In a study by Jeffrey Morenoff (2003) on what makes a place healthy, he finds that "places where neighbors are more engaged in the social life of their community, residents are more likely to generate informal resources by assisting one another with favors; providing each other with health-related advice and other information; aiding one another with everyday tasks, such as childcare; monitoring each other's property; and participating in local voluntary associations, such as block clubs, tenants' associations, and religious organizations."

The events we hold, including our garage sale and annual meeting coming up this spring, build community by highlighting strengths and talents

of community members, and getting neighbors to know each other. We hope you will join your neighbors in one of the eight formal events that take place throughout the year.



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

ell, the holidays are barely over and the second half of the school year has begun. So that means school choice time is here again. This is the time when parents and students start thinking about where kids will be in school in the fall and beyond. This can be very stressful for families of students who are just starting their formal education, or transitioning to middle or high school.

It has been a while since this has directly impacted our family. Way back when our now adult children were small, we made the decision to go the community school route. All three of our children went to Bryn Mawr, Anwatin, and Southwest. Our youngest is now a junior at Southwest and although it has not been perfect, our experience has validated the choice we made so long ago.

I'm sure there are those who would say, of course we are happy with the education our child is getting at Southwest. It is considered one of the top high schools in the country. But I would add that our experience at SW is as good as it is because of all she learned and did at Bryn Mawr and Anwatin.

As a family, we value the fact that they were in classes with high achieving students and those who struggled with academics, language, behavior and poverty. I know that seems counter intuitive. But through this, our children learned how to be part of a genuinely diverse community and to look at life from a global perspective. I feel they are well equipped to function in the real world.

If you are a family with a student entering kindergarten in the next couple of years, I strongly encourage you to attend. I am not saying that it is the right choice for every child, but at least learn more about it before you rule it out.

The things we learned and valued at our inner-city community schools are still guiding us, as that long-ago Bryn Mawr kindergarteners considers where to apply for college.

Bryn Mawr -by Eino Hekarinen

Have you ever known a youngster, either boy or girl, who, seeing water, doesn't want to drink it, put his hends in it, strong in it, or in sheer aban-domaant fling himself bodily into it? Such a stream of water was Bassetts Creek on the northern boundary of Bryn-Newr.

I have known this "Crik", as we always referred to it, all of my many years and in my youth it was a tempestuous, raging thing in the spring flood. Never content to remain on its banks or confines, but spreading wide over the surrounding lands.

The creek at Fruen's mill was per-heps the most picturesque because of the large boulders in the creak bad which made the water dance and boil and sparkle in the sun. All of the creek, in its several parts, was used for different purposes, some spots for swimming, some for fishing, sketing in the winter, rafts and canoes in the summer. In short, the creek was a refuge, a release, a companion.

Bassetts Creek was by no means all of Bryn Mawr for a youngster. There was Fartier's Hill for eleding and skiing. The thrill of watching the borsedrawn sleds filled with ice cut from Cedar Lake being pulled along Cedar Lake Road, the lonely bluff overlooking the lake, the dredging of the channel connecting Brownie and Cedar Lakes, the sand pit just off Penn Avenue. These ware all interesting interludes, but the "Crik" was a live thing, the brightest jewel in a mosaic of a delightful place in which to live.

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BMNA Yearly Community Project Got a good idea?

The BMNA Community Project program has been in place for the last nine years. Each year we ask neighbors to suggest projects that improve livability and safety in Bryn Mawr. Projects from past years include:

• Redesigning the Upton garden in Area 4. Our first community project; we completed a remake of the Upton garden and thanks to Cathy Skalicky, created a plan for ongoing maintenance. Drive by to enjoy the beauty.

• Energy Challenge. Over 80 neighbors joined the challenge and

• Ash Bore identification project: Our team identified more than 800 ash trees in Bryn Mawr and presented neighbors with a variety of options.

• Downtown banner project: Part of a joint City of Minneapolis/BMNA NRP project. The banners are up!

• 2011 Pedal to Pedal garden bike ride; which culminated in a very successful 2012 BMNA garden tour.

• Construction of a Little Library on Penn Avenue in front of Bassett Creek Arts.

• Buckthorn removal in Chestnut • Park/Fruen Mill area over a period of three years

• Construction of a bench at Brownie Lake

• Historical murals to be placed in neighborhood sites

Successful projects have a leader who is willing to carry out the work needed to finish the undertaking. In past years, the financial commitment from the neighborhood was limited to \$2000. This year some of our CPP dollars from the city are being allocated to the community projects program; we are looking for projects that might need up to \$5000 to complete.

How to participate:

The Community Project Committee will take suggestions and create a prioritized list, making a recommendation to the BMNA board in the spring. Committee members include: Steve Harvey, Area 7; Jay Peterson, Area 6; Joanne Michalec, Area 4; Jessica Wiley, Area 3; Susan Verrett, Area 2; and Patty Wycoff, Neighborhood Coordinator; The categories of projects considered:

- Environmental (e.g. Ash Tree identification, buckthorn removal)
- Energy (e.g. Energy Challenge project)
- Downtown (e.g. Banner project)
- Transportation

• Community (e.g. Upton Garden Redesign, historical murals)

The committee evaluates suggestions using criteria including:

- Is it possible (politically, physically)?
- Does it meet the budget (\$0 \$5000)?
- Is it sustainable long term?
- Does it have neighborhood wide impact?
- Is there leadership (an identified neighbor) to get the project done?

Sculpture Garden at Walker Expands

he Walker Art Center announces an expansive new program of acquisitions and commissions by leading international contemporary artists for the redeveloped Walker campus and Minneapolis Sculpture Garden. The works will be installed following completion of the first substantial update to the 19.5 acre campus in more than a decade, with the Garden set to reopen to the public in June 2017.

The Walker opens this new chapter by adding 16 artworks in the Garden and throughout the campus via commissions, gifts, and purchases. Artists included are: Nairy Baghramian, Frank Big Bear, Tony Cragg, Sam Durant, Katharina Fritsch, Theaster Gates, Robert Indiana, Kcho, Liz Larner, Sol LeWitt, Mark Manders, Matthew Monahan,

Philippe Parreno, Eva Rothschild, Monika Sosnowska, and Aaron Spangler. These artists bring a range of diverse, global voices from seven countries, increase the number of women artists represented, and include many notable career firsts. Commissions include the first permanent outdoor works by artists Nairy Baghramian, Theaster Gates, Mark Manders, Philippe Parreno, and Aaron Spangler. Each of the commissioned works is site?specific, establishing a new contemporary dialogue with existing works and building upon the Sculpture Garden's strong historic presentation of both figurative and geometric abstract works.

"We are thrilled to announce the addition of these new works to the Walker campus and Minneapolis Sculpture Garden by some of

today's most significant artists." says Olga Viso, Executive Director of the Walker. "These acquisitions affirm the Walker's long?standing mission to collect artists in depth as well as to add important new global artistic voices to the collection. These additions enhance the strength of our collection and form a vital piece of our vision for the new campus to be shared with the Twin Cities community and visitors from around the world." These 16 works join recent additions to the Garden under Viso's leadership of works by Jim Hodges, Pierre Huyghe, Kris Martin, and Dahn Vo. First created through the vision of the Walker's Director Emeritus Martin Friedman nearly 30 years ago as a partnership between the Walker and the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board, the Minneapolis Sculpture Garden was the first public/private urban sculpture park of

its kind and has served as a model for urban sculpture parks nationwide. Anchored by Claes Oldenburg and Coosje van Bruggen's iconic Spoonbridge and Cherry, the Garden has welcomed more than nine million visitors since first opening in 1988, showcasing more than 40 works from the Walker's internationally renowned collection ranging from figurative, abstract, and historically notable sculpture. Part of the institution's 75th anniversary as a public art center, the campus renovation and Garden reconstruction includes: a new entrance pavilion, indoor and outdoor dining, expanded green space next to the Walker and along Hennepin Avenue, five added acres for artwork, modernization of outdoor spaces with sustainable technologies, and a seamless integration of the Walker and Minneapolis Sculpture Garden.

Bryn Mawr Meadows Park

What follows is a correspondence between BMNA President, Kevin Thompson and MPRB Commissioner Anita Tabb.

12/1/15

Dear Commissioner Tabb,

At the November meeting of the Bryn Mawr Neighborhood Association we discussed the projected delay of the long-planned renovation of Bryn Mawr Meadows. The board voted to express disappointment in this further delay and asked me to send a formal letter of complaint to you as our representative on the Park Board. It is our understanding that the project has now been pushed back to at least 2021. Board members and neighbors are distressed with the general condition of the park and feel that is has been allowed to deteriorate while other projects have been funded and moved forward. It is one of the largest parks in the city and as such takes up a substantial section of real estate in our neighborhood. The condition of the park affects not only the appearance of the neighborhood but also the perception of it given that a large number of people from outside the neighborhood use the park, particularly but not exclusively during the warmer months. Neighbors who live on or near the park express the most concem for its appearance and degradation. A few comments received from neighbors:

I thought I saw plans for a remodel, but nothing gets done. It's the worst park in the entire city, yet it probably gets the most athletic field use. The entire place is a dump. The Meadows are always flooded, all the paved pathways are upheaved. There is not adequate parking space. The park board has zero quality standards for maintenance, mowing or weed control.

During the summer there are dozens of games at the Meadows with hundreds of cars. The neighborhood near the park is overrun. The traffic, drinking and associated nuisance behavior has grown without planning by the Park Board to mitigate the impact.


The park is being used as a regional sports center without the road infrastructure to support it and it significantly impacts the livability of the neighborhood.

The park looks like it has been forgotten by the Park Board, essentially. Just doing the bare minimum to get by.

As the projected renovation gets pushed back further and further, there are young children for whom the years are passing by without a neighborhood park that meets their needs. Parents of these youngsters have been among the most vocal in expressing their disappointment in the quality of the facilities and grounds at the park.

We have iterated our concerns to you previously and have yet to see impactful action on the Meadows and so reiterate our concerns at this time in light of the recommended further delay in renovating the Meadows. We find such a long delay in restoring this asset to be unacceptable. The BMNA board is requesting a meeting with you and Superintendent Miller to further discuss the Meadows.

Dear Kevin,

First of all, I apologize for the delay in getting back to you. I wanted to make sure to relay your concerns to the Superintendent and staff before I responded and we have been talking about Bryn Mawr Meadows to see if there are things that can be done on an interim basis until adequate funding is available.

Just so that you'll be aware, many projects in out years were pushed out at least a year (including Bottineau, Farview, Fuller, Holmes, Luxton, Lyndale Farmstead, and many others - I have just started down the alphabet!) because so many of our projects have been coming in well over budget. In fact, one of the beneficiaries of our pushing off projects is the Bryn Mawr park at Bassetts Creek which was allotted additional funding last year to put in a new playground that would meet safety standards as well as deal with the many water issues plaguing the area. We need to allocate additional funding to many projects in order to complete them and replace them with AT LEAST the current level of amenity. Our bids for the past two years have been coming in so far over target that we've been unable to do so. We've had to find ways to address these issues and one of the tactics that the board agreed to was the delaying of out year projects in order to complete current projects at an acceptable level.

Let me make sure you have a clear picture of the work we will be performing. Our first order of business will be to do a service area master plan that will include Bryn Mawr Meadows. Our purpose in doing these master plans is to look at the parks holistically rather than have one neighborhood park serve all functions. As an example, there may not be a wading pool in every park but there would be one in the area. This planning will begin in 2017 and includes Bryn Mawr Meadows. So specific discussions about the functions at Bryn Mawr Meadows will kick off that year. It will likely consume the majority of the year and will start at a very high level and then drill down. As the process progresses, specific details related to each park will be completed and we will have a plan for Bryn Mawr Meadows park (along with all of the remaining parks in the service area). I am not sure if you noticed but the playground at BMM is NOT being pushed off to 2021. It is still planned for 2019. And I fully expect it will be replaced during 2019. But the fields, paths, possible new or changed location of parking lots, etc will be delayed until 2021 and can be planned in conjunction with the SW LRT work. In the meantime, I am working with staff to see what temporary measures we can use to address some of the worst path. For example, it is possible that we could add gravel to make the paths more usable during this interim period if that might be an acceptable interim plan.

And speaking of SW LRT, we will actually be doing some of the BMM planning starting in 2016 because that project will have a significant but temporary effect on the park and we would like to obtain some neighborhood input as we make certain decisions. We'll be in touch when we have enough information from the project office to provide information as ask the right questions. For example, we believe that the Project Office desires to use the park to facilitate construction of a new pedestrian bridge as a part of the SWLRT project. Their plans would include reconstruction of a path through the center of the park-a route they would use to access the construction area. However, as that route cuts through the center of the park and would likely be disruptive to park activities, we intend to ask the SPO to access their construction area using a route along the south edge of the parknear 394, and then reconstruct that trail when their construction is complete. It is important to consider the impacts of the SWLRT project construction on the park; completing improvements in advance of the LRT work would likely compromise those improvements, so sequencing becomes critical.

Because of the SPO's work in the park, we should begin an engagement process to define at least initial directions for any evolution of the park so the bridge and a trail leading to it are fully considered relative to the park. The SPO's plans show an alignment, but it's based solely on their understanding of the park. For SW LRT impacts park aspects, we'll be framing an engagement process that can happen in 2016 and will use staff resources to develop a concept/master plan.

None of us on the board are happy about the delays in any of our parks. Nor are we happy about the cost increases that we've seen in the past couple of years since so many construction resources in the area have been allocated to the building of the Vikings Stadium. We are hopeful that we will have more and more realistic bids once the "construction boom" is over but that is looking unlikely. So we are adding an inflationary factor into our estimates and hope that it helps to keep our budgets realistic. This has been a particularly difficult year because so many bids came in so far over budget. I would like to suggest that we have staff sit with the neighborhood to determine some interim measures we can take to address some immediate concerns and "take the rough edges" off the park until it is fully funded. Please understand that these might only be putting lipstick on a pig but perhaps the appearance of better manicured areas can work in the short run.

February 25, 2015 Northern Harrier swooping from tree to tree along Hawthorne Av. These medium-sized hawks are slim, have long tails, fly close to the ground, and stick around during the winter. Bigger than kestrels, don't soar like red-tailed hawks.

Eight Bryn Mawr Moms on the Search for Good Books & Food

The Painted Girls by Cathy Marie Buchanan

he story of the three Van Goethem sisters, Antoinette, - Marie, and Charlotte, struggling to survive in the slums of Paris after the death of their father, is based in history. Marie was, in real life, a model for Edgar Degas. She was the inspiration for his wax statue of "Little Dancer Aged Fourteen." This is a book filled with tension from the beginning. We were drawn in from the opening paragraph; Maman wringing her hands as she pleads with the landlord to let them stay, "we just put my husband into the ground."

Buchanan has fleshed out the fictional lives of these three sisters in the context of Emile Zole's 7th novel, La Assommoir. Rife with alcoholism and poverty, La Assommoir grapples with a universal question, "is birth destiny?" Marie struggles with this throughout the book, wondering if a descent into wretchedness is inevitable. Does her physiology determine her destiny, no matter how she fights to succeed?

Paris in the late 1800's is a time of artistic and cultural change, and the sisters are at the heart of it. All three yearn to be dancers at the Paris Opera Ballet, one way out of poverty and despair. But staying the course to achieve this end becomes difficult, as Antoinette falls in love with an abusive criminal, and Marie follows her mother's spiral into alcoholism. In the end, the power of their bond as sisters gives them the strength to prevail over the brutal reality of their lives.

Bradstreet Neighborhood Crafthouse 1930 Hennepin Avenue

he Bradstreet Neighborhood Crafthouse, previously located in the Graves Hotel (now Lowes), has moved next door to Burch Steak and Pizza Bar. And they brought their premier cocktails with them, along with an expanded menu. This Lowry Hill spot once housed Auriga (1997 – 2007) and then Rye Delicatessen for a few short years.

We started with some tasty cocktails—the Black Walnut Old Fashioned, Franklin Mint, and Off the Balcony—all featured exotic ingredients, like absinthe, pisco, Demerara, and various bitters. No point in picking a favorite; they were all great.

The small plates were perfect for sharing. We tried the broccolini, polenta fries, and cauliflower fritters, which were so good we ended up ordering a second plate. The citrus yogurt chicken with cilantro chutney was excellent, the lamb burger got a big thumbs up, and the ginger chicken with snow pea slaw really delivered a punch. The togarashi fries that come with the sandwiches were a real favorite. We liked them better than the polenta fries.

The desserts topped off the night, no chocolate and still a delight. The Yuzu Crème Brulee was the best ever. The Ricotta cheesecake with hazelnuts elicited a big "wow!"

The bar anchors the space, (it's in the same spot as it was in Rye, on the wall as you enter the restaurant) with smaller spaces surrounding; cozy and quiet enough for friends to talk on a cool Friday night.


