a company is exploiting youth workers, call 911 so the City can take action. (See more details below)
- Door-to-door salespeople cannot knock on doors before 8 a.m. or after 9 p.m. (or sunset, whichever is later), and they must leave your property if you ask them to leave.
 - . You can also post a sign indicating "no solicitors."

WHAT ABOUT CANVASSERS?

While all salespeople are required to register and get an ID card in Minneapolis, because of federal law, people who are canvassing are NOT required to get identification cards. That includes people who advocate for religious, social, or political causes.

WHAT IF MY CHILD'S SCHOOL OR YOUTH GROUP PLANS TO DO DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES? The City wants to make it easy for schools and youth groups to do their regular door-todoor fundraising sales, so the City will approve group identification cards to those groups at no cost, Just call 673-2080 to learn more, or visit www.minneapolismn.gov and search for "solicitor" in the search box.

WHAT SHOULD I KNOW ABOUT TRAVELING MAGAZINE SALES CREWS?

Some companies create dangerous situations for young people by taking youth across state lines to sell magazines door to door. This can often be unsafe. In fact, traveling magazine crews are one of the top five most dangerous jobs for teens. If a youth comes to your door to sell magazines and does not have a City ID card, offer them the 24-hour phone number for Parent Watch at 917-579-4641 or the National Runaway Switchboard at 1-800-786-2929.





July 1, 2015

Full moon, the Ojibwe strawberry moon. July is our sunniest and warmest month. Gardens produce tomatoes and cucumbers. Young birds test their flight feathers, sometimes with hilarious results. Birds sing from about 1/2 hour before sunrise to about 1/2 hour after sunset. Most of the singers are males, and if you listen carefully you can hear that even within a species some birds have more complicated songs than others. This is learned behavior that apparently is attractive to females.

July 9, 2000

Bassett's creek washes out the CP railroad tracks under Glenwood Avenue after a 3 inch cloudburst. The Army Corps of Engineers had built a narrow concrete channel to contain the creek and drain the slough north of Glenwood and west of Morgan, but as usual nature took its own course. In the 1870s Bassett's Creek was described as a "meandering stream with marshy banks winding its way from Medicine Lake to the Mississippi."

July 25, 2009

Solar eclipse over SE Asia and the Pacific. We'll experience one here in August 2017.

July 31, 2015

Full moon, the Ojibwe midsummer moon. The second full moon in a calendar month is called a "blue moon".




